

> Constitution and By-Laws Randolph Baptist Association Revised: October, 1990

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this body shall be known as the Randolph Baptist Association. It may hereafter be referred to as the Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

- Section 1. This Association is a self-determining Baptist body, created and sustained by the churches affiliated with her and responsible to them through their Messengers.
- Section 2. The purpose of the Randolph Baptist Association is to enable member churches, individually and together, as they endeavor to enlarge, strengthen, and enrich the fellowship of God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to foster cooperation in the programs and ministries of this Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention, thereby fulfilling the Commission of Jesus Christ as stated in Matthew 28:19-20.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches within the area of the Association. A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an Annual Report to the Association, elects Messengers to attend the Associational Meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.
- Section 2. The Association shall be sole judge of it's membership and may receive churches, according to the Constitution and By-laws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire.
- Section 3. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association over a period of two years shall be contacted by the Credentials Committee of the Association to determine the intentions of the church regarding it's desire to remain in the Association. In the event the church does not respond to the efforts of the Credentials Committee, the church will be considered as having chosen to withdraw from the Association.
- Section 4. Any church that has departed from Baptist faith and practices and has failed to abide by the provision of the Constitution and By-laws of the Association, will be contacted by the Credentials Committee. Such church upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee and a vote of the Association shall be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such actions have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the Meetings of the Association.
- desiring affiliate with Section 5 Churches to the Association shall make a written request to the Credentials Committee of the Association at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October), for examination and recommendation to the Association. A church (or mission) is first received into the watch care of the Association. Upon completion of one year in watch care relationship, a church may be received into full membership of the Association by a recommendation of the Credentials Committee. There must be a vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the Associational Meeting petitioning church (or mission) to become a regularly affiliated member church of the Association.

Section 6. It is understood that each church in this
Association is independent and sovereign in it's
own affairs, and the Association has no authority
over the churches, except in an advisory nature,
and this by invitation only.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

- Section 1. The Associational meetings shall be composed of Messengers elected by the affiliated churches according to the plan. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) Messengers, including the pastor, and one additional Messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above one hundred in its resident membership, but not to exceed ten (10) such Messengers. The Director of Missions and General Officers shall be Messengers in all Associational Meetings.
- Section 2. The Associational Meetings will be held as follows:
 - (1) The Fall Meeting shall meet on two days, the week following the third Sunday in October.
 - (2) The Winter Meeting shall meet in January. All Mission Performance Directors shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the Messengers at this meeting. In order for the Messengers to have adequate time to consider the nominees for Program Directors, the Nominating Committee will mail a copy to the Messengers two weeks before the January Meeting. They shall be Director-Elect until October 1 when their tenure of service begins.
 - (3) The Spring Meeting shall meet in April. All General Officers, Committee members, and Program Council members shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for a vote by the Messengers at this April Meeting. This will give each person selected the privilege to plan and train for the upcoming year. In order to give Messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, a copy will be mailed to them two weeks before the Spring Meeting.
 - (4) The Summer Meeting shall meet in late July or early August. The Associational Budget for the new year, beginning on October 1 and ending on September 30 of the following year, shall be presented by the Finance Committee for approval by the Messengers of the Association. In order to give the Messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee shall mail copies to the

Messengers two weeks before this Summer Meeting.

Section 3. Other meetings of the Association shall be held when called by the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions. Before calling a special meeting, a notice of at least two weeks shall be given to the Messengers, with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. No other business can be considered. A quorum of fifty (50) Messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

- Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three (3) trustees.
- Section 2. These officers shall be elected in the Spring Meeting in April by the Messengers of the Association. The Nominating Committee will present nominees to the Messengers with the privilege of other nominees from the body. Prior approval and consent to serve shall have been received from a prospective nominee before placing his name in nomination before the body.
- Section 3. The officers of this Association shall serve from October 1 through September 30 of the following year. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall serve no more than two years in succession.

Section 4. Duties of the Officers:

- (1) The Moderator shall preside over all Meetings of the Association, and fulfill such duties as required upon the presiding officer of this Associational body.
- (2) The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.
- (3) The Clerk-Treasurer shall fulfill the following duties:
- a. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of all the Associational Meetings. The Clerk shall distribute the Uniform Church Letter forms to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the Association. The Clerk shall compile the reports and statistics of the churches and issue a book of minutes as soon as is practical after the Fall Meeting.

b. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at each Quarterly Meeting, plus a year end report at the Fall Meeting.

(4) The trustees shall have the authority to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of the elected trustees shall be authorized by the

Association in it's meetings.

(5) In the event the Office of the Moderator of the Association shall become vacant, the Vice-Moderator shall immediately become the Moderator for the unexpired term of office without any further action by the Association.

(6) The vacancies occurring in the office of Vice-Moderator and other General Officers, except Moderator, will be nominated by the Nominating Committee at the next Association Meeting.

ARTICLE VI - MISSION PERFORMANCE ORGANIZATION

- Section 1. The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches for the promotion and training of the various phases of their work.
- Section 2. The Directors of these organizations shall be:
 Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training
 Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director,
 Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism
 Director, Missions Development Director,
 Stewardship Director, Family Ministries Director,
 Christian Life Director, Pastoral Ministries
 Director and Seminary Extension Director.
- Section 3. These Organizational Directors shall be elected at the Winter Meeting, (January), or no later than the Spring Meeting (April), for a term of three years. The Directors shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee.
- Section 4. The Directors shall assume their duties on Oct.1, and serve through September 30, or until their successors are elected. They will be Directors-Elect in the Winter Meeting and will have the privilege of training, planning and enlistment of their Council members until October 1.

ARTICLE VII-ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

- Section 1. The Administrative Committee is composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Properties, Chairman of Communications, and the Director of Missions.
- Section 2. If there are major decisions to be made between the Quarterly Associational Meetings, the Administrative Committee will act in behalf of the Association, and will report the actions to the next Quarterly Meeting.
- Section 3. The Administrative Committee will meet as needs arise between the Quarterly Meetings.

