PROCEEDINGS.

The Eastern Baptist Association met in its Fifty-first Annual Session with the church at Lisbon, Oct. 9th, 1894.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Dr. John Mitchell. Text from Ephesians 3, 16 to 19.

Adjourned for one hour.

The Association was called to order by Rev. L. R. Carroll, Moderator *pro tem*. A. R. Herring acted as Secretary *pro tem*.

The roll of churches was called, a majority being present. On motion, Finance Committee was appointed, L. R. Highsmith, B. Matthews, and — Dobson.

Reading Clerks F. A. Fennell and D. L. Herring. Committee of Arrangements was appointed, consisting of Rev. M. C. Walton and Deacons of Lisbon church.

Church letters were read. The delegates were not enrolled there being so few delegates present.

Rev. S. D. Swaim was elected Moderator, A. R. Herring, Clerk, W. H. Middleton, Treasurer.

An invitation was extended to visiting brethren, and the following brethren responded: J. C. Caddell, in the interest of the *Biblical Recorder*, Dr. John Mitchell, for the Board of Education W. D. Harrell, from Chowan Association, B. S. Peterson, for the *North Carolina Baptist*, D. C. Durham, for State Missions.

The Committee of Arrangements report:

Devotional exercises to be conducted by Rev. F. T. Wooten, 9, a. m. Time of meeting of the Association, 9:30 a. m.

Petitionary letters were called for. Letters from South Side church and Olivet church were presented, asking for admission into this body, and also letters from Providence church of the Atlantic Association. These were referred to a committee consisting of Revs. Will B. Oliver, F. T. Wooten, W. B. Harrell and M. C. Walton.

The above named committee reported favorably as to Providence and South Side. The letter from Olivet church was referred

to the Association for some irregularity. The reports were adopted and the churches received.

Motion to adjourn. Prayer by W. B. Oliver. Benediction by Rev. R. E. Peele.

SECOND DAY.—MORNING SESSION, Wednesday, Oct. 10, 1894.

Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. M. C. Walton. Read 15th chapter of John.

The Association was called to order by Moderator. Roll of churches called but few delegates answered because of overflow in the rivers.

Proceedings of the 1st day read and approved

Committee to nominate an Executive Committee was appointed, consisting of Rev. M. C. Walton and N. E. Shelly. To nominate preachers for next session of the Association, L. R. Highsmith and R. B. Moore.

Committee on Sunday Schools, A. Hewlett and Isaiah Carroll.

Report of Executive Committee was read by L. R. Carroll, and in connection the report on State Missions was read by Dr. C. Durham, and pending a motion to adopt, remarks were made by L. R. Carroll and Dr. C. Durham.

Roll of churches were called for pledges for the next year for State Missions. The churches responded as follows:

Barlow Chapel \$10.00, Bethel 4.00, Boykin's Chapel 5.00, Burgaw 10.00, Caintuck Chapel 15.00, Dobson Chapel 12.50, Johnsons 15.00, Lisbon 10.00, Poplar Grove 2.50, Masonboro 12.50, Mt. Holly 5.00, New Hope 10.00, Riley's Creek 5.00, Salem 10.00, Siloam 10.00, Teachey's 3.00, Warsaw 15.00, Willard 2.00, Colvin Creek 1.00, South Side 5.00, Olivet 1.00, Providence 5.00, Corinth 2.00, Clinton 10.00, Well's Chapel 10.00, Ebenezer 2.00. Here remarks were made by Moderator and J. S. Canady.

The reports as read on State and Associational Missions were adopted. The Executive Committee requested to correspond with the churches in the Association, asking for pledges. Adjourned for one hour.

EVENING SESSION.

Report on Education was read by Dr. John Mitchell, pending

its adoption, remarks were made by Dr. Mitchell, R. E. Peele and R. W. Harrell. Rev. L. M. Curtis from West Chowan was welcomed by Moderator.

