The following report on Periodicals was read:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Your committee recommend the *Biblical Recorder*, our State organ, as worthy a place in every home; *Charity and Children*, that greater interest may be aroused for the support of the Orphanage; *Foreign Mission Journal*, that all may become better acquainted with the needs of our foreign fields; the *Wake Forest Student*, to keep informed about our college's work in preparing our young men for active and useful lives; *Our Home Field*, that our people may know more about the Home Mission work of the Southern Baptist Convention; the *Kind Words* series of the Sunday School periodicals, published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

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SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, Aug. 5th, 1891.

Reading Psalms 103, by Bro. M. L. Kesler; Prayer by Bro. S. F. Conrad. The congregation then joined in singing "What a friend we have in Jesus."

Dr. C. A. Rominger was elected permanent Moderator.

Minutes read and approved.

Remaining letters received and read.

Madison, Summerfield and Beaver Island churches at their own request, were granted letters of dismission, in order to join the Pilot Mountain Association.

The following visiting brethren reported: Bro. Newton, representing the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage, and Bro. S. F. Conrad, Corresponding Messenger from the Pilot Mountain Association.

Bro. Durham introduced a resolution in reference to the observance of the Centennial of Baptist Missions, which was adopted, as follows:

WHEREAS, The Centennial of the Missions is to be emphasized by the Baptists of the World, and especially by the Southern Baptist Convention during 1892, therefore,

*Resolved, 1st,* That this Association add one extra day to its session in 1892.

*Resolved, 2nd,* That a committee of three be appointed to arrange for special and appropriate Missionary Centennial services, during one day of the next session of the Association.

The report on Education was read, which is as follows:

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

It would seem hardly needful to urge the importance of general education, yet it is a fact that many parents are almost entirely neglecting the education of their children, and many young men and young ladies seem to overlook the fact that they could and should educate themselves.

Your committee will in this brief report call attention to three phases of education:

1st, Ministerial.—It is a fact that God calls men to the Ministry who are unable to educate themselves, except by a loss of a number of the best years of their lives. This is an age of education, and the "pulpit must not fall below the pew." There is a subtle infidelity in literature, in the atmosphere that will not be met by pious platitudes in the pulpit, nor by religious cant in the religious circle. Irreverent "Higher criticisms" must be met by reverent higher criticism. Again, the growth of our denomination and the multiplication of churches demands men—effective men. There are associations of one thousand members who have not one thoroughly equipped leader. A contribution to Ministerial education *is not* a gift to man. *It is* a contribution to the upbuilding of the Redeemer's Kingdom. If men are willing to give their lives, surely we ought to be willing to feed them (that is about all we do) while they are preparing for their life work.

2nd, Female Education.—We call attention to the fact that there is no well endowed Female College in N. C. If colleges for men were not endowed, and were run as a financial invested business, tuition would be \$150.00 to \$200.00 per year. Now, unendowed Female schools must do one of two things. First, they must give a very moderate grade of culture, or, second, they must charge an enormous tuition and heavy "bill of extras." Possibly both are sometimes combined. Now it is simply a wonder how our unendowed schools do so well. They have done great good, but many young ladies can never be educated under the existing state of things. Has not the time come when we must cheapen higher education for our worthy girls of moderate means?

3rd, The Religious Education of our young church members.—Every thoughtful Christian is bound to see that they do not get in the Sunday School and from the Pulpit all the training they need. We should hail with joy the effort to organize, to utilize and to develop our young people. Will some one speak to this question?—"How shall we teach them our church history, the great doctrines of the Bible, and the distinctive doctrines of our denomination, so that when they chance to fall in some field they shall mould thought and life, and not be moulded into existing shades of thought and sentiment?"

The names of illustrious men aided by the Board were called, and a strong plea made for helping deserving young Ministers in educating themselves for the most responsible of all callings. As Baptists, the imperative duty is laid upon us to sustain this department of our work. The report was adopted, and pledges taken, for which see table of pledges.

Rev. S. F. Conrad addressed the Association in behalf of Ruffin church building, which he is anxious to dedicate to the Lord's service the third Sunday in August, free from debt. To this end he asked of the different churches composing the Beulah Association, the sum of three hundred dollars.

Brothers W. B. Wingate, J. R. Jones and others endorsed the work as worthy of support. Pledges were taken, for which see table of pledges.

