CONSTITUTION

-OF THE-

Atlantic Baptist Association.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the

spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post-office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, Other Objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or

dropped from this Association.

8 The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, an Historian, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among the members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, the Historian in recording and reporting such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to entrusted to or the body.

9. The Annual Sessions of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

10. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a two thirds vote of the members present.

By - LAWS.

- 1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating them as such.
- The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.
- 4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.
- 5. The Historian shall record and report at each Association such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation.
- 6. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.
- 7. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.
- 8. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.
- Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.
- 10. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board; also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.
- 11. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Mell's Parliamentary Practice."
- 12. The General Order of Business shall be:
- 1. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.
- 2. Election of officers.
- 3. Petitionary letters.
- 4. Appointment of committees for this session.
- 5. Appointment of standing committees.
- 6. Report of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.
- 7. Reports of standing committees.
- 8. Reports of other committees.
- 9. Miscellaneous business.

The following visiting brethren: C. Durham, Financial Secretary State Board; John Mitchell, Wake Forest College; O. L. Stringfield, Baptist Female University, D. McLeod, Tar River Association representing Washington Baptist Church; J. H. Lambeth, Tar River Association; D. W. Spilman, Tar River Association; A. D. Hunter, Raleigh Association representing Biblical Recorder, and R. T. Vann, Tar River Association, representing Home Missions; were cordially invited by the Moderator to participate in the deliberations of the Association.

Moved. That the Moderator appoint a Committee to recommend changes and additions to the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association.

In accordance with the above motion, the Moderator appointed the following brethren members of said Committee: C. A. Jenkins, R. D. Carroll and W. T. Jones.

R. D. Carroll, pastor of this Church, extended a hearty welcome to all delegates and visiting brethren. C. Durham responded in behalf of the Association.

The Moderator appointed the following as Committee on

exercises: A. L. Stough and B. F. Dillahunt.

The Moderator appointed A. D. Hunter, Chairman of Committee on Periodicals and Religious Literature, and

John Mitchell on Ministerial Education.

The Committee on Religious Exercises reported the following order: 7:30 a. m. Prayer and Praise; 10 a. m. the Association will meet; adjourn at 12:30 p. m. Re-assemble at 2 p. m.; adjourn at pleasure. Night session 7:30 and adjourn at will.

The report on Ministers' Relief Board was read by R. D. Carroll, and after being discussed was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERS' RELIEF BOARD.

The Baptist Ministers' Relief Board is located at Durham, N. C. Its object is to afford aid and relief to needy Baptist Ministers, and needy widows of Baptist Ministers, who have given their lives to the work of the gospel ministry, and have thus remained poor in this world's goods.

The business of this Board is conducted strictly upon a cash basis. No

debts are at any time contracted, or aid voted to any one, unless there is

money in the Treasury to pay the same.

No officer of this Board receives any compensation for services rendered,

except actual expenses for attending to the business of the Board.

This Board now has a "Permanent Interest Bearing Fund" of about six hundred dollars, with which one-third of all amounts collected by the Churches is invested; the interest on this Fund with the remaining twothirds collected by the Churches, goes for the support of Beneficiaries.

The Corresponding Secretary of the Board says "what is needed now, is more of the needy ones on the Board. Doubtless there are many in the State who are greatly in need of aid, but who know nothing of the provisions of this Board. The reason for this, is, our people have not paid proper attention to this class of our Ministers, and to this department of our work."

Doubtless if there was some one from the Atlantic Association on this Board it would stir the brethren and Churches within our bounds to more liberal giving. We would urge the importance of looking up the needy ones in our own Association, if there are any, that they may be reported to this Board and receive its aid.

There is not a Beneficiary on this Board from this entire Association, and there are thirty-four Associations in the State that have not a Beneficiary on the Board. Is it possible that there are none in these Associations that are as needy as those on the Board?

While we seek to enlarge the contributions, we ought to be equally inter-

ested in finding THOSE WHO ARE IN NEED.

There are now six old Brethren on the Board with their families, and three widows of deceased ministers. Four of these Brethren have only wives to care for; one of them has a wife and three children, and one with a wife and one child. All the widows have children; one with one child; one with four daughters; and one with four or five little children. The Board is very strict about receiving and retaining applicants. At this time there is only one applicant—a widow from Eastern Association.

