## PROCEEDINGS

### FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION

Mt. Moriah Baptist Church, October 6, 1927.

The fifty-first annual session of the Carolina Baptist Association met with the Mt. Moriah Baptist Church and was called to order by the moderator, W. B. Sinclair.

W. A. Morris, pastor of the church, extended a welcome to the visiting delegates and led in the devotional services.

At the call of the moderator, the following churches answered with their letters: Balfour, Bat Cave, Bear Wallow, Beulah, Broad River, Double Springs, East Flat Rock, Ebenezer, Fletcher, French Board, Fruitland, Hendersonville First, Holly Springs, Liberty, Mills River, Mt. Page, Mt. Gilead, Mt. Moriah, Mud Creek, Pleasant Hill, Refuge, Saluda, Green River, Horse Shoe, Shaws Creek, Tryon First, Tryon Second.

On motion it was voted to give those delegates who did not have their letters an active voice in the deliberations.

The following officers were elected: Moderator, J. J. Slattery; clerk, A. G. Sargeant; treasurer, Foster Bennett; historian, A. I. Justice; auditor, M. L. Walker.

A standing vote was offered by the association for the past services of W. B. Sinclair as moderator.

A call for representatives of our denominational interests was made and no one responded.

J. R. Owen of Mars Hill was recognized as a visitor.

The following new pastors were introduced to the association: S. J. Parrish, Saluda; H. J. Davis, Tryon; M. L. Lewis, Balfour; N. B. Phillips, Fairview; A. G. Sargeant, Hendersonville.

Arthur Jackson read the Treasurer's Report for W. A. Garland. Upon motion the report was received as information and referred to the executive committee for further discussion.

The following report on Periodicals presented by M. L. Lewis and discussed by O. B. Kelly, was adopted:

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS

Men who really think, put their best thought in print. Therefore when we read our denominational periodicals we are reading the best thoughts of the best people. The great things of our Lord's Kingdom are freely discussed in our weekly and monthly religious papers. Every Baptist should read them. The Biblical Recorder gives us valuable information concerning the work in our state that cannot be had from any other source. Pastors should try to get their people to read it more. It might pay them to pay half the subscription price for the first year to any of their members who would pay the other half.

The Home and Foreign Fields is a monthly paper that gives us first hand information concerning our Home and Foreign Mission work. Every member should know what his denomination is doing. He can get it better from these periodicals than any other source.

Charity and Children carries out its mission wherever it is read. Its weekly visits tell us important things about our family of more than five hundred children. For sixty cents you can hear from your family every Sunday morning for a year.

Royal Service and World Comrades should not be overlooked by the ladies and children. We are letting the daily newspapers crowd out the above named papers. We should look well to what our children read. They are going to read something. "Show me your books, papers and graphophone records, and I will read your thoughts if not your character." Good literature is cheap at most any price, while

trashy literature is very costly, even as a gift.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

As we approach this subject we realize that it is not a new one because many of our institutions have in the last year rounded out one hundred years of activity in organized work for Christian education.

North Carolina's own Baptist college, Wake Forest, was organized in 1834, and the beloved school of this association, Fruitland, has passed its quarter of a century in the field of Christian service.

While Southern Baptists have their colleges in the different states, we also have two seminaries, one located at Louisville, Ky., and the other at Fort Worth, Texas. Both of these institutions admit both men and women students. The W. M. U. Training School, being located in Louisville, its students attend the classes of the seminary. The Baptist Bible Institute is located in New Orleans and admits both men and women to its classes.

All our colleges and academies had an unusually good session in 1925-26 and we trust the sessions of 1927-28 will be all we could hope for them to be.

It seems to be the opinion of some people that we should give all of our attention and means to higher education and do away with our academies. But if Christian education means giving our young people right ideals of life and God then it seems to us that our academies ought to be strengthened because many fine boys and girls never have the privilege of more than a high school education.

May we hear the voice of our risen Saviour afresh saying, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations."

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

It is the information of your committee that most of our churches maintain a Sunday school of one kind or another. In some communities Union Sunday schools are being conducted by Baptist people in co-operation with others.

Perhaps the most significant thing in connection with our Sunday school work during the past year was the Enlargement Campaign conducted by Secretary J. N. Barnette and other state and southside work-

ers. In this campaign eleven churches co-operated with great benefit to their respective Sunday schools from the study for a week under a trained teacher of the textbook, "Building a Standard Sunday School."

We recommend that all our Sunday schools adopt the Standard of Excellence prepared by our Sunday School Board as an aim or goal to work toward. Free information will be sent by the Sunday School Board in regard to this important work. Trained teachers can be secured to conduct classes. We may become proficient if we wish to do so. We commend this to our pastors and superintendents for their earnest consideration.