ARTICLE VIII - ASSOCIATION COUNCIL

- Section 1. The Associational Council shall be composed of the General Directors of all Mission Performance Programs, the Associational Officers, the Associational Staff, and the Chairman of Finance, Strategy and Communication, and others deemed necessary to attend the Council in planning the work of the Association.
- Section 2. The Director of Missions will serve as the Chairman of the Council. Other officers will be elected in their meetings, such as Vice-Chairman and Secretary.
- Section 3. The Associational Council will conduct at least six meetings per year, at least once every other month. The time and place for the meetings will be set.
- Section 4. The purpose of the Council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the Association, and evaluate the progress toward fulfilling the plan. Also, the Council gives guidance to the work of the Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Association shall have the following Committees with terms of office extending three years from the time duties of the office are assumed on October 1 of each year. To be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the April Meeting:

- Section 2. Each Committee nominated by the Nominating Committee will begin serving on October 1, and will serve for three years with the terms rotating, so that only 1/3 of the members are elected each year.
- Section 3. Each Committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons from every area of the Association.
- Section 4. Each Committee should meet once each quarter to fulfill its duties.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended at the Fall Meeting of the Association, (October), by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present, provided the proposed Amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Fall Meeting and voted upon on the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

ARTICLE XI

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority of the Messengers present and shall supercede any and all Constitutions, By-laws and Amendments previously adopted.

BY-LAWS

BY-LAW I - PARLIAMENTARY RULES

<u>ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER</u>, Latest, revised edition, shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting the business and assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

BY-LAW II - ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1, and close September $30. \,$

BY-LAW III - NEW CHURCHES

Section 1. Any church or mission seeking membership in the Association shall petition the Credentials Committee at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October) of the Association. The church shall be studied for it's Church Covenant, intentions, relations to other member churches of

the Association, and it's willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-laws of the Association. The Credentials Committee shall report to the Association at the Fall Meeting it's findings and recommendations for Associational action.

Section 2. Each church or mission applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. Each church received under a watch care relationship, shall submit a Quarterly Report to the Credentials Committee of the Association, and also submit the Annual Associational Letter at the end of the year.

BY-LAW IV - ORDINATION OF NEW MINISTERS

- Section 1. When a church desires to ordain a candidate for the Gospel Ministry, it may petition the Credentials Committee of the Association for an examination and approval for ordination. The Credentials Committee shall work with the requesting church concerning date, time, and other persons forming the Examining Committee.
- Section 2. After the examination of the candidate has been conducted by the Examining Council, a report of it's findings shall be given the requesting church.
- Section 3. Guidelines for Ordination:
 - (1) The Credentials Committee requests that it receive a copy of the minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the requesting church voted to request examination of the candidate.
 - (2) The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
 - (3) The Committee requests that the candidate be examined at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
 - (4) The Committee shall examine the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, personal and family life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.
 - (5) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the Gospel Ministry.
 - (6) In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7, and Titus 1:5-9.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall provide a written report of the examination of candidates to the Gospel Ministry to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

BY-LAW V - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1. The Moderator will preside over the Quarterly and called meetings of the Association. As the presiding officer, the Moderator will open the Meetings punctually, at the appointed time, enforce the rules, preserve the order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer, according the principles of established parliamentary usage. Robert's Rules of Order will be followed. The Moderator, if desired, appoints a parliamentarian to serve at any or all Meetings of the Association during his term of office. This person must be approved by the Messengersin-session. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- Section 2. It would be the duty of the <u>Vice-Moderator</u> to discharge the duties of the <u>Moderator</u> in the absence of, or at the request of the <u>Moderator</u>. Details are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>.
- Section 3. The <u>Clerk</u> will record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association and make this information available upon request. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>. The Administrative Assistant of the Association will serve as <u>Clerk</u>.
- Section 4. The <u>Treasurer</u> will receive all the funds contributed to the Association and disburse them in accordance with the Budget of the Association, or for which the funds were contributed. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>. The Administrative Assistant will serve as <u>Treasurer</u> of the Association.

BY-LAW VI - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS COMMITTEE

(1) This Committee will be responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called Meetings of the Association. They will propose an order of business and enlist all program personnel, and publicize the program to the churches in advance of the Meetings. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) This Associational Meetings Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 2. <u>COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE</u>

(1) This Committee will be responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions, and services of the Association to the churches and to the general public. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) The Communications Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only

two members are elected each year.

Section 3. <u>CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE</u>

- (1) This Committee will assist the Association in counselling churches who fail to cooperate with the Association, help churches to meet the qualifications for being properly accepted in the Associational fellowship, and assist in examination of the candidates for the Gospel Ministry upon the request of the member churches. Detailed duties are outlined in the ASSOCIATIONAL HANDBOOK. Procedure for ordination is located in BY-LAW IV.
- (2) The Credentials Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. It is suggested that three pastors and three deacons serve on this committee.

Section 4. <u>EXTERNAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE</u>

(1)This Committee will be responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the Association, such as the various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the Baptist State Convention the Southern Baptist Convention. Detailed duties are outlined in Associational Handbook.

(2) The External Relations Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that

only one member is elected each year.

(3) Membership will also include the Associational representatives of the various

agencies, boards, foundations, and Baptist related groups. These would be eligible for re-election at the end of the three years for another term.

Section 5. FINANCE COMMITTEE

(1) This Committee assists the Association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. They shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association and report to the Quarterly Associational Meetings and a final report to the Annual Fall Meeting. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) The Budget will be prepared and copies mailed to the Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Summer Meeting. (July or August). The Messengers will vote on the proposed Budget during the Summer Meeting of the Association. The fiscal year of the Association will be from October 1 through

September 30.

(3) The Finance Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with terms rotating so that only two members are elected each year. The Treasurer serves as an ex officio member of the Committee.

(4) The Finance Committee chairman will serve on the Associational Council.

Section 6. HISTORY COMMITTEE

(1) The History Committee will gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work. The Committee will make a report at the Fall Meeting of the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) The History Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one

member is elected each year.

Section 7. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

(1) The Nominating Committee leads in coordinating the selection of all Association-elected leaders except paid personnel. They shall nominate a complete slate of General Officers, Mission Performance Directors, and Council members, and Committee persons. Equal representation should be given from all pastors, staff

members, men and women. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>.

(2) The first report of the nominations will be in the January Meeting of the Association, in which Mission Performance Directors are elected for training, planning and enlistment of their council members.

(3) The second report of nominations will be in the April Meeting of the Association, in which the General Officers, Program Council members and Committee members are elected.

(4) The Nominating Committee will consist of six members, representing all areas of the Association, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 8. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE

(1) The Properties Committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the Association. It will make recommendations to the Associational Meetings concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) The Properties Committee shall consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the term rotating so that only one

member is elected each year.

(3) The Committee shall give a written report to the Fall Meeting of the Association.

Section 9. SEARCH COMMITTEE

(1) The Search Committee will serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions.

(2) The Committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one woman, all named by the Nominating Committee, plus the Moderator, and the Chairman of Finance Committee.

