


Statement of Institutional Purpose

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is an institution of higher learning established and supported by the Southern Baptist Convention in order to assist Southern Baptist churches by preparing God-called men and women for Christian ministry through theological education and practical training. Southeastern maintains an administration and faculty whose convictions and calling reflect consistent adherence to the institution's *Abstract of Principles*. Southeastern's administration and faculty are qualified by personal commitment to Christ, by academic preparation, and by personal and professional experience to provide guidance in spiritual, intellectual, and practical endeavors.

Through its administration and faculty, Southeastern offers programs of instruction and personal disciplines, preparing men and women for Christian ministry and service consistent with the 2000 *Baptist Faith and Message* in churches, on mission fields, in schools, colleges, and seminaries, and through other Christian ministries throughout the world. Southeastern's purpose is implemented through campus-based and off-campus programs of academic studies and practical preparation for ministry.

Academic Studies – Southeastern seeks to prepare men and women by helping them discern, defend, and proclaim God's revealed truth. Southeastern pursues high academic standards in providing courses of study for understanding the Bible and the history, content, and contemporary relevance of the Christian faith. Southeastern is committed to the complete inerrancy and sufficiency of the Bible as the foundation for effective Christian ministry and service.

Practical Preparation – Southeastern emphasizes a wholesome, intelligent, and intentional evangelism in obedience to Christ's commission to make disciples of all people. Spiritual development in Christ-likeness through Bible-based theological studies will produce a compassionate desire to minister to the human suffering caused by individual, social, and spiritual evils. Southeastern provides practical preparation for a wide variety of Christian ministries, with special focus on proclaiming the Gospel and extending the ministry and influence of the local church.

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Student Services: Personal and Family

General Information

The location of the Woodstock Extension of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is the First Baptist Church of Woodstock. The address is 777 Neese Road, Woodstock, GA, 30188. The pastor of the church is Dr. Johnny Hunt. The seminary contact person at the church is Rev. Roy Blankenship, Minister of Pastoral Care/Lay Ministry Development. His secretary is Jackie Hyde. The church switchboard number is 770-926-4428.

Security and Emergency Messages

First Baptist Church of Woodstock employs security personnel that patrol the church's campus regularly. When Southeastern's classes are meeting, a security staff member will always be on the campus. Operations staff members will also be present.

Office hours at First Baptist Church are 8:00 AM to 5:30 PM, Monday to Thursday, and 8:00 AM to 12:00 noon on Friday. During office hours, in order to deliver an emergency message to a student, family or friends should call the church switchboard at 770-926-4428. After office hours, the procedure is to call the switchboard number, listen for the recorded instructions as to how to reach the "Deacon on Call Pager," and enter the number provided by the recorded message. The Deacon on Call will handle the emergency message or will call a minister on call. If students need emergency medical care, hospital services are available within 10 miles north or south of the campus. Kennestone Hospital is located at 677 Church Street, Marietta, GA 30060, (770) 793-5000 and Northside Cherokee Hospital is located at Northside Hospital, 1000 Johnson Ferry Road, NE, Atlanta, GA 30342, (770) 720-5100. Another urgent care facility is Well Star Primary. It is located at 145 N. Medical Parkway, in Woodstock. It is open 8:00 AM to 8:00 PM, and the phone number is 770-592-3000.

Family Crisis Communication

One of the advantages of being part of a Christian community like a seminary is the readily available prayer support for persons who experience a crisis in their lives. Southeastern has devised a family crisis communication procedure to provide a way for the seminary administration to be aware of crises that arise in the Southeastern family. If you are aware of a serious illness, accident, major material loss, birth, death in the immediate family, or other situations that should be communicated, you may call the Dean of Students' Office at 919-863-8306 and report this information. The prayer request will then be communicated by e-mail immediately to all major offices and areas of the campus, and the seminary family will be asked to pray for each emergency situation.

Building Layout

On the next page is a schematic drawing of First Baptist's buildings. To find out the location of a class, students may call Jackie Hyde one week before the first class meeting. If the location of the class changes at any point during the semester, students will be notified. On the first class meeting, Roy Blankenship will inform students where to find changes in class locations.

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
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
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Registering for Classes

Students should be officially admitted to the seminary before the beginning of the semester in which they enroll in a particular class. This admittance requires completion of an application for admission and acceptance by Southeastern's Office of Admissions. An application for admission can be obtained from that office. Students who have not been officially admitted prior to the class in which they wish to enroll will be given a non-degree admission form on the night of the first class. This will be completed by the student and mailed to Southeastern by the seminary contact person (Roy Blankenship).

