The 2014 Annual Minutes are dedicated in honor of Rev. Frank and Eula Brooks. Frank Junior Brooks and Eula Lee Green Brooks were married April 17, 1954 in Sulton, Washington. They have 6 children together, 12 grandchildren, and 13 great grandchildren. The names of their children are: Arnold Brooks, Wayne Brooks, Elaine McMahan, Phyllis Morgan, Chris Brooks, and Emery Brooks.

Frank was saved in 1945 at the age of 16. He was called by God to preach in 1949 at the age of 20. Frank has pastored a total of 15 churches: 10 in Jackson County (some of which are Hyatt's Chapel, Trout Creek, Fall Cliff, Dicks Creek, Cedar Cliff, Balsam Grove, Mt. Pleasant, and Big Ridge), 1 in Swain County, and 4 in the state of Washington. Some of these churches he pastored twice and was pastoring two at the same time because at that time, there were not enough preachers to fill all of the churches in Jackson County. In 1953, he helped form Mountain View Baptist Church in Bennettsville, WA. This church is still in operation.

Eula Green Brooks was born in the Wilmot community on January 5, 1935. She was saved in 1968 at the age of 33.

Mr. & Mrs. Brooks and children moved to North Carolina permanently in 1972 where they still reside in Dillsboro in the Macktown Community.

PROCEEDINGS 185th ANNUAL MEETING FIRST SESSION, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 16, 2014

1. Scotts Creek Baptist Church hosted the first session of the 185th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 101 present: 80 Messengers and 21 visitors representing 20 churches.

2. Chuck Norris, Moderator, welcomed everyone

3. Rev. Johnny Lee welcomed everyone to Scotts Creek Baptist Church. He read scripture from Ephesians 3:20-21 and then invited everyone to come to the altar for prayer. Scotts Creek's choir provided special music.

4. Rev. Johnny Lee brought the message from Haggai with the topic of "Worship and Bringing Glory to God's Name"

5. The 185th Annual Meeting was called to order by Chuck Norris, Moderator.

6. The agenda was approved as presented.

7. Rev. Tim Reeves of Hyatt's Chapel Baptist Church, Rev. Keith Ashe of Long Branch Baptist Church and Rev. Matthew Ledbetter of Lighthouse were recognized as new pastors in the association.

8. Chuck presented the appointment of Committee on Committees and Resolutions Committee on page 11.

9. Grace Morris, music director, led the congregation in singing, "Blessed Assurance".

REPORTS

<u>Director of Missions</u> - Rev. Gerald Morris gave his report as Director of Missions. It was located on page 3 and 4. He talked about the three areas that had been focused on this year.
 <u>Music</u> - Grace Morris gave the Music report listed on page 5.

12. <u>WMU</u> – Betty Dean and Karen Burnette presented the WMU report on page 6. She added that the WMU is promoting the "Now I Lay Me Down to Sleep" project to collect bed linens for Broyhill Children's Homes.

13. <u>NC Baptist Foundation</u> – Rev. David Webb presented a \$1,000 check to Gerald for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. It was for a grant to buy popcorn, snow cone and cotton candy machines with some startup supplies. He then went on to report about how the Foundation will help individuals with estate planning, awards grants and scholarships, and provides investment and loan opportunities.

COMMITTEES

14. <u>Memorials</u> - Laura Brown, Virginia Pangle and Betty Dean read the names of members from each church that had passed away during the past year. The minutes will be dedicated this year in honor of Rev. Frank and Eula Brooks and Steve and Lee Lillard of Long Branch Baptist Church. Laura described Frank and Eula's work in the churches. Virginia described the mission work that Steve and Lee have been involved in with their church and the association. They presented flowers to each couple. Rev. Keith Dean led in prayer.

15. <u>Stewardship</u> - Rev. Mike Moore presented the proposed 2014-2015 budget to be voted on during the second session. The budget was on page 7.

16. <u>Committee on Committees</u> – Rev. Keith Dean presented their report on page 11. It was approved.

17. <u>Nominating Committee</u> – Karen Burnette presented their report on page 12. No further nominations were made and the motion carried.

18. <u>Place and Preacher Committee</u> - Their report on page 14 was presented by Frankie Harris. It was approved with no opposition.

19. <u>Articles and By Laws Committee</u> – David Dalton presented the proposed By Laws for the Association. It was to be voted on the following night.

20. <u>Miscellaneous Business</u> – Chuck reported there were 75 messengers and 21 visitors present on Thursday. (This is a little different after Gracella got back to the office and compared more carefully all the attendance sheets.)

21. Grace Morris led the congregation in singing, "The Old Rugged Cross".

MISSIONS

22. <u>Ochre Hill Baptist</u> – Sydney Henson and Grace Morris presented a report with pictures of their trip to Wheeling, West Virginia through Youth on Mission/SCORE. They had 28 to go that broke up into three teams to do two Vacation Bible Schools, home repairs and volunteered in the Soup Kitchen and the Salvation Army Thrift Store. Their youth group has also served in their community and church by cleaning this past summer.

23. <u>Moses Creek Baptist</u> –Jason Watson reported on their involvement with Broyhill. They have adopted the Frizzell-Higdon Cottage and go at Christmas time and have a party with them. There are 5 cottages total at Broyhill in Clyde, NC.

24. <u>Cashiers Baptist</u> – Danielle Rice told about their mission trip to Lehighton, Pennsylvania. Sixteen people presented the Gospel at a park and apartment complex. Their puppet team shared also. The puppet team is open to come to other churches. They were able to witness to a lot of kids and parents. She encouraged everyone to make themselves more aware of the people around them. Ginger Patrick shared about their WOW Ministries. This is Worshipping Outside the Walls to share the Gospel. It included a lot of hands on ministries for everyone in the church that meets once a month.

25. Denny Mathis lead the benediction prayer.

SECOND SESSION, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 17, 2014

1. Faith Baptist Church hosted the second session of the 185th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 98 present: 82 Messengers and 16 visitors representing 21 churches. There was a total of 23 churches represent for both nights.

