## CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association shall be denominated and known as the EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ART. 2—The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3.—This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from her membership assembled in conference.

ART. 4.—The delegates from each church shall bear a Letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church: Provided, however, That when any church has prepared a Letter, and through inadvertence the Letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5.—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members, by ballot, by majority of its members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6.—It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Coustitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7.—It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

ART 9.—!he Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual report of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to Executive Committee in order that sa'd Committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

ART. 10.—The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe Gospel order.

ART. 11—The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privilege of the body, except that of voting.

ART. 12.—The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13.—By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14.—This Constitution may be amended at any annual session, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

## CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been lead, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Chost, we do now in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another as one body in Christ. We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion, to religiously educate our children, to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances, to walk circumspectly in the world, to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all talking, backbiting, and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage te watch over one another in brotherly love, to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness or distress. to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of these rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant and principles of God's Word.

## RULES OF ORDER.

1.—On the meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceeding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a Chairman pro tem shall be elected.

2. - Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3.—At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4.—The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.

5.—Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6,—No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. -All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer, before discussion.

8.—No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9.— When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time; which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10.—After a motion has been decided any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11.—No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association, and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the Minutes.

12.—All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be de-

cided by a majority of votes.

13.—The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14.—The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

MOUNT HOLLY, Oct. 3, 1899.

The Eastern Association met in its fifty sixth annual session with the Mt. Holly Baptist Church at 11 a. m., Tuesday, October 3, 1899.

On motion bro. N. B. Cobb preached the Introductory Sermon, in the absence of R. C. Sandlin, the appointee. Text: Romans 6:3, 4.

After the sermon a recess was taken for one hour.

#### AFTERNOON.

The Moderator called the Association to order at 1:30 p m., and read 19th Psalm. Benj. Ward led in prayer.

On motion the Treasurer was ordered to pay the money sent with Letter from Bowden's equally to State, Home, and Foreign Missions.

On motion of S. M. Carlton the Letters from Clinton, New Hope, Mt. Olive, and Salem were laid on the table.

On motion of L. R. Highsmith, that part of the Shiloh Letter referring to Ivanhoe was laid on the table.

Moderator announced that it was in order for the election of officers for the ensuing year. Whereupon by motion of J. T. Albritton, S. G. Hall cast the ballot of the Association for J. L. Stewart, Moderator; A. R. Herring, Clerk: Isaiah Carroll, Treasurer.

The following visiting brethren were recognized and welcomed to seats in the body: J. C. Caddell representing Riblical Recorder, E. J. Edwards representing N. C. Baptist, J. D. Newton from Liberty Association, C. S. Blackwell, J. J. Adams, and J. J. Payseur, who are now members of this Association.

On motion of J. T. Bland the Letter from Shiloh was taken from the table and referred to a Committee appointed by Moderator, consisting of C. S. Blackwell, J. T. Albritton, N. B. Cobb.

On motion J. T. Bland was added to the Committee.

On motion of J. T. Bland the Moderator appointed as Corresponding Delegates any member of this Association who may visit any of the Associations to whom we usually send delegates.

The Association adjourned after prayer by M. C. Walton.

## SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Wednesday, Oct. 4, 1899.

Religious exercises were conducted by J. D. Larkins, after which the Moderator called the Association to order.

Roll of delegates called Minutes of yesterday read and approved.

Jno. E. White Corresponding Secretary, A. Johnson of the Orphanage and Charity and Children, were welcomed by Moderator.

Special order.—Reports of Executive Committee together with State Missions and Jacksonville church debt.

Reports not being ready, the Treasurer submitted his report, which was referred to an Auditing Committee composed of C. E. Daniel, J. R. Marshall, W. J. Hollingsworth.

Report on State Missions was then submitted and read by J. B. Harrell:

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSONS.

We as Baptists of North Carolina have continual cause to thank God for the success that attends the work of State Missions within our bounds. Our motto has ever been and ever shall be "North Carolina for Jesus Christ," To this end our faithful laborers have toiled in the past, are toiling now, and shall continue to toil, until this grand ideal is reached. Our faithful heralds have gone to every county and almost every home in our beloved State, and as a result our most aggressive churches have sprung up, and many of the most faithful servants of the Lord who are preaching the Gospel, not only in North Carolina but in other portions of our country as well as in foreign lands, have been the outcome ef this work. Our Board of Missions has in the field this year 100 regular missionaries, one general missionary for the west, one district missionary, and a Sunday School missionary for the whole State. In addition to these we have 120 of our best pastors as members of the Volunteer Mission Corps reenforcing the regular workers on the destitute fields. We are occupying 358 destitute stations in 69 different counties.