(3) The Committee will use the guidelines and duties found in the <u>Associational Handbook</u> for calling a Director of Missions.

Section 10. STRATEGY COMMITTEE

(1) The Strategy Committee will assist the Association in determining its Strategic Objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. The Committee also shall be available to study change or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) This Committee will work very closely with the Associational Council. The Strategy Committee Chairman will be an active member

of the Associational Council.

(3) The Strategy Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. Also, two members from the Associational Council should serve with the Committee in determining Annual planning objectives.

Section 11. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

(1) The Personnel Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.

(2) The Committee will prepare and update as necessary, position descriptions of all Associational staff personnel, except the Director of Missions, whose responsibilities are described in BY-LAW VIII. Section 1.

are described in BY-LAW VIII, Section 1.

(3) The Committee will survey the need for additional staff positions, recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel with the guidance and approval of the Director of Missions; and when necessary, recommend to the Association the termination of employment of staff personnel.

(4) Annual review will be conducted by the Director of Missions to the employees, and employees' differences and grievances may be appealed to Personnel Committee by the

individual.

(5) The Committee will review annually, salaries, benefits, and make recommendations to the Budget Committee.

(6) Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VII - TRUSTEES

The Trustees will act as the legal agent of the Association. The duties will be to hold title to the property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association, with the Association's foreknowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution and By-laws of the body, and with state laws as they affect the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VIII - EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Section 1. DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

The Director of Missions shall be an officer (1)As an officer and of the Association. general leader of the Association, the Director of Missions shall be an ex officio Councils, and member of all Committees,

groups of the Association.

(2)The Director of Missions shall be elected to this office upon a recommendation of the Search Committee, and by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present at a regular Meeting by the Moderator for that particular purpose. Letters of information concerning the prospective Director of Missions shall be sent out to all Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Meeting.

The time of service shall continue until (3)terminated by the request of the Director of Missions to the Association, or at the request of the Association, which would require a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers to the Associational Meeting. Proper notice and explanation of termination shall be provided to or by the Director of

Missions and/or the Association.

The Director of Missions shall promote the (4)work and ministry of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers, and Associational Committees and organizations.

He shall be responsible for planning, promoting and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the

Associational Council.

He shall serve as Chairman of b. Associational Council, and make an annual report to the Association at the October Meeting.

He shall seek to visit each church in c. the Association in order to:

Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.

(2)Encourage and strengthen ministry of the churches.

the (3)Enhance cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.

He shall have full responsibility for d. supervising all personnel employed by the Association.

Detailed duties and benefits e. outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 2. OTHER EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Other personnel shall be employed as needed by the Association with a two-thirds majority of the votes from the Messengers in a regular Meeting of the Association. All personnel must come as a joint recommendation of the Budget and Personnel Committees.

ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT (1)

- The Administrative Assistant shall serve a. primarily in a secretarial assisting the Director of Missions with the daily administrative matters of the Association.
- The Administrative Assistant shall be b. responsible for the media and resource center, making available materials, pamphlets, video tapes, and other equipment for individuals and churches in the Association.

This person shall also serve as the c. Associational Clerk/Treasurer, unless Personnel Committee deems otherwise.

- This person shall supervise the work of d. office help, along with Director of Missions.
- Personnel Committee shall recommend to the Budget Committee salary and benefits annually.

Detailed duties and benefits outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) OFFICE HELP

Office help shall be provided by one or а.

more persons as needed.

This individual(s) shall fill in for the b. Administrative Assistant during leave times, such as vacations, sickness, conferences, etc.

Personnel Committee shall recommend to Committee, salaries the Budget

benefits.

CUSTODIAL SERVICES (3)

Custodial services shall be provided by a. one or more persons in order to keep the associational properties in clean and acceptable condition.

This person(s) shall be recommended by Properties Committee the to Personnel Committee who shall consider the selection, and upon approval, shall present the person(s) to the Association

for final approval.

c. The Properties and Personnel Committees will recommend to the Budget Committee salaries and benefits for service rendered.

- d. The Properties Committee and the Director of Missions shall jointly supervise the custodial services personnel.
- e. Detailed duties are outlined in Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW IX - ANNUAL REPORTS

Persons preparing reports for the Annual Meeting of the Association in October, shall present the same in writing for inclusion in the printed <u>Book of Reports</u> two weeks before the Fall Meeting. These reports are to be limited to 300 words each.

BY-LAW X - AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-laws may be made at any Session of the October Meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the Messengers present and voting..

in January and has met every Saturday night since then. 105 people have been reached with an average attendance of 35. It is hoped that by the end of the year a Mexican or Spanish pastor can be found. Giving to MAP helps, but more money is needed. The Randolph Baptist Association gives \$167 per month and the Baptist State Convention gives \$334 per month. Approximately \$1005 is needed per month to support a pastor. A family with 8 children, ages 18 and younger, attended the service Saturday night, and is in need of household items and food. Mrs. Renea Henderson/Victory gave the Nominating Committee report. Judson Rotan has agreed to work with this on an interim basis. Mike Eller gave the Personnel Committee report that a temporary secretary has been hired. Mrs. Retta Plunkett has filled this position and is working from 8-3 Monday through Thursday. This situation will be reviewed at a later dated, possibly before the Annual Meeting.

on these committees, and that a Sunday School Director is still needed.

The Budget Presentation for the approval of the 1993-1994 budget was given by Mr. Dan Wood/Oakhurst, and Mrs. Renea Henderson. A skit was presented showing all the resources available in the association. Dan talked about how we could be good stewards. The more these resources are used, the more we will be willing to support them. The budget was given in the form of a motion.

Mr. Bill Rice/Shady Grove made a statement about how we need to support the Spanish Mission. With between 8,000 and 10,000 Spanish people in Randolph County, we need to find a way to reach them. Jesus instructs us to reach out to others in His Name, and if we do not do that, then we have failed in our mission. This Spanish Mission has been a need for several years. If God is in it, then we need to trust Him. An amendment to the budget motion on the floor was brought to add \$2,400 for this next year to the proposed budget. Dan Wood stated that the Budget and Finance Committee has discussed this situation and agrees

with the idea of supporting the Spanish Mission through MAP and individual church budgets. This committee has looked into what other associations are doing and has found that mission projects do better in mission accounts than in a direct budget allocation. Just because an item is budgeted does not guarantee that the money will be there. In fact, the proposed budget is a decrease of \$984 because the money has not come in this year. Which mission endeavors can and will be included in our budget? The Budget Committee recommends that the motion be left as it has been proposed originally.