2. Chuck Norris, Moderator, welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order.

3. Rev. Peter Mudge welcomed everyone to Faith Baptist Church and read Romans 12:1-2. He invited everyone to the altar for prayer. Faith's Praise Team presented special music.

4. The congregation did not sing at this time to save a little time.

REPORTS

5. <u>Life Challenge</u> – Suzy Charles reported that they had 10 women in the program with a waiting list. They always need prayers, volunteers and teachers. She thanked the churches for their financial support.

6. <u>Smoky Mountain Pregancy Care Center</u> – Did not report.

7. **Baptist Children's Homes of NC** –Rev. Lewis Smith the Thanksgiving Offering video and encouraged people to show it at their churches. 69 received Christ this year in the homes. 100 of the kids will be going to the Baptist State Convention this year in November.

8. Grace Morris led the congregation in singing, "Tell Me the Story of Jesus".

9. Chuck reported that there were 73 messengers, 20 visitors and 20 churches represented on Friday. There was a total of 22 churches. (This is a little different after Gracella got back to the office and compared more carefully all the attendance sheets.)

MISSIONS

10. <u>Kent Moore</u> Kent shared about his visit to see his son, MM, during the summer. His son is in the spiritually darkest region of the world and encouraged everyone to lift all the international missionaries up in prayer and to support the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. (Note: Name withheld due to security concerns.)

11. Long Branch Baptist Church – Rev. Keith Ashe spoke about the outreach their church started two years ago to share the truth with kids and parents in a trailer park in Cullowhee. They have had 23 people saved in those two years. They are now running two vans to bring them in for services. Long Branch took the Broyhill kids and houseparents to the WCU football game.
13. <u>El Centro del Señor</u> – Jose Moctezuma shared about El Centro and La Primera Iglesia Bautista de Amor. He talked about the passion Rev. Felix Villarreal has to share Jesus Christ here and in Mexico. El Centro invites everyone to attend their 13th Anniversary on Nov. 2nd. He said they are making disciples of their people and they are sharing the Gospel in the Asheville area also. Some Fruitland students are coming from Cuba and they are going back as disciples for Christ. Cuba has a lot of doors opening right now. He spoke about the Hispanic Bible classes that are being offered by Fruitland in several places including at the Baptist Center in Sylva. Jose said "Jesus said follow me."

14. <u>Webster</u> – Nancy Ford showed pictures and reported about their "Set in Motion" program to give families a Bible and bike with a lock and repair kit with pump. Last year they gave 55 packages. It is a very spirit-led program.

COMMITTEES

15. <u>Stewardship Committee</u> - Rev. Mike Moore moved that the 2014-2015 budget on page 7 presented the previous session be approved. It was approved.

16. <u>Articles and By Laws Committee</u> – David Dalton presented the proposed by laws for the association. There was one typo to change a reference from article 15 to article 13. It was approved with no opposition.

17. <u>Resolutions Committee</u> – Rev. Joshua Blythe presented the following resolution and moved that if it was adopted that the director of missions have it sent to the local newspapers as a witness.

Resolution on Same-Sex Marriage

WHEREAS, marriage is a covenant institution designed and created by God to be between one man [a husband] and one woman [a wife] for life and

WHEREAS, from God's perspective, as revealed through His written Word, the Bible, His original design for marriage can never be amended and/or abrogated by any human court of law or by any consensus of human opinion and

WHEREAS, on Friday, October 10, 2014, Judge Max O. Cogburn, Jr., of the United States District Court for the Western District of North Carolina took judicial action to strike down Amendment 1 to the North Carolina constitution, thereby opening the way for the recognition of same-sex marriages under North Carolina law and

WHEREAS, pursuant to this judicial ruling, marriage licenses have already been issued to same-sex couples in our own community of Jackson County, North Carolina, be it RESOLVED, that the messengers to the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association annual meeting in

Sylva, North Carolina, October 16-17, 2014, affirm the biblical definition of marriage between one man [a husband] and one woman [a wife] for life and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we peacefully, yet convictionally, oppose any legislation or judicial revision of state or federal laws that in any way attempts to amend and/or abrogate an application of the biblical definition of marriage between one man [a husband] and one woman [a wife] for life-the definition that we recognize has been the historically operative ethic regarding marriage in American society and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we commit to earnestly pray for those entangled by the sinful, personal choice to live in homosexuality [or any category of sexual preference] that is contrary to God's good plan for mankind as revealed in the Bible and

BE IT FUTHER RESOLVED, that we commit to earnestly and lovingly be a witness to the lifechanging power of Jesus Christ to save any person who will turn from sin by placing their faith in Him.

It was unanimously approved.

Rev. Joshua Blythe also presented the following resolution:

Whereas Scotts Creek and Faith Baptist Churches have hosted meetings, provided abundant meals, and extraordinary hospitality to messengers of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, and Whereas Rev. Johnny Lee presented (and we believe also Rev. Joshua Blythe will present) motivating, encouraging, and uplifting messages, and

Whereas associational and convention-wide representatives have given informative and challenging reports, and

Whereas Sister Grace Morris has so capably led us in worshipful singing, and

Whereas Brother Chuck Norris has so efficiently presided over these sessions and other meetings, and

Whereas our Director of Missions, Rev. Gerald Morris, has brought wise leadership that strongly promotes missions and unity, and

Whereas, our committee officers and members have given of time and energy to serve the association well, be it

Resolved that we extend sincere appreciation to all who have served to honor our wonderful Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

It was also approved.

18. Grace Morris led the congregation in singing, "Amazing Grace".

19. Reverend Jimmy Grissom of Little Savannah Baptist Church presented the special music.

20. Rev. Joshua Blythe, pastor from Buff Creek Baptist Church, gave the Scripture and sermon. He spoke Mark 6. Are you totally committed to Jesus?

