Accreditation

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada. SEBTS is also accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award Associate, Masters and Doctor of Ministry degrees.

Admission

Students applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog, 1992-93 p. 10, and register on the designated days.

Currently enrolled students need only to register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to summer school on any other basis should be received in the admissions office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. Curriculum

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the A.Div., M.Div., M.A./C.E., M.A./C.M., and D.Min. programs. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admission to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-degree studies.

The maximum load permitted per term is four hours. Students who elect Elementary Hebrew may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, unless otherwise noted. Except where otherwise cited, Catalog prerequisites for summer school courses are waived. Students are encouraged to consider carefully their level of proficiency when selecting electives in areas where no formal study has been done.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio or to cancel a course if enrollment is not sufficient.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours' credit for the completion of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1992-93 pp. 58-59. In order to receive credit, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report at the conclusion of the course (M 4360 - M 4361 and M 4362 - M 4363).

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Registration

Special Summer Courses require permission of the professor, registration, and payment of all fees at least 24 hours before the course begins. Special Summer courses are limited in enrollment, therefore, permission of the professor should be obtained well in advance.

June Term: On Tuesday, June 1, 1993, orientation activities and matriculation for all students will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 4:30 p.m. Classes begin on Wednesday, June 2. Enrollment closes at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 3.

July Term: On Monday, June 28, 1993, orientation activities and matriculation for all students will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 4:30 p.m. Classes begin on Tuesday, June 29. Enrollment closes at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 30.

Students who wish to enroll for both June and July terms may do so on Tuesday, June 1 provided that all fees are paid for both terms on that day.

Fees

The matriculation fee for the **Special Summer Courses** is \$75 per course. (\$150 for non-SBC students).

The matriculation fee for the June or July Term is \$100 per course. (\$200 for non-SBC students).

The matriculation fee for auditing a summer school course is \$25.

These fees are not refundable after 4:30 p.m. on June 8 for the June term or after 4:30 p.m. on July 3 for the July term. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken.

In addition to matriculation fees, professors may also collect additional fees for supplies, travel expenses, etc. necessary to complete the Special Summer courses.

In addition to the matriculation fee, each summer school student will be charged a Summer School Student Services Fee of \$10 per semester. (Catalog 1992-93, p. 11)

Withdrawal

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:30 p.m., June 5 in the June term and until 4:30 p.m., July 2 in the July term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance.

Housing

Inquiries concerning housing accommodations for the summer terms should be directed to the Director of Housing. Dormitory rental rates for Johnson and Lolley Halls are \$115 for double occupancy and \$145 for private rooms. Duplex Apartments are \$225 per month for a one-bedroom apartment, \$240 per month for two bedrooms, and \$250 per month for three bedrooms. The Townhouse Apartments are \$275 per month for two bedrooms and \$285 per month for three bedrooms.

An exegetical and theological interpretation of the Ephesian Letter. The English text is used. Prerequisite: B1500 & 1501. 2 semester hrs.

Johnson

An historical study of music in the structure of corporate worship. ${\bf 2}$ semester hrs.

T3039-Theology of the Reformers. Richardson

A study of selected writings of the Reformers and their relationship to the development of Protestant doctrines. 2 semester hrs.

M4335-Theology & Self-Understanding Carlisle

An investigation of how one's personal history shapes one's theological outlook, how Christian theology addresses the task of self-understanding, and the importance of self-understanding for emotional and spiritual well-being. 2 semester hrs.

B1101-Biblical Hebrew

Galeotti

A continuation of B1100 with emphasis on the weak verb and readings from biblical text. Prerequisite: B1100 or its equivalent. 3 semester hrs.

B1628-The Epistle to the Galatians.

Reid

A study of the letter to the Galatians in its historical setting in the life of Paul, utilizing the English text. Prerequisite: B1500. 2 semesters hrs.

M4020-Biblical Preaching.

McDill

A study of the effective use of the Bible in preaching. Attention will be given to the interpretation of the Scriptures in the work of preaching with emphasis upon their relevance to the contemporary situation. 2 semester hours.

The study will be concluded by relating the Christian claim to other contemporary claims to truth. 2 semester hrs.

An historical study of music in the structure of corporate worship. 2 semester hrs.

BHTM0410-Colloquium: Theological Method in Ministry. (First Colloquium) Bush

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. Open only to D. Min. students. 4 semester hrs.

BHTM0411-Colloquium: Action-Research Approaches to Ministry. (Second Colloquium) Braswell/Pyle

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological foundations and functions of ministry (e.g. preaching, pastoral care) with attention to the candidates' field experiences and projects in ministry. Open only to D. Min. students. Prerequisite BHTM0410. 4 semester hrs.

Special Summer Courses

M4923-Theory & Practice in Ed. Admin. Powers
May 17-21 Class meets M-F 9-4:30

An integrative study of local church and denominational administration of selected church programs. The relationship between theory and practice will be examined during seminar and workshop sessions conducted in local churches/denominational offices. Requires approval of professor by May 12. 2 semester hrs.

H2324-Practicum in Church Planting Braswell June 1 - August 10

A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and/or Baptist State Conventions and local churches. Open to middlers, seniors and graduate students. Requires permission from Professor. 8 semester hrs.

H2143-The Southern Baptist Convention Akin June 15-27 Travel to SBC in Houston, Texas

This course is designed as a series of lectures, discussions, and on-site examination. Students will meet for two days, travel to the Convention, observe what occurs, and upon their return, prepare a paper analyzing the yearly meeting from a practical and theological standpoint. 2 semester hrs.

H2458-Practicum in International Evangelism. Roberts August 1-14 Romania

A comprehensive experience in an international setting including both practical involvement in personal and other types of evangelism and exposure to various methodologies and ministries of evangelism. Requires permission from Professor. 4 semester hrs.