Report of committee on Ministers' Relief, was read by L. R. Carroll. Adopted without remarks.

Report on Foreign Missions was read by L. R. Carroll. Adopted without remarks. Treasurer's report was adopted without being audited. Report on Home Missions read by M. C. Walton. Adopted without remarks.

Report of Committee to nominate an Executive Committee. Read by N. A. Shelly. Adopted.

Report to name Preachers for next Session was read and adopted.

Corinth church petitions the Association to hold its next session with her. Request granted.

Report on Periodicals was read by J. C. Caddell. Report adopted without remarks.

Report on Temperance, read by D. L. Herring. Report adopted without remarks.

By motion, all unfinished business of the Association was referred to the Executive Committee to finish the work of the session, and when done to report the same to the Clerk, with all the church letters and other papers belonging to the Association. On account of the rapid rising water in the river, the Association was forced to adjourn to meet with the Corinth church, on Tuesday after the first Sunday in October, 1895. Prayer was offered by Rev. M. C. Walton.

REPORTS.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Owing to our failure to take pledges at the last Association, for the support of the work within our bounds, your committee has labored under some serious disadvantages during the year, and while from this and other causes, the progress of the work has not been so satisfactory as it otherwise might have been, yet it has not been without some very pleasing results.

Bro. R. E. Peele, our former missionary, retired from the field, or work in Onslow, in Feb'y last. At the request of the Board, one of your committee undertook to visit the churches thus left, until a regular minister could be secured. In Jan'y Bro. M. C. Walton agreed to take charge of the work until the present Association. For the more successful prosecution of the work in the future, your committee respectfully recommend a consolidation of the unions as in the earlier history of the work. That the number of the Executive Committee be reduced to five. That they select the place of the 5th Sunday meetings, and ask the churches to send representatives with contributions for the work.

STATE MISSIONS.

The Baptist State Convention has defined State Missions to include all practical efforts to give the Gospel, as we believe it, to the destitute sections, towns and neighborhoods of the State. This work is done through individuals, through Associations and through the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools of the Convention. This year there are 92 Missionaries, located in all sections of the State, preaching at more than 300 destitute places. Among these there are some of the most consecrated and successful Baptist preachers in the State. The Board is very anxious to go to the Convention this year without a debt on this department of our work. But to do this it will be necessary for all of the pastors and churches to do what they can during October and November, to aid the work. Your committee therefore recommends, first, that the pastors be requested to present State Missions to their churches, during the months named above, and to ask the people to aid this work and to forward whatever is thus secured to J. D. Boushall, Treasurer, Raleigh, N. C.

EDUCATION.

We are pleased to be able to report an increasing interest in the subject of Education. Our Schools and Colleges have opened well, and the future is encouraging. Wake Forest College enrolled 210 students this session, and still they come. Let us be thankful and rally to their support, and also our High School at Warsaw, and to the Chowan Baptist Female Institute, at Murfreesboro, and to the Oxford Female Seminary, and to all of our schools.

Ministerial Education.

The importance of the subject has never been felt as now. More young ministers are asking help than ever before, and their

need is great. The Board of Education has secured 36 for this session, and others are asking for help, and some now at the College, know not how they can remain longer, unless they can be aided. But the Board is not able to help them. There is now a debt of \$900 on the Board, and others cannot be secured unless the contributions should greatly increase. Would that we were able to help all the worthy young ministers who apply for aid. Brethren, come up to the help of the Lord, and aid all His young ministers who are in need of help. There are now four on the Board from this Association, and they all seem to be promising. Will the churches support them? We submit the following:

Resolved, That all our churches be requested to take a collection, at least once a year, for the Board of Education, and that we will endeavor to raise an amount sufficient to pay the board of the four young ministers from this Association.