Also, just prior to the first class meeting, student photos will be taken, students will complete a survey form, and books will be purchased. Also, on the first class meeting students will pay all fees. If students are not prepared to pay on the first night, they may make arrangements to pay with Roy Blankenship or Jackie Hyde before the second class meeting. If fees are not paid by the second class meeting, the student may not continue in the class.

Purchase of Textbooks

Before the first meeting of each class, at the beginning of each term, a representative from Lifeway Christian Resources of the Southern Baptist Convention will be present at First Baptist, Woodstock to sell textbooks required for each class. Students should come to the first class meeting prepared to pay for all textbooks as well as tuition and fees for the class(es) for which they are enrolled.

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

The library at Southeastern Seminary is also available for extension center students. By accessing the library web site at http://library.sebts.edu. you may search the on-campus library for available books by clicking on search the Catalog. You may also utilize "first search." This program will allow you to look for magazine articles and other resources. After finding the needed book and checking for availability, an extension center study may email Judy Durham to check on having that book mailed directly to them. Her information may be found on the same web site by clicking "library staff" located under Information. By properly utilizing the available resources, an extension center student has access to every resource an on-campus student does. Financial Aid

Southeastern's financial aid is based on the premise that students are making an effort to be as self-supporting as possible. It is recommended that students should have sufficient funds or income to see themselves through at least the first semester before seeking aid.

Almost all of Southeastern's financial aid is reserved for full-time, on-campus students. Usually, extension students have not left their sources of income to settle in Wake Forest, so they are usually in a better position to meet the financial requirements of higher education. Financial assistance for on-campus students includes: 1. Off-campus and on-campus jobs through Southeastern's Employment Services Office, 2. Ministry positions through the Ministry Referral Office, 3. Emergency Assistance, 4. Scholarships, and 5. Matriculation Deferment Plan. With the exception of emergency assistance, students applying for these sources of aid must be currently enrolled full-time in a degree program. Applications for emergency assistance will be considered on a case by case basis.

Southeastern students at the Woodstock extension may be eligible for assistance from the Community Action and Resources Evangelism (C.A.R.E.) of the First Baptist Church of Woodstock. This ministry includes a Job Assistance Ministry, Food Assistance Ministry, Clothes Assistance Ministry, Transportation Assistance Ministry, and Financial Assistance Ministry. Students must meet First Baptist's criteria in order to be eligible for this assistance. Students may obtain further information from Rev. Roy Blankenship or his secretary Jackie Hyde, at 770-926-4428.

Wellness and Recreation

Students at the Woodstock extension of Southeastern Seminary are eligible to use the recreation facilities located in Building B of First Baptist Church. This includes the exercise equipment, gym, walking trail, showers, and lockers. Students who are interested in using this equipment should inform Rev. Roy Blankenship of their desire to do so. Students are also eligible to participate in the intramural teams of First Baptist Church. Students must sign a waiver of liability and submit to the supervision of the Wellness and Recreation Department of First Baptist Church.

I.D. and Activity Cards

An I.D. card is issued to each new student upon entering Southeastern. This card will serve a number of functions and should be carried at all times. In addition to identifying a person as a Southeastern student, it is required to check out books and other materials from the Library. An identification card will also be required before recreational facilities and equipment can be used.

For an extension center student to receive a valid Southeastern ID, you must make arrangements to have a jpeg image of yourself sent electronically to Southeastern. This may be accomplished through an email sent to Thomas White at twhite@sebts.edu. The image may not be over 150 kb in size. Along with the image, you must also send an email requesting an ID. This email must have your full name, your student number, your telephone number, and the address to which you would like your ID to be mailed. You will be notified electronically once your ID has been mailed. If you do not have access to electronic mail, please call 919-863-8309 to arrange for processing your ID. An ID Card will only be necessary if you plan to utilize the library or student center located at the main campus of Southeastern Seminary.

