Sylva, N. C., August 18, 1938

The One Hundred and Ninth Session of the Tuckaseigee Association met with the Sylva Baptist Church.

Song: "Take the Name of Jesus With You."

Devotion by the pastor, H. M. Hocutt, from the verse: "Follow thou me, and I will make you Fishers of Men."

The Moderator, T. F. Deitz, called for the enrollment of messengers. Eighty were found present for the opening session.

By motion the order of business was adopted as was submitted by the Executive Committee.

The report on the Biblical Recorder was read by G. H. Cope. Motion to adopt this report was made and the motion sustained. R. F. Terrell discussed the report. The report on the Biblical Recorder was adopted.

The introductory sermon was delivered by Rev. G. N. Cowan, PERIODICALS

Missionary Baptists should be an informed people, and with the different periodicals that are available there is no reason for our being uninformed about our denominational work. Some of the periodicals we should have in our homes and read are "The Biblical Recorder", "Charity and Children", "Southern Baptist Home Missions" from the Home Mission Board, and "The Commission" from the Foreign Mission Board. These papers give us the best of reading matter and keep us informed about all our work.

The special task that should challenge us now is the enlarged circulation of the "Biblical Recorder." Surely every pastor, Sunday school superintendent, teacher, deacon, and church leader should receive and read this paper.

We have at present about 150 subscriptions in our association. This is a considerable increase over a few years ago, but even now we have the Recorder in only one Baptist Home in eight. It is no surprise that our people are giving so little to the mission causes when they know so little about what is being done.

The management of the Recorder is now promoting a new plan for securing more subscriptions. In brief, the plan is to secure clubs of subscribers in the different churches of about 10 per cent of the resident membership for 1.50 a year and let the subscriptions expire and be renewed at the time of the meeting of the association. One person in each church can receive the money for the entire group of subscribers and bring the money with the names of the subscriber to the Recorder representative in the association or send it directly to the office in Raleigh. Each reader receives his paper through the mail, and he knows that he will be expected to renew at the time the association meets. The committee feels that the association would like to endorse such plan and to encourage our people to read the Recorder and the other periodicals mentioned above.

Report on State and Home Missions was read by H. M. Hocutt, and Fred Forester, and motion to adopt the same.

STATE MISSIONS

For a hundred years the work of State Missions has centered in evangelism, and truly a noble service has been rendered. In many strategic centers churches have been started through the State Mission program that have grown to be strong in evangelism and liberal in giving to all our mission causes. One very important task at present is that of assisting some of our faithful pastors who are serving in important centers where the people are not able adequately to carry the full responsibility of pastoral support. Let this work continue, and these churches that are now assisted will become strong among us in the Lord's work.

Some other phases of our State Mission program are: Teaching and training or the Sunday school and B. T. U., aiding in church building programs in important centers when funds are available, work among the Indians in Robeson County, some assistance to the negroes, work among students in the colleges, services in hospitals and sanatoriums, and our general missionary work by Missionaries M. O. Alexander and J. C. Pipes. The accomplishments of the past and present make it very evident that we have a worthy task that deserves our hearty support. With renewed energy let us push forward along every line.

One of the best ways we can have a part in this great task is for us to return to our churches and urge every church to make a contribution to our general denominational program through the Cooperative Program. A small offering from each church will count.

Inasmuch as the major emphasis of our denomination for 1939 is to be on evangelism, your committee would recommend that a committee on evangelism be appointed whose duty it will be to keep the matter of evangelism definitely before our people and to see to it that no unchurched community will be deprived of evangelistic services.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS OF WORK DONE THE PAST YEAR

Christ's closing message to His followers in Matt.: 28:18-20 was for them to go and minister to all nations. The Home Mission Board in last year is ministering to "nations" in our home-land, To the many nationalities in the home land our representatives have preached 36,579 sermons, built 22 missions chapels and pastors homes, opened over 100 new missions stations, visited 50,000 people personally in the name of Christ, given out 34,930 Bibles and 23 missionaries have been added.

