The Report on The Biblical Recorder was read by R. D. Redfearn, and discussed by J. M. Page, and adopted.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER.

As a man thinketh so he is. His thoughts are close akin to his character. What he reads and hears from the lips of others determines largely what he is to be. On motion, W. A. Elam discussed The Temperance question and made the following report:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

As the years come and gc, prohibition grows in favor with the people everywhere. A great work has been accomplished in the last few years in regard to putting out of business intoxicating drinks. The States have one by one, been going "dry" for several years.

This year we have war-time prohibition and now we have the ratification of the amendment to the Federal Constitution by the States which gives us a "bone dry" nation after January 19, 1920.

The Anti-Saloon League has done much for the stamping out of alcohol.

We are glad to report just at this time that there has been formed a "World League Against Alcoholism" whose purpose it is to make the world dry.

For all this we are thankful, but the battle for absolute prohibition is just begun.

There are more illicit stills and blind-tigers now than ever before; to stamp out this lawless business is the main problem for God's people.

The law must be enforced and God's people must take a stand against this evil.

The above facts about prohibition is only one phase of the great subject of Temperance.

We are taught in God's word to be temperate in all things, and this includes all that has to do with our every day living.

We should be temperate in regard to eating. Many people eat more than is necessary for them to be efficient. Then we should be temperate in respect to spending the money that God has given us; the money that belongs to God and we have no right to spend it wrongfully; then again we should be temperate in respect to dress. Not only in cost but temperate in manner as well. We are sorry that a few thoughtless women dress in such a manner as to invite evil. If the women want to keep the world pure, then they must dress in decency.

But we are glad to report that the good women have started a movement to be more modest in dress.

There is still another great evil amongst us, and that is the universal use of extracts, bitters, and so-called soft drinks, which contain more or less alcohol.

There are millions of lives being wrecked and billions of moncy being wasted on these things every year. God's people must wage

a crusade against this evil.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Christian Education is education under Christian management for Christian ends. A Christian is not educated in the true sense of the term unless he has been trained in the principles of Christiannty. The Christian religion implies a form of education and involves a specific kind of training and instruction, for Chirstianity must always engage in teaching and be the mother of schools.

The Bible is the back bone of Christian education.

Our task is the enthronement of Jesus over all the world, and over all the life of the world.

Christian education cultivates the heart while state education cultivates the head.

The heart and head both must be trained in order to make Jesus Lord and Christ of the life. Baptists have always believed in education because they believe in the Bible.

The Bible lays more stress on teaching than on preaching. The word teach, occurs in some form, in the Bible, one hundred and eighty-seven times.

About one hundred years ago Baptists began to build schools and now let us see what we have today.

In the South we own 132 colleges and high schools.

In North Carolina we have three colleges and 14 high schools. Wake Forest, for boys, Meredith and Chowan for girls.

Our North Carolina schools are valued at \$1,491,690.

There were enrolled in the high schools last year, 2,248 students, 55 of which were preparing for the Christian ministry. The colleges enrolled 906 students including 62 for the ministry.

This year all our schools are full and many are being turned away.

The Board of Education in its regular work undertakes to help nearly all the ministerial students at Wake Forest and the young women at our two colleges who are preparing for missionary work.

Part of the 75-Million to be raised in 5 years will go to our Christian schools.

What are our schools doing for the Kingdom of God and the world at large?

Eighty-five out of every hundred ministers are trained in Christian schools.

Ninety one out of every hundred missionaries are trained in Christian schools.

In North Carolina 95 per cent of church officials, deacons, clerks, Sunday school superintendents, are trained in Christian schools.

The nation and our own State has relied largely on Christian schools for our leaders.

Three out of five last governors were Christian trained. President Wilson and Vice-President Marshall were both trained in Christian schools.

All'eight of the United States Supreme Court Judges were edu-

REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage rests heavily on the hearts of our people. More than 525 boys and girls are growing into honorable manhood and womanhood under its benign influence. Its record is rich in helpful service; our people are satisfied.

We feel more keenly with each passing year our obligation to the children who cry to us for help and friendship. And as this obligation is more clearly seen and felt, we the more gladly and generously discharge it.

And this is well, for the enormous and outrageous prices that we are obliged to pay for every household necessity makes it essential to increase the current fund in order to keep our beloved institution out of the bondage and peril of debt.

Furthermore, the pressure for admittance from boys and girls on the outside grows stronger day by day. Hundreds of homeless children utterly helpless and dependent clamor at the doors. The Lord has poured material things upon us. Our barns are filled with plenty and our presses burst out with new wine. We are well able to heed the cry of these children, and we must heed it or suffer ourselves.

To give relief to this army of children we must largely increase our current fund. What comes into the treasury barely covers the cost of supporting those within the walls of the Orphanage.

We have many children here who might be cared for by their

mothers, if a little help were supplied to them by the communities from which they come. The welfare workers of the State, with Mr. Roland F. Beasly as their head, are trying to hold these households intact. We would give our hearty endorsement to this agency of help and blessing and thus make more room in the Orphanage for those who have neither mother nor father but are wholly dependent upon the institution for their care and training.

Your committee would recommend:

1. The plan of setting apart ONE DAY FOR THE ORPHAN-AGE at or near Thanksgiving by every man, woman and child in this association.

2. A monthly contribution from every Sunday school in this association.

3. A club of CHARITY And CHILDREN in the well organized Sunday schools with an individual copy to as many others as pos-

REPORT OF THE BAPTIST MINISTERS' RELIEF BOARD.

The status of the work of the Ministers' Relief Board may be charactrized by "Four Greats":

1st. We have had a great year. Forty-two beneficiaries have received aid since last Convention—the greatest number in the history of the Board. The treasurer's report will show the greatest amount of money ever contributed to this object and raised at the least cost—less than 1-3 of 1 per cent.

2nd. There is a great Task before us-the task of raising \$300,-000.00 which is our part of the 75-Million-Program.

3rd. We have a Great Decision to make. We must soon decide the question as to whether or not our work shall be placed in the hands of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Annuities established by the Southern Baptist Convention and located at Dallas, Texas, with Dr. Wm. Lunsford as its head as Corresponding Secretary. Three-fifths of the State Conventions have voted their work into the hands of the Southern Board and have already entered upon the period of adjustment. The Convention at Greensboro appointed a committee to act with the present Board of Ministers' Relief and make recommendation in regard to the matter to the Convention at its session this year.

4th. The work of Ministers' Relief makes a Great Appeal to the hearts of men as the achievement of this Board witnesseth:

Not more than half of the associations have ever been visited in behalf of this work. Very few of them have ever been visited more than once. Yet, the Board has been able to take care of the needs of the work quite adequately and lay by an average of 1,000.00 for each of the twenty-nine years of its history. Contributions were increased fifty per cent in one year by the Corresponding Secretary visiting twenty-six of the associations. This would indicate that our part of the 75 millions will not be very difficult to raise, if the

matter is presented to the folks.
