ITEMS OF INTEREST

THE FAMILY AND EQUAL RIGHTS

Southern Baptists for the Family and Equal Rights met at Camp Caroway on Saturday, March 5. Ann Barnes, Representative in the North Carolina General Assembly, spoke concerning legal issues relating to women and family. The group voted to send a statement to the legislators urging support of legis-

lation that speaks to these issues.

Anne Neil, SEBTS Visiting Professor of Missions, addressed the topic: Women as Leaders in Ministry and Missions in the Southern Baptist Convention. In relation to this topic, Linda Morgan, SEBTS graduate, presented a Statement of Resolution regarding the affirmation of Southern Baptist Women now serving in ministry within our denomination. The resolution was adopted and will be presented to the women meeting in Louisville on March 20-21, 1983. (See Calendar.)

THE WOMEN'S FORUM

The second in a series of forums for women members of the seminary family was held March 10, in the Women's Dorm. The guests were Hannah and Elmo Scoggin. Dr. Scoggin spoke on "Women in Ministry and How They Should Be Involved in Polititcal Action." Among several remarks made by Dr. Scoggin were the following:

"There are many problems inherent in being female groundbreakers in this field, but we should be patient and work hard to open ministry to all regardless of sex, etc..."

"There exist opportunities that we never dreamed of...."
"Ministry that is creative and redemptive entails politi-

cal involvement."

"There is no option for any minister without political involvement."

"There exist no little ministries ... all ministry is a matter of life and death."

"There are many ways that church involved people can do politics."

"Political ministry will not be easy in the future for men

or women because of recent controversies."

"Doing a good job will take the best possible preparation you can bring to it - drudgery filled hours of preparation."

"We must have commitment and discipline, but also personal devotion."

"We should not do the church, we should be the church."

"If women don't prepare themselves to be the prophetic

voice in the church, it might not have one."

Issues raised during the discussion included the arms race, the tendency of women not to gather enough information to be effective politically, the tendency of women to imitate men rather than being true to their more sensitive natures, and the need of women to work within the system to improve it.

WOMEN IN URBAN MINISTRY SUMMER INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

There is a summer internship program for women in urban ministry offered in Chicago, June 19 - July 29, 1983. This will provide an opportunity for about fifteen (15) women to work with women ministers in varied ministries to women in different racial, ethnical, economical, political and religious structures. Rosemary Radford Reuther will be one of the leaders during the weekly reflection days. Issues to be reflected upon include: white women and racism; women in therapy; women and sexuality; the relationship of the church to Hispanic women, women and native American women. Seminary credit is available through Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary or Lutheran School of Theology. (This does not guarantee transfer of credit to SEBTS.) WOMEN'S THEOLOGICAL CENTER

A nine-month, 24 semester hour program of theological education at a Masters level for women is opening this fall in Boston.
