CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Savior, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, Angels and this Assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another as one body in Christ. We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this Church in Knowledge, Holiness and Comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor and the spread of the Gospel through all nations. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion, to religiously educate our children, to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, back-biting, and excessive anger: to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drink as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Savior.

We further agree to watch over one another in brotherly love, to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness or distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of those rules of our Savior-to secure it without delay. We moreover engage that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and principles of God's Word.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. At the meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a Chairman pro tem. shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exer-

cises, to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that

courtesy which belongs to Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer; he shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question, without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the

majority may move a reconsideration.

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without permission of the Association; and if any shall do so their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12. All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be decided

by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known and denominated as the Eastern Association.

Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men, and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from the membership assembled in Conference and Executive Committee.

Art. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church, Provided, however, That when any church has prepared a letter, and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot, by a majority of its members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

Art. 6. It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on all questions under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

Art. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

Art. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

Art. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, That our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee, in order that said committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

Art. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe gospel order.

Art. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats and extend to them the privileges of the body, except that of voting. Art. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

Art. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an introductory sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary sermon.

Art. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

PROCEEDINGS.

The Sixty-Fourth Annual Session of the Eastern Association met with the Clinton Baptist Church, Clinton, Sampson County, N. C., October the 8th, 1907.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by C. M. Rock. Text: 2nd Timothy 2:15. After which the Association took a recess till 2 o'clock p. m.

Herring was instructed to cast the ballot of the Association for Maury Ward for Treasurer, which was done and A. F. Robinson was declared elected Clerk and Maury Ward Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Petitionary letters were called for but none were presented. Invitation was extended to visiting brethren and the following brethren announced themselves: J. A. WEDNESDAY-MORNING SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. H. Booth. The Association was called to order by the Moderator. The roll of delegates was called and the minutes of yesterday's session was read and approved.

The report of the committee on State Missions was read by J. M. Alderman, as follows:

Report on State Missions.

The State Mission Board began its work seventy-seven years ago. The results amply justify the wisdom of our fathers in this great undertaking. Accurate statistics were not given by the missionaries until 1882 just twenty-five years ago. From these statistics are gathered the following interesting figures:

Number baptized by our missionaries	31,179
Churches organized on Mission fields	737
Houses of worship built on mission fields	735
Amount paid for building houses on Mission fields\$150	3,313.08
Sunday Schools organized by Missionaries	373

There are in the State 1,821 Missionary Baptist Churches. Seven hundred and eighty-seven, three-sevenths of these, were organized by the missionaries of the Board within the last twenty-two years. It would be entirely safe to say that at least half the Baptist Churches of Norh Carolina were organized by the Missionaries of the Board. It is no exaggeration to claim that two-thirds of the money that comes into the Lord's treasury for our general work, comes from churches that were organized by or were beneficiaries of our Board. Last year fifty-eight churches gave each one hundred dollars or over to Foreign Missions. Of these forty-four are churches that have been aided by the board, leaving only fourteen that had not been aided. Five churches gave last year \$500 or more each to Foreign Missions; and every one of these five were founded and are fostered by the Board. It

will be seen by these facts, that in the work of State Missions, we have been laying the foundation for the enlargement of every department of work.

As much as has been done, much remains to be done. A large area of rich, virgin soil remains untouched. There are five counties in the State with only one resident Baptist pastor to the county, and that one would not be there were he not supported in large measure by the Board.

There are four county seats in no one of which is there a Baptist church or a Baptist preacher. Many towns are yet untouched, and are making urgent appeals to the Board for help. Many of the towns which the Board aided in establishing the first church, are now asking help for one or more Mission points. This is due to the rapid growth of many of our towns.