Dale Robertson/Forest Park asked if it was possible to get funds from the US-2 Program that we have left over and put towards the Spanish Mission? Judson explained that was a separate situation, and that if a full time pastor is called, the BSC will match us with \$6,000. The same would be true for a part time pastor in the amount of \$4,000. This would be for a period of five years. Hoover Lee spoke about the pros and cons of separate funding, stating that it had been hard the last two years when funds had not come in from the churches as The Question was called for, and with a vote of 26 in favor of the amendment, and 33 opposed to it, the amendment did not pass. The original motion from the Budget Committee was brought for a vote and passed.

Mark Sink suggested that a love offering be taken as people left the meeting to give to the Spanish Mission. This was made in the form of

a motion, seconded, a vote taken, and carried.

Judson suggested that the Spanish Mission might look at ways to increase their visibility, and other possibilities of looking at the situation.

Hymn " Have Faith In God " was led by David Thomas.

Mary Ann Ingold sang a solo entitled " Shepherd of My Heart." After she sang, a plaque was presented to her from the association in recognition and appreciation of the two years she served as our Administrative

Hoover Lee gave a short explanation of the Hope for Hurting Humanity program. This will be a denominational emphasis in 1994. This is to be a simultaneous mission project for the churches to individually participate in from June15-July 31,1994, with preparations already beginning on an associational level. More about this will be presented at later dates. All pastors were to be sent information about this, and are encouraged to begin thinking and praying about participation in this .

Hoover talked some about his two year US-2 ministry with us, and mentioned that reports of his ministry are available at the Associational Office on request. Hoover used different objects to

symbolize his ministry here in Randolph County. He first showed the keys to the Associational Office, and said that they symbolized our invitation to him to come and work with us. He next showed the keys to Balfour Baptist Church, and said that they were representative of all the keys to the churches in our association, and the opportunities to minister to, with, and for these churches. A watch symbolized the many individuals who took the time and energy to minister for the Lord in this association. Church bulletins showed the gift of our ministry to Hoover. HISTORY OF VICTORY BAPTIST CHURCH SEAGROVE, NORTH CAROLINA

Victory Baptist Church of Seagrove was officially constituted as a church on December 18, 1983. The goal of the new fellowship, as stated in the beginning, was to become a "ministry-oriented church" that strives to meet the needs of people in the community and beyond, through ministry and missions.

On August 4, 1984 the church called it's first pastor, Rev. Johnny Henderson, who presently serves the church. Victory Baptist Church also became a member of the Randolph Baptist Association in 1985. Also, in January 1985, after a one-day offering of \$20,000, the church purchased a 19 acre tract of land on Highway 220 near Seagrove. In May the church sold \$350,000 in church bonds to construct the facilities as they now stand. The present facilities were built and dedicated to the Lord on May 11, 1986.

In August 1986 the church originated the Victory Baptist Church Child Development Center which now serves over 50 children and their families daily. Other ministries in which the church is involved are Prison Ministry, Van Outreach Ministry, Youth Ministry, Senior Adult Ministry, Clothes for Kids Project, Project Angel Tree, Disaster Relief, Missions Organizations, and others. Presently the church has 224 members, and continues to have a growing Sunday School since it's origination. In it's brief existence, Victory Baptist Church has been blessed with young people who have responded to the call of ministry and missions. Three ministers have been ordained, and four men are studying for the ministry at present. Victory Baptist Church continues to expand with the recent purchase of an adjoining 9.3 acres of property, and a house which is now being renovated for future use.

God has blessed Victory Baptist Church tremendously, providing spiritual and material blessings, opportunities for ministry, vision, people who are involved in God's work, and countless other blessings. When we look at the past, we are humbled by God's blessings, and as we look toward the future, we are excited about all the Lord will do as we are faithful.



History of Mount Pleasant Baptist Church

On the 6th day of July 1872, the Presbytery met for the purpose of constituting a Baptist Church in Randolph County. The Charter Members, composed of seven male members and nineteen female members, had withdrawn from Mount Zion Baptist Church to constitute a church of like faith and order. An Advisory Council from other Baptist churches examined the church on their faith in Christ as Missionary Baptist. The church became an independent church, was given the right hand of fellowship, and named Mount Pleasant Baptist. The land was presented to the church by Henry Kivett. From the earliest records, we find the church was functioning in a steady way by August, 1872.

During the lifetime, Mount Pleasant (which was called Kivetts due to the many number of Kivetts attending there) held services in three different church buildings. The first church, believed to be a log structure, was located on or near where the present sanctuary now stands. History reveals this original building was used some 30-34 years. The second church building was begun in October 1904 and completed in August 1906. This building consisted of the sanctuary recently torn down, but had a vestibule, steeple, and Sunday School classroom annex that had been added. The plans for the first cemetery were drawn up in 1874 and many loved ones buried there are fondly remembered today.

Our present brick sanctuary was completed in 1982, with the first service being in June. The educational building was finished in 1962 and the first service was held on January 20, 1963. Our first pastorium was built in the year 1968.

Originally Mount Pleasant was a part of the Sandy Creek Association, but joined the Randolph Association in 1934-35.

Music has always been a part of worship at Mount Pleasant. Records indicate the first organ was purchased in 1906 and the second in 1987. Of course, many pianos were used.

Missions have always held a prominent place at Mount Pleasant. They helped to organize in January 1887, Liberty First Baptist, as an arm to Mount Pleasant. In December 1887, a letter was granted to establish a permanent church for themselves.

During the lifetime of Mount Pleasant Church a host of consecrated Christian men, women, and children have tried to do their part for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.





Church and Community Ministries Report - 1993

The Church and Community Ministries Committee has worked closely with Hoover Lee the past two years as both sounding board and encourager. This committee assisted the implementation of English as a Second Language (ESL) classes held at Oakhurst Baptist Church. While this program was not as successful as it had hoped to be, it did provide an avenue of experience and challenge to Hoover and the committee.

The CCM committee also assisted Hoover in promoting and beginning Back Yard Bible Clubs throughout our association. This program proved very successful. The first year 7-9 BYBC groups were held. This last summer we had approximately 16. There was a good increase in both interest and activity. Of particular note was the one held by the RBA Acteen Activator team at Coleridge Apartments which had an attendance of 56 children. This has opened the door for ministry opportunities in this area.

The CCM committee worked with Hoover in developing a plan for an Urban Ministry to be implemented in Randolph County. The fruit of

this labor in part has developed into what is now known as the Christians United Outreach Center. The initial organizational efforts were formally presented to the Asheboro Ministerial Association by Hoover Lee.