An I.D. card is valid during periods of continuous enrollment. Cards become void when a student's enrollment terminates or is interrupted. I.D. cards are provided at no charge, but a \$10.00 charge will be made to replace lost cards. Replacements are made at the Student Life Office in the Ledford Center. Student Excursions

The seminary regularly sponsors off-campus trips for personal enrichment and academic credit. Extension center students are eligible to participate in these excursions. The three primary types of seminary-sponsored excursions are mission trips, Holy Land trips, and conferences. Student behavior during such travel opportunities is required to be consistent with both the purpose of the trip and the established policies of the seminary. If the purpose of the excursion is mission work, students will be available at all times to do mission work. If the purpose of the excursion is archaeological work, students will apply themselves to their work. If the purpose of the excursion is attendance of a conference and/or seminars, students will attend all such meetings.

While on mission trips, students are expected to comply with the standards of conduct and dress that are appropriate for Christians in the culture in which they are serving. Students are also expected to sign any waivers that are applicable to their work and travel. When work is to be done on any school trip, students are expected to work diligently, without complaining. All conduct that is prohibited in this handbook in the section dealing with discipline is also prohibited on student excursions. Fraternization with the opposite sex is forbidden. All seminary-sponsored excursions will be accompanied by a member of the faculty or administration of the seminary. When such trips are for academic credit, students are responsible to meet the academic requirements specified by the supervising professor.

Student Discipline

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is a Christian institution whose primary purpose is to conduct a program of graduate and undergraduate theological education designed to equip women and men students for effective Christian leadership in church-related ministries and other areas where theological training is required.

This purpose assumes a community and lifestyle that are in the world but not of the world. The distinguishing factor is commitment to the vocation of the Christian ministry which signifies not only the role of a Christian but also the role of spiritual and moral leadership in the church of Jesus Christ. Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is also a Southern Baptist institution. Therefore, those who are part of Southeastern are expected to adhere to the behavioral standards that are normative for Southern Baptist ministers.

Disciplinary action may result whenever students are involved in the violation of the personal or property rights of others, or in behavior which is not acceptable in the Southeastern community. The following are examples of conduct which is unacceptable in the Southeastern community and subject to disciplinary action:

- A. Academic misconduct such as plagiarism, cheating, or making false representations.
- B. Use or possession of beverage alcohol, or possession of illegal drugs or controlled substances.
- C. Homosexual behavior or heterosexual misconduct, including possession or viewing of any pornographic material.
- D. Neglect of personal financial obligations.
- E. Giving false information or altering records.
- F. Theft, intentional abuse, or destruction of personal or Southeastern property.
- G. Neglect, disregard or breach of established seminary/college policies which govern the use of any seminary/college properties or facilities.
- H. Behavior (verbal, physical, emotional) which is demeaning, harassing, or abusive of another person; and behavior that is profane or vulgar.
- Disrespect or abuse directed toward any faculty member, school administrator, or staff person.
- J. The use of tobacco products anywhere on seminary property.
- K. True ministers of the Gospel must set the standard by modeling biblical marriage. Any active student experiencing a divorce must notify the Dean of Students, and withdraw from classes and campus housing for a period of one year before applying for readmission.
- L. Students and their families are expected to dress in modest attire everywhere on campus. The seminary's position is that immodest clothing damages one's Christian testimony, so clothes such as short skirts, and tank tops are discouraged.

Students involved in civil infractions are accountable to civil authorities, but may also be subject to discipline by Southeastern.

Prompt and decisive action is required in cases which involve disciplinary procedures. Therefore, the Director of Student Life, the Dean of Students, or the President may issue at once an automatic suspension to a student charged with an offense pending a full investigation of the matter.

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The intention of the seminary is to make all student discipline occasions for learning and growth in Christlikeness. Most disciplinary action will be handled by the Director of Student Life. If a student feels this action to be unjust the student may appeal to the Dean of Students. If still not satisfied with the decision, the student may go to the President of the institution to appeal to him. Upon the direction of the President a committee may be appointed to hear the appeal of the student; however, this action is not a necessity but only an option. The President of the institution has full authority to handle all cases as he deems necessary.

If the President chooses to call a meeting of the Student Discipline Committee to hear an appeal, it will be comprised of the Director of Student Life (who will serve as Chairman), the Dean of Students, one seminary professor, one college professor, one seminary student, and one college student.

Anyone witnessing what he/she believes to be an infraction should inform the appropriate Southeastern personnel (faculty member, administrative officer, etc.) and lovingly confront the perpetrator in accord with the procedure described in Matthew 18. The witness and/or the appropriate Southeastern personnel will also inform the Director of Student Life. The Director of Student Life will collect information on the charge, and meet with the student(s) and witness(es) as needed.

