ORPHANAGE REPORT

Some forty years ago a few Baptists under the leadership of John H. Mills established at Thomasville our own institution for the care of our helpless little ones. Almost three thousand of these children have been nurtured and reared in this institution, and sent out into the world as helpful, useful citizens. These citizens have only cost us a modest sum each year for training; no human agency can compute their value to the world. We Baptists are now called upon to go forward in this work. Hundreds of children are crying for admission to the Orphanage, and other hundreds are in homes where help is needed to hold the little group together around the family altar.

The Baptist churches in this State have almost four hundred thousand members. What a mighty host, and what a wonderful opportunity to invest in the health and happiness—yea, in the very souls of these children. And we appeal to the churches of this body for a larger and a more loyal support.

FRIDAY MORNING

Prayer service was conducted by J. B. Ray. The Association convened for business, and minutes of yesterday were read and approved. Messengers reported with letters from Holly Springs, Bethel, and Oak Grove.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

Our Lord was a missionary from heaven, sent to seek and to save that which was lost, (Luke 19:10). His first commission was only to the house of Israel, (Matt. 10:5-6) but he came to save the world, (John 3:17). "And other sheep I have which are not of this fold, them also I must bring, and they shall hear my voice, and there shall be one fold and one shepherd," (John 10:16). After he tasted death for every man and was risen from the dead, he said to his followers, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature and lo I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We your committee on education beg leave to submit the following report: Education should begin in the home very early in the child's life, first, with a great reverence for God; second, with an intimate knowledge of the Bible; and third, with a reverence for Sunday School and church. After this give them the best opportunity possible in the literary world.

SATURDAY MORNING

The opening prayer service was conducted by Guss Myers, and the Association was called to order for business. Minutes of the preceding day were read and approved. The Orphanage Report, being unfinished business, was read and received by the Association.

REPORT ON EVILS OF THE DAY

The evils of the day are many, and through devious temptations they present themselves often before us, especially our young people. Too often we see utter disregard for the rights of others, and flagrant violations of the law of the land. Agencies for good, such as the automobile, are transformed into instruments of death and destruction by their use in the liquor traffic.

OBITUARIES

Huie

John R. Huie was born June 30, 1846. At the age of forty nine he professed a hope in Christ, and was baptised into the fellowship of Mount Vernon Church. He was elected and ordained a deacon May 21, 1904. Brother Huie attended his church regularly as long as he was able to get there. He died April 23, 1926. "I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me write: Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth; yea, sayeth the spirit, that they may rest from their labours, and their works do follow them."

Crater

Rufus W. Crater was born near Crater's Mill in Stokes County June 13, 1836, and died May 8, 1926. He united with Zion Church in October 1867, and soon after, June 21, 1873, was ordained deacon in which capacity he served till his death. He has gone on before us a little time, but his going only forms one more bond between us and the other shore.

Cooper

Thos. H. Cooper was born in 1849, and died October 5, 1925. He joined the Church at Zion, in June 1844 was ordained a deacon, and continued to serve in that capacity till his death. Brother Cooper's life was exemplary, his every day acts being a constant reminder of the joys of christian living.

E. M. SALE, G. E. ROBINETTE.

This report was received, and the obituaries were ordered spread on the Minutes.

REPORT OF RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

Resolved, That we tender our sincere thanks to the people of Zion church and the community for the splendid way in which they have entertained this Association:

That we once again urge the Sunday Schools to take monthly collections for the Orphanage, and that each member contribute the proceeds of one day's work as a Thanksgiving offering to the Orphanage;

That it is the sense of this body that we go on record against the sale of gasoline, oil, and confectionery at stations along the public highways on Sunday.

G. W. SALE, J. M. CRATER.

After remarks by N. T. Jarvis, C. J. Hambricks, J. T. Jennings, and Guss Myers the report was adopted.

This being the centennial year for Zion church the Association gladly heard as a special report, a short historical sketch of the church, and ordered that it be spread upon the minutes. The report follows.

HISTORICAL SKETCH OF ZION CHURCH

So much human interest, local history, and religious zeal are interwoven with our church records that it is peculiarly fitting for us to take cognizance of them, and carefully preserve them for future generations. Zion church is not an exception in this respect. For a century her influence has been felt in the surrounding country, and within her walls those who have assembled there have known and shared their joys and sorrows, each with the other.

The record shows that authority was granted by Union church in Wilkes county for an arm or branch to be established at Douthit's School House in Iredell county, and that the first meeting was held there on the fourth Saturday in June, 1825. John Walker, Harris Standley, Wesley Armstrong, James Barret, Charles Russel, Ester Jones, Amy Barrett, Elizabeth George, and Sarah Walker were present, and their names were enrolled as members of the arm. An open door was declared for the reception of members; Synthy Rigsby came forward and was received to be baptized the following day, Sunday. Meeting dismissed in order. This record was signed by H. Standley as deputy clerk.