It is the hope of the CCM Committee that the work begun under Hoover's supervision and enthusiasm will continue to grow and minister to all our community, drawing more of our people into active ministry for the Lord.

Counseling Center Report

" A motion was made that the Randolph Baptist Association meeting in Annual Session on October 20, 1992 study the possibility of helping to establish a Christian Counseling Center in our county, or that the Association explore ways to coordinate local Christian counseling resources that might be available for those who need professional help. This committee shall be appointed by the moderator and report their preliminary findings at the next Quarterly meeting. The complete report and recommendations would be made by the next Annual Meeting.

As our committee met, we sought to identify the key elements of this motion and to determine what we were asked to do. Some key elements that stood out to us are:

- establishing a Christian Counseling Center

- coordinate local Christian counseling resources
- make a report and recommendation

We are well aware of the professional capabilities of several counselors, psychologists, and psychiatrists in our area. We were asked to specifically submit a report and recommend the possibility of offering a Christian alternative, one that will be established as well as administrated from a Biblical perspective. This gave us our foundation as all else had to live up to this principle. We then had to deal with many issues:

- long term counseling
- short term counseling
- type of counseling psychoanalysis, cognitive, and thirty others!
- hospital care based on Christian intervention, with Christian psychiatrists and Christian counselors
 - location for a center
 - and, of course, how to pay for this ministry

After meeting with representatives of several established Christian counseling centers (N.C. Baptist Hospital Pastoral Care; Pastoral Care and Counseling Center at Charlotte; Associates in Christian Counseling, Winston-Salem; and the Institute of Christian Growth, Graham, N.C.) we felt a kindred spirit with the plans, purposes, and Biblical foundations of the Institute of Christian Growth in Graham, N.C. This ministry is well qualified as a professional Christian Counseling Center staffed by professional Christian counselors: Dr. William P. Wilson, retired Professor of Psychiatry of Duke University Medical Center; Dr. Cary Cottle, and Larry Willet, PhD.

The following is a joint proposal for a counseling center that will integrate Biblical truth with sound psychological treatment strategies.

RECOMMENDATION

We, the Christian Counseling Center Steering Committee of the Randolph Baptist Association, recommend that the following motion be approved:

That we establish a Christian Counseling Center to be operated as a ministry of Randolph Baptist Churches. That the steering committee consisting of Mrs. Beulah Tote, Dr. Dan Wood, and the Rev. Ron Chaney, Chairman, who were appointed at the Randolph Baptist Association's October 1992 meeting, along with the Director of Missions moderator, be appointed as the temporary Board of Directors of Randolph Baptist Counseling Center (to be named at a later date) and shall have the responsibility and authority to establish such a Christian Counseling Center reporting at each quarterly meeting with updates and recommendations as pertinent to the progress.

SPANISH MISSION REPORT

In September of 1992, two Spanish speaking young men approached retired missionary Stephen Davenport about the possibility of beginning a Spanish ministry in Asheboro. They were aware that Stephen had been a Baptist missionary, serving in Argentina, along with his wife Bonnie and family. The needs are great for a Spanish ministry, since there are close to 2000 Spanish speaking people living in Asheboro. In consultation with Pastor Bobby Blanton of Balfour Baptist Church, and Rev. Judson Rotan, Director of Missions, plans were formulated to begin a ministry to the Spanish people. A choice location was found in downtown Asheboro. The owner of the building, Mr. David Stedman, graciously consented to let the Spanish group hold worship services in the building, rent free. Services began on January 2, 1993, and have continued on a regular basis each Saturday evening. This ministry has reached at least 123 people who have attended at least one time. Attendance has reached in to the 40's and 50's. Average attendance is 35 for the year. Plans are being made to begin Sunday School classes the last part of October.

ESL (English as a Second Language) classes were started on October 4. Enrollment has reached 17. These classes are being conducted at the mission in order to help the Spanish people learn English. We are grateful for the several trained workers from our association who are giving of their time and talents toward this ministry.

We are grateful for the eight churches and several groups who are giving a monthly support to the Mission. Monthly support is as follows:

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I think about this past year as an association, we must admit that it has been a difficult year. Several events have made it critical:

- 1. Our income from the churches was low. We received around \$900.00 more than we did the previous year, and were behind in our budget for the year \$8,481.53.
- 2. Our Administrative Assistant, Mary Ann Ingold, resigned because of the financial crisis.
- 3. Programs, events, and projects were curtailed, which caused some organizations to have no training events this past year.

4. Even the spirit of the association was low in the midst of changes and direction.

But in the midst of our crisis, God blessed our efforts. We have sought to know the mind of Christ and what God is up to in our midst. We have affirmed that God is on mission in our world, and especially in our setting. What we needed to do was to stop and see what God is doing in our midst. I have tried to stop and ask God, "What is it that you are purposing for us as Randolph Baptists?" When I began to see and understand what God is doing in my life and in our midst, than I began to see what I needed to do and what our association needed to do. It has been a soul do and what our association needed to do. It has been a soul searching experience. I spent a week at Ridgecrest Conference Center with Henry Blakaby in "Fresh Encounter for Revival and Spiritual Awakening." It was a renewal experience for my spirit In the spring of 1993, I began studying and ministry. "Experiencing God," which has increased my faith about who we are as Randolph Baptists as we seek daily to know and do the will of God has been real to me the last several months.

Several events and projects have given us a sense of mission about

our work together this past year.

1. The Spanish Mission has developed greatly under the leadership of Steve Davenport and the sponsoring church, Balfour Baptist I am glad that we as an association have a small part Church. in it's development. Through MAP we have given a monthly contribution of \$167.00. Many are being reached weekly in the Hispanic community. This mission work needs our continuous prayers and support.

- 2. There were twelve Backyard Bible Clubs conducted around our county this summer in apartment settings, mobile home parks, and other communities where unreached persons were located. Several hundred boys and girls heard about God's love and saw it demonstrated in the lives of persons. Many seeds of God's love were planted in many hearts. Several of these places could become on-going ministries.
- 3. We concluded two years of ministry in Church and Community Ministries with Hoover Lee, US-2 Missionary, appointed by the Home Mission Board, SBC. It was a very successful ministry in helping us to discover needs , and seeking to meet those needs in the lives of hurting humanity. God used Hoover Lee to probe us in our Christian witness and concern for hurting and needy persons. Does God want us to continue to meet these needs through some organized ministry?

