Next Meeting

With the Church at Salem, one mile north of Fletcher's, N. C., on Thursday before the Second Sunday in October, 1890, at 10.30, A. M.

POLK COUNTY, N. C., AUGUST 29TH, 1889.

The Carolina Baptist Association convened with the Friendship Church. In the absence of the former, Moderator the Clerk called the body to order. Sang the hymn, "Bless he the tie that binds us." Prayer by Elder James Blythe. The Clerk then appointed John Leverett and J. L. Brookshier, Reading Clerks. and letters were read from the different Churches, and the names of Delegates enrolled. The Clerk then appointed tellers for the election. L B. Johnson and B. F. Turner, for Moderator. J. L. Brookshier and J. W. Freeman, for Clerk. J. A. Staton and W. C. Ward, for Treasurer. The election resulted as follows: W. B Johnson, Moderator. Joshua Pruitt, Clerk, and P. T. Ward, Treasurer. Then, on motion, Rev. J. C. Stowell, of the Home Mission Board, was invited to a seat in the body. Also, Rev. J. W. Oliver, of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina, was invited to a seat. The Association granted Rev. J. C. Stowell time to address the Association on the great important work of the Home Mission Board. On motion, granted J. W. Oliver time to address the Association to-morrow, at 10 o'clock, in behalf of the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina. Recess 15 minutes.

Came together by singing—resumed the business of the body. On motion the rules were suspended, and the Introductory Sermon postponed until to-morrow morning. Then opened the door of the Association for Churches to unite with this body, and Barnwell, a new Church, presented a letter, was received, and the delegates welcomed to seats. Then appointed a Committee on preaching: T. J. Allen and J. J. Blythe, with the Deacons of Friendship Church. Then by motion appointed a committee to report on the Baptist Orphanage of North Carolina. Committee: J. W. Freeman, J. W. Oliver, A. B. Thompson. Committee on Preaching, report that Elder F. H. Plemmons preach to-morrow afternoon. On motion, dispensed with the Committee on Arrangements, and adopted the order of business of last year to govern this Association this session. The motion adopted. A motion to adjourn and meet to-morrow morning and spend half an hour in devotional exercises. Praver by J. L. Brookshier. Then adjourned.

Whilst it is not progressing as rapidly as we might wish, still the principles of Temperance are fastening themselves on the minds and hearts of our people in a way that is encourageing. During the last National Campaign Temperance was discussed throughout our nation in the form of Prohibition, and whilst the result was not what the friends of the measure hoped for, still it was impressed upon the public minds, a great moral question, and has made many strong friends to Temperance. Brethren, if there is any one of the great evils of the land which God has pronounced his woes upon more than any other, it is this monster evil of intemperance. We as Baptists of the Carolina Association should, in the name of God, and in justice to our fellow men, do all in our power to drive this evil from the borders of our land. King Alcohol with all his glaring vices, poisoning the blood, shattering the nerves, destroying the mind and corrupting the hearts and morals of our fellow beings, and above all, destroying the immortal soul of man, demands the earnest attention of all God's followers. Let us heed the admonition of the Apostle Peter, "be temperate in all things." And whereas, efforts have been made to suppress the liquor trafic which have failed to remove the blighting curse of intemperance, therefore we recommend all the brethren of this Association to pledge themselves not to vote for any man for office, or to fill any position within the gift of the people, who makes, vends, or uses spirituous liquors, except for medical purposes.

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE OF NORTH CAROLINA.

The Baptist Orphanage is the property of the Baptists of North Carolina, and has to be supported principally by them though only four years old the work has advanced rapidly, and to-day, we have four cottage homes completed, and the fitth in process of erection. In these homes we now have one hundred and ten children, who can look up to God, and thank him for this their home. The cry is coming to us from hundreds of others who have not life's necessaries—no homes, no fathers. Some of these children are from the Western Convention. The home is located west of the center of the State, and belongs equally to the Baptists west of the Ridge, and appeals to them for part of the support. Brethren, let us heed the command of our Master, and care for these destitute ones. God will bless us as a denomination, as a nation, and as individuals, as we own religion by helping the lost and helpless. The children have to do all their work, and are given a business education. We have a farm of 300 acres, which adds much to its support. We have a printing office where "Charity and Children" is published, a weekly eight-page paper. This is sent one year to those who give a dollar to the Orphanage. Bear in mind, this goes directly into the Orphanage Treasury. We ask that a Committee of one be appointed in each Church to work for the Orphanage, and that their names and addresses be put in the Minutes for the benefit of the Treasurer in sending out circulars, &c. Let us remember that true and undefiled religion is this, to visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction.