21. Grace Morris led the congregation in singing "I Love to Tell the Story".

22. Dennis Proffitt closed the meeting with the Benediction.

Executive Committee Report Gracella Morris, Clerk

October 7, 2013 The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Dennis Proffitt, Vice Moderator, and was held at the Baptist Center. There were 13 executive committee members and one visitor with eight churches represented. Dennis led the group in prayer after a time of taking prayer requests. Grace Morris led the group in singing "*In the Garden*". Rev. Caleb Kelly, Pastor of Unity Baptist Church, had the devotion. Caleb was the only new member recognized. The April 1, 2013 and July 8, 2013 executive committee minutes were presented in the Book of Reports. They were voted on and approved. The October 2012 through September 2013 financial reports were presented in the Book of Reports. They were voted on and approved. The Annual Meeting. Rev. Gerald Morris presented his quarterly Director of Missions report. He spoke about the Children's activities, Western Carolina Outreach, BookLink Mission trips and the Migrant Ministry.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his quarterly Director of Missions report. This quarter provided three opportunities for the churches to gather for times of worship together. In April, the youth of the churches in the Association gathered at Faith Baptist to worship. Jason Smith, youth pastor at Cowee Baptist in Franklin, brought a challenging and encouraging message. He also brought the praise band from Cowee. There were several churches and youth that participated. On May 1st, several people met at the flagpole at the Justice Center to pray for our county, state and nation. As in the past, it was a great time to gather to pray for our government. He was grateful for those that came but was disappointed that more did not show up for an important time of prayer when our nation was in such sinful condition. Also in May the annual Spring Worship Rally was hosted by Scotts Creek Baptist. Marty Dupree brought an uplifting and challenging message to the churches that had gathered. Robert Fernandez did a superb job at translating for the Hispanics in attendance. The choir loft was full as several people from several churches joined together for the traditional community choir. The last major event the Association sponsored this quarter was the Creation Seminar hosted by Lovedale Baptist. Dr. Kurt Wise, professor at Truett-McConnell College, taught three sessions about why we could trust the creation account in the Bible. The first session was translated into Spanish by Robert Fernandez, the second session was targeted toward adults and the third session was for youth. There has been a lot of positive feedback and we hope to hold another session in the future. We completed the annual Food Roundup for Broyhill Children's home with the most food that has been collected in several years. Director of Missions Report 2013-2014, by Gerald Morris

This year has, once again, been an exciting and productive year. Please give me just a few minutes of your time to tell a little bit about what YOUR Association has been doing.

Worship - We are called by the Bible and our hearts to worship our Lord God. The Association assisted churches in worshipping together in the following ways: Youth, Children's and Adult Worship Rallies. At each of these rallies the people of the churches came together to worship. At each event God was glorified and people were blessed. The attendance was great with many churches represented at each event. Marty Dupree, from the Baptist State Convention, spoke about sharing Christ with the lost around us at the Adult Worship Rally. Jason Smith, youth pastor at Cowee Baptist, brought a challenging message at the Youth Worship Rally. The "3Ms" performed Gospel illusion and music and Pastor Lloyd Fish led the children in a devotion about how we are all wonderfully made at the Children's Worship Rally.

The other joint worship gatherings sponsored by the Association were the Spring and Fall Singings and prayer events. The spirit of fellowship is always sweet when God's churches come together to raise their voices in song to praise our Lord. The National Day of Prayer (May) and Campus Prayer Journey (September) are always wonderful times to lift our hearts in prayer for our country and schools. May we always come together as one to worship.

Evangelize - I have also been amazed to see how God is working through the cooperation of the churches to evangelize the lost here and beyond. The churches of the Association came together to reach the Hispanic migrant workers as they came through our area. We were able to reach several migrant camps late last year and this year. The ministry is evolving as we are developing a plan to disciple those that we reach through the Migrant Ministry. Pray for the Hispanic churches as they take the lead in discipling these workers.

In late April and early May Associational churches reached out to their communities by serving the needs of their neighbors and sharing the love of Christ through Operation Inasmuch (OIAM). There were many different projects like ramp building, feeding emergency workers, serving shut-ins and doing general service work in several different ways. Even though the Baptist State Convention promotes OIAM every other year, we have decided to make this a yearly emphasis in Jackson County.

We took two trips to Book-Link International in Eubank, Ky to deliver and process Christian literature, Sunday School books and Bibles that will be shipped to churches in other countries. Several Association churches participated in these mission trips.

We have made little headway in replacing the outreach to the students at Western Carolina University that the Baptist State Convention abandoned last year. I know that a couple of churches are working to start college ministries but more needs to be done. Please pray that God will raise up churches and individuals that will have a burden to reach the campus of over 10,000 students, faculty and staff. Also pray as we work to develop an outreach to the students at Southwestern Community College.

The first annual Mission Celebration last November was a great success with churches coming together to hear how God is working through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas offering. We had the pleasure of hearing from two missionaries, one from North Africa and one from Mexico. Plans are in the works for this November's Celebration.

Disciple - Again this year, we provided discipleship opportunities for the members of our churches. We simplified the format of our Sunday School training and held one class for everyone who came. Bruce Sumrak, member of Calvary Baptist, led in a discussion about the motivation for teaching Sunday School. Everyone who attended, left encouraged and uplifted in their role in teacher God's Word each Sunday morning.

The Association, by request of the churches, hosted a Creation Seminar and trip to the Creation Museum. We hosted Dr. Kurt Wise of Truett-McConnell College as he spoke at three sessions for the Hispanics, youth and adults. The seminar was educational and faith building. I was able to plan one trip to the Creation Museum in Northern Kentucky. Participants spent two days visiting the museum and learning that we can trust the Bible starting with the very first verse. We are hoping to host more such events in the future.

Miscellaneous - In other areas, the Association reached out to the Senior Adults in the churches by hosting a fellowship once a month with the group enjoying working together in outreach projects. I am working on fostering fellowship between pastors through various means. The Handyman ministry has been hit or miss this year without a leader but the churches of the Association were able to help a few families with building needs.