These are just a few of the positive things that have kept us on mission as a group of cooperating Baptist churches.

As to my personal stewardship of time to the association, it has been another busy year. I share the following:

Miles Traveled: 11,276 (kept a daily log of travel)

2. Office Work: I have kept regular hours for my work. I had 39 committee meetings and 17 group conferences. Our office, through the secretaries, Mary Ann Ingold and Retta Plunkett, have prepared and mailed over 1,200 Randolph Baptists each month to our church leaders and others. Many events and and activities emphases, promotional letters, and flyers were produced and mailed from the associational office monthly.

Our associational office building is a Resource Center as well as offices for staff and meetings. Over 400 videos are available for the churches to use. Many videos were added this year, which included those on state, home, and foreign missions. Literature and materials from various boards, institutions, and agencies are made available for the churches.

- 3. Work Among the Churches: I have visited and worked with 32 of our churches during this associational year. I have preached a number of sermons, supplied for pastors, spoken at homecomings and mission days. I have assisted in deacon ordination services, worked with search committees, taught Bible studies, and conducted a revival in one of our churches. I have lead deacon and Sunday School teacher trainings. I have been available for our churches, to meet their needs and requests.
- 4. Meetings Attended Outside the Association: I have attended the Baptist State Convention, State Evangelism Conference, Convention Staff/DOM Retreat, Mini-Sunday School and Fresh Encounter Conferences at Ridgecrest during this past year. I participated in a World Missions Conference in the Yadkin Baptist Association, and made two trips to Long Island, New York for two weeks of mission involvement. There were six conferences of day meetings that I attended either at Caraway, Cary, or Ridgecrest. Also, it has been my privilege to serve as President of the Director of Missions Conference that meets at Wingate College each July. In this position, I have had four meetings across the state with DOM's and committees.

I am very grateful to our general officers, associational council, and our staff for listening and helping us through this past year. These and several pastors have been my sounding boards, my enablers, and my counselors in seeing our mission fulfilled.

As we face another year, we will possibly enter into three years of special emphases. They are - 1994: Hope for Hurting Humanity, 1995: "Here's Hope, Share Jesus Now," Revivals, and 1996: World Missions Conference. Each year we will focus on one major theme. There will be steering committees suggested for detail planning for these events.

One of my major emphases for the next few years will be to give priority to some dreams for the churches of Randolph Baptist Association. Our major thrust should be the following:

- 1. EVANGELISM: (We will baptize more than 300 persons each year in our churches.) The fields are truly white unto harvest since 66 percent of our population is unreached and unchurched. It is important to get these on our Sunday School rolls. They need the positive influence of good Bible teaching and challenging worship experiences to present the claims of Jesus Christ.
- 2. SUNDAY SCHOOL GROWTH: (We will seek to increase at least 5 to 10 percent in enrollment each year.) The average attendance will continue to rise as the enrollment increases.s Individuals need Bible study. Sunday School workers must reach out in love to those not in the church. Good Bible teaching and fellowship will melt the hardest heart.
- 3. FELLOWSHIP: (We need unity and purpose among us.) Acts 2:1 speaks of unity and purpose in the early church "They were all together in one place." To accomplish great things for God, His followers must enjoy fellowship with one another with unity of purpose. God's people must love one another and work together to carry out the "Great Commission."
- 4. MISSIONS: (We must educate our people inn missions, doing missions, and supporting missions financially.) A growing church is a missions minded church, which is doing missions locally, in the state, in our nation, and around the world. The Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) informs us that our mission is the entire world. Let us major on missions and not on issues that divide us.
- 5. FINANCES: (We need to encourage churches to give 4 to 5 percent of their undesignated offerings to the association to accomplish our mission ministries of the association.)

 Percentage giving to support associational missions and to give through the Cooperative Program is the best way to support missions. It puts all churches (large and small) on an equal basis, since that percentage of every offering plate dollar goes to missions. Baptist Children's Homes 1993 Report

Chris starts college at North Carolina State this fall on a football scholarship. After leading Thomasville to a state championship in 1991, Chris also earned national honor society recognition, was active in the community counseling drug abusers...and became a Christian at Mills Home.

Kathy married a Christian young man who was a volunteer a t Broyhill Home, where she lived. She continues her education at Haywood Technical College while working and becoming a young wife. She and her husband, Kris, are members a Woodland Baptist Church, where she was active in leading children's programs, even as a Broyhill resident.

Several rows of supportive staff members cried during the wedding when the minister asked, "Who gives this woman to be married?" Child care worker Jim Johnson responded, "Her mother and I do." "Her mother," was Jim's wife, Vivian. Together, Jim and Vivian helped Kathy develop from an angry and withdrawn child, to a beautiful, confident, Christian leader.

Ashley was growing up too fast...and her parents didn't know how to handle it. They wanted to treat her like a child; she wanted adult freedoms. When their constant clashing came to blows, they knew they needed help.

Through the family clarification program at Mills HOme, both Ashley and her parents learned the roles they played in the family conflict, and how to listen, forgive and adjust to the future.

"We're very grateful to Baptist Children's Homes," said Ashley's mother Victoria. "I don't know what would have happened to Ashley. I've had friends say to me, 'I never knew there was a place like that.'"

Well, there is a place like that.

Thank God.

Baptist Children's Homes in 1992-93 served 1,453 children and their families through programs of intentionalized services at 13 facilities across North Carolina.

Those facilities include four residential care campuses; seven emergency care homes; two homes for behaviorally troubled girls; therapeutic camping for boys; a maternity home; a home for teen-age mothers and their babies and a model daycare facility. Baptist Churches, through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Program, and direct gifts funded about one-third of BCH's \$10 million budget. A significant source of income continues to be from estate gifts from those who remember children in their wills.

BCH's model daycare service took a giant step June 27 when the new \$1 million, 10,000 sq.ft. Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center was dedicated. It will accommodate 75 infants, toddlers, and two-year-olds.

During dedication, Robin Britt, N.C. Secretary of the NC Department of Human Resources, said BCH is "a true model of how young children can be shaped, nurtured and loved," and that "we will be looking at institutions like the Fleshman-Pratt Early Childhood Education Center as we find models to replicate."

T. Winfield Blackwell, president of the Fleshman-Pratt Foundation, whose lead gift started construction of the building, said, "Think how many children will be raised and shaped by the dedicated staff who serve here, and surely a goodly number will be developed, not only to be good citizens, but active ministers in God's service." Churches interested in beginning or improving their daycare ministry can get free help from director May Lou Dickey. Call (919) 472-3503.