MISSIONARY REPORT.

DEAR BRETHREN: I labored as follows: Days service, 43; miles traveled, 27; sermons delivered, 48; addresses. 6; religious, 50; prayer meetings, 49; professions witnessed, 72; baptisms, 70; collected on the field, on salary, \$1245. I assisted in a meeting at Green Mountain Baptist, 31; also, at Ebenezer Church, Baptised 18; at Beulah, Baptisms Crab Creek. I have been preaching at Riverside, as it is in a settlement destitute of Baptist preaching, and needs cultivating with Baptist doctrine. I also preached for French Broad Church, as it had gone down to 27 members last year, and was almost a destitute Church. I have baptized 10. Those two Churches have in the last year almost doubled their membership. I have supplied Shaw's Creek Church. The Board was not able to pay me for last year's labor, and I was compelled to stay at home and see after my family, and raise money to pay my expenses. If I could have labored in the destitute parts of the Association, I think I could have accomplished much more good. Yours in Christ, most humbly submitted,

REPORT OF HISTORIAN.

To the Carolina Association: Brother Moderator—The action of your last session at Beulah Church, which excited the most interest, was the recommendation to start another Baptist paper for the West. Our last one, "The Western N. C. Baptist," having been consolidated with the "Biblical Recorder." in compliance with this request, and many others coming from other Associations; and also one from our Western North Carolina Convention, a Publishing Company was organized in the city of Asheville, and on the 20th day of March last, the first number of the "Asheville Baptist" was issued. It is a four-page seven column weekly paper, published in Asheville, at One Dollar and Fifty Cents per annum. With your present Historian, as Editor, the enterprise is thus far succeeding well, and seems to be meeting the demands of the denomination as a medium of communication and information. Judson College closed another successful session early in June, and President J. B. Boon, after a successful career of six years, retired and removed to Moberly, Mo., and engaged in the pastorate. The Board of Managers

have however been fortunate in securing the service of Dr. R. H. Lewis, late President of Kinston College, in this State, who becomes President, and who with an able corps of assistants, will open the next Session on the 30th day of August. Rev. T. J. Brook was ordained at Refuge Church, in this County. Your Historian having removed in the early Spring from this County to Asheville, is not informed of the progress made in Associational Mission work during the year. For this item of information you are referred to the report of your Missionary. Several churches have enjoyed revivals, notably, Mills River. Elder T. H. Plemmons is the present pastor, and under his labors, assisted by Rev. E. J. Morgan and Rev. James Plemmons, a most gracious revival has been recently enjoyed. At last account there had been thirty-four professions in thirteen days. Twenty-four had been baptized and the meeting had not closed.

We are glad to note that almost all of the conversions to the Churches are reported from the number of the Sunday Schools, then proving that the Sunday School is nothing less than the Church at work. Your Committee are pained to note the small number of church members engaged in the Sunday School work. Brethren, this should not be. Christ says to us, take up the Cross and follow Him, He being our model Sunday School Teacher. We think this Association should have one Sunday School Missionary, to work at least half his time in the bounds of the Association. To this end we ask your consideration. The Lord is doing wonderful things through the Sunday School whereof we are glad. Let us renew our efforts and trust God for greater results. Respectfully submitted,

CONSTITUTION,

We, the members of the Baptist Church of Jesus Christ, who have, on profession of our faith in Him, been immersed, believing that the Holy Scriptures are the only standard of faith and duty for Christians, enjoining as they do zealous and continued effort in promoting the cause of our blessed Lord, do now unite in this Association under this Constitution, for the advancement of

the objects therein stated.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be called the CAROLINA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, and shall be composed of representatives chosen by each church in the Union, from among the number of its own members, who shall carry to each meeting of the body, certificates of their election, with a statement of the membership, conditions, and prospects of the church they represent, the names of its licensed and ordained ministers, and such contributions as have been made for benevolent objects, which shall be appropriated only as the donors may direct.

II. This Association shall meet annually, and shall be organized as soon as the names of the representatives are enrolled, by the election of a Moderator, a Clerk, a Treasurer, and a Historian, by ballot, who shall hold officess until the next annual meet-

ing.

III. Each church shall be entitled to a representation of three delegates, and an additional one for every fifty members in excess of one hundred, and all ordained ministers shall have seats as delegates.

IV. The Association shall be governed by such rules of or-

der as it may from time to time adopt.