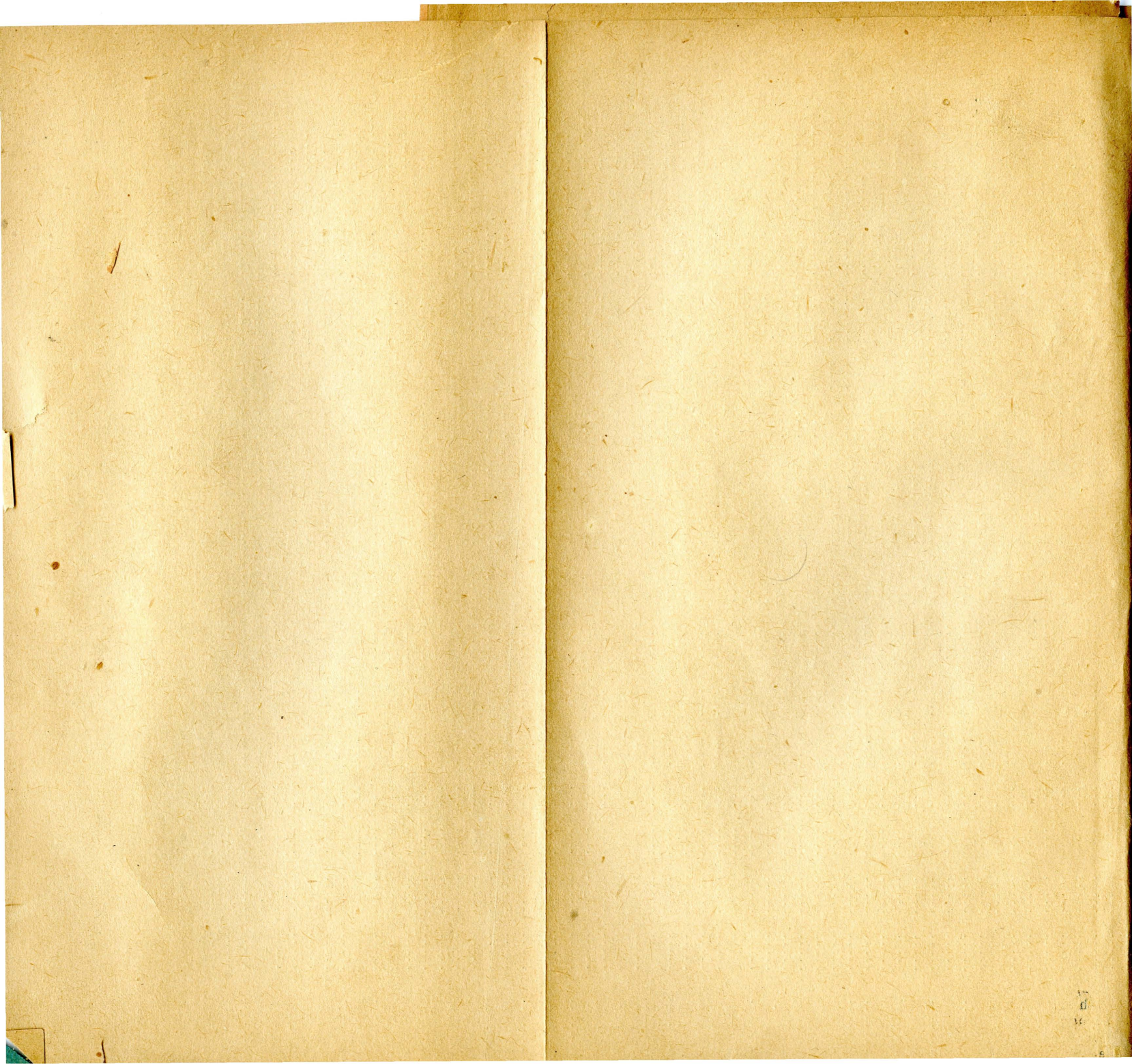

