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TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS (Revised August 13, 1954)

ARTICLE I—The name of this body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the Churches.

ARTICLE III. (1) The Association shall have power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) the association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time if it is still their will they may be voted in by majority vote of the association provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V. The association shall hold its regular session on Thrusday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The Moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure.

ARTICLE VI. The officers of the association shall be a moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday School superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union superintendent, superintendent of Evangelism, President of Deacon's organization, Brotherhood President, and superintendent of Education.

ARTICLE VII. The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the moderation. (2) He shall appoint all committees pertinent to the operation of the body. (3) The vice moderator shall assist the moderator and in case of the absence or incapacitation of the moderator he shall act in his stead until otherwise provided for. (4) The clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all the transactions and reports given in the association in regular or called meetings and cause to be printed a minute containing the records made. (5) The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the

State Convention Office. (6) The treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the executive committee the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (7) It shall be the duty of the historian to keep the record of the association up to date. (8) It shall be the duty of all other officers to execute the function of their office pertinent to a well directed association.

ARTICLE VIII. All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body.

ARTICLE IX. The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the moderator, vice moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday School superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union superintendent, superintendent of Evangelism, President of Deacon's organization, President of Brotherhood, superintendent of Education, associational missionary and nine other members appointed by the moderator. Seven of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII. The associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the moderator.

ARTICLE XIII. The association shall have the right to withdraw fellowship from any church which become heterodox in doctrine, or disorderly in pratice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomation at large and of this association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the association.

ARTICLE XIV. The association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst, the members of these committees to be nominated annually by the committee on committees unless otherwise determined by the association.

ARTICLE XV. This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read on the previous day of the association. Otherwise two-thirds majority of the votes cast must be in favor of the amendment.

BY-LAWS

1. All vacancies in the elective officers and in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

2. The Executive Committee shall meet at a time and place desig-

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nated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman.

3. Each church clerk shall mail to the clerk of the association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

4. No church shall be received into the association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.

5. Duties of the committees of the association:

- 1. Order of Business Committee: This committee shall plan the annual program for the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.
- 2. Committee on Committees: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committees.
- 3. Finance Committee: This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year.
- 4. Resolutions Committee: This committee is to report suitable resoultions at the annual meeting of the association.
- 5. Nominating Committee: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.
- 6. Credentials Committee: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.
- 7. Committee on Organization and Reception of New Churches: This committee shall have the responsibility of advising with groups proposing the organization of new churches and offer such suggestions as are deemed advisable, and submit a written report of same to the association or Executive Committee and grant to the proposed church a certificate of Commendation which must be presented with the first letter of the church to the association. This committee shall be composed of the Baptist Pastors of the Churches of the Tuckaseigee Association. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. The Chairman of the committee shall be named by the committee on committees.

Thursday, August 12, 1954

This year we had fifteen special workers for our enlargement campaign. A very fine spirit of cooperation was displayed. Several Training Unions were set on their feet again and two were newly organized. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the Associational Training Union officers who have served so faithfully in the past year for their cooperation and unselfish service.

Let us as an Association realize every possibility as far as Training Union is concerned and do our part to see that every person has an opportunity to attend the Baptist Training Union.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Tuckaseigee Association should have an especial interest in the report of the activities of our colleges. The main reason is that we have a state sponsored college in our county and the fact that a positive relationship exists between Western Carolina College and the various Baptist colleges.

What have Baptists done during the past year that affects Western Carolina College? Some years ago the State Convention became aware of the importance of helping college communities (Baptist and otherwise) secure the finest leadership possible by making funds available to supplement local salaries. We, and members of the Cullowhee, church especially, realize the full effect of this fact. At the State Convention this year the convention bound itself to continue and broaden this previous committment. Not only has the convention recognized the invaluable services of the college pastor in our own Baptist schools, but in state schools.

Developments in other fields may be briefly stated as follows: Our total enrollment in now around 6,000 in our seven Baptist colleges; permanent improvements are presently being made in each institution and plans are being made for the future growth and development; plans for Community Colleges, ie, junior colleges in several localities, in addition to the present ones, are being pushed.

Our seven schools, Wake Forest, Mars Hill, Wingate, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Meredith and Campbell, face fierce adversities. In order to attract students their teaching staffs. physical plants and stucent products must compare favorably with the state schools. The State is putting increasingly great sums of money into their schools. We must do our best to match this or our schools cannot hope to be as attractive.

