





 Meeting opened with singing and prayer by Brother Jeremiah Matthews  
 2. Made choice of Brother Samuel Elmendorf for moderator

 5. A door was opened to hear from any person that had any thing to relate to the church by way of experience or otherwise

  - 6 Twenty six voted in favor, and ten against the proposition

- February 27<sup>th</sup> 1864. Church meeting held at the usual place  
 meeting opened with singing and prayer by Elder Winchell  
 2. Made choice of Elder Winchell for moderator.  
 3. The moderator enquired the minds of the Brethren and  
 Sisters, and they are a tried and afflicted people, still they  
 have a desire for the peace and union of Zion of our God  
 hoping that they may travel on in union and peace, ~~long~~  
 united together in the everlasting love of their Lord and Saviour  
 4. A door was opened to hear from any person that had any thing to  
 relate to the church by way of experience or otherwise,  
 5. Brother Jeremiah Matthews requested to have the record of our  
 last church meeting held in January 1864, read.  
 6. Read the record of the church meeting held January 30<sup>th</sup> 1864.  
 and the record appears to be according to the acts of the church  
 7. Meeting closed with prayer,

March 26<sup>th</sup> 1864, being stormy there was no meeting

 Meeting opened with singing and prayer by Elder Winchell  
 2. Made choice of Brother Henry Bogart for moderator  
 3. The moderator enquired the mind of the Brethren & Sisters  
 and they appear to be in great affliction of mind and in  
 trouble of soul, yet still have hope in the Lord that He  
 will in his own time give them peace and union, knowing  
 that he is able to do these things for them, and that he will  
 uphold no good thing from them that walk uprightly

4. A door was opened to hear from any person that had any thing  
 to relate to the church by way of experience or otherwise —  
 5. Brother Jeremiah Matthews, manifested to the church  
 that Elder Winchell was in fault, as follows, first in  
 requesting a letter of recommendation to test the fellow-  
 ship of the Brethren

- Second for calling up the former difficulties of the church for nearly two years back, From the pulpit -
3. That all that voted to abide by a certain clause in the covenant, as mentioned in the 5<sup>th</sup> section of the record of the church meeting held Jan. 30<sup>th</sup> 1864, Should be considered the church, and for stating that those Brethren that voted against the proposition in said section had no privilege in the church, Fourth for opposing the Sisters voting that is telling him in conversation that the act allowing them to vote should not go on record without an overwhelming majority and trampling him under foot, Fifthly, for what Elder Winchell stated to the church or Brethren on the Sunday after the vote was taken on the proposition above referred to -
6. Brother Jeremiah Matthews Said that he had taken the first and second steps of labour, and that he had taken Brethren Lorenzo Eckert and Lemuel P. Winchell with him in the second Step
7. The church call on Brethren Eckert and Winchell and they give their testimony and the church receive the labor as a gospel labor
8. The church refer the matter to a special meeting to be held on Saturday May 7<sup>th</sup> 1864 at 1. P.M.
- 9<sup>th</sup> Meeting Closed

May 6<sup>th</sup> 1864. Brother Jacob Bishop Died

- May 7<sup>th</sup> 1864 Special meeting held at the usual place
2. Made choice of Brother Samuel Elmenhorf for moderator
- 3 Read the record of the last covenant meeting at the 5<sup>th</sup> Sec. H.C. and took up the matter of Brother Jeremiah Matthews and Elder Winchell,
4. the church <sup>took</sup> up the first accusation, and voted that Elder Winchell was not wrong in asking the letter

- of recommendation under the circumstances that he did
- 5<sup>th</sup>. The Church took up the second accusation, and the Church justified Elder Winchell in the remarks, made in the sermon or discourse referred to in this accusation
6. The Church took up the matter of the third accusation and the Church say there was no fault on the part of Elder Winchell respecting the proposition referred to
7. The Church took the fourth accusation, which not being proved, was not acted on
8. The Church took up the fifth accusation, and a motion was made to vote it down, and the Church voted to throw it down
9. The Church voted to receive the foregoing and that it should be recorded.
- 10 Brother Bevier requested that the church call a council to assist us in settling our difficulties
11. The church refused to call a council at present

