CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, have been baptized in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost, we do joyfully enter into Covenant with one another as one body in Christ. We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this Church in knowledge, Holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the Ministry, the expenses of the Church. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion, to religiously educate our children, to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drink as a beverage and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour. We further agree to watch over one another in brotherly love, to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness or distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offence, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of those rules of our Saviour-to secure it without delay. We moreover engage that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other Church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this Covenant and principles of God's Word.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. At the meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman pro tem, shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3. At each daily session and previous to proceeding to business the names of the delegates shall be called and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy which belongs to Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer; he shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the Association; and if any one shall do so their absence shall be noted in the Minutes.

12. All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The rules of order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known and denominated as the Eastern Association.

Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men, and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who

are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from the membership assembled in Conference and Executive Committee.

Art. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the Church. Provided, however, that when any church has prepared a letter, and through inadvertence the letter fails to be present, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot. by a majority of its members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

Art. 6. It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint Committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on all questions under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

Art. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

Art. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

Art. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, That our Missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee, in order that said Committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

Art. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe gospel order.

Art. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats and extend to them the privileges of the body, except that of voting.

Art. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

Art. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introductory sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary sermon.

Art. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

Constitution of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Eastern Association.

Article 1. This organization shall be known as the Woman's Missionary Union of the Eastern Association.

Art. 2. The object of this Union shall be, the spread of information among the Societies, and for the discussion of the best means for the promotion of Christ's kingdom, and for mutual encouragement.

Art. 3. This Union shall be composed of two delegates from each Society in the Eastern Association.

Art. 4. The delegates shall bear letters, communicating information relative to the work being done in each Society.

Art. 5. Associational Vice-President shall preside at each session of the Union and a Secretary and Treasurer shall be chosen annually.

Art, 6. The annual session shall be held on Thursday after the first Sunday in each September.

Art 7. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Union by a vote of two-thirds of the members.

The report on the Orphanage was read by Archie Johnson.

REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE.

Four hundred children are under the care of the Orphanage. The past year has been remarkable for its health record. Not a single case of serious sickness through the whole year has interrupted the work. A valuable gift has come to the Orphanage in the shape of 1200 acres of land in Lenoir County. Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Kennedy are the generous givers. \$30,000 will be required to erect the necessary buildings and equipment for the work on this new place to begin. One-third of the amount is already in sight, and it is hoped that the Kennedy memorial house will be opened next year. This means that instead of 400 children our people must support 500. The Orphanage is in debt. It is hoped that the Thanksgiving offering will wipe it out, and we urge all of our churches to take this Thanksgiving collection; and in addition that every Sunday School in this Association give a monthly COMMITTEE. offering to this object.

Archie Johnson spoke to the report. The report was then adopted. Pledges taken for the Orphanage.

On motion, the report on State Missions was read by B. G. Early and upon motion of W. B. Oliver, a resolution by W. N. Johnson was read in connection with the report on State Missions. The report was spoken to by Livingston Johnson.

Moderator appointed J. M. Page, C. M. Beach and V. N. Seawell a Committee to Nominate an Executive Committee. This committee recommended the election of C. E. Daniel, W. H. Middleton, E. M. Teachey, W. H. Hagwood, J. R. Peterson, The report was adopted. The following committees were announced:

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION.

9:30 a m - Devotional by C. H. Cashwell. 10:00 a. m.-The Association was called to order by the Moderator. Roll of Delegates called and corrected. Minutes of vesterday's session read and approved. Special order Reports on State and Associational Missions. Report on State Missions was read by B. G. Early.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