Disciplinary Actions

- 1. Reprimand: A disciplinary action may be private if the offense was committed in private and affected only a few individuals. If the action committed affected many people publicly then the reprimand may occur publicly. This action may or may not require a probational period. Records of student violations and disciplinary actions may be retained during a student's enrollment. Decisions containing conditions of continued or future enrollment may be held in a student's academic record until such conditions are met.
- 2. Disciplinary Probation: This action may be taken by the seminary to indicate to a student who has violated the seminary's standard of conduct that his/her behavior is inappropriate and is not to be repeated. Probation is notice to the violating student that if the inappropriate behavior is repeated, suspension or expulsion is likely. Probation may be for any length of time deemed appropriate by the seminary administration.
- 3. Requested Withdrawal: Requested withdrawal is suitable in instances where questionable behavior has threatened the development of the student as a potential minister or threatened the community fellowship, but culpable deportment has not been established. Withdrawal does not imply the assessment of guilt, and therefore is normally a private matter. Withdrawal will be for a specified period of time and will normally carry stipulations regarding readmission.
- 4. Suspension: Suspension is the right of the institution to require that a student be separated from the institution for a specified period of time. Suspension is suitable in instances where questionable behavior has threatened the development of the student as a potential minister or threatened the community fellowship. In all cases of Requested Withdrawal or Suspension, fulfillment of the discipline contracts only insures eligibility to be considered for readmission, following standard Southeastern readmission policies.
- 5. Expulsion: Expulsion is suitable in instances where there are repeated offenses, flagrant violations of a disciplinary contract, or where the initial evidence in a case involves a civil or criminal indictment or flagrant violations of seminary/college norms. By decision of the President, expulsion may become part of a student's permanent record.

On-Campus Student Organizations

Fellowship of Military Chaplains

This student organization was founded in 1992 with the following threefold purpose:

- 1. To provide a support group for students planning for service as military chaplains.
- 2. To educate chaplain candidates about topics relevant to ministry in the military.
- 3. To promote a heightened awareness of military chaplaincy on campus.

Student Leadership Team

The Student Leadership Team is an elected body of four students seeking to minister to the needs of the Southeastern family. The main foci of the Student Leadership Team are campus prayer and community evangelism. Other programs to foster personal, family, and community growth are implemented through various kinds of religious, social, and educational opportunities. The Leadership Team works to unify the campus to accomplish the vision set forth by the Seminary President. Part of bringing about this unity includes enhancing communications between the students and the administration. Southeastern is a faculty/administration run campus which desires to make adequate decisions by being fully informed. The Student Leadership Team works as a liaison to provide this information. The team consist of a President who must be a senior Masters level student, a Vice-President who must be a Masters level student, a 2nd Vice-President and a Secretary/Treasurer, one of which must be a college student.

Southeastern Women's Fellowship (SWF)

SWF is an organization made up of student wives and women students and is dedicated to ministering to their needs. SWF meets monthly in the Ledford Center, where the ladies hear outstanding speakers and share fellowship. Other ministries include Bible study, clothing ministry, outreach, bread ministry, craft & bake sales, and much more.

Doulos

The Doulos organization is a group which meets each week in the Ledford Center to share the Gospel through door to door evangelism throughout the town of Wake Forest.

Homeschoolers in Ministry

Homeschoolers in Ministry (HIM) operates to bring together homeschoolers to participate in a community environment which serves to benefit the entire group. They offer many activities and family-oriented functions.

International Student Fellowship

The International Student Fellowship provides an opportunity for all international students to fellowship with one another and encourage one other in adjusting to their new environment. It also serves as an outlet for North American students to get acquainted with the international students.

On-Campus Student Organizations

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This content organization was founded to 1992 with the following threefold pulposity

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Southeastern Christian Martial Arts

Southeastern Christian Marital Arts serves as an opportunity for students to exercise, and learn self-discipline and self-control. This group provides a friendly environment of encouragement to learn skills in the Martial Arts in a Christian atmosphere. Scripture memory and prayer times are incorporated with physically challenging work-outs.

American Association of Christian Counselors (AACC)

AACC is an organization designed to encourage Christian Counselors in their efforts to minister to those in need.

Patristics Club

This club offers an opportunity for those interested in the church fathers to come together and discuss theological issues that are relevant to this era of the church.

Baptist Student Union

The Baptist Student Union is operated mainly by college students and offers opportunities for spiritual growth and service in an exciting environment of fellowship. Their meetings will be announced in the Newsline each semester.

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