Foreigners: Those born in other lands and those born in this land but speaks a foreign language making over five million people to minister to. We have 235 workers serving 247 organized churches and 353 out-stations. They report 5,004 conversions 2,164 baptized into missions, churches and a church membership of 12,445 members. This work includes Mexicans, Italians, Cubans in United States, Europeans and Chinese.

Deaf-Mutes: Two home missionaries are working with 45,000 deaf-mutes and report the need of 120 teaching centers for Bible study. There were 79 baptisms last year.

Indians: There are more than 200,000 Indians including 40 tribes speaking 30 languages in North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Arizona with 62 missionaries serving 289 churches trying to carry the good news to them.

Panama: There are more than 60,000 looking to the Home Board to send them the Gospel through seven churches and two missionaries. The Balboa Heights church is self-supporting.

Cuba: Under the direction of Dr. McCall 30 important centers have the gospel with 51 churches and two newly-organized churches. There are nearly 5,000 Baptist in Cuba and they give liberally to the church work there.

City Missions and Good-will Centers: Our board is doing a good work in these thickly industrial areas. Good-will centers and several rescue missions are ministering to thousands who need the gospel.

Negroes: Dr. Noble Beall s general missionary to the negroes with several other white workers they are greatly honoring the Lord in this field.

Missions in the mountains are carried on by eight laborers. The home mission board operate three Mission schools and owns eight mountain schools that are operated by their local board of trustees. Jacob Gartenhaus the board's only missionary to more than half million Jews is getting more support from praying Baptists in this progressive work. Dr. Leavell in the department of evangelism has some sweeping associational and city-wide revivals over the

South.

Debts are being paid, field work is being done and our Southern Baptists are rallying to the support of Missions generally.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Ninety-three years ago our fathers met in Augusta, Ga., and launched the Foreign Mission Enterprise of the Southern Baptist. We are profoundly grateful to our Almighty God for the marvelous way in which He has led us through these years.

Report

There should be sustained and signal gratitude in our heart to our Lord Jesus for His blessings upon the work of Foreign Mission as carried on by Southern Baptists. In spite of constantly receiving obstacles, there has been progress. In 1927 your Foreign Mission had 544 missionaries on the roll. In 1934 there were only 377 in active service. Since 1933 there have been appointed 90 more new missionaries and reappointed 28 making a total of 118 replacements. There are at present 415 active missionaries. There are 56 retired missionaries on the pension plan. Your board has work in sixteen countries. In all these countries our Lord is blessing in the work and some of the countries many souls are being added to the kingdom. In these sixteen countries there are now 1,715 churches, 2,798 out-stations making the total membership on all fields in 203,674 with 2,250 Sunday schools having an enrollment of 109,580. Last year there were 14,882 baptisms.

With these items of general information, this report calls attention to some discouraging features that come up.

First, the war in China with its terrible destruction of property in many sections where we have work.

Second, persecution in Rumania. A decree was passed to close every Baptist church, but they are still open.

Third, persecution in Italy. Our work in Italy is hedged about by government restrictions.

Fourth, the greatest need in our mission work today is for the increased income on the part of the Foreign Mission Board. We cannot properly man the field where we have worked with the missionary personnel of less than 500 until we build our missionary force back to this number our work will be seriously handicapped.

Encouraging Features

First, our debt reduction on January 1, 1933, we owed the bank in Richmond \$1,110,000. Today we owe \$339,500.

Second, increased receipts of the board during the past year

there was received for the first time in a number of years more than \$1,000,000 and in 1933 we received just a little more than \$671,000.

Fourth, the increasing in our missionary personnel. During the lean years our number was decreased from 544 to 377. We have now built the number back up to where we have 415 missionaries.

Fifth ,the opportunity for the preaching of the gospel to all our mission fields.

Report for the Baptist Hospital was read by J. T. Gribble as follows:

REPORT ON THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL, INC., AND SCHOOL FOR NURSES AT WINSTON-SALEM, N. C.

The Baptist Hospital was incorporated in 1922 and received its first patient on May 28, 1923. This hospital was instituted to carry out the teachings of the ministry of Jesus and was made possible by a fund provided in the \$75,000,000.00 campaign.

