

Proceedings of the Ochlocknee Association.

The Ninety-fourth Annual Session of the Ochlocknee Primitive Baptist Association convened with Ty Ty church, two and one-half miles north of Ennis, on the A. B. & A. Railroad, beginning on Saturday, October 23d, 24th, and 25th, 1920.

The introductory sermon was preached by E'der W. M. Holcomb of the Pulaski Association.

After one hour intermission the delegates assembled in the house and were called to order by the Moderator.

Prayer by Elder W. D. Bryant.

First. Called for and received letters from eleven churches and minuted their state.

Second. Elected Elder E. R. Rhoden Moderator and Elder J. W. Gardner Clerk by ballot.

Third. Adopted last year's minutes as course of business. Fourth. Read the Decorum.

Fifth. Invited brethren of our faith and order to seats with us.

Sixth. Called for petitionary letters.

Seventh. Appointed committees as follows:

On Preaching and Finance: Brethren J. M. Clark, J. H. Martin, C. F. Horn, together with messenger of this church.

On Business: W. C. Singleton, Elder A. L. Perce and F. M. Renfro, together with the Moderator and Clerk.

On Memorials: W. H. Godwin and F. M. Renfroe.

Eighth. Called for the correspondents of the Association and received: From the San Pedro Association, J. J. Westberry.

From the Pulaski Association.

From the Union Association: A. A. Knight, J. D. Boykin and B. B. Oliff.

From the Flint River Association:

From the Alabaha Association: Elder W. D. Bryant, J. O. Walters, Randall Davis, and J. T. Thornton.

Moved and seconded that the Chippola Association be dropped from our correspondence. From the Suwanee Association:

Ninth. Called for petitionary correspondents.

Tenth. Appointed G. W. Horn to write corresponding letter. On motion adjourned until Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock. Prayer by Elder W. H. Godwin.

Fourth. called for report of Business Committee and received report as follows: We have examined the minutes of the several Associations and find nothing objectionable. Signed by A. L. Pierce, F. M. Renfroe and W. C. Singleton.

To the San Pedro Association to be held with the Blue Spring church, five miles northeast of Lee, on the Seaboard Railway, commencing on Friday before the first Sunday in October, 1921. Elder W. H. Godwin, F. M. Renfroe.

To the Unon Association to be held with Liberty church, nine miles northwest of Nashville, six miles southwest of Alapaha, beginning on Saturday before the third Sunday in October, 1921. J. I. Baker, J. H. Martin, Elder E. R. Rhoden and Elder J. W. Gardner.

To the Flint River Association to be held with Union church, twelve miles southwest of Camilla, fourteen miles west of Pelham, beginning on Saturday before the first Sunday in November, 1920: J. M. Clark, Elder W. H. Godwin and J. W. Gardner.

To the Alabaha Association to be held with Damascus church, Bacon county, Coffee, on the A. B. & A. Railway, 1 1-2 miles northeast, beginning on Friday before the first Sunday in November, 1920. Elders E. Lindsey and E. R. Rhoden.

To the Pulaski Association to be held with Mt. Pisgah

Call for corresponding letters; read and adopted.

Seventh. General meetings will be held as follows:

First District. Beginning on Friday before the first fifth Sunday in 1921. To be held with Mt. Zion church, four miles west of Coolidge, on the A. B. & A. Railway.

Second District. Beginning on Friday before the second fifth Sunday in 1921. To be held with Mt. Pisgah church, two miles east of Ochlocknee, on the A. C. L. Railway.

Eighth. On motion moved and seconded that the writing of the circular letter be discontinued.

Ninth. Called for report on finance and received as follows:

We, the Committee on Finance, submit the following: \$90.60 as contributions from the several churches. We recommend that five hundred minutes be printed, three hundred and fifty for the churches and one hundred and fifty for correspondents. We recommend that \$30.00 be given to the Clerk for printing minutes and his service, and \$60.00 to be divided among the visiting ministers and correspondents. We recommend that the cost of minutes be printed on last page of minutes.

Tenth. Called for report on Memorials. We, your committee on Memorial, find that God, in His all wise providence, has seen fit to call from time to an unbounded eternity our belover Brother, Elder D. N. Williams, who was a member of Live Oak church. Our loss is his eternal gain, then let us bow in humble submission, saying, "Thy Will Be Done."

