ver the past 20 years, opening your "mailbox" has taken on an entirely new meaning. Almost

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without exception, one thinks first of e-messages and the internet rather than parcels and stamps. We live in the age of the worldwide web, when information is shuttled about more rapidly and easily than once could have been imagined.

The Ph.D. program at Southeastern is eager to take its place on the information super-highway with a newly constructed website. Current students will find this new avenue of information a great way to keep up to date and find the answers to some important questions regarding various elements of the program. And prospective students will discover a wealth of information about the program, giving them a thorough idea of what the program is like even before they plan their first visit.

Browsers can access the Ph.D. website from the seminary's main address, <u>www.sebts.edu</u>—use Quick Links for easy access—or they can access the Ph.D. homepage directly with <u>www.sebts.edu/phd</u>. There is a familiar feel to the site, fashioned with an effort to make the new pages fit well with the seminary's existing web services. Still, it is unique in its offerings and full of news pertinent to the students in the Ph.D. program at Southeastern.

The Ph.D. homepage greets viewers with six links to sites of further interest: a welcome section, details concerning the various fields of study in Southeastern's Ph.D. program, admissions information, a Ph.D. student section, a listing of eligible academic mentors and access to a portion of the Ph.D. program's quarterly newsletter, *Academicus*.

The **Welcome** section gives a word of introduction to the program and provides options for a personal greeting from the Director of the Ph.D. program, Dr. Andreas Köstenberger, a Frequently Asked Questions section, and a brief Philosophy of Study.

The Admissions page offers information important to prospective students including contact information for the Graduate Studies office and a useful link to the admissions forms on the seminary's primary website. An application checklist and other instructions have recently been added to the already existing forms so that prospective applicants will discover everything they need to begin the application process.

A third page provides a brief overview of the academic program and descriptions of the three primary **Fields of Study:** Biblical Studies, Theological Studies, and Applied Theology. Other pages provide descriptions of the various concentrations available in those fields (New Testament, Philosophy of Religion, etc.), including the new cross-area concentrations (Hermeneutics and Biblical Theology).

Students who are currently enrolled in the program will find the student page to be a valuable aid. From this point, they can access a Ph.D. calendar that contains a list of

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important dates and events pertinent particularly to the Ph.D. student's academic life. This should be especially helpful when students and families are taking out their calendars at the beginning of a new year or new semester in order to make family plans. Another useful feature is the current listing of Ph.D. seminars. Course numbers, seminar titles, professors and meeting times are all a part of this listing.

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Current students as well as prospective students will be interested in the remaining two items on the student page. The first is a record of the dissertations that have been approved at Southeastern Seminary. Dissertations from 1998 through 2004 are displayed. The second item is a link detailing the placement record of many of Southeastern's Ph.D. graduates. Viewers will discover that a significant number of these graduates have obtained positions in universities and seminaries both in North America and overseas as well as positions of leadership in various Southern Baptist agencies. Insofar as these pages demonstrate an important piece of history to the program and show the high rate of success it has in preparing students for service and ministry, students will be able to accurately judge how the program is fulfilling its promise to prepare its Ph.D. candidates for scholarly professions.

Two pages remain, and the fifth may serve to answer one of the

Honoring the Inanguration of President Daniel Akin

In recognition of Dr. Akin's inauguration as the sixth president of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary (October 24-27, 2004), the Ph.D. program is pleased to feature excerpts from several of Dr. Akin's publications including a section from his dissertation: Bernard of Clairvaux – Evangelical of the 12th Century: A Critical Analysis of His Soteriology. Dr. Akin received his doctoral degree from the graduate school of The University of Texas at Arlington in 1989.

"Bernard stressed the fact that God's work of salvation was entirely of grace; in the form it took, in the way in which it was carried out and in the method of its application to men."1 Such a declaration concerning this medieval Roman Catholic seems quite strong and almost out of place. Yet we must remember Bernard's place in history and not commit the anachronistic error. Bernard is prior to the Council of Trent in the sixteenth century. Here the counter-reformation of Roman Catholicism developed a more rigid sacramentalism. This theological development goes far beyond any type of understanding Bernard would have had. He is also prior to the elaborate Thomistic system which developed in the thirteenth century. It is Thomas Aquinas who utilized the philosophy of Aristotle and wedded it to the Bible and the teachings of the church to create a highly developed scholastic theology. His Summa Theologica is a massive work that runs in excess of sixty volumes. It is a systematic presentation of Christian thought in philosophical tenoogy. It unites faith and reason. Aquinas saw in man a greater capacity innately to respond to God than Bernard. This is also true when Aquinas is compared to modern evangelicals. Analyzing the remainder of De Gratia et Libero Arbitrio, as well as his other writings, demonstrates that Bernard is evangelical in that grace is primary in his thinking. Reason is helpful, but grace is primary.