Regular meetings were held on the fourth Saturday in each month for the transaction of such business as might come before the body. At the July meeting Sallie Mullis was received as a member, and in September Enos Windsor joined by letter. The

August 1825 meeting shows no record of a sermon for the day, but states that H. Standley was appointed clerk.

In December of this year the Arm decided to request a constitution, and directed the clerk to prepare a letter of request which was read and approbated on the following day. The plans to constitute the church in February 1826 were not carried out, due to the failure of the helpers to attend, but the request for a constitution was renewed. In June 1826 the Arm met and after some conversation decided to ask for the ordination of James Barnard as deacon, and H. Standley as their preacher, provided the church was constituted. One month later, at the July meeting, the Arm met with the brethren called to assist in constituting the church, "opened in fellowship," and appointed William Dodson moderator and H. Standley "occasional clerk."

Inquiries were made as to the faith of the Arm, and as to the qualifications of H. Standley for preacher and James Barnard for deacon. After due examination the committee agreed to constitute the church, but deferred the ordination of the pastor and deacon till the following day. The presbytery which officiated in the constitution of the church and the ordination service was composed of Elders William Dodson, William Gillham, Thomas Mastin, and John Walker. Brother Standley was given the special charge of the newly organized church.

At the following meeting, the fourth Saturday in August, much business was transacted. Joseph Beeman was received by letter, and was elected clerk; the church name, Zion, was chosen, and a decision reached to join the Brier Creek Association, to which body H. Standley, James Beeman, and Enos Windsor were chosen delegates, and H. Standley was authorized to prepare the letter to the Association. In October these delegates reported that they "were received in love" by the Association.

The following year, 1827, two scriptural queries, Matt. 5:23-24 and Romans 16:17 were carried from this church to the Association by messengers, H. Standley, Joseph Beeman, and Enos Windsor; they also carried a "loving request that the Association take under consideration the difficulty between the Associations."

We find that the church met regularly to worship and to transact routine business, and that usually the members were very diligent and faithful, though there is a record of committees being sent to notify members to fill their seats, or to answer charges or rumors which reflected on christian character.

In 1829 letters of dismission were granted to Harris Standley, Sarah Standley, and Nancy Standley. After this we find no further record of them, but for the part Harris Standley had in the organization and early growth of Zion church he should have our lasting gratitude. For this signal service, we should reverence his memory. Peace to his ashes!

In May 1831, Joseph Nickson was granted authority "to sing, pray, and exhort within the bounds of his own church."

In 1834, Anthony Wright, Bennett Windsor, and Joseph Nickson were appointed to attend an extra session of the Brier Creek Association which met in May at Little River church in Wilkes County. This minute was dated March 1834, and from that time till March 1866 no records are available.

In 1867 W. A. Myers asked for and received permission from the church to use a public gift. Doubtless the members could not fore see the great and useful career lying out before this grand old christian soldier. Just one year later, after a sermon by Thomas Howell, a presbytery consisting of Elders Thomas Howell, W. G. Brown, and R. H. Parks was called on to meet on September 25th to examine into the qualifications of W. A. Myers for the ministry. After due examination they found him orthodox, and proceeded with the ordination. Elders Brown and Howell conducted the examination, R. H. Parks presented the Bible and gave the charge, and Thomas Howell led the ordination prayer.

At the church conference in February 1870, the question of building a new house was discussed, and a building committee consisting of E. T. Burgess, E. M. Couch, T. L. Jennings, W. W. Wright, W. W. Bell, and E. L. Windsor was appointed. Soon after the completion of the building, the Brier Creek Association met here, and was followed immediately by a protracted meeting which resulted in many additions to the church.

In November 1892, Elders W. A. Myers, and V. M. Swaim made up a presbytery for the ordination of T. L. Jennings to the ministry.

By 1897 the old church building had become inadequate to the needs of the congregation, and at the suggestion of E. M. Sale it was decided to erect a more suitable building. E. M. Couch, R. W. Crater, T. L. Jennings, E. M. Sale, and T. H. Cooper were appointed as a building committee, and given full power to act. This house was completed in the spring of 1899.

By order of the church in conference, March 1910, our contributions to foreign missions will be sent direct to Rev. T. L. Blalock in China, which practice is still continued.

It might be of interest to some to know that colored folks once belonged to Zion church. The record shows that Frank Jones, colored, joined this church in 1868, by letter from Oak Grove, was received as an ordained minister, and was granted a letter of dismission two years later.

Zion church is a noble inheritance handed down to us by our forbears. Let us ever show our gratitude to each one of them for this great preserver of liberty and civilization. Take out of America the church and its influence for good and in a few years this country would revert to heathenism. We can not conceive of a better or more appropriate way in which we as a church can perpetuate the memory of our ancestors who wrought so well in founding this institution than by living better lives, being more faithful to every duty, thereby showing the world that there is a reality in the religion of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Let us all teach the rising generation to honor and revere the memory of christian patriots who have for a century carried on the Master's work. Peace to their ashes, and long live their sacred memory.