Eleventh. On motion adjourned to meet with Mt. Pisgah church, two miles east of Ochlocknee, on the A. C. L. Railway, beginning on Saturday, before the fourth Sunday in November, 1921. E. R. Rhoden, Mcderator, Elder J. W. Gardner, Clerk.

Pisgah church, Thomas county, Georgia, on Saturday before the fourth Sunday in October, 1921, when and where we hope to meet you again. Until then, beloved brethren, farewell.

Minutes of the Ochlocknee Association

Rules of Decorum.

1. This Association shall open and close with prayer.

2. The members who are regularly chosen by the churches in our Union shall compose the Ochlocknee Primitive Baptist Association; two-thirds of which shall form a quorum.

3. Members chosen shall produce letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, together with their number in fellowship, those received by experience and baptism and otherwise, dismissed, excommunicated, restored, and dead since our last Association.

4. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe on the internal rights of any church.

5. This Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen of the members present.

6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preserve order, explain and put questions; he shall have the same right of speech as any other member, provided the chair shall be filled, but shall not vote, except the body be equally divided.

7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a fair record of the proceedings of the Association and the minutes taken shall be read and amended, if necessary, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises. The Clerk shall also keep a file of the minutes to be presented at each Association, and shall be accountable for all money deposited in the hands of the Association.

8. Any church applying by letter and delegates for admittance, which, upon examination, is found orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association and man fisted by the Moderator, giving the right hand of fellowship to its delegates.

9. Every church shall have a right to send two delegates to the Association and no more.

10. Every motion made and seconded shall claim the attention of the Association, except withdrawn by the person who made it, with the consent of the Association.

11. Every person who speaks must rise from his seat and address the Moderator and shall not be interrupted when speaking except when he departs from the subject.

12. No person shall speak more than three times on the same subject, without leave of the Association.

13. There shall be no talking or whispering in time of public speech, nor reflection cast on the speaker.

14. Whenever a case is decided by a vote, there shall be no more debate on the subject.

15. No person shall absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

16. The Association is in favor of preaching the Gospel, the circulation of the Scripture, and the advantage of education, and recommends temperance and morality in general, but to her members in particular, notwithstanding she is opposed to all modern institutions of men, such as Missionary; Bible, Tract and Sunday School Societies, together with the Baptist State Convention and Theological Schools, and such like, because their connection with the church of God is unauthorized by the scriptures. As such we cannot fellowship them, or admit to our church privileges any person who is therewith connected in any wise, believing all such to be speculative in their nature and fruithful sources for corrupting the church. In relation to Free Masonry, we recommend to our brethren who may already be attached to that fraternity to immediately withdraw therefrom, and when brethren leave the church and join that fraternity, they are not such as follow after the things that make for peace and things wherewith one may edify another.-Rom.-4-19. And as such, unless they manifest a suitable repentance and immediately withdraw therefrom, and make suitable acknowledgements, shall be rejected from the fellowship of the church.

17. We recommend to the churches composing this body to receive members that went off with the Missionaries and all other Baptists at the time of their separation from us, providing they bring satisfactory evidence of legal baptism with a suitable confession of faith, and not otherwise in disorder, and not to receive any who have been baptized by them since said separation only by experience and baptism.

18. This Association holds that if the Union be broken between any of the churches and the breach cannot be healed, to withdraw from them that may be deemed unsound in faith or immoral in practice until they be removed.

19. To invite visiting brethren from sister Associations, and ministers of our faith and order to seat with us.

20. To keep a correspondence with other Associations of

the same faith and order, so that a chain of communication may be preserved throughout the denomination.

21. If any member shall break the rules of this decorum he shall be reproved by the Moderator.

22. These rules shall be read at every Association prior to entering on business.

23. The rules of this decorum may be altered or amended at any time by a majority of three-fourths of the Association.

Articles of Faith.

1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the God-head—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.

2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the words of God by inspiration, and is our rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of eternal and particular election.

4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the state he is in by nature, or of his own free will and ability.

6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

8. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and not finally fall away.

9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper, and washing the saint's feet, are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances, and that the only true baptism is by immersion.

10. We believe that the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous shall be eternal.

11. We believe that no minister has the right to the administration of the ordinances only such as are regularly called and come under the imposition of the hands by the presbytery.

12. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.