What is State Missions? Rev. W. N. Johnson says, "State Missions is the mingled glow of patriotism and religion. It is Missions in North Carolina and North Carolina in Missions, or in other words, it is our Baptist Churches and their equipment touching the life of the State and its institutions." If this gives us a correct idea of What State Missions is, and I think it does, then we see at once the task before us. In this endeavor our Board has put in the field 152 men preaching the gospel at 352 points. and by reference to the report on State Missions offered at last State Convention, you will observe that great strides are being made and yet the larger possibilities are still before us. This year we are working on a financial basis of \$50,000 which is inadequate to cover the needs of our Board. This Association stands pledged for the sum of \$389.50. Shall we not rise in our strength and assume a larger part of this great work which the Lord has so signally blessed? We your Committee, recommend that this Association undertake to raise at least \$500.00 for this during this Associational year. We furthermore recommend the adoption of the following resolution. A good resolution for every Baptist Association to pass this year:

Whereas, Baptists are the guardians of the Spiritual foundations of Democracy, and Whereas, the modern Republic cannot long endure in ignorance of the religious essentials of Democracy, it behooves North Carolina Baptists to make Baptist principles felt in every educational center of the State. Therefore, be it Resolved.

1. That our State Mission Board be encouraged in maintaining an efficient Sunday School hard by every day-school and College in North Carolina. That this Association assert its approval of the State Mission Board's desire to support the strongest possible preacher in every educational center of the State: that this Association go on record as favoring a denominational policy that will ultimately put an adequate house of worship in every educational center of the State of any importance.

2. That it is the sense of this Association that the way should be cleared to work out this policy by the Denomination's coming to the help of the local church at Wake Forest in supplying our own Wake Forest College with a house of worship ample for taking care of all the students that may ever go to Wake Forest to study.

3. That some denominational agency should be empowered to push this matter so that at least every three years a new ample church building shall be erected in one of our educational centres until all of them are supplied with churches. Respectfully submitted, COMMITTEE.

The prospect is favorable for a new church on the borders of Duplin and Onslow counties. The land has been secured and the timber is being put to the mill for the house. At Beulaville an effort is being made to build a parsonage for the Missionary, part of the money is subscribed with fair prospects, for the success of the work, and in this connection your Committee recommend that the Association authorize the sale of the land deeded to our Association for that purpose by our late sister Ann C. Sandlin, and the proceeds applied to building the parsonage. We have secured the services of brother C. H. Cashwell who began work August first. The foregoing report includes report of his work in connection with Brother Early's. Alum Springs Church has become self-sustaining and called Bro. Rivenbark as pastor. Bro. Early has offered his resignation as Associational Missionary after having served in this capacity for nearly four years.

REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The fourth annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Eastern Association was held with the Baptist church of Rose Hill Wednesday and Thursday after the first Sunday in September.

Prof. C. M. Beach delivered a strong Missionary address Wednesday night. Miss Macy Cox, Associational Vice-President, presided at all other sessions of the meeting.

Presidents from eleven Woman's Missionary Societies, President of one Y. W. A., six Sunbeam Leaders, two Royal Ambassador Leaders, sixteen delegates from the W. M. S., fifteen delegates from Sunbeam Bands, four Y. W. A. delegates and one Royal Ambassador, responded to the roll-call, making a total of fifty-six representatives from twenty-five Societies. Missionary enthusiasm among the women and children, prevailed through the entire meeting. The important features of Woman's Missionary Work, privileges and duties, were ably presented by intelligent Christian women, and many plans were carefully made to advance God's kingdom, in which they plead earnestly for co-operation and assistance of the pastors.

After discussion, the Union decided to change the time of their annual meeting to Wednesday and Thursday after the third Sunday in August. Next session to meet with Mount Olive Church.

REPORT ON BAPTIST EDUCATION.

Recognizing the obligation of the State to give the fundamentals of an education to all her citizens, the Baptists of North Carolina have always been loyal supporters of our public school system and through the efforts of Baptists it has largely been made what it is. The needs of the public schools at this time are very urgent and we look with favor on the present agitation looking to a larger appropriation of public funds to the use of the public schools. We believe however that the best the State can ever do in the matter of education will be incomplete. Education in its true sense requires the development of the physical, mental and spiritual natures of the student and the State is utterly incompetent to give the spiritual and does not pretend to do so.

Realizing this incompetency on the part of the State our Baptist people have built up a splendid system of denominational schools beginning with secondary schools and continuing through the Colleges to the Seminary.