The Wake Forest Building Program and move to Winston-Salem is moving along at a steady pace. The Southeastern Seminary showed a large increase in enrollment during the past year.

The purpose of our Baptist schools is to train personnel for Christian leadership. The colleges are surely succeeding in their purpose. for most of our trained ministers and lay leaders have been totally or partially trained at Baptist schools of higher learning. For judging the achievements of the labors of our colleges all that must be done is to look about you and see that the leaders have been trained in Baptist colleges. This reason alone amply justifies our sincere moral support and continued financial backing in the promotion of the growth of our Baptist schools in North Carolina and the Tuckaseigee Association.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

"And He healed many that were sick" (Mark 1:34). This statement refers to the ministry of Jesus when He was here in the flesh. Also, it describes the ministry of our Baptist Hospital today, where hundreds of sick people go each week in search of relief from disease and sickness of almost every nature. In many cases they go as a last resort when hope has all but failed. They go saying, "We have spent all our money and we are still sick. Can our Baptist Hospital help us?"

It is the business of our hospital to say, "Yes" to these pleas which come out of sickness and poverty. It is our opportunity through our Mother's Day Offerings to make it possible for our hospital to answer these calls for help from those who have little or no money.

The hospital admitted 10,886 persons as bed patients and rendered a total of 92,476 days of patient care last year. There were 49,205 visits made to the clinics for examinations and treatments. A large number of these were people who couldn't pay for the care they received. Much of this service could not have been provided without the help of our Mother's Day Offerings. These funds are used exclusively to help pay the hospital expenses of these patients who can pay only a part of their hospitalization or nothing at all. The hospital provided tree service in the amount of \$527,299.99 in addition to free doctor's care to needy persons in 1953.

Free hospitalization for regularly-ordained ministers and missionaries who devote their full time to the ministry is provided unrough the Out-Patient Department. Such persons pay fifty per cent of the cost of private accommodations if they elect to enter as private patients. A fifty per cent discount is given on all work done for actual dependents of pastors and missionaries. These discounts amounted to \$23,-242.67 in 1953.

Originally built as an 80-bed institution, the hospital was enlarged in 1942 to a capacity of 250 beds and 50 bassinets, The new South Wing is now being used as the construction is completed and the equipment is secured. It will increase the capacity of the hospital to 450 beds, including bassinets.

Patients and their families are visited daily by chaplains. A religious program is provided for nurses and medical students. Classes in Bible, marriage and the family, psychology of nursing and sociology are taught in the school of nursing. Personal counseling is available for students and personnel. Sunday School is conducted on Sunday mornings for children and adult patients. Vesper services are held two nights a week for students, hospital personnel and patients.

The hospital has a School of Nursing which is fully approved by the North Carolina Board of Nurse Examiners. Normal enrollment in the school is about 170. A class graduates each summer, and a new class is admitted each September. This school has graduated 605 nurses since it was opened in 1923. The Medical School has graduated 492 doctors since it opened in 1941.

Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethern, ye have done it unto me" (Matthew 25:40). Let us give our best in the name of the Lord in meeting and accepting the opportunities of helping the sick people who need the services of our Baptist Hospital.

E. Dodd said, "A non-reading Baptist is a non-informed Baptist. A non-informed Baptist is a noncooperative Baptist, and a non-cooperative Baptist is not much of a

Baptist."

"Seek ye out of the book of the Lord, and read: No one of these shall fail." Isaiah 34:16. Every book that is truly religious represents man's search for God, for ultimate reality, for a knowledge of the most High, for the assurance of forgiveness. Such literature represents man in some fashion or other seeking after God, and trying to describe the almighty in human language.

The Bible is different from all other Christian literature, in that in it God is seeking after mankind. From the beginning to the end of the Bible we find God is seeking to find the children of men and turning them into the true way of life. W. A., Tell, Sunbeam Activities, Broadman Comment, and many other books and papers that can be obtained from our Baptist Book Store.

The advice that Paul gave to us in 2 Timothy 2:15 is a challenge to all: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of Truth."

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

The fourth Associational year of the Baptist Homes for the Aging has been one of considerable expansion and encouraging progress. There are many evidences of the continued blessing of God upon this newest phase of our North Carolina Baptist program.

