REPORT ON ORDER OF BUSINESS.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The creed and history of our denomination ally us as a people with Education, and all right educational policies and agencies. We believe it to be our duty to foster and promote the education of all the people in the

It is intended to have at least one Sunday School Convention in each Association during the year. We have held one since our last meeting. We are requested also to co-operate in an effort for special training in the Sunday school work, and to have our officers and teachers take special interest, our membership should be greatly increased. A few facts copied from the *Biblical Recorder* may arouse us to greater activity:

"We have 214,000 church members and 150,000 Sunday school scholars. You see the Sunday schools are only 70 per cent. as large as the churches they ought to be larger. This is true in 459 of our churches. There are ?00,000 white children in North Carolina, from four to twenty-one years old, in no Sunday school. Every year over 8,000 white children and 20,000 negro children get old enough to go to Sunday school. Yet, from 1905 to 1908 the net gain in all the Sunday schools in North Carolina was only 20,000 for the three years.

"The above facts are true of over 60,000 children reaching the age of accountability each year. Nearly 300 of our churches are without Sunday schools, and 800 Sunday schools close for winter."

THURSDAY MORNING

Religious exercises conducted by J. K. Faulkner. At 10:30 the Association was called to order by the Moderator. Minutes of previous day read and approved.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention made a most hopeful and encouraging report for year 1908. What burdens our growth has laid upon us. How our responsibility has been increased by the very success of our work in distant countries. The work has grown to be so large, and has been crowned with such wonderful success, that we are forced to give far more to missions in order to fill the large place God has opened for us.

METHODS OF WORK.

The main thing is the preaching of the gospel, and all that is done is aimed directly toward reaching the people with the Evangel of Christ. There are some valuable aids to the work of preaching. One of these aids is the educational work. We have 142 schools with 3,846 scholars. Four of these are women's training schools, and eight theological schools. We have four printing plants which print hundreds of thousands of religious tracts, periodicals, books and Bibles in the languages of the various countries.

FINANCES OF THE BOARD.

The total receipts for the year were \$460,797. The Convention fix d the estimate for this year at \$537,500. North Carolina is asked to give \$45,000. The Beulah Association is asked to give \$165 of this amount

Expenditures were as follows: Expenses in Richmond, 7 per cent.; in various States, $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent; for interest on money borrowed, 2 per cent.; sent to foreign fields, $87\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of total receipts.

A DECADE OF DEVELOPMENT.

In ten years we have grown from 82 missionories, 845 baptisms. \$109,267 contributed—average 7 cents per member, to 231 missionaries 2,905 baptisms, \$460,797 contributed—average 22 cents per member.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We recommend that special effort be made to secure a contribution for Foreign Missions from every church in the Beulah Association, and from every member of the various churches.

We urge all of our people to subscribe for the *Foreign Mission Journal*, and that they read the leaflets and tracts sent out for information.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The signs of the times are favorable for Home Missions. The million alien immigrants who come into our country each year, the still larger number of native people who move annually into the Southwest and West, the wonderful industrial change now in progress in the South—such facts as these have been used of God to arouse His people to the urgent necessity of taking and holding this land for Christ.

The task proposed is great, and demands devoted attention. Of the 90,000,000 people in the United States, only 20,000,000 are members of evengelical denominations. Of the remaining 70,000,000, 12,000,000 belong to Catholics and other sects, while 58,000,000 make no profession of religion. The forces which tend to make this situation worse are active, powerful and determined.

Among the Christian denominations, none has such a great opportunity and responsibility in winning America for Christ as have Southern Baptists. No other mission board in America last year showed results in conversions, baptisms and additions to churches at all comparable to those which attended the efforts of the missionaries of our Home Mission Board, which is located at Atlanta, Ga. Vet, the Northern Baptists, Northern Presbyterians and Northern Methodists each spent more than three times as much for their Home Mission work as Southern Baptists spent. Northern Baptists raised for Home Missions \$904,798, and had 8,462 Baptisms. Southern Baptists raised \$283,436, and had 25,109 baptisms. The total *additions* to mission churches last year from our work was 47,808, which is more than two-thirds the entire *membership* of the Home Mission churches of Northern Baptists.

In the Southern mountains, at a cost to the denomination at large of only about \$5 for each student, our Board last year conducted mission schools in which 4,316 mountain boys and girls were educated.

In the Southwest great gains came to Southern Baptists through Home Mission endeavor. Home Board work in this department cost about \$70,-000, and there were in it 33,000 additions to mission churches. The State Boards had a large share in this work, but the result is none the less gratifying.

Among the negroes the evangelistic work of the Board in co-operation with the National Baptist Convention (colored) is wonderfully successful. In fact, the Home Mission Board, in each department, brought in a harvest for the brotherhood and for Christ which was beyond precedent. Yet, the Board feels that it is but beginning to enter upon the larger work of administering for Southern Baptists their larger gifts, which will enable them indeed to take and hold the Southland for Christ.

We recommend more liberal and frequent collections for this work, and that each church get up a club of subscribers for the *Home Field*, the admirable monthly magazine of the Board, and that our pastors make it a point to preach more frequently to their churches on Home Missions.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

Your committee begs to report as follows: That this Board is located in Durham, N. C, designed to furnish necessary aid to ministers who have given their lives to the ministry, and in their declining years are not able to provide for themselves and those dependent upon them. The committee is glad to state that more money has been raised up to date this year than for the corresponding length of time last year. We are asked to raise \$3,000 this year, and have raised \$1,900 to date.

We have now 32 on the Board. This means in some cases husband, wife, and from one to three or four children. Sometimes it means the old brother, sometimes the widow. So you see it means there are this many families represented. There are several applications pending for action of the Board in August.

The amount asked for means only about \$100 to the family, a sum often entirely inadequate to meet the needs of the case. This being true, we have not been able to meet the urgent requests and pitiful pleas that have come to them. It has been our painful privilege to receive from nearly every one of them this year the sad intelligence of their many needs and various wants. These requests are pitiful and sad, and should enlist the sympathy of all Christian people. Your committee, therefore, earnestly request all the pastors, or some layman, in each church, to see that this Board's work is represented in every church, and that they co-operate with us in bringing the needs and wants of these old Baptist preachers and their families before the people, and urge an increase in contributions during the next year.