Many of our Sunday schools are taking once-a-month offerings for the support of the Thomasville Orphanage. We recommend that all do so. Clubs of Charity and Children may be secured by the Sunday school at the rate of sixty cents a year. It is a good thing to have the paper ready to be handed out each Sunday morning.

#### REPORT ON WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Mrs. Edna R. Harris, state corresponding secretary, Miss Emma Leachman, Home Mission field worker, and Mrs. A. E. Hampton were the chief speakers. Each one brought a soul stirring message. The East Flat Rock ladies entertained royally. A large number of the societies answered the roll call with excellent reports.

The following are the officers for 1927-1928: Superintendent, Mrs. Eugene Coker, Balfour, N. C.; assistant superintendent, Mrs. Harley Justice; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Marion Walker; assistant secretary-treasurer, Mrs. Fred Bowman; young people's leader, Mrs. Arthur Jackson; mission study chairman, Mrs. John S. Forrest; stewardship chairman, Mrs. John Perry; personal service chairman, Mrs. Howard Bennett; Ruby Enlistment chairman, Mrs. L. P. Carter.

Due to the fact that six months of 1926 we had no superintendent, we can give only a partial report as follows: Number of societies, 23; churches, 36; members of societies, 285; women members of churches, 671; churches having W. M. S., 13; Y. W. A., 2; G. A., 2; Sunbeams, 4; R. A., 1; without any missionary society, 23; letters and postals written, 51; societies organized, 4; miles traveled, 242; societies visited, 4; number having personal service, 8; societies observing week of prayer, 8; number of Home and Foreign Field taken, 37; Biblical Recorder taken, 65; Royal Service, 78; World Comrades, 8; number of points reached on Standard of Excellence, 5.

While there is much room for improvement we are glad to be able to report that there is a forward move along all lines in many of our churches. Yet we are sorry to find that several of them are dragging and making no progress at all. Some seem to be out of harmony with our co-operative work altogether. Candor forces us to make this statement. Yet we hope the day is not far distant when there will be union and harmony in our effort to carry forward the kingdom work.

#### MORNING SESSION, OCTOBER 7, 1927

Called to order by Moderator at 9:30. After reading a portion of the sixth chapter of John's Gospel, John Guice led in prayer.

On motion the regular order of business was suspended and the clerk was asked to read the minutes of previous day's session. After correction the minutes were adopted as read.

Melton; Sunday Schools, H. L. F. Drake; Periodicals, William Blackwell; Temperance, E. E. Lance; States of Churches, R. P. Corn; Woman's Missionary Union, Mrs. Eugene Coker; Ministerial Relief, C. E. Blythe; Obituaries, R. M. Pryor; Orphanage, W. B. Sinclair; B. Y. P. U., Junius Huggins.

J. B. Guice, P. E. McCall and E. G. Ross were appointed a Committee on Resolutions.

Home Missions Report presented and discussed by N. A. Melton.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

One of the oldest and one of the most important phases of our Baptist work is that of Home Missions. Even before the organization of

the Southern Baptist Convention in 1845 this work was being carried on by churches and associations. During the eighty-two years of our convention's history our Baptist Home Mission Board has done much in ministering to the needs of the growing south, needs which are becoming more and more complex with the passing years.

The work is now prosecuted by means of the following departments: 1. Co-operative Missions and Enlistment. This work is carried on in conjunction with the state mission boards of the several states and results in close co-operative relations with the state agencies. 2. Evangelism. Citywide, associational and statewide campaigns are conducted from time to time with the results of many conversions and a general uplift of the cause of Christ. 3. Independent and Direct Missions. This department includes at present the work among the Jews, deaf mutes, soldiers and seamen, foreigners, Indians and negroes. 4. Cuba and Panama. Evangelism and teaching are carried on in both of these countries. 5. Mountain Mission Schools. Dr. J. W. O'Hara, superintendent, says, "First class work is being done by noble, consecrated men and women, who are devoting their lives to this great task of leading thousands of students to higher aims and purposes in life and to greater efficiency in life's service." 6. Southern Baptist Sanatorium. This is located at El Paso, Texas, and is for the treatment of tubercular patients. 7. Church Extension. The church building and loan fund now amounts to about \$1,325,000. Many loans have been made to churches and the interest from these loans continually increases the principal. The average time of the loan is from one to five years. 8. Publicity. This department is constantly disseminating information in the forms of leaflets, tracts and books.

Because of the great falling off in contributions from 1920 to 1924 the Home Mission Board has been greatly embarrassed with debt and has been compelled to retrench along almost all lines. The great need at the present time is continued loyalty and more sacrificial giving to the cause of Christ which is fostered by our Home Mission Board.