A step forward was taken when the Albemarle Home opened its

doors on December 7, 1953. It afforded space for 35 additional residents making the total capacity of the two Homes 54 residents—Resthaven, Winston-Salem (19), and the Albemarle Home (35). The purchase price of the property at Albemarle—Hospital and Nurses Home buildings and 3 acres of land—was \$25,000. The cost of renovation was about \$75,000, thus making the total cost of this plant \$100,000. But, with the value of the equipment donated, the property there should now be worth at least \$300,000. Good fortune was ours again in securing the splendid staff of helpers at Albemarle. Rev. Zeb A. Caudle, former pastor of the First Baptist Church of Aberdeen, was selected to serve as superintendent of the Albemarle Home. Both the residents of and all who have visited, the Home have been greatly pleased with the program of service.

Resthaven, at Winston-Salem, which began operating March 16, 1951, has been filled to capacity throughout the year. Although the ages in both Homes range from 67 to 94 years, there has been no death within the past year. The general health has been remarkably good, and the spirit of satisfaction on the part of the residents has been most encouraging. The greatest loss came from the retirement of Miss Edna L. Heinzerling, supervisor of Resthaven since its opening. She had rendered most acceptable service. Mrs. Ethel Fulghum a resident of Resthaven, was selected to act as supervisor temporarily.

A tract of 34 acres of land, just outside the city limits of Winston-Salem, was purchased in 1953, for a central site for new buildings. The cost was \$25,000. A topographical map has been made and an architect engaged to prepare sketches of buildings to be erected on this central site, as money and circumstances will permit. It is the intention of the trustees, however, to proceed with one building at a time. The first unit will furnish space for additional residents and for offices, chapel, infirmary, laundry, refrigeration, etc. It is hoped that construction of the first unit can get underway within a year.

Inquiries have been received as to the possibility of a couple erecting a cottage on the central site, so that they might live in it until death, and then the cottage would be available to another couple. The cost of erecting and furnishing it would be paid by the couple, but it would become the property of the North Carolina Baptist Homes.

The second Special Day Offering, February 21, 1954, was encouraging. The total amount will probably be \$65,000 to \$70,000. In addition, the Homes received \$21,000 as their share of the Nine-Year Program. Word has come, too, of wills, from which the Homes will receive gifts. At least one will was probated in 1954, from which estate the Homes will receive \$2,000. But the most encouraging progress has been the response, on the part of our churches, to the program of the Homes. More and more of them are beginning to support the Homes through the Special Day Offering, or by specially designated gifts. These evidences indicate the future success of the Homes in providing more facilities and accomodating larger numbers of aging friends.

The residents and all who are serving in the Homes are deeply grateful for the help received thus far, and they covet the prayers and

continued support of our Baptist constituency in the future. Respectfully submitted, T. C. Bryson

It is true that there is a great tax on this, and that this tax money goes to a good cause of some kind. We see in our newspapers where large sums of money are turned over to our school systems. On the other hand, have you ever seen published in our papers the effect of alcoholic beverages even in our state upon humanity? Have there been published the number of accidents and the number of people who have who have lost their lives as a direct cause of alcoholic beverages? Have you been to the courts of Jackson County and seen the number there on the docket for drunken driving? Have you seen the number published of homes broken up by this drink? Have you seen the number published of innocent children who had to suffer from the lack of food and clothing? Have you seen published the number who are in our state mental and medical hospitals as a direct cause of intoxicating liquors? We are having to expand our hospitals to take care of this.

We have church members today who state that alcoholic beverages are here to stay and that there is not much we can do about it. It may be so, but sin has been in this world ever since Adam and Eve ate of the forbidden fruit in the garden of Eden, but we do not have to compromise with it or lay down our guard against it.

As brothers and sisters in Christ I urge you to renew your faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and take a definite stand against this when

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

"Ge ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the son, and of the Holy Ghost," as commanded by Jesus does not mean that Christians are to be interested only in the salvation of those people in foreign fields. This is well proven when we consider the significance of Acts 5:8: "And Stephen, full of faith and power, did great wonders and miracles among the people." Also, Acts 5:42: "And daily in the temple, and in every house they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ."

