Constitution of the Atlantic Baptist Association.

- 1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."
- 2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.
- 3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their own edification and for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.
- 4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.
- 5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.
- 6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post office, delegates, and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.
- 7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, of whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued 'till the church be recovered or dropped from this Association.
- 8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.
- 9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall beentrusted the prosecution of Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, cooperate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts

and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time

of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall con-

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by

a two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY = LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches,

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right

4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.

5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians,

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited

to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by

"Mell's Parliamentary Practice."

11. The Report of the Executive Board, and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The General Order of Business shall be:

The "Biblical Recorder," the organ of the State, is devoting itself with increasing zeal to our work, and ought to find its way into every Baptist home in this Association.

We also commend to our brethren, "Charity and Children," the organ of the Baptist Orphanage, and urge a more general patronage of the "Foreign Journal," of Richmond, Va., and the "Home Field," of Atlanta, Ga.

Your Committee especially recommend to this Association the cordial endorsement of the action of the Southern Baptist Convention in continuing with increased energy the publication and extension of our "Kind Words Sunday School Series," and we earnestly commend them to the patronage of the Sunday Schools of this Association. REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

At our last Association it was resolved to do more work for Associational Missions (working in conjunction with the State Board) in our Association and through the Executive Committee for the coming year than had been heretofore, feeling that too little interest was felt in this great work by our own people. We are gratified to report decided progress. God has specially blessed our efforts, and, during the year, we have raised in our own Association \$615.40 and this does not include the amount that we are to receive from the State Board. We are also glad to state that our beloved Missionaries have faithfully labored and God has abundantly blessed their labors, and now we wish to go forth in the coming year and double what we have done in the past year. To do this we will have to rely upon the Churches and their members. Brethren, as God has blessed you, we ask you to contribute liberally to this object. We also earnestly urge upon you the great need of an Evangelical Colporter to travel through the destitute sections of our Association and preach the Gospel, and distribute Baptist Literature, and we earnestly hope that this matter will be put in some definite shape at this session, and that the services of a Colporter be procured at once, and this work begin at an early date.

The report on Antioch Church was read and adopted

Your Committee to whom is referred the letter from Antioch Church asking permission to withdraw from the Atlantic Association to join the Tar River, beg leave to say that in their judgment, the reason assigned, namely the difficulty of reaching the church from this Association, does now obtain with as much force as formerly.

1. Because the completion of the R. R. to Greenville now brings us closer to them, within four miles by rail.

2. Because the Executive Board contemplate arranging a field along the line of this new road, of which Antioch would be an important part.

We, therefore, recommend that this Association request Antioch Church to reconsider and withdraw their request. But, if upon consideration of these new conditions, the church still thinks it to the interest of the Master's cause to change their associational relation that permission be granted.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Brethren of the Atlantic Association. This subject of Home Missions is one of great importance and should engage the attention of every Association in the State. We have now on the field, in the different States and Territories, 371 Missionaries; churches and stations, 1,182; baptisms, 4,477; received by letter, 3,621; total additions, 8,098; Sunday Schools organized, 336; teachers and pupils, 12,420; churches organized, 267; houses of worship built, 84; tracts distributed, 857,400; Bibles and Testaments, 5,728.

Our people have done a good work also among the negroes of the South, in the Indian Territory, and in Cuba. God be praised for such grand and glorious re-

sults. Let us, as a body of Christians, strive to do more for the cause of Christ in the future, than we have done in the past. Respectfully submitted,

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION.

KINSTON, NORTH CAROLINA. Thursday, Oct. 30. 1890.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator at 10 o'clock. Rev. T. J. Baker conducted the religious exercises. Proceedings of Tuesday and Wednesday read, corrected and adopted.

The Report on Foreign Missions was taken from the table and the discussion continued, after which the Report was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The past ten years in the history of the Foreign Board of the Southern Baptist Convention have been years of special growth and enlargement. God's richest blessings have rested upon his servants in their desire to obey, in cheerful toils, the great commission of our Divine Master. The work, as it now stands before us in the last report of our corresponding Secretary, presents * the most gratifying results and the most encouraging prospects for the future.

The Board has now upon the field 78 foreign and 86 native workers. The amount received for the support of this work the past year was \$109,174.20.

Of the 78 foreign Missionaries in the employ of this Board, 19 have gone out from North Carolina. The

contributions from our State have been sadly disproportioned to such a call from God upon our men and women. It is gratifying, however, to note that certain Associations have become responsible for the support of a Missionary, and there are signs of increasing liberality to this great work. It not only is a place for the training of the children, but also a place for the study of the Word by adults—yea even by the aged. We therefore think that every church member has an appropriate place in the Sunday Schools.