The main hospital is a five-story, fire-proof brick building with basement and is beautifully located on an elevation in the western part of Winston-Salem. The capacity of the hospital is 108 beds and is equipped with all the modern conveniences of the best hospitals in the land. The hospital grounds comprise nine acres which have been made very attractive and beautiful by the women from the different churches of Winston-Salem.

On March 10, 1938, when the last report was made public, 39,712 patients had entered this hospital since its establishment, an average of 388 patients per month. These patients come from all sections of the State regardless of religious affiliations. Western

North Carolina has had a number of patients in the hospital from time to time and today one of our elderly ministers, Rev. J. D. Sitton, is now a patient there. I am sure that all of us rejoice that "Uncle John", as commonly known among us, is being so well and comfortably cared for in his declining days.

During the year 1937, the hospital treated 1,564 patients who could pay little, if anything, at an estimated cost of \$78,000.00 plus medical and surgical services of \$117,300.00. This will give you a glimpse of what the hospital means to those who are suffering and should call very vividly to our memory the great compassion which Jesus had toward those who suffered during his ministry.

Another instance of the work of the hospital during the year 1937 which is noteworthy was the services rendered to the mothers of our State. 1,000 mothers were sent back from the hospital to their homes representing 3,000 children who were blessed with mothers who, otherwise, might have been orphans today.

There is a staff of sixty-nine doctors and ninety-one nurses whose qualifications and ability are excelled by none, and, whose devotion to duty and consecration to the Master cannot be excelled.

It costs \$4.00 per day to care for a patient in the hospital, but, by special arrangements, these charges can be reduced very materially. Service cases, those paid by a church or community, are \$1.50 per day. 1,000 or more persons were turned away from the hospital last year because of the lack of room.

The hospital depends for its financing upon the 4% of the monies of the Co-operative Program, Mother's Day Offerings and special contributions. May our hearts be touched in sympathy for and our pocket books be opened to this great institution of services to humanity which is fulfilling one of the commandments of our Lord.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

There is probably no one agency of our North Carolina Baptist that is as widely familiar to us as our institution at Thomasville, and the Kennedy Home.

What it is doing for us will not be known in this generation, but we will have to wait until those children grow up to be the citizens of our great common wealth.

We do know this, however, that it is our pet institution and Baptists from all over our State are interested in its welfare.

We send large amounts of produce that we have on hand and often feel satisfied that we have done our duty. Now this is only a very small part of what we should do. Every pastor and Sunday school superintendent should urge the ONCE A MONTH OFFERING through our Sunday schools. We should try to get every Baptist in every church to give in cash as much as one days wages for our THANKSGIVING OFFERING. Such systematic planning and giving would tie us on to our Lords work everywhere.

The clerk read the resolution that was adopted at John's Creek in order that two vacancies may be filled.

RECOMMENDATION

We, The Tuckaseigee Association in session, at John's Creek Baptist Church, Cowarts, North Carolina, having forty-one churches to constitute our membership, and having more than fifty ordained ministers in our territory, with many of our churches having only once a month preaching and many of our ordained ministers having no work at all, believe it necessary to take some steps in our association whereby our local churches may be more cautious in the ordination of our young men to the ministry with no church in view: Therefore, we recommend:

First, That this Association in session appoint a presbytery consisting of not less than five pastors to sit in session and pass upon the qualifications, advantages and possibilities for pastoral work of any man or church who may desire a young man ordained.

Second, That any man who has been licensed by a local church to the gospel ministry shall preach and exercise his calling whereever he may desire to do so for a period of not less than two years before he shall be eligible for ordaination unless some church shall call him as its pastor.