#### EVENING SESSION.

Report on State Missions was read, which is as follows :

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

State mission work is a practical application of the great commission to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," and consequently ought to elicit the hearty support of every Baptist in the State. The obligation to sustain it is imperative, because it rests on positive command, and Baptists cannot hesitate or falter in the presence of specific command of their Lord. It is the most important work before us, because it is the basis upon which all other work largely rests. One hundred and eighteen Missionaries under the appointment of the State Mission Board are carrying the Light of the Gospel to many destitute sections of the State in the face of many privations, and at great personal sacrifice. They need our sympathy and prayers in the substantial form of pecuniary support *rendered at the proper time*. In this connection we would direct special attention to the system in many churches of deferring, 'till the close of the year the payment of their contributions to this object by which these men are greatly hampered in their work. We beg also to call attention to the disparity, at present, between the salary paid the State Missionary and that paid his brother in the foreign field, and to remind the churches that the one is entitled to as much consideration as the other. To this end let contributions to this object be more liberal, and *paid in more promptly*.

The report on Foreign Missions was read, which is as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission work is attracting the attention of the Christian world as never before.

1st.—By means of the advanced methods of travel and communication we are enabled to learn of the magnitude of the destitution and needs in the foreign field.

2nd.—Many of the barriers which were formerly in the way have been removed. This has been brought about largely through the interchange of relations between christian nations and heathen countries.

3rd.—The Bible is now translated into more than three hundred and fifty different languages.

4th.—Converts are being made in some sections and countries by thousands. In Ongale, India, recently, more than two thousand persons were baptized in a few days, while among the same people on a former occasion, two thousand, two hundred and twenty six were baptized in one day, and Bro. Clough, the Missionary there, reports many thousands baptized in a few months, thus almost literally fulfilling the prophecy that a nation should be born in a day. The work in Cuba and Mexico seems marvelous in its results.

5th.—Another striking feature of the foreign work is multiplication of laborers for the foreign field. The time has been when we were in great need of men and women to do this work. Now we have the men but lack the means to send them.

6th.—To the Baptist, the Foreign work has been peculiarly inviting, as it is said for the money expended, and the number of laborers in the field, we have outstripped all others in point of results, indicating very clearly the seal of God's approbation of our efforts.

7th.—To prove ourselves loyal to the great command, Mat. 28:19 "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations," we are in duty bound to give the Gospel to the perishing millions. While in last year's minutes this Association reported over \$200.00 contributed for the Foreign work, and only five churches out of the nineteen blank. Let us try to have no blanks, and very much increase this amount. Last year the entire membership of the Association was 1,644, and the average for foreign missions about 13½ cents per head. Let there be a wider dissemination of knowledge among our people and greater effort put forth along this line, and these figures will be very materially changed.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention.—The Home Mission work, embracing all the Southern States, the Indian Territory and Cuba, is in a hopeful condition. The growing work calls for enlarged contributions, and greater effort to extend its influence until all the destitution of our Southern Zion shall be supplied with the Gospel of our Lord. Just at this time special effort needs to be made to pay for the house of worship in Havana, Cuba.

REPORT ON THOMASVILLE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

Report on Sunday Schools and Colportage was read by Bro. M. L. Kesler :

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND COLPORTAGE.

There is a wide-felt need that this work take a more definite shape than it has ever taken before.

1st.—That the efficiency of the schools already organized be increased by doing better teaching in the schools, and by reaching old and grown people who are strangers to the schools. The Sunday School is not the place only for teaching children born pious, to be good. It is the place for the earnest, manly study of the Bible, and the work must have a wider sphere. There is also a wide field for work outside of the organized churches. Many churches are centers from which this work ought to spread. Some are already doing this kind of work. We recommend that there be an executive committee in every Association whose business it shall be to see after this work. Closely connected with this work, is the work of Colportage. This work has scarcely begun. We venture the statement that Baptists have less of their literature than any other denomination in the



State. And then there is an untouched field for Baptist Colportage, outside of our own churches. How can this work be done? We recommend that each Association select a suitable man for this work and raise for his support a comfortable salary. This can be supplemented by the profit he makes on his books. But before this can be done to the best advantage we must have a sufficient capital to keep a good stock of books and tracts in our supply store. The notion that this work can be carried on without means, can only end in harm and failure.