The Baptists of North Carolina and particularly of the Carolina Association have good reason to be grateful to the Home Mission Board because of the co-operative work maintained at Fruitland Institute. Appropriations for buildings and for maintenance are made from year to year which has made possible the wonderful service of our school.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

It has been nearly a century since the Baptist State Convention was organized, and all through these years its mission board has been its agency to carry on its work. It is not overdrawing to say that Baptist progress along all lines in North Carolina is the outcome of State Missions.

The following clipping from a communication by our efficient secretary, Dr. E. C. Maddy, of July 27, puts State Missions in a nutshell. We give it as follows:

"The State Mission Board was organized with the convention in 1830. This agency has been the John the Baptist in Kingdom building in North Carolina. Almost every church in the state today that is a great Kingdom force is a trophy and product of State Missions.

As the years have come and gone, there have come new needs and new problems with each decade. The State Mission Board, with the vision and virility of youth, has adjusted itself to each new demand and met with wisdom and statesmanship each new responsibility thrust upon the denomination.

First there came the organization of the Woman's Missionary Union

as Auxiliary to the Baptist State Convention in 1886. Under the leadership of Miss Fannie E. S. Heck, Mrs. W. N. Jones and Miss Elizabeth Briggs and others, the W. M. U. has done more to set forward the great mission program of North Carolina Baptists than any other one agency since our organization in 1830.

Then came the great Sunday school movement under Spilman, Moore and Middleton, until today North Carolina ranks with the first states of the south in Sunday school work.

Out of the very life of the churches came the great movement for the training of our young people. Perry Morgan has led the B. Y. P. U. forces of the convention now for eight years and truly the future of our denomination is sure and promising with such training for Kingdom service.

Within the last few years there has grown up within our schools and colleges a demand for the unification and co-ordination of all our religious activities and agencies. So out of this need came the Baptist Student Union in the colleges and schools of North Carolina and the south. Our board has now three student workers at three of our state schools."

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

Jesus Christ loved children. At no time in his earthly life did he speak harshly to them. On the other hand he exhorted his disciples to be kind to them. At one time when mothers were trying to press through the crowd to present their children to Jesus, he said unto them, "Suffer little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of Heaven." Again he said, "Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones." The spirit of the child is the spirit of the kingdom. Our attitude toward the helpless shows our attitude toward Christ. For he has said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The Orphanage at Thomasville was established with great sacrifice and is in a real and vital sense our institution. It is very near to our hearts and is at the threshold of our benevolent institutions. It appeals to our hearts as no other institution does. It is the embodiment of Christ's instructions to care for the helpless. This institution cares for more than 900 mothers and children each year. But with all the aid that is given to it from all sources the Orphanage cannot meet the demands which are made upon it. Can we hear the cries of the helpless and not respond to their needs? "Charity and Children," the Orphanage weekly paper, can be obtained in clubs of ten or more for sixty cents per year, and is worthy of a place in every Baptist home in North Carolina.

We, your committee, recommend that a special representative be appointed in the association to see to it that a special collection be taken in every church each month for the Orphanage. Let us give to this institution our most hearty and loyal support that our own lives

may be filled with the riches of His grace.

Arthur Jackson and W. B. Sinclair introduced their report on Digest of Letters calling attention to the gains made in the past year. The report was adopted. (See Statistical Report at back of Minutes.)

Request for a one minute representation of the lay members of each church was made and delegates from the following churches responded: Bear Wallow, Mt. Moriah, Beulah, Saluda, Hendersonville First, Mud Creek, Tryon, Shaws Creek, Tuxedo and Fruitland.

Communications were read by Arthur Jackson and A. I. Justice setting forth the fact that an agreement had been reached between C. E. Maddry and M. A. Huggins representing State Education and the Trustees of Fruitland Institute relative to the Centennial Campaign for Christian Education as follows:

1. The campaign for Fruitland Institute shall be merged into the general campaign for education.

2. The goal for the campaign in the Carolina Association shall be \$10,000. The division between the State Education Fund and Fruitland Institute shall be on a "50-50" basis up to \$8,000. The remainder shall be turned into the general Centennial Fund.

This arrangement was heartily approved by a unanimous vote of the association.

The Obituary Report was presented by O. B. Kelly and adopted.

RESOLVED, That we hereby request all our churches and those interested in "All day singings" or "Conventions" to arrange for them on some day other than on Sunday, since they are very detrimental to our Sunday schools, and other church services, taking a great number of people away from many of their regular religious duties.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 2

RESOLVED, That we reassert our loyalty to the United States government in the enforcement of the Volstead Law and in its efforts to suppress the liquor traffic.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 3

RESOLVED, That we, the Carolina Association, do hereby express our heartfelt appreciation to the Mt. Moriah church and community for the sumptuous hospitality and co-operation during the session of this association.