BCH also dedicated a counselor's lodge at Cameron Boys Camp; completed a strategic planning cycle for the next three years; celebrated the 50th anniversary of Odum Home in Penbroke; completed a three year partnership with the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil; and produced a new video about BCH, available August 15.

Swelling with emotion at the dedication of her new building, Daycare Services Director Mary Lou Dickey promised, "we will not fail" those who trust BCH with their children.

Michael C. Blackwell, who celebrated his 10th anniversary as president of BCH July 1, echoes that promise. "Baptist Children's Homes has been a cutting-edge ministry for NC Baptists since 1885. As a disintegrating society moves the edges further and further, we're honing our ministry sharper and sharper. Thank you, NC Baptists, for your support."

1993 Baptist Hospital Report to the Associations

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our funding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this missions. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality healthcare at affordable prices.

Providers and Recipients of Healing

Our healing team now consists of 5,852 employees. The Medical Center (NCBH and BGSM) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,247 inpatient admissions. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 490,667 patient visits.

Our chaplaincy division joined with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15-40 chaplains present at various times, 52,934 ministries were provided to

patients, families, staff and groups.

A new department of our Pastoral Care program named the Center for Congregational Health was given birth. It's purpose is to (1)train Intentional Interim pastors; (2)train church leaders; (3)provide a minister's assessment program; (4) establish a Minister's Help Line providing an opportunity for church leaders to receive guidance via a telephone call. The Pastoral Counseling Division opened a new counseling center in Wilmington bringing our total counseling centers to 11 across the state. The centers provided 16,205 counseling sessions.

Points of Excellence

(1) The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations ranks Baptist Hospital in the top 9% of all hospitals in the nation.

(2) We performed our first pancreas transplant and first double organ transplant and first double organ transplant (pancreas and

kidney) this year.

(3) We are one of only 26 comprehensive cancer care centers in the nation, treating more cancer patients than any hospital from Baltimore, Md. to Atlanta, Ga.

(4) Quality infant through adolescence care in our Brenner

Children's Hospital.

(5) Our neonatal transport team is the largest in North Carolina and one of the 10 largest in the U.S.

(6) Our Level I (highest awarded) Trauma Center has 2,100 admissions a year.

Superb Financial Stewardship

In the midst of escalating health-care costs, we have a proven

record of excellent stewardship.

(1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commissions comparing hospital major services charges vs. Baptist Hospital reveals, for our most frequent diagnoses:

Duke - 36% higher

Carolina's Medical Center (Charlotte) - 36.5% higher

UNC-Chapel Hill - 28% higher Average statewide - 9% higher

(2) We are one of only 17 similar hospitals nationally with a

"AA"bond credit rating.

(3) Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1993, the Consumer Price Index will average 3.9% and the Medical CPI will average 9.7%. Baptist Hospital charge increases for the same

period will average 3.3%, well under both the above mentioned indexes.

Expansion for Meeting the Needs of the Future

Nursing Center at Oak Summit

Opening in July, this 170-bed facility provides skilled and intermediate care. The center will be one of only a few in the state to provide care for ventilator-dependent patients.

Emergency Department/Dietary

Under construction at the present time to be completed by June 1995, this facility will total 750,000 square feet. Our current ER was designed to handle 29,000 patients annually, but it is handling more than 40,000. Our new ER Capacity will be 70,000 annually. This building will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, and a 35-bed Day Hospital, new kitchen an cafeteria.

J. Paul Sticht on Aging and Rehabilitation

Construction on this facility begins in November of 1993 and is scheduled for completion in January 1996. It will include geriatric care, research, and education; psychiatry; and also provide comprehensive acute rehabilitation services including nutrition assessment, physical, outpatient, speech, and recreational therapy.

Baptist Benevolent Care Fund

Last year Baptists across our state gave \$422,000 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

In conclusion, it is readily seen that this healing ministry we share together says to our patients and their families: "We care about your health-care needs, your spiritual and emotional needs, and your financial burdens, and we express our caring through

service."

In an attempt to meet the above mentioned need, Baptist Retirement Homes of NC Inc. in 1993:

Opened the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville, N.C. (a 100 bed

Medicaid certified nursing care facility).

The Rickman Center is a state-of-the-art long-term care facility that has been developed to meet the needs of the poor elderly in Western NC. (80% of the resident population will be recipients of

benevolent funding).

Renovated the Albermarle Baptist Home in Stanly Baptist Association and renamed it the Taylor House. The Taylor House has no financial requirements for admission and is designed to provide care to the assisted living level of care resident, regardless of his/her ability to pay for the long-term care services provided.

Developed a new addition to the Brookridge Health Care Unit in Winston-Salem in order to provide an area for small group work with residents suffering from dementia. This state-of-the-art program will enable Baptist Retirement Homes' staff to improve the quality of life experienced by members of it's resident community who are

mentally impaired.

Baptist Retirement Homes is keenly aware of the fact that without the support of NC Baptists none of the above would have been possible. As a result of the prayers and funding that the "Homes" receives through the Cooperative Program and the NC Offering for Older Adults, it has been able to offer hope to many Older Adults whose future would have been uncertain without the caring involvement of NC Baptists. It is because of you that our institution has been able to make life for many Older Adults in 1993...The Best Of Times.

Christian Action League of North Carolina Annual Report 1993

Do you believe in miracles? They still occur, and we experienced one in the 1993 session of the NC General Assembly. No gambling legislation was enacted during that legislative

session.

When the legislators came to Raleigh on January 27, 1993, veteran legislature observers admitted that this was the year for a state-operated lottery bill to get out of the General Assembly. Both Governor James B. Hunt and Lt. Governor Dennis Wicker, both former lottery opponents, had endorsed the proposed lottery legislation. Furthermore, there were 42 new House members, and a large majority of them had campaigned supporting the lottery. OUt of the key elected state officials, m bgambling opponents had only

one friend, HOuse Speaker Dan Blue, and he made no apologies about

his opposition to state-sponsored gambling.

What happened? Concerned Christians began to speak up and contacted their legislators. by the time, Senate Bill 11, The State Lottery Act, had passed the Senate by a vote of letislation began contacting members of the House Committee on Constitutional

Amendments and Referenda to keep the bill in committee.

