FIRST DAY---THURSDAY, SEPT. 29, 1904.

The Liberty and Ducktown Baptist Association met according to adjournment with the Liberty church. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder W. S. Kimsey, followed by Elder T. W. Crowder. Recess for one hour.

Reassembled. Scripture reading by Elder J. F. McGee, the former Moderator, and prayer by Elder E. A. Deweese. The house was called to order for business by the former Moderator and appointed Brothers A. K. Dickey and J. T. L. Hartness reading clerks. The letters of the various churches composing the Liberty and Ducktown Baptist Association were called for and all present were read by the clerks.

Then went into a permanent organization by electing officers as follows: Elder B. M. Ledford, Moderator; A. K. Dickey, Vice-Moderator; L. D. Mc-Nabb, Treasurer, and D. T. McNabb, Clerk. Then an opportunity was given to any church wishing to become a member of this body, but received none, Gave an invitation to visitors and received Elder J. E. Norton, from the Western North Carolina Association. Then appointed committees as follows:

On Temperance-Elder W. D. Hogsed, J. L. McNabb, A. J. Johnson and A. K. Dickey.

On Finance-J. T. Payne and J. E Tilson,

On Education-Elder J. A. Craig, S. M. Reese, P. E. Nelson, and F. A. Brown was added

The body met. Scripture reading, comment and prayer by Elder J. W. Lawing. The house was called to order by the Moderator.

pense of the Church—Elders W. A. Revis, J. A. Craig, E. A. Deweese and L. D. McNabb.

Renewed the invitation for visitors and received Elders J. W. Lawing and E. D. Cole, from the Morganton Association, and Elder A. E. Brown as field secretary for the Home Mission Board. Also Bro. F. A. Brown, representing the interest of the Bellevue High School.

Extended an invitation for membership and received Mine City Church by

letter from the Morganton Association.

Back to the appointment of committees:

On Orphanage-P. E. Nelson and F. A. Brown.

On Nominations—J. H. Rymer, P. E. Nelson, J. T. L. Hartness and Samuel Amburn.

On Duty of Deacons-O. L. Keith, Elder J. W. Lawing, J. M. Shearer and James Coleman.

Suspended the regular order of business for preaching at 11 o'clock by Elder J. W. Lawing, who entertained the congregation, preaching a very instructive sermon. Text, Romans 10:4; subject, Righteousness.

Adjourned for dinner.

The body instructed the Executive Committee of the Bellevue High School to purchase the upper story of the Ledford Hall for the use of said school, and took pledges as follows to pay for same:

The body recommend and request that each Sabbath school, and each church where there is no Sabbath school, send delegates to the Sabbath School Convention, to be held with Friendship church, which will embrace the first fifth Sunday after the adjournment of this body begin ning on Friday before; introductory sermon by Elder J. W. Lawing. Report adopted; see report. Appointed A. K. Dickey, W. L. McNabb, A. L. Martin and W. G. Sparks to arrange a program for the Convention and have it published in due time. Report of Committee on Electing a Missionary and Colporter for this Association, to hold one year, was submitted and read. Motion to adopt. Discussed by Elders J. W. Lawing and J. F. McGee. Report adopted; see report. Report of Treasurer read and adopted; see report. On motion appointed Elder J. F. McGee, Elder W. A. Revis and A. K. Dickey Executive Committee to take the general oversight of Mission work in this As-

sociation. Elected Elder G. F. Burger delegate to the State Convention, A. K, Dickey delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention, and Elder W. A. Revis member of the State Board. On motion appointed Elders W. A. Revis and B. M Ledford to arrange time and place for Baptist school. Then took up a collection for the orphans at Thomasville and raised \$8,25; also Rev. Gay Bryant took a collection for Samuel Farner, to bear the expense of an operation to remove an ulcer from the muscle of his arm, (amount, \$14.50) after which the body off red a resolution of thanks to the people of the Liberty community for their kind hospitality during this session. Elder A. E. Brown then preached a very instructive sermon from Rev. 14:6; subject, Vision of a World-wide Gospel. Adjourned to time and place mentioned in report on Nominations. A farewell address was delivered by Elder E A. Deweese, after which the congregation engaged in singing a hymn and the parting hand was extended to each other with much good feeling manifested, in which many expressed a hope of a happy future. COMMITTEE REPORTS.