Third, That the association encourages all young ministers who may be found worthy to make progress and prove themselves capable of spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

RESOLUTIONS

Whereas, it is commonly known that an effort is being made to secure permission for the local theatre to operate on Sunday; therefore,

Be it resolved that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association now in session at the Sylva Baptist church do go on record as disapproving any form of Sunday shows in the Town of Sylva and that we urge the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Sylva not to grant any permission for Sunday shows;

Be it further resolved that we express our disapproval of the frequent late-hour dances in Sylva and that we urge the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Sylva and the law enforcement officers to keep a close watch on any and all places selling beer where disorderly conduct is in any way evident and seek to check all drinking as far as possible;

Be it further resolved that we express with regret the fact that the swimming pool in Sylva has been permitted to remain open on Sundays for the past two summers and that we urge the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Sylva to give due and serious consideration to the evil effects of such Sunday operation before permission is granted for the pool to remain open on Sundays after this summer:

Be it further resolved that we express our keen appreciation to the Mayor, the Board of Adermen, and officers of the Town of Sylva and all the officers of Jackson County for their faithful service in an effort to check drinking and all other forms of evil and that we lend our encouragement and support to them in their work in the future;

Be it further resolved that a copy of these resolutions be given to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Sylva, a copy be given to the local papers for publication, and a copy be placed in our minutes.

Motion made to adopt the above report.

Report on S. C. I. was read by Brother H. E. Monteith as follows: SYLVA COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE

For about thirty-five years Sylva Collegiate Institute played an important part in the education of the youth of Western North Carolina. Due however, to financial conditions, and to the better equipment of Public Schools, Sylva Collegiate Institute was forced to close its doors in 1932 and it does not seem probable that it will

again be operated as a Baptist School, certainly not in the near future.

It was the policy of this association during the time the school was in operation to select from nine to fifteen good and loyal men to act as Trustees of the school, and these men during the years have served well, giving of their time, talents and money in the cause of Christian education.

Since the school is no more in operation, and since the only function of a Board of Trustees at this time is to look after the property of the school, by and with the aid of the Home Mission Board, I therefore recommend, that hereafter there shall be five men appointed by the Moderator of this association as trustees of Sylva Collegiate Institute, and that the five men so appointed shall be and constitute the Board of Trustees of Sylva Collegiate Institute, and that they shall hold office until their sucessors shall in like manner have been appointed. I do further recommend, that in addition to the five men named by the Moderator, that the Moderator of this association, shall at all times be a member exofficio of said Board of Trustees.

W. M. U. REPORT

We have come to a great and glorious year in the history of Woman's Missionary Union. As we join this year in the Golden Jubilee Celebration of the fiftieth Anniversary of united Mssionary effort.

Anniversaries are like peaks on a highway from which one looks back over the road traveled, and views the inviting scenes that lie before us. There are many elements that make them sacred. Commemorating as they do both joyous and sad occasions. Association contribute to deepen the impressions they make. Increasing years hallow the memories they awaken.

Anniversaries of organizations and movements are memorable because they provide coincidence of growth of the ideals and purpose for which they were organized.

And we recommend and urge that Tuckaseigee W. M. U. accept the goals allotted to us and that we earnestly endeavor to attain them and to do so we must make a united effort.

Financial goals. A ten per cent increase in total gifts of Woman's Missionary Union over the total gifts of 1937.

Jubilee gifts. That over and above the ten per cent increase, our special jubilee gift of \$10,000.00 be reached through the Heck Memorial Offering.

Organizations and membership goals. A ten per cent increase in number of organizations and members.

We in the Tuckaseigee Association, have a long way to go to reach these goals . . . We have forty-two churches and organizations in only nine of these we have two new organizations to report.

We had six A-1 Societies last year. Our W. M. U. contributed ten dollars to hire a truck to take our R. A. boys to Ridgecrest to R. A. Camp.

The Tuckaseigee ranks second in the Asheville Division in the number of societies observing the special seasons of prayer and Tuckaseigee led in all these in the number of subscriptions to the BIBLICAL RECORDER with 115 subscribers making total amount contributed last year by all our organizations \$534.26.

We would give ourselves anew to the great purpose which was ours from the beginning, "To stimulate the missionary spirit and grace of giving among our women and young people of all our churches, praying that God may use us to advance His Kingdom on earth." Through the plans of our Golden Jubilee year, and we would urge each one to give their best of loving, loyal service to our Master.