I have helped serve individual churches in several ways such as pastor search, church conflict, pulpit supply, information, advice, teaching VBS, etc. I have endeavored to worship with each church as much as possible (this is truly one of my favorite parts of the job). I am always humbled and excited to help any church in any way needed. I am also continuing to reach out to the Baptist churches in our county that do not currently belong to the Association in the hope of fostering a sense of fellowship and cooperation.

We have continued to be a connection point for the churches with information through the newsletter, internet, phone, etc. We have also been a collection point for Broyhill, Migrant ministry and Book-Link. With Fruitland Baptist Bible College teaching classes here each week, the Baptist Center has developed into a hub of activity.

One other thing that has kept me busy this year is working with the By-laws committee to update and simplify our By-laws. With it being more than 20 years old, the By-laws are severely out of date and in much need of revision. We hope that the simpler format for the Association with help us work more efficiently.

I know the report is long, (and I feel that I am forgetting much of what we did) but it is because the churches of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association are busy working together to serve God.

2013 Report: July 2013 - June 2014

Lilly dreams of a tree house, but not one constructed by human hands – she dreams of a tree house made by God.Lilly is paralyzed from the neck down. She cannot run, climb or play like other children. But she believes with all her heart that she will play in the tree house God has built especially for her. Lilly lived at Baptist Children's Homes (BCH) from November 2013 to May 2014. And during her time at BCH's Truett Home located in the mountains of Hayesville, Lilly asked Jesus into her heart. Lilly's decision is an incredible culmination in a young life that has experienced more tragedy than most adults will ever encounter. At age six, an automobile accident took the life of Lilly's mother. The accident also took away Lilly's ability to run, play, or even wiggle her fingers and toes. While her friends attended school and ran on the playground, Lilly's world revolved around doctors, lifesustaining medical equipment, and the chair in which she is now confined. Because of her fragile health, Lilly needed special care and a special place to live until the Department of Social Services could find a long-term care facility. That place was BCH. And it was there she learned about Christ. "I know this is why God sent her to us," says houseparent Judy Blanton. "Through Christ, Lilly has a hope and a future."

Even though BCH's 19 NC locations do not provide specialized medical care, BCH's houseparents and staff committed to doing whatever it took to care for Lilly. Medicaid ensured Lilly had the medical care she needed while living at BCH and her houseparents met Lilly's daily needs and showed her God's love. "My momma had to go to Heaven," Lilly says, "but I was okay. I'll go to Heaven one day and see her, and I'll be able to play again."

Message from the President

God has *greater things* in store for Lilly. We are thankful to have played our role, and we all have been richly blessed to become part of Lilly's bigger family. Through the faithful support of NC Baptists, Lilly came to know Christ in the short time she was with us. Whenever a child comes into our care, we often do not know how long they may be with us. But from the moment that boy or girl steps through our door, we have the opportunity to be the outstretched arm of Jesus.

NC Baptists were indeed the hands and feet of Jesus to Lilly and to the 9,983 children and families we ministered to last year. And Lilly was one of 75 BCH residents who made a decision for Christ in 2013. You are making greater things possible for the children and families we serve. Thank you for giving Lilly a home and showing God's love to children.

International Missions: Baptist Children's Homes establishes Guatemala orphanage

BCH is partnering with North Carolina Baptist Men and International Indigenous Community Development (IICD) to establish the Good Shepherd Children's Home, an orphanage in Quetzaltenango (Xela), Guatemala. The orphanage will serve children who belong to a people known as the Quiché – the largest indigenous Mayan group in Guatemala. "To be able to expand BCH's vision of *sharing hope...changing lives* and extend the hope of Christ to the children of Xela, Guatemala is a blessing beyond words," says BCH president Michael C. Blackwell. "Like a biblical pillar of fire, God has led in this journey, and we will follow Him for the sake of His honor and glory." The Good Shepherd Children's Homes will be an affiliate of BCH. BCH is providing the benefit of its 128-years of child care expertise to implement the appropriate policies and procedures at the new orphanage. BCH's involvement ensures that Quiché children will receive the highest quality of care. The goal is to begin caring for children in 2014. NC Baptist Men and WMU NC are partnering with BCH to help establish the home. Baptist Men teams have been tackling the necessary work to renovate the building. WMU organized a "Tie that Binds" drive collecting thousands of neckties. The ties were sold at the WMU Missions Extravaganza raising funds for the new orphanage.

Twenty-eight year old Sedrick is realizing his dream to walk. A traumatic brain injury that resulted from abuse when he was four years old not only caused developmental challenges, but it robbed Sedrick of his ability to walk. Today, Sedrick lives at BCH's Stegall Home in Marshville, one of nine group homes for developmentally disabled residents. Through a corrective surgical procedure and the aid of his caregivers, including trainer Sheryl Pressley, Sedrick has taken his first steps since he was a young boy. Under Pressley's direction, Sedrick completes a routine of exercises each day to strengthen his legs and upper body. "He's always so excited about the exercises. He does everything I ask him to do and never complains," Pressley says. "Sedrick does everything with joy." Using his walker, and with Pressley by his side adding extra physical support, Sedrick is walking total of 225 feet per day.

"My legs are getting stronger," Sedrick exclaims. "I am blessed because I can walk." As a child, Sedrick was so neglected that he had to lay on his stomach and pull himself across the floor with his arms. "Scooting," as Sedrick calls it, was the only way he could maneuver. But those days are long behind him. "I don't have to think about scooting anymore," Sedrick says. "My Savior is so awesome."

North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry: NCBAM Celebrates Five Years of Ministry

North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) has reached a milestone marking its fifth anniversary. Under the founding leadership of Baptist Children's Homes' president Michael C. Blackwell, NCBAM and North Carolina Baptists have crossed the state with the love of Jesus to meet the spiritual and physical needs of aging adults 65 and older since 2009.

*Tapping into more than 15,000 volunteers and service providers, NCBAM fields as many as 350 calls a month from aging adults in need or their caregivers and connects them to resources. More than 13,000 outgoing calls are made annually by NCBAM's *Call Center Specialists* to partnering churches and other organizations to meet those needs.