ON EDUCATION.

This is no doubt the most vital of all questions to our denominational life in the mountain section. True Christianity stands for the education of the mass-No people can do their best work without a clear knowledge of what they are doing, and to do well anything attempted there must of necessity be the best possible preparation for its accomplishment. Two things are very necessary—the masses must have careful, capable leaders, then the people must be so trained as to choose between true and false leadership. Since the duties of leadership devolves largely upon the ministry, it is very important that these be educated. Then it is very important that the church membership be educa ed in order that we may accomplish the most possible good in the coming years. The achievements of the pat five years in the development of the educational interests of the denomination in he mountain section has been truly marvelous. Ten schools have been established, from which influence has gone out, are telling much in the development of our denomination. In these schools last year were enrolled 1,750 students, costing the denomination \$4,400. One of these schools—the Bellevue High School—stands as a monument to the zeal and sacrifice of this Association. Then we have the Murphy High School for young men and young women, which is another Baptist factor in the development of this section. Rejoicing in past achievements, let us, for the sake of the lost among us and for the sake of our Redeemer, go P. E. NELSON, Chairman. forward.

ON TEMPERANCE.

We are glad to report that our people are being more and more aroused over the liquor question. Seeing the great evil it is in our land, destroying our young people's ambition for good, turning the fatherly affections of many fathers into the affections of brutes, seeing that saloons are the nests in which infidelity, anarchism, and, in fact, almost all the schemes of delusion are hatched, let us unite as one mighty army, Jesus being our captain, and say in our hearts that we will never surrender until the demon is driven out of our beatuiful land and our people are anchored in safety from it.

RESOLUTION OFFERED:

We, the Liberty and Ducktown Baptist Association, in session, representing about 2,000 Baptists of Cherokee county, North Carolina, respectfully petition the United States Congress to pass such legislation as will protect prohibition in our territory from shipments of liquor from outside.

ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board is appointed by the Southern Baptist Convention at its annual meeting. The board has its headquarters at Atlanta, Ga. The president of the board is Dr. W. W. Landrum, pastor of the First Baptist church of Atlanta. The corresponding secretary is Dr. B. D. Gray. He is assisted by Rev. M. P. Hunt, who superintends the work west of the Mississippi river; by Rev. A. J. Barton, who superintends the work among the negroes, and by Rev. A. E. Brown, who superintends the work in the mountain regions of the South. The treasurer of the board is Mr. Walker Dunson, a business man of Atlanta. The field of the Home board is the Southern states, the island of Cuba, and Panama. The board employed 616 missionaries last year. These supplied 2,244 churches and stations and baptised 7,526 converts. They constituted 157 new churches and built 179 houses of worship. There was received and expended for this work last year \$127,850.56. board is endeavoring to supply the destitution in Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Oklahoma, Indian Territory, Cuba, Panama, the mountain regions, foreign factory towns and mining regions, and to assist the negroes in their work. The aim of the Home board is to enthrone Christ in the works and lives of men. The immediate sphere of the Home board is our own dear home land, but the ultimate aim is the world for Christ and Christ for the world. Let this Association become endued with the high and holy purpose of making Christ regnant on earth. We would close this report by reminding our people that this board is aiding our school work, and but for it our mountain schools would not have been established and could not employ the accomplished men and women they have to train our boys and girls. We appeal to our churches to manifest their appreciation of the aid extended us by making a liberal contribution to Home Missions this year.

ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your committee on State Missions submit the following report: State Missions means the work that has been and is being done by the board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. Through Livingston Johnson, corresponding secretary, by means and work of said board, many destitute

fields have been occupied by her missionaries in our beloved old North State. The good that has been done by way of sending the gospel of Christ through our organized system of doing mission work will only be revealed to us when the work is complete and we are gathered home. There has been constant growth and progress made each year in our state mission work since the convention was organized, and yet there remains much to be done as there are still destitute fields to be cultivated, and we believe it is our duty to contribute li erally of the means God has blessed us with, to the support of said work. By helping those in need we grow strong and useful in the Master's cause. This year the board has 122 missionaries employed on the field and God has wonderfully blessed their labors. 1,217 converts have been baptised and a still larger number have professed faith in Christ. We further recommend that this Association elect a missionary to travel in our bounds for the ensuing year and the work of an organizer on the different lines of our mission work. Recognizing the great opportunity of the Ducktown mining region and the difficulty of the field, we recommend it as a worthy and hope-J. F. McGEE, Chm. ful mission field. Respectfully submitted,

ON NOMINATIONS.

The third fifth Sunday meeting at Persimmon Creek Church; introductory sermon by Elder W. S. Lenderman, Elder T. W. Crowder his alternate. Fourth to be held with the Union Church; introductory sermon by Elder W. A. Revis; alternate, Elder J. T. Dugan. The pastors and churches where these meetings are assigned will each arrange a program and have it published two weeks before each meeting convenes. ON ORPHANAGE.

There is no class of persons that appeal more strongly to our sympathies than do the orphans of our land. For the care and protection of these unfortunate ones, our denomination has built a great home at Thomasville, where more than 300 orphans are being cared for. Under the superintendency of Rev. J. B. Boone, these children are being so trained and developed as to become industrious and useful members of society. We recommend that this body consider the needs of these unfortunate ones and make regular contributions for their benefit.

ON DUTY OF DEACONS.

Your committee on Duty of Deacons submit the following: The term "deacon" originally signified helper. When the church needed helpers the Holy Spirit signified the fast, which could be done by men full of the Holy Spirit, in order that the Apostles might give themselves entirely to the ministry of the Word. The object was to save time to the ministry by placing a part of the work then performed by the Apostles. The first duty was to serve tables. The Grecian widows, being neglected, the poor, and the finances of the church became the duties of the new officers installed in the office of Dea-

con by the Holy Spirit through the church. The Deacons were to see after widows, orphans, poor and churches. They should look into the temporal wants of all these and supply the wants as far as ability would admit. We include that they should visit the widows and orphans, encourage the desi ondent and sympathize with the bereft. They should see well to the incidental expenses of the church and to the support of the pastor.

ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We rejoice to know that our mission work is being greatly blessed in the foreign fields. We had in 1898, 76 missionaries and 117 native helpers and 102 churches; baptised 701 converts; members 4,760; contributions \$124,249.69, and in 1904 we have 138 missionaries, 225 native helpers and 180 churches; baptised 2,076 converts; members 9,969; contributions \$247,629.62, which shows a vast increase in our Foreign Mission work, but we see a great need of an increase of interest on the part of a great many of our Baptist people in the Foreign Mission work, so we urge our people to pray for Foreign Missions, and we also urge our people to give more means for the support of our missionaries and missionary work. Missionary means "one sent." Jesus was a Missionary sent from Heaven, therefore every child of God should be a missionary to the core, and should pray, work and give for the support of the same. We would recommend that the various helps be secured to aid in the great work of the Sunday school in all its departments. We would suggest the following, published by our Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn., to-wit: Normal Stud-

ies, by Spillman & Moore at 25c per vol.; Pastor and Sunday School, by Hatcher; Pastoral Leadership of Sunday School Forces, by Smith, at 50c; The Twentieth Century Sunday School, by Green, at 50c; and Kind Words—a weekly paper for children. We would further recommend that the Sunday schools of the Liberty and Ducktown Association organize themselves into a Sunday School Convention.





HAVE been informed that there are Baptist Sunday schools which have yielded to the solicitations, personal and otherwise, of an undenominational publishing house, and which are taking, in whole or in part, the literature of that house in preference to the literature of their own Publication Society. In view of this information we desire to put the question, *Is it wise?* to pastors, Sunday school officers and teachers who may have been thus influenced.

Is it wise to put into the hands of Baptist children and youth a literature which in some parts is largely sensational, in other parts directly opposed to Baptist teaching, and in no part clearly and positively declarative of our distinctive denominational views?