To-day as never before our people need to rally to the support of all these institutions, because their fields of usefulness are enlarging and their success is coming to mean more and more to the life of the denomination and the extension of the Master's Kingdom. For the young preachers and Missionaries our Seminary at Louisville offers the best possible training in all the essentials of a successful pastoral and Missionary career, and without its training neither can do his best work.

The reputation of Wake Forest has been established by her sons in every profession, in every movement for the good of humanity throughout the world. We now have in training there more than 400—95 of whom are Ministerial Students. We must more liberally support this phase of our work if we render the aid necessary to enable these young men to remain in College and take the training they need for their life work. We rejoice in the fact Meredith has just closed a successful campaign for increased endowment and is overflowing with students.

We are glad to report that our own school at Dell is in the midst of the most successful session in its history. The enrollment is now 184 against 160 at this time last year. We have 32 over nine years of age who are not Christians. Of the total enrollment 160 are boarding students. The greatest present need of the school is a loan fund that will enable us to encourage bright young men and women, who cannot make the start for an education without help from some source. If our system of secondary schools is to succeed, we must look after this part of the work. God is wonderfully blessing our people and no better investment of our wealth can be made than in a loan fund for the help of your boys and girls. Your committee recommends that pledges be taken for this object as for other denominational enterprises, and one third of the amount raised be devoted to current expenses and that two thirds be the loan fund.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association called to order by Moderator at 2 p. m.

On motion of W. B. Oliver, the reports on Layman's Movement, Home and Foreign Missions were read and discussed together under the head of Missions. Report on Layman's Movement read by H. L. Stewart, Home Missions by J. M. Alderman, on Foreign Missions by E. J. Harrell.

REPORT ON LAYMAN'S MOVEMENT.

The Layman's Movement has received some attention in the Association during the past year, through your committee appointed at the last session of this Association, 15 churches having been visited. The discussions have been along the lines suggested by our State Secretary and each church visited has been urged to appoint a Layman's Committee, consisting of such a number of members as they deemed necessary to the proper execution of the work. In most of these 15 churches we think this committee was appointed and we believe interest in Missions is being revived. The direct financial results of the work are uncertain but we believe that it is an effort in the right direction, that will in God's appointed way and time bring forth fruit unto his honor and glory.

The Layman's Committee of the Association cannot possibly do all the work. We can simply suggest, and we earnestly urge every delegate present to help keep up the work in those churches where it has been started.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

In recent years there has been a great and gratifying advance among Southern Baptists in Home Missions, conviction, giving and results. Ten years ago we raised \$88,874, supported 674 Missionary workers and reported 8,150 baptisms. Last year the Home Board received \$366,050, supported 1,309 workers and reported 26,897 baptisms. We are undertaking to raise \$412,000 this year.

Besides the regular work, steps forward have been taken in two ways: The first—A campaign to raise a one million dollar Church building Loan Fund. The second—larger step was a Department to enlist the 10,000 backward churches in the bounds of our Convention. It has become necessary to appoint a special representative in each of these much needed departments. Our Board is leading Southern Baptists in a worthy manner in the great and fundamental work of saving the South. Your Committee warmly commends it and its work to the prayers and enthusiastic and liberal support of the churches in our Association. We recommend that our pastors preach upon this great cause at least once during this year. We would also commend the Home Field, the splendid monthly of the Board, together with the new book "The Home Mission Task."

