ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY: BOOKS OF SPECIAL INTEREST TO WOMEN. By Marilyn Mayse, Staff Chaplain, Alabama Baptist Hospitals-Birmingham; M.Div., SEBTS, 1983.

One of my favorite authors is Rosemary Ruether, a Catholic theologian who has averaged a book a year for some 15 years, on various subjects. A Medieval historian, she writes clearly and persuasively, with historical perspective and documentation. I recommend especially these:

a. LIBERATION THEOLOGY (Paulist, 1972), pb. Subtitled "Human Hope Confronts Christian History and American Power." Includes chapters on black theology, Latin American liberation theology, and anti-Semitism, as well as two excellent chapters on women's liberation. Ruether sets these topics against a well-stated Christian theology of liberation.

b. MARY--THE FEMININE FACE OF THE CHURCH (Westminster, 1977) pb. A "study course book" written for local Presbyterian churches. Easily read, this book presents a historical/theological rationale for the importance of Mariology in keeping alive certain "feminine" qualities in theology. Especially interesting are chapters on Mary and the mission of Jesus; Mary and the Protestants; and Mary and the humanization of the church. Includes questions for reflection after each chapter.

c. NEW WOMAN/NEW EARTH: Sexist Ideologies and Human Liberation (Seabury, 1975) pb. A collection of essays on religion and sexism; sexism and ministry; women and other aliens (such as blacks and witches); psychoanalysis; socialism; and ecology. Ruether seeks to lay a groundwork for recognizing the interrelation of ideology and social structure in the history of sexism.

d. RRR and Eleanor McLaughlin, WONEN OF SPIRIT: Female Leadership in the Jewish tradition, the early church, the patristic age, through the 20th century in Protestantism, Judaism, and Catholicism. Essays by 16 historians.

e. RRR, ed., RELIGION AND SEXISM: Images of Woman in the Jewish and Christian Traditions (Simon and Schuster, 1974) pb. \$4.95. Another collection of essays, this one focusing on theological writings from the Old Testament to Barth and Tillich.

Nancy Friday, MY MOTHER MY SELF (Dell, 1977) pb. A basic book for a woman sceking to understand and claim her identity. It examines a woman's principal ties: first, to her mother, the most lasting and crucial relationship; and then the influence of that relationship upon bonding to a man, one's child, other women, and work. I recommend it even (perhaps especially) for those women who discount or deny the influence of their mothers upon them.

Irene Claremont de Castillejo, KNOWING WOMAN: A Feminine Psychology, pb. Could more accurately be titled "Knowing Persons: A Masculine/Feminine Psychology." Using Jung's archetypes, the author discusses the masculinity/femininity in all of us, and the development of a balance through our relationships with others and with ourselves. Chapters entitled "Meeting," "What Do We Mean by Love?' and "The Rainmaker Ideal" are all wonderfully expressive of the struggl