Your Committee would call especial attention to the fact; that since our last session God has flung open a gate of great opportunity in western North Carolina. The Western North Carolina Convention dissolved and 10 counties were added to our field of work; this enlargement of our territory, brought about by God's providence, has made necessary an increase of \$5,000 in Boards of Appropriation. In order that we may do our share in meeting the demands of this enlarged work, we recommend

that each church should increase its pledges for State Missions  $33\frac{1}{8}$  per cent.

At the request of the Executive Committee of the Association we report that in our own bounds the Board has made appropriations as follows: To Joseph Aden and N. A. Shelly, \$200: B. Ward, \$50; J. H. Hildreth, \$75; F. H. Farrington, \$250; making a total amount of \$575. These appropriatious were made on the recommendation of the ixecutive Committee. The earnest attention of the Association is called to the fact that by oversight or neglect no pledges were taken at our last session for Associational Missions; consequently our courches, with few exceptions, have taken collections to help the Board meet its obligations to missionaries in our own bounds; and we have received more than twice as much for our missionaries as we have raised for State Missions. Such a state of affairs ought not to be, and this Association should at once take pledges for Associational Missions.

Pending its adoption the congregation sang "Jesus lover of my soul." At close of song Jno. E. White addressed the Association: after which a cash collection for State Missions was taken, amounting to \$16.70.

On motion of J. H. Hildreth pledges were taken for State Missions as will appear in Table.

No written report of Executive Committee or Committee or Jacksonville church debt was submitted, but J. H. Hildreth, Benj. Ward, and N. A. Shelly spoke of their work and its needs.

At this juncture an effort was made to raise funds to pay balance due on Jacksonville church debt. D. L. Gore proposed that he would pay 25 per cent of the debt if the State Board would pay \$100 and the Association would pay the balance. Jno. E. White assumed the payment of \$100 on the part of the Board; \$17.60 in cash received by individual subscriptions Roll of churches then called and pledges taken which secured the payment of the balance of the debt in thirty days.

On motion it was ordered that the settlement of this debt be turned over to D. L. Gore, and that all money raised for the payment of the same be paid in to him and that he apply the same to the settlement of said debt and report at our next session.

The report was then adopted.

The report on Orphanage was submitted and read by J. D. Larkins:

## REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist Orphanage has just closed a successful year, although it has had a cause to be gloomy and almost despair, for, this year God has taken to his eternal reward one of the greatest, if not the greatest, friend the orphans have ever had. J. H. Mills will ever live in the memory of those who are homeless, yea, every one who known him, and he was known where he was never seen. We wish to begin a new building. "Mills Memorial Machine Shop," let every Baptist in North Carolina rally to its erection. 175 orphans are provided for, and 300 more homeless and help-less are knocking at the door. Can't we provide for them? A new nursery nearly completed at a cost of \$2200. Orphanage property-valued at \$25,000. Out of debt; do not owe a cent. All of the officers and teachers in full sympathy with their work, and the treatment of the children excellent. Charity and Children a circulation of 6,000, therefore destined

to be a great source of revenue. May God bless us and increase our zeal till all of those who are homeless shall find homes.

Committee on Investigation reported as follows:

#### RFPORT.

After carefully investigating all the facts relating to the grievances expressed in Letter from Shiloh church against Ivanhoe church, your Committee are unanimously of the opinion that this Association, to whom an adjustment of the difficulties between these churches has been referred, recommend, 1st. That Ivanhoe church rescind its action in receiving the 49 brethren from Shiloh church who united with them without Letters. 2d. That Shiloh church rescind its action in regard to all the brethren and sisters who endorsed a paper setting forth certain grievances and signed "Brethren and Sisters of Shiloh church," and restore such of them as have been excluded to church fellowship, with the understanding that they be granted Letters of Dismission to unite with other Baptist churches if they so desire.

Special order, Report on Orphanage was taken up and spoken to by A. Johnson.

Final leave of absence granted the delegates from Masonboro and Hallsville.

On motion a cash collection was taken for the Orphange, amounting to \$9.59. The report was then adopted.

The delegetes from Poplar Grove, Castle Haynes, also D. L. Gore were granted final leave of absence.

Then the Association suspended for the preaching of the Missionary Sermon.

Scripture used, Isaiah 38:17, Rom. 1:3, and latter part of Rom. 8.

After sermon business was resumed. D. W. Fussell excused.

Report on Periodicals submitted and read by J. T. Albritton.

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Your Committee deplore the fact that so many brethren fail to patronize our periodicals. No Baptist can become a well developed Chris-

tian character, and no organization can become an active, co operative Baptist church that ignores our denominational literature. The individual or church thus deprived of the means of information and development will be marred by dwarfishness or disfigurement, or both, and as unsightly as a body covered with wens and carbuncles. We appeal to our pastors to urge their brethren to seek wider information about, and deeper interest in the co-operative work of the denomination by means of the Biblical Recorder, price \$1.50 per year; North Corolina Baptist, \$1.00; Charity and Children, \$1.00; Foreign Mission Journal, 25 cents; Our Home Field, 10 cents; and the Sunday School Literature of the Southern Baptist Convention. See to it that above periodicals are taken by the membership of their churches.

## REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Paul writing from Corinth "to all that in Rome called saints," said: "I am debtor both to the Greek and to the barbarians, both to the wise and to the unwise, so as much as in me is I am ready to preach the Gospel to you that are at Rome also."-Rom. 1:14. He did not mean that because these parties had bestowed upon him favors, or were his personal friends or connected by earthly kinship that he owed them the gospel, but he meant plainly, that a man who had received the gospel himself was placed under obligation to deliver that Gospel to every human being upon the whole earth, whom he could reach in his life time. It was a legacy left him by the Saviour to be distributed among all nations-to be carried to every creature. And Paul's debt to the world could not be fully discharged so long as a single individual remained within his reach who had not heard of the Gospel of Christ. As was Paul's indebtedness to the lost world, so is ours; for this obligation rests upon every individual who has received the gift of eternal life. What are we doing to discharge our debt? The 1658 white churches in North Carolina containing 165,754 professing Christians gave last year but \$8,092.91 to the Foreign Mission Board to send the Gospel to the millions of China, of Africa, of Japan, of Brazil, and of Mexico, who have it not.

Some individual churches have made contributions to support individual missionaries through what is known as "The Gospel Mission Plan," amounting to ; but what are these amounts when compared with the vast destitution in pagan and in papal lands.

North Carolina Baptists are now represented in China by the following ordained missionaries and their wives, and by the daughter of Bro. G. W. Green.

# REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF MISSIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA.

To the Eastern Association:

It is with great pleasure that the Central Committee reports to your Association another prosperous year in its mission work. While we regret to say there are yet many churches in which there are no Woman's Missionary Societies. The number of these organizations is constantly increasing and testimony to their helpfulness comes from every section of our State. The aim of these Societies is not only regular contributions to Home, State, and Foreign Missions; but also the study of the Scriptures, united prayer and mission study. It is with deep thankfulness, therefore, that we can truly say we believe the Societies are not only growing in gifts, but growing in the grace of God, and in knowledge of His Word.

In the year 1897-98 96 new societies were organized, and \$6.893 were reported. December, 1898, closed the 13th report of the Central Committee. This Committee was appointed by the State Board of Missions in 1896, and from a beginning of 14 societies has risen to 350. In the 13 years work \$44,664 has been reported. We ask again as last year for the continued assistance of the ministers, believing that an active Woman's Missionary Society will be found to be a blessing to every branch-of church work.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

This department of our work has for its territory Tennessee, Texas, Florida, Louisiana, Cuba, Indian Territory, Oklahoma, and all the States making up the Southern Baptist Convention. This work is very important. Foreign population is coming in from various parts of the world. We ought to give them the gospel as they come to us. To fully supply the destitution in North Carolina, Tennessee, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Maryland, Missouri, and Texas alone it would require more than 1,000 missionaries and about \$450,000 to support them, besides what their fields of labor would furnish, and about as much for building churches. annually, for the next 10 years. If we include the remaining States of the Southern Baptist Convention, it would require about 2,000 missionaries and about \$500,000, annually, to supply our own destitute territory. Cuba came into our hands in the war with Spain, and ought to be nearer our hearts than ever before. We ought to gain and take that country for Christ. Last year this Association gave for Home Missions \$134.50. This year it gave about \$122.67. Shall this Association with its 6,333 members let these conditions remain unchanged? Dear brethren lets fall in line, unite our efforts, double our gifts to this work, and give the gospel to our brethren. J. W. NOBLES.

#### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We congratulate the Baptists of North Carolina on being the leaders in the great educational movement now sweeping the State from mountain to sea. The educational enthusiasm now prevailing in the State is evidenced in the unprecedented number of students now in Wake Forest and in the Baptist Female University—250 and 184 respectively. The opening of the Baptist Female University with 142 boarders and 42 day pupils is phenominal in higher female education. No school of equal grade ever opened with such signal tokens of public favor. It is a work that began in faith and God has not failed to honor his faithful servants.

#### WAKE FOREST.

Has moved on and up on all lines. The 250 students now within her walls testify how close she is to every Baptist heart. The ministerial students now number 30, and the Board appropriates \$9.00 per month to each, with the agreement that each beneficiary give his note for same and to refund with interest. We believe this arrangement is wise and calculated to inculcate a higher selfrespect in each beneficiary and at the same time increase the usefulness of the Board in future years. We heartily commend this interest to every church, and urge a collection for Ministerial Education. We commend our many preparatory schools scattered over our State, and especially such as are within the bounds of our own Association. Baptists should patronize Baptist schools, other things being equal—and things are more than equal in favor of our Baptist schools.