During the Conventional year up to June 4th, only \$127.50 have been

During the Conventional year up to June 4th, only \$127.50 have been appropriated. The Treasurer of the Convention reports only about \$227 collected since the Convention. Shall we not stir ourselves up to a more faithful discharge of our duty in this work? Shall we allow our brethren to stand in the thickest of the battle till their strength fails them and then leave them to suffer in their old age? Shall they minister to us Spiritual things and we refuse to minister to them carnal things? Shall we muzzle the mouth of the ox that treadeth out the corn? Let every one lay by him on the first day of the week as the Lord prospers him, that a collection may be given to those poor Saints once every year.

Your Committee would recommend that the pastors of this Association bring this matter before their Churches once a year, and that a collection be taken for this Board.

REPORT ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

Your Committee recommend that Article 8 of Constitution be amended as follows: The word and before the words Treasurer shall be smitted, and the words and an Historian shall be inserted between treasurer and elected. Article 8 as amended will read as follows:

The Officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, an Historian and a Treasurer elected annually by ballot from among its Members to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, the Historian in recording and reporting, at each Association, such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

The same Committee reported as follows on By-Laws:
The following By-Law shall be inserted between numbers 4 and 5 of the
present By-Laws: The Historian shall record and report, at each Association, such Associational historical facts as are worthy of preservation.

Association adjourned to meet at 2 p. m.

FIRST DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association was called to order at 2 o'clock p. m. by the Moderator. Prayer by J. H. Lambeth.

The report on Temperance was read by W. T. Jones and after being discussed was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The liquor business like a monster devil fish, fastens its tentacles upon the powers of State and then proceeds with its work of ruin. If allowed an existence, at once, its promoters essay to make the laws of State minister to their gain. If established, we can never estimate the half of its destructive work. Granted an existence, it defies the laws of God and of the State whenever an opportunity is presented. To engage in it, is to become a moral outlaw against God and man.

How is it to be throttled?

The tear stained cheeks of wives and mothers and children, aye, the voice of millions of people cursed by rum, is lifted against this business. The drunkard's grave and the drunkard's hell bid us fight against it. Let us preach against it; pray against it; and vote against it. Let our Churches have a high temperance standard before them. Be it ours ever to discountenance dram drinking on the part of Church members. Let our people in no way be participators in this blood business, either by drinking of liquors or in any way countenancing their sale.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS AND SUNDAY-SCHOOL LITERATURE.

In our times the printing press has become a great power both for good and evil. A vast amount of hurtful literature is constantly thrown in many homes. It is a matter of great importance that our Baptist homes be guarded from the evils of bad books and literature and be blessed with the presence of good ones. All our people should read the Biblical Recorder. It is sound in its matter and progressive in its policy. It has been a great power in the development of all our denominational interests. It is ably edited, and has a large number of able contributors.

We also endorse Charity and Children, our Orphanage paper and our own Sunday-school literature published by our Southern Sunday-School Board at Nashville, Tenn., also the Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field. We recommend that our Churches and Sunday-schools buy this literature from our supply store in Raleigh.

The Association met at 9:30 a. m. for devotional exercises led by John Mitchell. At 10 o'clock a. m., the Moderator called the Association to order.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

This branch of our Mission work embraces the territory of our Southern Baptist Convention and Cuba. The work may be divided into five departments:

1 In Cuba.

2. Among the Indians.

Among the Foreign Population,
 Among our Native White People.

. Among the Colored Race.

During the last Conventional year it employed 381 Missionaries; Baptized 4,470; Constituted 133 Churches; and established 429 Sunday schools. It had 14 Missionaries laboring in our State, 5 in the bounds of our Convention and 9 in Western North Carolina. They baptized 149 souls.

Receipts and expenditures of the Board amounts to some over \$100,000 per year, North Carolina contributes about \$2500. Its last report shows a debt of \$6,500. This work is highly worthy of your support. In connection with its mission work it publishes The Home Field at 25 cents per year. It should be in every Baptist family.

There are now thirty-six young ministers on the Board of Education. Several others are asking for aid but the Board can not help them, for the lack of funds. Would that we were able to help all the worthy young ministers who apply for aid. The Board is now several hundred dollars in debt, and is in pressing need of funds to carry on its work, and the brethren are earnestly requested to send up their contributions as soon as convenient, and make them as liberal as they may be able.

Resolved, That all our churches be requested to take, at least, one collection during the year for the Board of Education and that we will try to

raise, at least, \$200. to aid our needy young ministers.

tional interests of the people of the State.

MORNING SESSION. -3RD DAY.

The Moderator called the Association to order promptly at 10 o'clock a. m.

Bro. J. H. Mills, representing the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage, was heartily invited by the Moderator to participate in the business of the Association.

The Report of the Executive Board was read by Rufus Ford, and after being discussed, was adopted as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.