*The second biennial *Rampin' Up!* took place this year in partnership with Baptist Men and in conjunction with NC Operation Inasmuch. More than 400 ramp requests were processed for this event. The first *Rampin' Up!* yielded 327 ramps built. Since 2009, NCBAM has connected volunteers with more than 2,000 aging adults needing wheelchair ramps.

*Prevention remains an NCBAM priority. Through its "Priority #1: Prevention" initiative, NCBAM staff members conduct regular Fall and Fire Safety trainings. According to the Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM), more than 10,000 smoke alarms have been installed by NCBAM-connected volunteers. Since 2013, NCBAM held 51 OSFM installation trainings--mobilizing 1,243 Baptist volunteers for Fire Safety ministry. Since its beginning, more than 16,000 Red Bags have been distributed. The Red Bag initiative helps medical professionals prevent overmedication and reduces the risk of prescribing conflicting medicines. Red Bags make it easy to store all nonperishable medications in one place. Red Bags help emergency responders quickly locate medicines in a crisis.

*NCBAM's new aging adult leadership initiative entitled Aging Adults Innovating Ministry (AAIM): Resourcing Leaders for the Age Wave assists churches in strengthening aging adult ministries across the state.

*The new Servant Care program directed by NCBAM outreaches to aging ministers 65 and older. Servant Care offers enhanced services to aging North Carolina Baptist ministers and fosters opportunities for North Carolina Baptists to honor them and provide loving care. Fellowship and educational opportunities for Servant Care participants are provided through ENCORE programs and regional events. The first ENCORE event was held March 25, 2014 in Winston-Salem with 25 ministers in attendance.

*NCBAM is drawing attention to aging adults facing hunger through *Serving Hope*. *Serving Hope* is an outreach by NC Baptists to help meet the nutritional needs of the aging in their communities. This new initiative has two emphases to encourage action that can help make a difference in the life of an aging adult facing hunger – *MealShare* and *It's In the Bag!*

*NCBAM's highly-trained staff presents workshops on dozens of topics. Since January 2013, NCBAM staff members have presented 182 workshops informing 3,804 participants.

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION 2013 ANNUAL REPORT

As the trust agency of the Baptist State Convention, the North Carolina Baptist Foundation seeks every day to do "greater things" for our Lord and His Kingdom work. Our very mission is "to serve North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding Baptist churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis." Every year we want to report greater things in our stewardship ministry than the year before.

Below you will see some of the greater things the Lord used the Foundation to accomplish in 2013:

- *43 new accounts, most of which are permanent endowments to support Kingdom work until our Lord returns
- *Almost \$6 million dollars in charitable gifts to accounts
- *\$9.3 million distributed, with \$7.2 million going to support ministry in 2013

Another important part of our responsibility to do "greater things" concerns our investment program. In 2013, assets under management grew from \$134,680,155.48 to \$146,579,201.35. Investment returns were also excellent and afford us the ability to do greater things for His Kingdom. Our Total Equity Fund was up 32%, and our pooled funds were all positive with the Growth Fund up 17%, the Balanced Fund up 10%, and the Income Fund up 5%.

To encourage "greater things" in the future, our staff made 177 stewardship presentations in Baptist churches and associations, institutions and agencies, as well as statewide Baptist senior adult conferences in 2013. We co-hosted senior adult festivals at Chowan and Mars Hill Universities and at the Broyhill Campus of Baptist Children's Homes, and led seminars at state-wide senior adult events at Caraway and Caswell Conference Centers. We continue to provide Christian stewardship educational programs at Fruitland Baptist Bible College and the Divinity Schools at Campbell and Gardner-Webb. Once again we co-sponsored two important events with the Baptist State Convention, the 38th annual NC Baptist Development Officer's Conference and the 14th annual NC Baptist Heritage Award Luncheon.

Our newest ministry, NC Baptist Financial Services, is a partner in helping local congregations accomplish greater things as they expand facilities and ministries. By the end of 2013, NCBFS had provided 52 loans to churches totaling \$33.7 million. Also by the end of 2013, the Church Growth Investment Fund, which is used to provide the resources for loans, had reached \$41.6 million.

The Lord is surely providing and making good on His promise in John 14:12 that His followers would do even greater things. The North Carolina Baptist Foundation is blessed to have a small part in what God is doing with and through North Carolina Baptists, and we are forever grateful for the support we receive from the Baptist State Convention and NC Baptist churches.

FaithHealthNC - Caring Through Shared Commitments

Our partnership with North Carolina Baptists continues to expand through FaithHealthNC, a ministry of the Division of Faith and Health Ministries of Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center. This ministry combines the caring strengths of congregations, the clinical expertise of medical providers and a network of community resources focused on improving health.

Congregations participating in FaithHealthNC choose volunteers who will be trained as caregivers to help their members and neighbors along their health journeys – before they go to a hospital, while they are being cared for and after they are back on their own or in a post-hospital setting. The congregational caregivers work with Health Care Liaisons and Connectors through FaithHealthNC to ensure that care is received at the right door (hospitals, clinics, primary care physicians), and the right time (usually sooner rather than later); and that individuals are ready to be treated (with medications, health history in hand) and most importantly, not alone.

Participating congregations have experienced new levels of energy as they care for members and neighbors through the FaithHealthNC network. New missional connections are established and new levels of cooperation have taken place. Participating church are collaborating in new ways to improve the health of their communities.

Rev. Leland Kerr became the Baptist Healthcare Liaison for FaithHealthNC in November of 2013. His background in ministry includes serving as a church staff minister, a Director of Associational Missions, and a Pastor. These various areas of ministry have equipped him to work closely with churches, associations and the Baptist State Convention.

CareNet of North Carolina

CareNet, our ministry of Pastoral Counseling, extended the caring ministry of North Carolina Baptists to over 6,000 hurting individuals, couples and families in the 2014 fiscal year, helping them to find hope and healing. Close to half of those receiving care are NC Baptists from over 1,000 of our NC Baptist churches. Approximately 45,000 hours of faith-integrated counseling was provided in the 2014 fiscal year representing a 16% increase from 2013. CareNet, in grateful partnership with North Carolina Baptists, has 35 clinics covering 80 of the 100 counties across North Carolina, 66 clinicians, 6 Residents and 13 interns who provide faith sensitive counseling. CareNet remains the largest provider of faithintegrated counseling in the United States.

