

MINUTES

Of the Eighty-Third Annual Session of the Oconee Primitive Baptist Association, Held With the Church at Browns, Oglethorpe County, Georgia, October 8, 9, 10, 1920

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder D. M. Vail, of the Delaware River Association, the text taken from the 12th chapter of Isaiah, "Behold, God is my salvation."

After one hour's intermission the Association met at the stand.

Prayer by Elder D. M. Vail.

Appointed Elders R. L. Cook, W. W. West and Deacon U. M. Malcom to read the letters from the churches.

Item 1. Elected Elder J. M. Adams Moderator and W. H. Robison, Clerk.

Item 2. Invited visiting ministers and brethren to seat with us.

Item 3. Adopted order of business of last year for this session.

Item 4. Appointed the following Committee on Preaching: G. W. Malcom, Sr., G. T. Whitworth, E. H. Ingram, W. H. Haralson, G. W. Lord, W. W. Tiller, R. A. Cooper, together with the Moderator.

Item 5. Appointed Brethren U. M. Malcom, W. L. Allen and G. T. Whitworth to write Corresponding Letter.

Item 6. Called for correspondence from sister churches with whom she corresponds:

From the Yellow River—Elders R. L. Cook, W. W. West, S. A. Huff and Brethren C. S. Sorrells and Will Brooks.

From the Ocmulgee-Minutes.

From the Marietta-Minutes.

From the Euharlee-No Tidings.

From the Warwick-No Tidings.

From the Delaware-J. M. Adams and Minutes.

From the Delaware River—Elders D. M. Vail, J. M. Adams and Brother William Hobensack and Minutes.

Called for visiting ministers and brethren from orderly Associations and churches with whom we have no direct correspondence and received them.

To the Ocmulgee, with Ephesus church, Monroe county, Georgia, beginning Friday before the second Sunday in September, 1921, three miles from Juliette on the Southern Railroad; seven miles from Forsyth, on Central of Georgia Railroad.

To the Marietta-Elder J. M. Adams, with Minutes.

To the Euharlee, at Corinth church, Polk county—Elder J. M. Adams, with Minutes.

To the Warwick-Minutes.

To the Delaware, with Bryn Zion church, in May, 1921-

To the Delaware River, at Southampton church. Southampton, Bucks County, Pennsylvania, beginning on Wednesday before the first Sunday in June, 1921—Elder I. M. Adams and Brother William Hobensack.

Called for miscellaneous business.

Appointed a committee to draft some resolutions on our dead since our last two sessions: Elder J. H. Stewart and Brethren W. L. Allen and G. T. Whitworth.

Adjourned until 8:30 o'clock Saturday morning.

SATURDAY MORNING

Met at time appointed. Singing and prayer by Elder R. L. Cook.

Renewed invitation to visiting ministers and brethren and welcomed all present.

Called for Circular Letter written by Elder J. M. Adams. Was read and received as our letter.

Appointed Elder J. H. Stewart to write next Circular Letter.

Called for and adopted the Corresponding Letter.

Appointed Union Meetings as follows:

Ist District. Jack's Creek, Walton county, Georgia, seven miles east of Monroe, Georgia, and two miles north of Good Hope, Ga., by Greene County Railroad, beginning Friday before the second Sunday in April, 1921.

2nd District. Union church, Madison county, Georgia, beginning Friday before the 5th Sunday in July, 1921.

Appointed the next session of this body to convene with the church at Rock Springs, Morgan county, Georgia, at the usual time, beginning Friday before the second Sunday in October, 1921.

Appointed Brethren R. A. Cooper, Nat Lord and J. M. Breedlove to receive contributions. Called for and received contributions and directed the clerk to have one thousand copies of these minutes printed and distributed in the usual way.

On motion, voted our thanks to the brethren, sisters and friends for their kindness while we have been with them.

Read and adopted the minutes and adjourned.

CIRCULAR LETTER

The Oconee Old School Baptist Association, in session with the church at Brown's, Oglethorpe county, Georgia, October 8, 9 and 10, 1920, to the several churches of which it is composed, greetings:

Dearly Beloved:

In compliance with your appointment at your last session and in accordance with our custom, we take for a theme the sworn testimony of the Lord of Hosts, saying "Surely as I have thought so shall it come to pass, and as I have purposed so shall it stand"—Isaiah 14 and 24th. Surely, as well as shall, implying no doubt, as he told Adam he shall surely die. Absolute sovereignty belongs to God only. His thought and purpose was in the past; we will date it with Him in eternity before time began and everything that has ever come to pass. He had thought of it and purposed it for our good and His glory.

He thought and purposed to make a world and all that in it is, in accordance to His purpose. will and counsel, all meaning the same, saying also "My counsel shall stand and I will do all my pleasure." We say that all of them shall stand, they have ever stood, all being fixed or settled in His thought or purpose before he made man or devils.

Then when we awake in His likeness we will be satisfied, raised a spiritual body to enjoy that inheritance that is incorruptible and undefiled and fades not away, but reserved in Heaven for you who are kept by the power of God ready to be revealed at the last time, where sin and sorrow is felt no more forever. May it be His purpose to make us humble and patient until death.