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

A just and comprehensive view of Foreign Mission opportunities at present is the greatest inspiration in the Kingdom of God on earth. The complete transformation of China within the last few months is one of the greatest events in human history. A radical change of one-fourth of the human race intellectually and politically and the making of them ready for spiritual readjustment, in so short a time, is without parallel in the history of nations. At the present meeting of this body this Association is expected to elect an Associational Vice-President. Our present fields are Argentina, Brazil, Mexico, Italy, Africa, Japan and China. The present number of Missionaries is 271. The native workers have been increased to 577, making a total force of 848. The 342 native churches are growing in self-support and Missionary efforts, the 422 Sunday Schools are doing aggressive work. Nine Women's Training Schools have 312 students, and ten Theological schools have 245 students. These with the other 208 schools of all grades have 6,156 pupils. In six hospitals and thirteen dispensaries, thirteen medical missionaries treated 51,796 patients during the year. Four publishing plants are sending out millions of pages of religious literature. The contributions for 1911-'12 were \$580,408, a gain of \$70,400 over the previous year. Of this amount 12 per cent, was used for expenses at home as follows: In Richmond, 5 per cent; W. M. U., 1 per cent; interest 2 1-2 per cent; State expenses, 3 1-2 per cent.

This percentage of expenses is larger than the board wants it to be. Our people can reduce it very much by sending their money all through the year, so as to save the interest account. Let it also be remembered that a large part of the money used at home is expended in efforts to arouse our people and increase contributions. The Southern Baptist Convention asked the churches to raise \$618,000 for Foreign Missions this year. Every dollar of it is needed to meet past obligations and maintain the work on a hopeful basis. The Convention apportions this amount among the various States, and the amount asked of each State is apportioned among the Associations. It is very important that this Association, either through its Executive Committee or a Special Committee, apportion the amount asked of it among the churches.

The most significant advance ever ordered by the Southern Baptist Convention took place when the Oklahoma meeting last May authorized the Foreign Mission Board to raise one million, two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, as an Equipment Fund in honor of the Judson Centennial. One million dollars of this to be used for equipping our schools and publication work. Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars is to be used for building chapels, hospitals and Missionary homes. This is a mighty call, but it is made to a mighty people. This fund is to be raised during the next three years. It is to be entirely separate from the regular foreign mission offerings and the effort will be made to secure it in such a way as not to interfere with any other cause. We recommend, 1. That all our people help in our foreign mission work by sympathy and prayers: by subscribing for and reading the Foreign Mission Journal: by distributing tracts which can be had for the asking; by making our offerings as large as possible; by sending in their gifts now and not waiting for the season of pressure in March and April. 2. That we solemnly pledge ourselves to do our part to raise the amount \$750.00, which has been asked of our Association this year, which is an increase of 33 1-3 per cent, over last vear's pledges.

On motion of C. M. Beach, W. B. Oliver was elected Associational Vice-President of the Foreign Mission Board.

J. B. Newton who was appointed at our last Association to look into the condition of the Boykin Chapel Church reports that after consulting the leading members of said church he recommends dropping said church from our roll, which on motion, was done.

On motion, C. M. Beach was elected Associational member of State Mission Board.

Report on Sunday Schools submitted and read by J. B. Newton.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

In no other denominational activity is there more gratifying growth than in Our Sunday Schools. There are reported 1858 schools with an enrollment. of 174.384. This is a gain of 49 schools and 8,788 in membership. In the Southern Baptist Convention there are only 63 per cent, as many Sunday schools as Churches, but in North Carolina there are over 95 per cent. If this latter ratio existed in the entire South, we would have over eight thousand more Baptist Sunday Schools than now. In number of schools we are surpassed by Texas only, but we have 15,000 more enrolled in our Sunday Schools than Texas. We lead in the number enrolled in the Normal Course. and hold second place in the number of diplomas awarded. More schools have been organized than ever before, and this department has become selfsupporting. Much has been done but much more needs to be done yet. Your Committee would recommend-

1. A vigorous effort to reach more of our church members for the Sunday School. This is one of our weakest points in our work.

2. A better organization of our work by Associations. There ought to be a live Sunday School Convention in every Association.

3. That more of our churches be urged to contribute to Sunday School Missions, that we may enlarge the work as demands are made for it.

4. That the Annual Rally day be commended to our schools for their own enlargement and uplift and the general advancement of the cause. 5. That the greatest emphasis should be placed upon the importance of the teacher training courses which has been provided for by our Board. And that all our pastors co-operate with Secretary Middleton in order that the needed improvements in the management of the schools may be brought about.