CareNet's newest innovation is the placement of counselors in Primary Care and Pediatric offices. Plans are underway to develop a training program for clinicians to integrate care in medical offices across the state, making even more visible the connection between faith and health.

The partnership between CareNet and The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina as expressed through Cooperative Program support is making a measurable difference to the health of our communities. By enabling us to provide Pastoral Counseling to the hurting, you assure that no one is turned away due to financial difficulties.

Over \$600,00 of free care will be provided this year.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your continued trust and confidence in our care.

Our Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education Ministry extends the love of God through ministries to our patients and their families and our staff and provides life-changing education through Clinical Pastoral Education programs. In fiscal year 2014, we provided care to patients through close to 60,000 ministry contacts and trained 37 ministers.

North Carolina Baptists gave more than \$550,00 to the Mother's Day Offering in fiscal year 2014. These gifts make a life changing difference for hurting patients and families who suffer from serious illness and devastating financial need. Our Vision states, "Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center is a preeminent, internationally recognized academic medical center of the highest quality, with balanced excellence in patient and family-centered care, research and education." Our patient and family promise is that we will keep you safe, care for you, involve you and your family, and respect you and your time.

The Becker's Hospital Review in 2014 named the Medical Center to its annual list of

"100 Great Hospitals in America." We were specifically cited for our quality and safety measures.

In 2014, Brenner's Children's Hospital, part of the Medical Center, was ranked by the U.S. News and World Report as one of America's best children's hospitals. It is nationally ranked in two pediatric specialties: Neonatology (#26) and Orthopedics (#39).

The 2014 "Best Doctors in America" database includes 278 physicians from the Medical Center. The list includes physicians in 33 specialties, 46 of whom are pediatric specialists at Brenner's Children's Hospital.

Report from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina

For period July 1, 2013 to June 30, 2014

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina (Convention) exists to help local churches fulfill their divinely appointed mission from God. The Convention staff, under the leadership of Executive Director-Treasurer Milton A. Hollifield Jr., is committed to helping Baptist churches and associations maximize their ministry outreach for the purpose of building God's Kingdom. To that end, the Convention began implementing its five-year strategy, "Impacting Lostness Through Disciple-Making," in January of this year. The strategy calls for a commitment to both strengthening churches and planting churches through facilitation of a disciple-making culture that utilizes a relationship-driven model of consultation, beginning in the most concentrated areas of lostness in North Carolina are in eight population centers: Asheville, Charlotte, Fayetteville, Greenville, Unifour (Hickory), Wilmington, the Triad area (Greensboro, Winston-Salem and High Point) and the Triangle area (Raleigh, Durham and Chapel Hill). Strategy teams, comprised of local associational and church leaders, are being formed across the state—in the population centers and beyond—to develop strategies for impacting lostness.

To more effectively implement the five-year strategy, the Convention has restructured its staff, resulting in the formation of two new teams—the Strategic Focus Team and the Collegiate Partnerships Team—and the newly formed Evangelism and Discipleship Group.

Associational Partnerships

The Convention enjoys partnering in ministry with 78 associations across the state. One way the Associational Partnerships Team works with local Baptist associations is through Ministry Partnership Agreements. Through these agreements the Convention partners with local associations, providing funding, coaching and training resources for church planting, resort ministry, ethnic and language ministry and community ministry projects. Another way Associational Partnerships works with local associations is through Church and Community Ministry personnel serving in the associations. This office provides training, resourcing and encouragement to these ministry evangelism servants.

When a vacancy occurs, Associational Partnerships helps search committees as they seek to fill associational ministry positions. In addition, the office provides training for search committees. This office helps associations and churches understand the demographics of the area in which they are called to serve. Understanding the demographics of an associational area can help leaders be more effective in their planning and outreach. Convention churches can access this information through the Percept organization.

Collegiate Partnerships

The Collegiate Partnerships Team's goal is to see *no campus left* without a gospel presence. The team consists of three regional campus ministry consultants and two international ministry consultants, whose primary function is to equip local churches and associations to develop and implement contextualized, localized ministry models to engage college campuses with the gospel. The goal is to have a gospel presence through the local church on many more of the nearly 200 college and university campuses across the state. On March 1, 2014, the Collegiate Partnerships Team hosted a one-day disciple-making workshop at Pitts Baptist Church in Concord. Forty collegiate leaders from around the state attended the workshop, and many of them began to apply the principles to their ministry immediately.

Disciple-making Culture

In pursuit of the fulfillment of the Convention's strategy of "Impacting Lostness Through Disciple-Making," the Evangelism and Discipleship Group seeks to lead North Carolina Baptist churches in creating a disciple-making culture in which lives are changed by the power of God. The Evangelism and Discipleship Group is comprised of two teams, the Disciple-Making Team and the Church Strengthening Team. The Disciple-Making Team assists congregations in the areas of evangelism and discipleship and the Church Strengthening Team assists congregations in a variety of ministry areas that generally apply across the entire church. A major focus on training pastors and other church leaders to create a disciple-making culture in their church and equip their church members to know, share and live the gospel of Jesus Christ began in the summer of 2013 using "The Story," an evangelism and discipleship tool that equips believers to share the gospel through the overarching biblical story of creation, fall, rescue and restoration. The 2014 statewide evangelism conference was held at Providence Baptist Church in

Raleigh. The conference focused on the Convention's strategy: "Impacting Lostness Through Disciplemaking." Speakers included Bruce Ashford, Steve Corts, Derwin Gray and James Emery White.