We are working this year on a basis of \$40,000 including Associational Missions. There are the names of 151 missionaries on the roll book, to 90 of these on country fields is appropriated \$17,288 and to the 61 on town fields is appropriated \$17,339. We find of the \$30,000 received last year for State Missions \$18,702, or nearly two-thirds was contributed by town churches. A great door of opportunity stands before the Baptists of North Carolina, and State Missions is the key that can unlock that door. A dollar put in State Missions at many points to-day will be worth as much as ten dollars will be ten years from now. Let us increase our contributions to State Missions.

The report of the Executive Committee was read by L. Middleton, to-wit:

Report of Executive Committee.

We are glad to report progress in our mission field. The Lord has blessed the efforts of our Misisonaries. Brother J. H. Booth has served the following churches, viz: Hallsville, Sharon, Cedar Fork and Maple Hill. He also has a Mission Station at Beulaville and has organized a Sunday school at that place. He has preached 110 sermons baptized 24 persons.

Brethren Kendricks, Edmundson, and Rivenbark have aided him in meetings on his mission fields. The churches at Hallsville and Maple Hill are now self-sustaining. Brother D. S. Kennedy gives three-fourths of his time to the mission work. He has preached at the following places, viz: Alum Springs, Prospect and Tuckahoe in Jones county. Sermons preached 55. Three persons added to the church. Sunday Schools at Alum Springs and Tuckahoe.

Your committee asks the earnest co-operation of our Pastors in the work. L. MIDDLETON, for Committee.

Pending motion to adopt the above reports the Association was addressed by J. H. Booth, D. S. Kennedy, Braxton Craig and J. A. Powell.

The reports were adopted.

Visiting brethren, Archie Johnson, Braxton Craig, and J. B. Carlyle announced themselves and were welcomed to seats with us.

The report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was read by Thad Jones, as follows.

Report on Sunday Schools.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools beg leave to submit the following report: Of the 33 churches reporting to the Association 2 schools send no report. Those reporting report 195 officers and teachers and 2,014 scholars. We find from said letters a membership of 3,343. From the church letters they report \$4.05 for Sunday School Missions.

Your Committee realizing that the Sunday School offers and gives the greatest opportunity for teaching the Bible, and hence the greatest agency with the Church in bringing the unsaved to God and with the fact before us that in the beginning of organized Sunday school work in 1780-by Robert Raiks of Edinburg. It was tried only as an experiment, to bring the poor and ignorant classes to a higher standard of character, and after four years of hard work with paid teachers by Robert Raiks, there was only 77 males and 88 females enrolled as regular pupils; but before 1800 over one million of the people had been enrolled both in England and America in the Sunday Schools. And with the knowledge of the great Sunday school effort, and sacrifice of the consecrated men and women for God to-day and in ages past. We to-day have in all the world over twenty-six million people enlisted in the great Sunday school army of the world. Thirteen millions of said members being workers in our own beloved America; and with the facts before us that an average of 85 per cent of all the additions to our churches comes from the Sunday schools, and your committee finding the responsibility of the command of the Master, "Go' ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," and further knowing that the good "Master" said, "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not for of such is the kingdom of Heaven." We therefore feel that if the great masses are ever taught about the Lord Jesus the Sunday school teacher, and Superintendent must be willing and co-operative instruments with the master in teaching the way of life. Therefore we earnestly urge that every pastor in this Association preach one sermont at least during the year, especially for the Sunday school work and urge the attendance of the parents especially.

We further recommend that the Sunday schools organize a cradle roll, and home department, and that each have a decision day during the year.

The report of the Committee on The Orphanage was read by J. H. Booth and on motion, was received. By motion the report was laid on the table. By motion it was taken from the table and made special order for 2 o'clock p. m.

Report on the Orphanage.