May 28<sup>th</sup> 1864 Church meeting held at the usual place —  
 Meeting opened with singing & prayer by Elder Winchell

2. Made choice of Elder Winchell for moderator

3. Elder Isaac Hewitt being with us, he was invited and bid welcome to a seat with us, in all the privileges of the Church

4. The Moderator enquired the minds of the Brethren and Sisters, and they appear to be a people of many trials, but full to trust in the Lord to deliver them out of them all, for they have no where else to look for help —

5. A door was opened to hear from any person that had any thing to relate to the Church by way of experience
6. Brother David Bevier asked of the church the privilege that if the aggrieved minority called a council that the council so called might meet or convene in the meeting house —

7. The Church voted to grant Brother Bevier's request
  8. Brother Bevier requested of the Church to know if those aggrieved Brethren could have the privilege of holding meeting in the meeting house at convenient times not to interfere with preaching
  9. The Church refused to grant the request of Brother Bevier, respecting holding meetings
  10. Meeting closed with prayer by Elder I. Hewitt

June 25<sup>th</sup> 1864 Church meeting held at the usual place  
Meeting opened with singing and prayer by Elder Winchester  
2. Made choice of Brother Samuel Elmendorf for moderator  
3. The moderator enquired the minds of the Brethren and Sisters and they express a lowness of mind But appear to have a desire for the welfare of Zion and that this branch of the Church should travel on in peace and union loving one another as Brethren in Christ, for perfect love casteth out fear  
4. A door was opened to hear from any person that had any thing to relate to the church by way of experience or otherwise  
5. Meeting closed with prayer

Whereas certain Brethren of the Church called a council to meet with them <sup>on the 13<sup>th</sup> day of July 1864</sup> and to give their advice on certain difficulties that appear to exist among us as a church  
Olive July 13<sup>th</sup> 1864.

Council met at the meeting house as requested, and organized by appointing Elder Isaac Hewitt, Moderator, and Elder Samuel More Clerk Called on the different churches for their messengers and found the following Elders and chosen Brethren present

Council adjourned at noon for half an hour.  
Met again and after singing proceeded to business  
by the minority stating their grievances —

First Brother Bevier stated that he was aggrieved  
on account of Elder Winchell having called for a  
letter of recommendation

Second, on account of depriving the Sisters voting  
on church matter,

The council passed the following resolutions,

1<sup>st</sup>. Resolved that the sisters of the church have the  
right to a vote with the Brethren in church  
matters —

2. Resolved that Elder Jacob Winchell did wrong  
under the circumstances then existing in asking  
for a letter of recommendation.

3. Resolved that the minority Brethren did wrong

under the circumstances as then existing in refusing to give Elder Winchell a letter of recommendation

4. Resolved that the Brethren and Sisters of the church on both sides did wrong in telling the faults of each other from one to the other.
5. Resolved, that the Brethren and Sisters of the minority did wrong in leaving their places in the church and refusing to travel with the church —
6. Resolved that we advise the Church of Olive and Hurley to adopt the above advice and resume their travel as Brethren and Sisters in the Lord,

We promise in the fear of the Lord and by the assistance of his holy spirit, and grace, to perform the following duties;

1<sup>st</sup> We, do promise to watch over each others conversation and not to suffer sin upon one another, so far as God shall discover it to us, or any of us, and to stir up one another to love, and good works, to warn and rebuke, and admonish one another with meekness according to the rule left us, by Jesus Christ?

2<sup>nd</sup> We, do promise and engage to endeavour to walk in the way of holiness, humility, and brotherly love as much as in us lieth to render our communion, pleasing, an agreeable to the will of God, and comfortable to ourselves, and lovely to the rest of the Lords people

3<sup>rd</sup> We, do promise in a special manner to pray with and for one another, and for the increase of the church, and for the presence of God in it, and for the peace of Jerusalem, and for all in authority as God hath commanded; 4<sup>th</sup> We, promise to meet, together on the Lord's day and at other times, as the Lord shall give opportunity, to serve and glorify God in the way of worship to edify, one another, and not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is; 5<sup>th</sup> We, promise to bear one another's burdens, and to have fellow-feeling for one another in all conditions both as to outward and inward trouble;