V. Any church holding the principles of the doctrines of Christ, and the order of His house, as generally held by those denominated Baptists, may connect itself with this Association

at any meeting of the same.

VI. The decisions of the Association shall, in all cases, except in the matter of amendments to the Constitution, be made by a majority vote, but amendments to the Constitution must be adopted by a two-thirds vote. Amendments may be adopted at any meeting of the Association.

VII. The Association reserves the inalienable right to withdraw from any church that abandons the principles of this or-

ganization.

VIII. This Association holds that the Churches of Christ, though not possessed of any sovereign authority, are, nevertheless, in their government, independent of each other, and of all other ecclesiastical organizations, and accountable to no tribunal, but to Christ only, and holds that while it is the duty of all Churches, in temporal matters, to be obedient to the laws of the

land, in spiritual matters, they should be obedient alone to Jesus Christ, their only head and law-giver.

IX. While this Association holds that each Church of Christ is an independent body, as above stated, it rather regards itself as an advisory council, but will not presume to dictate for the Churches, but will give counsel, which the Churches may receive or reject; but the Association is of opinion that the best mode of settling differences between Churches, is to take the same scriptural steps as are prescribed for the settling of difficulties between members; that the Church that feels aggrieved should send a statement of the cause of grievance to the sister Church which gave the offence, and if it will not give Christian satisfaction, then call upon one or two sister sister Churches to assist in a settlement, and if the offending Church will not listen then, then report the same to this body, which will not pay any attention to such complaints unless the above course of procedure has been complied with.

X. This Association will not admit, or receive, any Church into membership in the union, that is known to be in disorder, or composed of members excluded from another Church of the same order of this Association.

XI. Any Church in good standing in this Association shall at any time be allowed the privilege of withdrawing from the same by letter.

XII. This Association may correspond and form a brotherly union with any Baptist organization holding similar views of doctrines and duty with those held by this body.

XIII. This Association may appoint as many boards, or committees, as may be necessary for carrying on the business and accomplishing the objects of its organization. These, when so appointed, shall make reports at the times appointed, by the Association.

XIV. The Minutes shall be read and corrected, if necessary, in the morning of each day of the session, and at the close of the last day.

XV. As the business of the Association must be finished before its adjournment, no member shall be allowed to depart from any of its sessions without leave.

XVI. The objects of the Association shall be the circulation of the Scriptures in destitute places, the encouragement and aid of Foreign, Home, Conventional, and Associational Missions, Education, Sunday Schools and Temperance.

XVII. The Association shall keep a book in which this Constitution, and a minute of each session, shall be recorded, which book shall be present at every meeting of the Association.

RULES OF ORDER,

1. The annual meetings of the Association shall open by singing and prayer, at half-past ten o'clock, on the Thursday before the 2d Sunday in October in each year. At this hour the Moderator, or in his absence the Clerk, shall call the members to order, when the certificates will be presented, and the names of the members enrolled. This body will then be organized by the election of officers, and thus organized, attend upon the introductory discourse, at the close of which the Association will take recess or proceed to business.

2. The order of business is to open the door—1. For membership. 2. For correspondence. 3. For any business coming up regularly.

3. The Association shall on each day open and close with prayer by the Moderator, or a brother, at his request. The title of "brother" shall be used in all the meetings of this body.

4. The Moderator shall preside in the meetings of the body, keep and decide questions of order, subject to appeal from members.

5. Questions shall be decided by "aye" or "no;" doubtful cases by the rising of the members to their feet until they are counted.

6. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, except those ordered by ballot.

7. In all cases by ballot, the Moderator may vote: in other cases he may not, unless the body be equally divided, or unless his vote, if given to the minority, will make the division equal, and in that case the question shall be lost.

8. A member may, on motion, submit any subject to the consideration of the Association that relates to its design or objects, and if seconded, it shall receive due consideration, except it be withdrawn by the mover with the consent of the body.

9. If two or more members shall rise to speak at the same time, the Moderator shall decide the priority of right.

10. It a member shall violate any of these rules, any member may, but the Moderator shall, call him to order.

11. No member shall speak on the same subject oftener than twice, without leave of the Association, except to explain.

12. A member, in making a motion, speaking, or in debate, shall rise and address the Moderator respectfully.

13. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.

14. When the Moderator is putting the question, or addressing the body, no member shall walk out of or across the house; nor, when a member is speaking, enter into private conversation, or pass between the speaker and the Moderator, but all are required to pay strict attention.