Embrace

The Embrace ministry year launched with the Embrace Leadership Training at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. Carolyn O'Neal, women's ministry director at Houston's First Baptist Church in Texas, encouraged and challenged the women's ministry leaders to serve the Lord wholeheartedly and faithfully as they serve their local churches. Embrace also hosted "Be Bold: A Women's Prayer and Evangelism Retreat" at LifeWay's Ridgecrest Conference Center in September. Through break out sessions and hands-on plenary sessions, participants learned to share the story of Jesus Christ and how His story affects every story.

Great Commission Partnerships

The Office of Great Commission Partnerships assists North Carolina Baptist churches and associations in developing, implementing and maintaining an effective missions strategy. Through partnerships in New York, Boston and Toronto, North Carolina Baptists are helping share the gospel in some of the most unreached areas of North America. This year the Office of Great Commission Partnerships launched new international partnerships in unreached and unengaged areas around the world, including parts of the Middle East, East Asia and Southeast Asia, while continuing to assist with the Moldova partnership. One of the major highlights of the year was the Next Generation Missional Journey New York experience for students involved in their third year of the training program. Partnering with the Metropolitan New York Baptist Association, the students shared the gospel with Muslims, Hindus and Buddhists. The students also participated in people group research among unreached and unengaged people groups.

Missions Development

The theme for the 2014 North Carolina Missions Offering is "Choose Now," based on Luke 21:10-13 (www.ncmissionsoffering.org). This offering is the visible expression of North Carolina Baptists who desire to impact eternity. The offering supports the work of NC Baptist Men, church planting, missions education and promotion, associational projects and mission camps. In Cooperative Program promotion, a variety of resources were made available and sent to churches. These resources highlight the biblical mandate for missions, and how North Carolina Baptists participate in fulfilling the Great Commission through the Cooperative Program. The *52 Sundays* prayer guide was produced, which features international, North American and North Carolina missionaries supported by North Carolina Baptists and devotionals on prayer, stewardship and missions. An accompanying PowerPoint was also developed. Other resources include brochures, bulletin inserts and videos.

Prayer

The annual statewide prayer conference was held in Garner at Aversboro Road Baptist Church. The conference featured John Franklin, Gordon Fort, Chuck Lawless and Robert smith. As a follow up to the spiritual awakening emphasis and call to prayer that has become a part of the last two Annual Meetings, 16 associational prayer retreats and rallies were scheduled with associations this year. The purpose of these retreats was to pray for, encourage and foster a desire to pray toward revival and spiritual awakening. Regional prayer conferences, summits and solemn assembly gatherings were also held in partnership with associations and churches across North Carolina.

Scholarships

For the 2014-2015 academic year, over 600 Baptist Scholarships were awarded totaling more than \$600,000. This annual scholarship is limited to members of cooperating churches enrolled at one of the five affiliated educational institutions: Campbell University, Chowan University, Gardner-Webb University, Mars Hill University, or Wingate University.

Youth Ministry

Attendance for the 2014 summer Youth Weeks camps was nearly 7,000 over seven weeks at the North Carolina Baptist Assembly at Fort Caswell. The theme was "Tag! You're It," which focused on helping students learn to stand up for their faith and to live as a witness for Jesus Christ. In 2013, more than 500 first-time decisions for Christ were recorded! Since 2011, the Youth Weeks missions offering project has consisted of students packaging food to help alleviate hunger in Haiti. During the summer of 2014, students packaged the "One Millionth" meal for Haiti thanks to the missions offering project. The youth ministry team offered North Carolina Baptist churches training in disciple-making, missions, worship, transitions after graduation and youth ministry planning.

International Mission Board Report Fall 2014

Last year Southern Baptists joined together in one sacred effort by giving \$93.8 million through the Cooperative Program (\$93,872,000) and \$154 million (\$154,057,852.36) through the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for International Missions, supporting more than 4,800 missionaries sent out by Southern Baptist churches through IMB.

In addition, Southern Baptists gave \$5.5 million (\$5,510,312.92) for hunger relief and development ministries around the world.

Together, these gifts enabled IMB missionaries to report:

• 235,170 people professing faith in Christ

- 114,571 new believers expressing their faith through baptism
- 6,192 new churches planted
- 118 people groups newly engaged with the Gospel

These successes come through both long- and short-term missionaries, who work together with Southern Baptist churches and other indigenous national churches. We praise the Lord for His work in each of the lives represented in these statistics!

And yet today, 3,052 people groups remain unengaged and unreached with the Gospel. Worse, it is estimated that 135,000 people die each day, entering eternity without Christ. The majority of these people live in places where there is still limited or no access to the Gospel.

Confronted with this sobering reality, how are we to respond? What is our responsibility? To truly understand the answer to these questions, we must go back to the beginning.

When man sinned, he forfeited his perfect relationship with God. But God had a plan to reconcile His creation back to Himself. He sent messengers to proclaim His name and the Good News of salvation that was to come. God created nations for His glory. He made a covenant with Abraham to bless the nations. God gave Israel commands to live differently. Prophets told the nations that there is no other God. In the climax of God's story, He sent His Son, the Promised One, who was both the Sent One and the Sender. After Jesus' death and resurrection, He sent His disciples to continue God's faithful mission to make Himself known.

We are part of this story — God's redemptive narrative that began before time. Each of us, as individuals, families and churches, are called to join the Author of all history in this magnificent redemptive movement to advance the Gospel among the nations — together in one sacred effort.

Your part of God's story is critical; the ways He can use you and your church are endless.

It is estimated that close to 1 billion people living today are very likely to go through life without ever hearing the Gospel in a way they can understand and respond. At a time of incredible opportunity, will we do what is needed to share the Good News with all peoples?

There is no better time to find your place in God's story. What will be your part?

GUIDESTONE

The GuideStone Team of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina (BSCNC) has experienced many changes in 2013 and 2014. The most obvious was the changing of the guard when Johnny Ross and Betty Pleasant decided to retire toward the end of 2013. The new GuideStone Team of Davis Blount and Pamela Bills has continued to work closely with GuideStone Financial Resources of the Southern Baptist Convention to serve the more than 4,300 churches affiliated with the BSCNC. The following information is a summary of those joint efforts:

Retirement

The GuideStone Team continues to work with church staff and lay leaders in an effort to assist them in the restructuring of pastor and staff compensation packages to include retirement benefits. Many pastors and staff members do not see the benefits of participating in the Church Retirement Plan and they will opt out of the plan if given an opportunity. Therefore, a continued effort is being made to motivate churches to take responsibility and assist its pastors and staff by contributing a portion of their salaries to their retirement plans. In the past year more than 2,000 of our 4,300 churches had no participation in the plan.

