ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is fully accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada.

REGISTRATION

FIRST TERM—Monday, June 7, 1976. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 8. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation closes June 9 and schedule changing closes June 11, 4:00 p.m.

SECOND TERM—Monday, July 5, 1976. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 6. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation closes July 7 and schedule changing closes July 9, 4:00 p.m.

COSTS

Fees \$30.00 per term. Rooms \$22.50 per term. Meals, approximately \$5.00 per day, may be secured in the cafeteria. The cost of books and supplies varies, depending upon the courses taken.

FACILITIES

Air-conditioned library and classrooms. Modern dormitory facilities are available for men and women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

RECREATION

The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Tennis courts are also available.

CURRICULUM

A course in elementary Greek (B151s-B152s), designed for beginners in the Greek New Testament will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Greek.

The student who does not take the course in Greek may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

The student who elects to take M 366s the second term may earn six semester hours. Classes for this course will begin on July 5.

In order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio, the Seminary reserves the right to control the size of classes offered in the summer sessions.

In addition to on-campus offerings during the June and July terms, special off-campus learning opportunities are available.

M 367s WORKSHOP ON URBAN STUDIES* Mr. Bland and Guests