The work of the Orphanage is primarily and directly for the benefit of the child. In the plans and purposes of the Board of Trustees the child has the first place. There are 350 children at the Orphanage. They are for the most part strong and well. The health record of the institution for the past year has been remarkable. No scourge has visited the institution but if such a calamity should come there are very poor facilities for caring for the sick. The women of the State are undertaking to remedy the evil by building a suitable infirmary. The first great gift for the enterprise came from a woman of Sampson county, Mrs. Brown, of Salemburg, who has since gone to her eternal home. The per capita cost of maintaining a child at the Orphanage is \$6.28 a month. This means that \$71.00 a day must come into the Treasury or about \$500.00 a week. Every dollar of the support fund comes from the Baptist people of North Carolina. The children are making good progress. Under the management of Rev. M. L. Kesler, the conditions have materially improved. The general policy is the same it has ever been but the facilities with which the work is done are vastly superior to what they were even a few years ago. The grounds are much more beautiful. Improved implements have been provided, and the drudgery as far as possible, has given place to a better and more sensible way of doing things. For example the little girls, who formerly had to do the heavy work at the wash tub, which they never had the strength to do, now manage a steam laundry which does the work in half the time and twice as well. And this simply illustrates the many modern improvements that have been made. The children still do the work of the orphanage, on the farms in the houses, on the grounds and everywhere. They are receiving excellent training under wise and experienced teachers.

The State owes a debt of gratitude to the Orphanage for gathering the wasting elements which are being transformed into citizenship. From the slums and the alleys, from the cross roads, grogeries, and the haunts of sin and shame these innocent children are being rescued to an atmosphere fragrant with Christian sympathy and love. The State pays not a cent for this service. The churches are receiving the greatest blessings of all for they give the Orphanage its life and hope and it is more blessed to give than to receive. The church that stands closest to the Orphanage is the one that most deeply shares its blessings. We urge our churches to increase their gifts to meet the increasing needs of the institution. Let every church within our bounds prepare to make a special thanksgiving offering

on thanksgiving day. We commend to our Sunday Schools the plan of taking monthly collections for this great institution.

The report on general education was read by J. M. Page. Also the report of the committee on Ministerial Education was read by J. B. Carlyle, to-wit:

Report on General Education.

We rejoice to see the increased interest manifested everywhere in education. The crying need of education not only comes to the homes of the rich and well-to-do, but has penetrated the darkest corners of poverty and ignorance, and we are becoming enlightened as never before. It seems to your committee that the greatest need to-day is for better equipped and stronger Baptist Institutions of learning. To this end we are glad that the Endowment of Wake Forest College is being increased and we note with pleasure the rise in our midst of the Dell School, which we believe is destined to prove a great factor in the development of the Baptist churches of this section. We heartly commend this school to our people and urge them to support it financially and otherwise. We urge the parents to give even more attention to the training of their children than hitherto.

There were thirty-one families aided by the Board. Our Eastern Association Churches reported \$97.50 for this object. The Board is now in need of funds. We recommend to our churches to increase their contributions to this worthy object.

The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by J. L. Stewart as follows:

Report of Committee on Foreign Missions.

We your Committee on Foreign Missions beg leave to report: That the Association is now in its sixty-fourth session; so that about 63 years ago our fore-fathers, in stating the object of their Union declared the primary

object to be: The promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men. This, of course, includes Associational, Home and Foreign Missions.

While some of our people and perhaps Churches are slow to fully understand this distinction in our field of work, the Foreign Mission work has been kept prominently before us through all these years. There have been, it must be admitted, seasons of depression and discouragement, along all the lines, but it is certain that in latter years Foreign Missions has taken on new life.

At the beginning of this work, many of the nations were closed against our missionaries who worked in, if at all at the peril of their lives. Few laborers offered themselves for this field. But these were the called of God and hence God's heroes. It was then difficult, strange as it may seem, to raise funds for the support of these. So evident however, has been the favor of God upon this work, that now every nation under the sun with scarcely an exception has opened its doors to our missionaries, and the call for men and money is louder and louder each year. Right nobly have the churches of our Southland responded to this call. Each year makes an improvement in contributions of money and laborers, and conversions on the field. For example, three years ago the contributions were about \$250,000, two years ago about \$283,000, and last year about \$315,000, and the conversions about 2,000 and—in a larger ratio. The laborers offering for the work, while gratifying, has not kept pace with the contributions in money. So that while the cry formerly for money, it is now for men. Hence the churches are earnestly urged to pray for laborers to enter the harvest. Our own Association has felt the touch of this new life; and our contributions for the object are annually increasing.