In the meantime, some 20 workshops were conducted throughout the state educating and motivating the Christian community about this insidious evil under the sponsorship of the League, NC Baptist Men, Woman's Missionary Union, the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs, and the NC Christian Coalition. Resource leaders included Dr. Norman Geisler, author, <u>Gambling a Bad Bet</u>; Dr. Patrick Anderson, Professor of Criminology, Florida Southern College; Dr. Paul Jones, Executive Diurector, Mississippi Christian Action Commission; Bill Brooks, Executive Director, CITIZENS AGAINST THE LOTTERY; from the Baptist State Convention, Doug Cole, Executive Director, Christian Life Council; along with George Reed, Director of Christian Citiazenship; and members of Gamblers Anonymous.

In the closing days of the legislative session, Rep. David Redwine, (D-Brunswick), who has introduced lottery legislation for the past 10 years, requested that the bill be held over until the

1994 session.

Of course, this will give the \$300 billion gambling industry some 10 months to re-group their supporters. Also, it will give concerned Chriustians the time to get their message to lawmakers that gambling is bad public policy, and such legislation ought to

be defeated.

There is also a pari-mutual gambling proposal (horse racing with off-track betting parlors) before the General Assembly. The Senate Bill has already passed a Senate Committee and is currently in the Senate Finance Committee. The House Bill has also passed a House Committee and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee. Both bills are eligible for the 1994 session.

Someone has said; "The only lesson we learnfrom history is that we don't learn from history." North Carolina had an experience with pari-mutuel gambling with dog tracks in Currituck and Carteret Counties in the early 1950's. The NC Supreme Court

closed them down as being a public nuisance.

Perhaps there is no industry that is "riddled" with corruption as much as the gambling industry. Last year we had legislators indicted in SC for accepting bribes from gambling lobbyists. Some 10 public officials have pled guilty to corruption charges in Kentucky over a gambling "scam", and 12 others are under investigation. In Arizona, legislators have gone to prison due to a gambling scandal. We have had Governors from West Virginia and from Maryland to go to prison due to gambling scandals in their respective states. Wherever you have legalized gambling, undoubtedly, you will find corruption in government.

That is why it is urgent for committed Christians to contact their legislators and urge them to oppose any gambling proposals.

DRUNK DRIVING: When you deal with politicians, tenacity is

DRUNK DRIVING: When you deal with politicians, tenacity is a key. For ten years, we have sought legislation that would

establish .08 breathalyzer reading as the standard for drunk driving in North Carolina. In the past, we were able to get such legislation through the House, but the Senate was the graveyard. The measure would always be referred to a hostile Senate Committee composed largely of trial lawyers, and htat would be "death" to such a proposal.

With a change in Senate leadership, the .08 breathalyzer legislation will become law on October 1k 1993, which will be a useful tool in helping to remove drunk drivers from the highways.

The League continues to assist local communities in combating our No. 1 drug problem, alcohol. Let us know if a liquor referendum is to be held in your area, and we will be ready to

The NC Baptist Foundation works diligently in service to

Christ as directed by the agency's Mission Statement:

"The NC Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Baptist State Convention of NC committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit to serving NC Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions, and mission

endeavors on a permanent basis.

And further the Baptist Foundation Staff and Board of Directors are committed to being scrupulously moral, legal, efficient, and accurate in carrying out the intent of each donor and trustor whose funds are placed under the management of the Foundation as a means of sustaining a tangible and perpetual involvement in presenting the Gospel, meeting human needs and strengthening all bodies of Christian fellowship where Christ is the Head."

The total market value of the assets of the Foundation at the end of 1992 was \$41,880,638., an increase of almost \$5.6 million over the end of 1991. Typically, assets are either held as endowments paying interest income in perpetuity to named Baptist causes or they are held in trust with current income being paid to individuals and future income to be paid to Baptist causes in Additionally, the Foundation offers fund management perpetuity. for Baptist causes on a revocable basis.

Earned income distributed and paid to Baptist churches, institutions, and mission causes during the fiscal year 1992: \$ 1,182,203.

Earned income distributed and paid to individuals (with Baptist causes

named as future beneficiaries) during the fiscal year 1992:

\$ 1,024,007.

In 1992, and continuing into 1993, the Long Range Planning Committee of the Board of Directors met extensively to lay the groundwork for the Foundation's goals and objectives for the next five years. The previous five years were quite successful with ambitious financial goals being met early on. It is anticipated that the Board's work in evaluating the past and present status and in laying a road map for the future will result in exciting times ahead.

The staff of the Foundation consists of seven full time employees and two persons who provide part-time service in accounting and legal services. The office is located in Cary next to the Baptist State Convention building. Visitors are welcome and are encouraged to stop by for professional assistance or just to say hello.

The Home Mission Board 1992 Annual Report

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention(SBC). Headquartered in Atlanta, Ga., the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

At the end of last year, 4,868 missions personnel were serving in the United States, the Caribbean, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,200 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 2,400 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 367,847 baptisms and 1,281 church starts.

Approximately half the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1992, gifts to the offering totaled #37.61 million, up almost 6 percent from the 1991 total. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1993 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$38 million. About 36 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

Home missions is a partnership of the HMB, state conventions, associations, and churches. The HMB's strategy is to help start churches, ministry endeavors, and evangelism efforts that will grow to self-support or be carried on by local churches or associations. The following is a summary of program/support ministry

highlights from 1992:
Chaplaincy Ministries - The 2,293 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported 24,000 professions of faith and 4,600 baptisms.

<u>Alternatives to Abortion</u> - Workers in 23 crisis pregnancy centers received training from the HMB. As a result of the ministry of these centers, 2,164 babies were born and 832 women found faith in Christ

<u>Church Loans</u> - More than 1,100 churches had active loans totaling \$115 million. These loans purchased, refinanced, remodeled, or constructed 106 buildings and purchased 9 building sites.

<u>Language Missions</u> - Home missionaries and pastors in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups using 98 languages and dialects.

Personal Evangelism - During the Southern Baptist Convention in Indianapolis, 1,353 volunteers canvassed 45,235 residences, conducted a religious survey, and shared the gospel with 2,905 individuals, 361 of whom made professions of faith.

<u>Prayer and Spiritual Awakening</u> - A national team began efforts to enhance effective prayer and revival ministries in churches. the Intercessory Prayerline grew from 7,500 calls in 1985 to 130,000 last year.

<u>Volunteers</u> - Over 71,000 Southern Baptist adults, college students, and youth group members volunteered for long- and short-term projects. More than 58,000 volunteers responded to disaster relief efforts in Florida, Louisiana, and Hawaii.

<u>Special Ministries</u> - Southern Baptists minister to seamen in 37 port cities and 200 missionaries are involved in ministries related to college students, resorts, special events, and diplomats.

In Memoriam