Bernard affirms boldly that to will the good requires that grace of God. This grace however does not limit, but actually liberates free choice to possibilities hitherto unknown. "Free will enables us to choose; but it is grace that enables us to choose the good. Because we are granted the faculty of will, we are able to choose. But because of grace, we are able to choose the good."²... Bernard clearly affirms the practical outworkings and eternal significance of grace.

But how to will the good, how to fear God, and how to love God requires for us the touch of His grace that we might truly become the sons of God.... He who makes the will to be good... But for the provision of grace, it would have been better that we have never existed than being left on our own.³

Grace we see enables us to 1) fear God 2) love God 3) becomes sons of God and 4) exercise a free will that is now a good will.

If the church is to maintain fidelity to "the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 3) . . . the twenty-first century Jesus must be the Jesus of the first century. Our ever-changing culture needs the never-changing Christ who alone can provide both the foundation and direction for Christian faith and practice as the Church faces the challenges of a new era. Four pillars from the New Testament can provide a stability for the Church at the dawn of a new millennium . . . Drawn from the comprehensive revelation of the New Testament, these four key Christological texts show how to know and worship the One whom Augustine described as the "beauty ever ancient, ever new."¹

I. Pillar One: Logos Christology (John 1:1-18) By using Logos, John takes a familiar first-century term and fills it with new meaning . . . He is the member of the trinitarian Godhead who is the agent of creation and the source of both life and light.

II. Pillar Two: Servant Christology (Philippians 2:6-11) A servant Christology shows a better way, and the text itself adequately addresses what is involved in self-emptying (*kenoo*): (1) He took the form (*morphe*, "essential nature") of a slave (*doulos*); (2) He was made in the likeness (*homoioma*) and fashion (*schema*) of a man; (3) He humbled himself (c.f. 2:3); (4) He became obedient unto death; and (5) He died on the cross.

III. Pillar Three: Cosmic Christology (Colossians 1:15-20) For the church on the threshold of a new millennium, the import of a Cosmic Christology is staggering. Christ is to have first place in all things. In all things, and in each individual, He and He alone is to be supreme.

IV. Pillar Four: Revelational Christology (Hebrews 1:1-3) In these last days He has spoken and disclosed Himself decisively, climatically, even finally and for all time in the person of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Because of God's determination to be known, we can genuinely and "truly truthfully" know God.



These four pillars . . . form the solid foundation upon which any Christian orthodoxy must stand.

Within 2 Cor 12:1-10 and its immediate context several important theological motifs are present which assist us in our exposition. These include the development of a weakness Christology, the foundation of apostolic authority, a rebuke of an over-realized eschatology, the Christian life, and the proper place of boasting.

- (1) Weakness Christology. In 2 Cor 12:1-10 Paul reluctantly "boasts" about visions and revelations though he finds little benefit in such activity. Though he has been "raptured into Paradise" and heard ἀρρητα ῥηματα, "unutterable utterances," he could not and would not boast in his present self (vv2-5) after the manner of his opponents.
- (2) The Foundation of Apostolic Authority. The basis of Paul's apostolic authority, as we see, is closely related, indeed rooted in his weakness Christology . . . Forbes identifies, I believe, the crux of the matter when he comments on 12:8-9 by saying, "This is why Paul will not boast of anything except his 'weakness,' his humiliations and sufferings: they are to him the surest marks of his commendation by the suffering Messiah."¹
- (3) Correcting Overrealized Eschatology. The triumphalism of Paul's opponents . . . gives evidence of an over-realized eschatology in Corinth. . . . 12:6 embodies the essence of Paul's thinking on this issue when he informs the Corinthians that it is his present and continuous public life and proclamation . . . which is his critical concern, and also his criterion for vibrant and genuine Christian experience.
- (4) Legitimate boasting in the Christian life. McCant points out that Paul's: "Boasting in weakness' is a parody of boasting and is thus ironical. Under no circumstances does Paul wish to engage in what Plutarch calls περιαυτολογία (Paul uses καυχήσιζ); it is not pleasing to the Lord (11:17)."²

most frequently asked questions from students who are considering the Ph.D. degree: Which professors are eligible to serve as my academic mentor? This **Faculty** page lists, according to the three major fields by which degrees are offered, those eligible professors. And just as the Fields of Study page is divided into available concentration areas, so this page also allows students to choose the field in which their concentration is found. Students can then quickly locate a list of all professors who are eligible to mentor in a particular area. Links are also provided that will take viewers to the seminary's main site where more detailed contact information is available.

The sixth page allows browsers to view the current cover article from the Ph.D. program's quarterly newsletter, *Academicus*. *Academicus* will still be distributed in its current form, but this on-line version will provide easy and permanent access to the articles that we hope Ph.D. students will find relevant and helpful.