The Baptist Ministers' Relief Board was established in 1890. Its object is to afford aid and relief to needy Baptist Ministers of North Carolina and their widows. There were thirty-one beneficiaries last year. They receive from forty to two hundred dollars a year. Some of them have no means of support except the amount they receive from the Board. Our churches should see that no one of those who have been worthy preachers should suffer for the actual necessities of life. To this end we pray that our churches may give liberally to this worthy cause. B. F. DELOATCH.

Pending its adoption B. F. DeLoatch and R. C. Sandlin spoke to the report and R. C. Sandlin very affectionately referred to J. L. Stewart, who for so long a time our Moderator, because of affliction in family and infirmity is absent, requested that this Association send greetings to our Brother J. L. Stewart. Whereupon J. M. Alderman was asked to draft a resolution looking to the same.

RESOLUTION BY J. M. ALDERMAN.

Whereas, we the Eastern Association, feel the high appreciation of Bro. J. L. Stewart as Moderator of this body for more than forty years, as pastor of many of the churches, we do hereby send greetings. We would also express how deeply we miss him at this session. And we earnestly pray that his life may be precious and that he may be spared to meet with us again.

To this end Bro. C. M. Beach was asked to lead the body in special prayer. The report together with resolution was adopted.

The report on the Biblical Recorder was read by J. M. Page.

While the report was under consideration J. M. Page addressed the Association, also J. B. Newton and R. C. Sandlin spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER.

The Biblical Recorder is the recognized agency through which the Baptists of North Carolina inform and express themselves on denominational matter. If we recognize the above fact, then it is our duty to support and read it. The Recorder is not what some of us would like for it to be in some respects, but it is impossible to make a paper that will suit all the Baptists in North Carolina. The managers of the Recorder are perhaps, doing all they can towards this end. We earnestly ask every Baptist to stand by the Recorder.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

North Carolina was the first State in the Union to pass Prohibition by popular vote, on April 26th, 1909. Since then the State has had great prosperity. When the saloons and distilleries went out the banks and business went up. "The State Corporation Commission ascertains and announces that there are 377 banks in North Carolina now, an average of nearly four to the county. They have combined wealth of \$71,144,154.25." Throughout the Southern States determined opposition to this traffic has resulted in the enactment of laws by which five entire States and approximately ninety per cent of the territory of the remaining States of our Southland now forbid the sale of intoxicating liquors."

For a time the blind tigers flourished. The effect was the prohibition laws were falling into disrepute. The Temperance workers saw that something must be done. Their work has been effective in most of the counties of the State. Criminals have been fined heavily and some imprisoned until they begin to see that the citizens of the State are in earnest. Some of the noblest citizens have fallen as martyrs to the cause of prohibition. Mr. E. B. Swinnie, of Asheville, is one who has fallen as a martyr. It is certainly true that the law is being enforced. The good results are being felt everywhere. Our State is being complimented for it, east, west and north and south. The Anti-saloon League is doing a vast work through its leaders O. L. Stringfield and R. L. Davis. Let the Sunday Schools pledge the boys and girls to total abstinence, and the public school give scientific temperance instruction.

The latest news from Washington is that the Judiciary Committee of the Senate has reported favorably the Webb-Kenyon-McCumber-Sheppard bill and it has passed the Senate. Let every Christian pray and work that this bill may become a law in December of this year when it is to come before the house of representatives at Washington. Let every man of influence in this Association write his representative and urge him to do all he can W. H. HAGWOOD, for Committee. to pass the bill.

Keziah Jane Ward, a "Mother in Israel," a woman of great age and mature judgment passed away in the dead of winter. She was a faithful member of Bethel Church and the mother of as noble set of children as earth affordsan index to her character and general worth. Her body is cold in death, but she still lives. Ann C. Sandlin, a devoted member of Hallsville Church has passed to the great beyond. She fell on sleep August 19. She was one of the most liberal contributors not only in her home church, but one of the most liberal in all our bounds. In her will she gave her entire estate to the denomination.