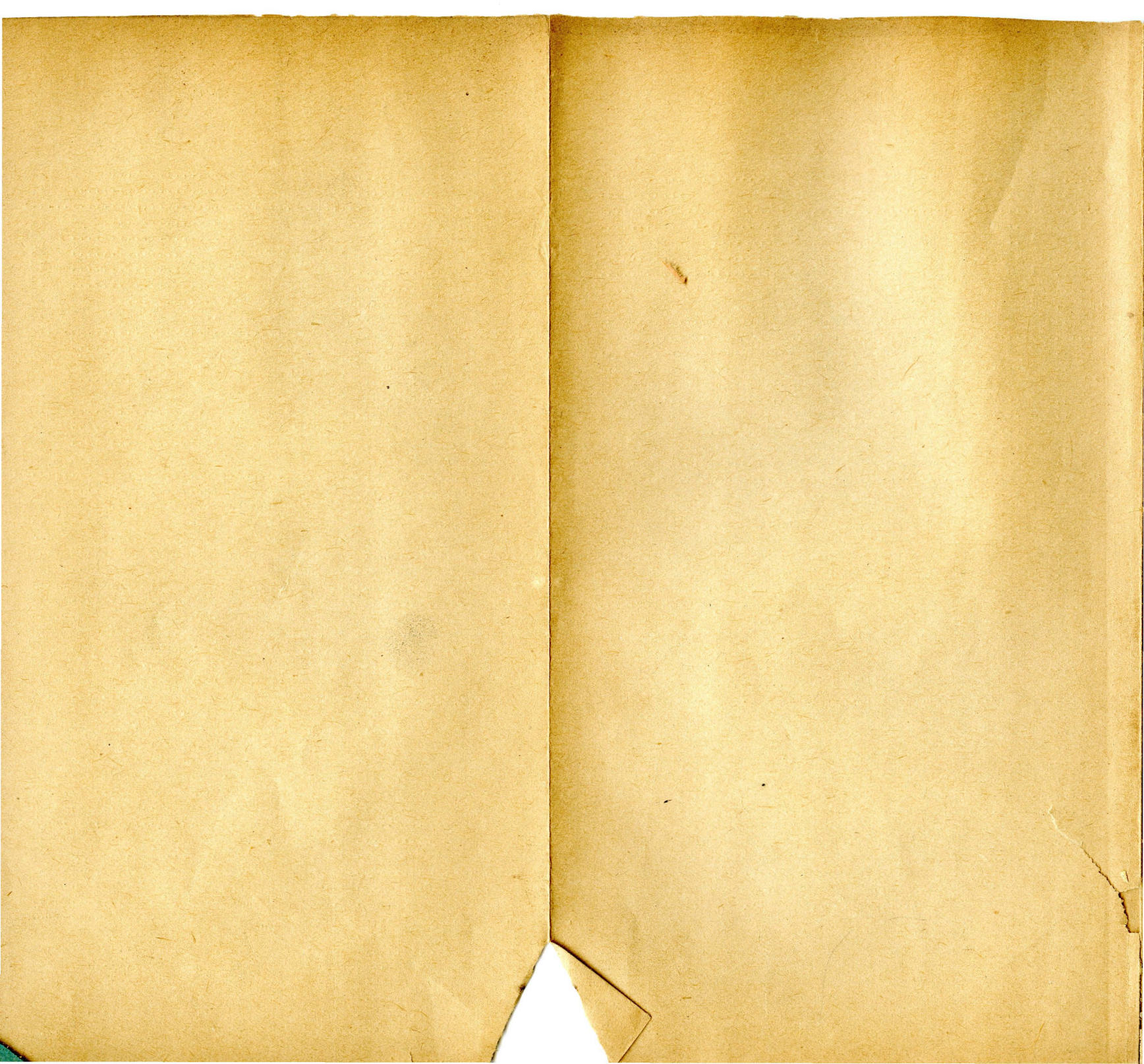