Jesus sent his disciples before him and said unto them, "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few: Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he would send laborers into his harvest."

As recorded by the 1954 Annual Report of the Home Mission Board, the past year was one of the best in the history of the Board. The missionary force of the Home Mission Board was 992 exclusive of the summer workers last year. These missionaries preached more than 113,850 sermons and reported 31,849 conversions. Also, 706 mission stations were opened and a total of \$419,184.00 was spent in purchasing and improving properties by these missionaries.

The Home Mission Board cooperated in 124 simultaneous programs of Schools of Missions using 328 missionaries in 831 weeks of mision service to reach 2,303 Baptist churches and 925,151 people with the message of missions last year.

Last year the Board distributed 188,749 copies of study books edited and published under the direction of the education department.

Last year it took 21.8 Baptists to win a convert as compared with 27 in 1944. Also, in 1944 more than one-fourth of the churches reported no baptisms while last year less than one-fifth reported no baptisms.

65.4 per cent of Southern Baptist churches now have full time services compared to 38.3 per cent six years ago.

The Home Mission Board is ministering to 37 different nationalities in the homeland and twice our present missionary force is needed to reach these people with the gospel. Also, \$3,500,000 is needed to build mission churches and chapels for the congregations belonging to these language groups.

During the first four years of the Five-Year Crusade, the workers of the Home Mission Board have increased in number from 754 regular and 271 student missionaries to 937 regular and 366 students. The total number of professions of faith for the four years was 131,404, and 2,573 missions were started.

During these four years churches have reported 1,467,829 baptisms. Approximately 1,710 new churches have been constituted. The value of church property has increased from \$645,271,741 to \$1,020,504,214.

The Home Mission Program is progressing; however, the work is far from a finished program. In fact, there can be no finish. The command and the challenge are ever present. May we as Southern Baptists put forth every effort to follow our Savior's commandment and meet the challenge that confronts us.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Coopertive Program is the plan and means of Southern Baptists whereby they seek to put into practical operation the Great Commission of Jesus. It is the program which enables the local church and the individual member of every church to share in all of the work of Southern Baptists. This is accomplished when the individual member places an offering in the offering plate of the local church at any service, if any part of that offering is given through the Cooperative Program. Through this plan, a Christian and church member is enabled to carry on the multiple ministry by means of his representatives around the world.

This plan has been proven by years of experience and is that which is used by our North Carolina Baptist State Convention and by the Southern Baptist Convention. It is the most effective plan yet devised for carrying on a World Mission Program. We commend it most heartily to all our churches.

According to our Associational Minutes of last year only thirteen churches of our association gave directly through the Cooperative Program Others gave designated gifts to objects in the Cooperative Program, but even with these the percentage is far too low for our association. In fact, it will remain too low until every church is giving directly through the Cooperative Program.

There is cause for alarm at this point, for a report from the Treasurer in Raleigh shows that during the first six months of this calendar year only ten of our churches have made offerings to the Cooperative Program. The trend should be upward, rather than downward. As an aid to this situation we urge all churches who have not given through the Cooperative Program this year to make an offering on Cooperative Program Day which is September 5, of this year. To do this will be a blessing to the churches and a way of honoring our Lord.

We hope to be able to report one hundred per cent participation in the Cooperative Program when we come to the Associational meeting next year.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

During 1953 the American Bible Society distributed throughout the world more than 15 million volumes of Scriptures.

In 1953 Southern Baptist Churches gave \$102,010 to the American Bible Society.

Gifts from churches of all denominations totaled \$785,897.

As we begin our new Associational year we face in a unique and opportune way a great challenge to accomplish more for the givery of Christ than ever before. In 1955, from April 10-24, Simultaneous Revivals are to be held in our area. This period of time is designated by the Southern Baptist Convention as the time when all the churches of our area can join together in concerted effort to bring men to Jesus Christ. Let all the churches of the Tuckasegee Association plan now to have a week or two weeks period of evangelistic services during these days set apart. Let us plan now, pray and work toward those days and God will richly bless us as we will surely experience a real revival of religion. The Association is making plans to stimulate interest and enthusiasm in this great effort. Dr. J. C. Canipe, Secretary of Evangelism for the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, will be in our Association Feb. 23-25 to lead us in the evangelistic rallies in preparation for the Simultaneous Revivals in the churches.