2013 State Convention Protection Benefits – The following disability and survivor benefits were in place for retirement participants:113 people received a total of \$586,708.42 in disability benefits, and 35 deaths resulted in a distribution of \$418,941.23 to beneficiaries.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina continues to receive several requests for financial assistance when someone in our Convention family becomes disabled or passes away. Many of these people chose not to participate in the Church Retirement Plan; therefore, there is no financial assistance available. However, there have been a few occasions when the church took the lead by contributing into a pastor's or staff's retirement plan allowing their beneficiaries to receive the Protection Benefits provided by your state Convention.

GuideStone Funds – the nation's largest Christian-screened mutual fund family – continues to be recognized by top industry ranking firms for its outstanding fund performance. On May 1, 2014, GuideStone Funds began accepting new values-driven investors by making available its 31 mutual funds for direct investment by those in the pew as well as those in the pulpit.

Insurance

Health Care Reform Law – GuideStone remains a leader in its coverage of the impact that new tax laws have on our churches and their staff. Timely and thorough updates of changes in the tax law can be found on the GuideStone website.

Major impacts for 2013 and 2014 associated with the implementation of the Affordable Care Act include GuideStone's decision to freeze issuing any new individual medical plans after December 31, 2013; the lifting of this freeze for new employees of eligible ministries beginning June 6, 2014; and the income tax impact on pastors and staff where a church pays for, or reimburses, their individual health insurance premiums.

Church Staff Compensation

Church staff participation in the 2014 Lifeway bi-annual Church Compensation Survey was completed on May 31, 2014. The results of the 2014 Compensation Survey should be available by the end of the summer. Much of the year has been spent educating churches on the tax implications of the "lump sum pay packages" for pastors and churches. The taxability of such pay packages continues to be a concern.

Mission Dignity

GuideStone Financial Resources continues to provide financial assistance to elderly ministers and widows of ministers who live under financial duress and need ongoing and/or one-time assistance through Mission Dignity. During the year, GuideStone assisted about 225 North Carolinians financially.

BY-LAWS OF THE TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.

2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.

3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.

4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.

5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline,

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as autonomous bodies.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the Bible.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watchcare the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Doctrine Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a constituted church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Doctrine Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Doctrine Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. Any church under watchcare is expected to participate in and financially support the Association. At the end of the year, the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting of the Association, at the recommendation of the Doctrine and Executive Committees and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational Clerk, before each annual session, a Church Profile, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving."

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternatives in conference to attend the annual meeting. SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the Doctrine Committee determines which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be affirmed by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Assistant Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Trustees and team leaders. Team leaders shall be chosen by the Nominating Committee as needed to serve the purposes of the Association (eg. Sunday School leader, Youth/Children leader). Team leaders will work with the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions to form a team to carry out assigned duties.

Associational representatives will be elected as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association. Associational representatives shall be a conduit of information between outside agencies and the Association. They may also represent the Association as the outside agency's policies specify.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees, the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service, the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational financial year will run from October 1 through September 30.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all meetings; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of the annual meeting; and prepare minutes of the annual meeting (Annual Minutes) to be distributed to each church.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association a congregational church profile as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association as soon as possible or by the deadline set by the Clerk and Director of Missions. All program reports should be returned by the same date.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the Clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports," the annual minutes and the registration of messengers at the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall oversee the receipts and disbursements, by order of the Executive Committee of the Association, of the money of the treasury and ensure that a complete report is presented at the Annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 6. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association and are not personally bound by signatures but are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the Trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

The business meetings of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX. QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member churches.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Team Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI. ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for three years except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Committees members, Team Leaders (as needed) and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified prior to presenting of their names at annual session.

SECTION 4. THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 5. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the Associational building, grounds, and equipment. SECTION 6. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

A. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.

B. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of Associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the Association.

C. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the Association's staff personnel.

D. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.

E. When a staff vacancy occurs, other than the DOM, they shall serve as the search committee. When a DOM vacancy occurs, they shall nominate a search committee and present it to the Executive Committee.

F. The Personnel Committee shall handle grievances as outlined in the grievance policy.

SECTION 7 THE ANNUAL MEETING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. The duties of this committee shall be to

- A. recommend the church(es) to host the annual meeting and the preacher(s) and alternate preacher(s) to deliver the annual sermon for the following year,
- B. present suitable resolutions at the annual Associational meeting,

- C. bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting,
- D. keep the historical records of the Association up-to-date,
- E. plan the program for the Annual Meeting(s) and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting,
- F. shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meeting(s),
- G. and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIII (amendments to by-laws).

SECTION 7 THE DOCTRINE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five pastors and two laymen.

- A. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV and make recommendation to the Association. It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.
- B. It shall also advise churches about candidates for ordination with the following guidelines: it serves on an advisory capacity only, serves at the request of the church from which the member is seeking ordination, is to examine such candidates as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led. It should regularly inform the Executive Committee of its work.

ARTICLE XII. JOB DESCRIPTION, DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. Title and Functions.

A. Position Title. This position shall be known as the Director of Missions for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

B. Basic Functions. The Director of Missions shall serve as a minister to the church leaders of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, as mission strategist, as chief administrative officer, and as a general leader of the Association.

C. The Personnel Committee shall be responsible to maintain, update and revise a job description as required, making recommendations to the Association for approval as they are needed.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Annual Meeting Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

ARTICLE XIV. NON-PROFIT STATUS

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No part of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. shall inure to the benefit of its' members, directs, officers, or other persons except that the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organization.

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. will be turned over to one or more organizations with similar purposes which are exempt as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.