We are compelled however, to report that in view of the fact that some of the most useful, zealous, earnest, and we think we can say without boasting, ablest of the missionaries to-day on the Foreign fields went out from our own Association, notably Bryan and Herring. Our contributions have not been and are not now up to the measure of our responsibility.

We hear it with heart-felt delight that our beloved and consecrated Brother David Wells Herring has deemed it proper to return to his former place under our Foreign Mission Board and now is in full accord with the policy of the Board, thus putting an end to the occasion which a few years ago some of our brethren and Churches were using as a disturbing element to the peace, harmony and good fellowship of our churches.

We very earnestly commend the Foreign Mission Journal to our people as among the efficient means of promoting this great world wide movement.

We heartily recommend that our churches be reminded of the importance and need of this the most fertile field in the world and send contributions, as surely they will make when rightly they will consider the field, both

offensively and defensively.

We urge both prayerful consideration and larger contributions of men and money to this worthy undertaking.

Report on Periodicals.

It is clearly manifest upon the slightest observation that as the means and facilities for obtaining education are increasing, our people are becoming more and more a reading people which is a matter of congratulation, but at the same time it is a fact which should concern us to know what they are reading, for reading is both a stimulus and a guide to the thinking, and "as a man thinketh in his heart, so is he."

There has never been a time when it was more important for our Baptist people to wake up to the responsibility that is upon them in regard to what our people are reading. And the duty of placing in their hands and inducing them to read the very best newspapers, and religious, moral books to be had. The secular press and publishing houses, which are run for the sake of gain, are flooding the country with reading matter, much of which to speak mildly is very far from what it ought to be. The printing press is perhaps the greatest agency in the world for moulding sentiment and determining destiny except the gospel. As Baptist people we must have a Baptist literature. If we have any principles that are worth holding, they are worth stating. If the world needs our message it is important that we

use this great opportunity to give the world what God has given to us.

The pressing need in North Carolina to-day is one strong denominational paper. Since 1883 the Biblical Recorder has supplied this need and has done its work well and served the denomination faithfully in all of its work. Its great aim has been to teach the new Testament religion in all its fullness. It has expressed in literature Baptist life principles and ideals. It has united our people, it has indoctrinated them; it has upheld the hands of the pastors. It has injected into our civic life benevolence, justice and righteousness. It is now striving to establish the rising generation in Bible doctrine and life, and to reinforce the moral life of our time with militant christianity. The accomplishments are great, the aims and plans are broad.

The North Carolina Baptist was established in 1891. From the first it has stood by all the objects of the Convention. It has taken part in the growth and development of the denomination since it was established. It has been an important factor in bringing about temperance reform in the State. Its aim is to be used of God in our work in North Carolina. Charity and Children is the only newspaper owned and operated by the Baptists of North Carolina. It was established in 1887 and grown until it has a circulation of twelve thousand. Its aim has been to make a direct sentiment for the Orphanage; but it has strengthened and aided every department of our work. It should have a place at every Baptist fireside and should be taken in clubs for Sunday schools.

The Foreign Mission Journal will keep us informed and awaken our interest and enlarge our efforts in support of the Foreign Mission work. The Home field published by the Home Mission Board, of Atlanta, Ga., is commended to us as worthy of being read in order to keep informed as to the work of the Home Mission Board. The Home Field has recently become a magazine of thirty-wo pages and has been wonderfully improved. The Piedmont Evangelist is a newspaper established for the advancement of evangelism in North Carolina.

The Little River Record published by J. A. Campbell is establishing itself in the minds of the people and is worthy of notice. It stands for the advancement of our cause and education of the youth of our State. We heartily recommend the above papers to our people.
