



BEN C. COOK 1886-1979

"Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in Heaven". Matthew 5:16

This scripture verse depicts well the life of the Reverend Ben Cook for he did let his life shine among the people of Jackson County for eighty of his eighty-three years.

Ben Cook, the son of a Baptist Minister, was often referred to as a "horseback circuit preacher" and a "Builder and Founder of Churches." An able evangelist he had great concern and compassion for people. As a result of his preaching and teaching he built or caused to be built not only the physical structure, but also the spiritual foundations for the body of believers who attended.

Ben Cook was not only a preacher but he was a family man, a neighbor and a man of God. He spent his life spreading the "Good News" to his fellow countrymen in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. While he is now gone to his eternal rest, his memory, faithfulness and good works will continue to live in the lives of the people in this part of the country.

It is to this great man of God that these minutes of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association is lovingly dedicated. Ben Cook walked tall among the members of this Association.

#### **PROCEEDINGS**

Thursday, August 16, 1979 Balsam Grove Baptist Church

The one hundred fiftieth annual session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association convened with the Balsam Grove Baptist Church as host, at 6:30 pm on Thursday, August 16, 1979. The host church served a delicious meal to 15 pastors, 72 messengers and 24 visitors, representing 27 churches of the Association. The moderator, the Reverend J. C. Robinson, called the meeting to order and presided throughout the two day meeting. Mrs. Mary Bennett led the Congregational singing using as the opening hymn "Send The Light". Mrs. Sherri Smith served as organist.

The following business was transacted:

1. The Reverend Abe Brooks, pastor of the Balsam Grove Church, gave the devotional emphasizing the Great Commission and our part

2. A motion was made and passed that the BOOK OF REPORTS be adopted.

3. The moderator gave a report on the work of the Executive Committee. A copy of the report is recorded in these minutes. The Reverend Robinson urged all pastors and lay representatives to attend the Executive meetings held each quarter.

4. The moderator recognized the following pastors new to the Association and present at the meeting: Abe Brooks, Ben Cabe, Max Lindsey, John Reid, and David Blanton. Pastors making changes

in churches within the Association were asked to stand.

5. The Director of the Balsam Grove Baptist church, Clifford Parken, led the church choir in some musical numbers. Mrs. McMahan, sister of the Reverend Cook sang with the choir.

6. The Reverend Kenneth Varner, a missionary serving in Tiwan but at present on furlough, spoke briefly on the work in that country and left the congregation with the challenge: "Do you believe in Foreign Missions?" "Then listen to God and heed his teachings and do His work."

7. J. T. Flake gave a special welcome to Mr. & Mrs. Charles Ginn who have returned to the Association to live and make their home.

8. The Reverend Luther Osment explained the new approach to the State Mission offering which is being implemented for the first time this year. North Carolina's part of two million dollars does not exceed greatly the former goals set for the six mission offerings formerly supported by this same offering.

The state mission report is included in these minutes.

9. The Reverend Harry Vance, Association Treasurer, gave the financial report in the absence of the Financial chairman. This report was accepted and Vance highly commended for his fine reports and the manner in which he kept the finance records.

10. Wesley Hooper presented the Committee on Committees Report. 11. The Nominating Committee report presented by Robert Blanton,

chairman, was accepted and approved.

12. The Reverend Jack Hinson of the Constitution Committee presented the report on the Constitutional changes being proposed. The proposed changes will be voted on during the second session business meeting.

13. The Reverend John Reid, Chairman of the Continuing Education Committee, told of plans projected for Seminary Extension work. Both certificate credit and Seminary credit at Fruitland may be earned by taking these courses. The classes will begin on September 9, 1979. THE LIFE OF CHRIST will be taught by Reverend Conley at the Hamburg church and again at Rockdale Church. These courses are open to both pastors and laymen. The cost is \$7.50. Scholarships are available. Reid presented certificates to those persons completing the course or courses offered last year. Those receiving certificates were: David Blanton, Tommy Moore, Ray Houston, L. Phillips, Richard & Laverne Moore, Dillard Moore, J. E. Carnes, Robert Blanton, T. Ensley and K. Miller.

14. The Reverend Jack Hinson reviewed the work being done in the C. J. Harris Hospital by Chaplain Frank Anderson. He commended Anderson highly for his work. He reported that four additional churches had been added to the list of those giving to the Chaplaincy fund this year. An increase in the amount of gifts this year over last amounted to \$432.33. He urged continued support of the ministry and reported a trust fund being set up to help promote this work and provide a more secure financial basis for operation of this ministry. The Foundation is being set up under the chairmanship of Dr. James Dooley and the Reverend Terry L. Hammill.

15. The Director of Missions, Alvin A. Loiry, presented two items of business. First, he felt that as an association we should participate in the Churchmanship Conference set for Camp Caraway in March 1980. The purpose of this conference is to provide training in associational leadership. The registration fee is \$20 with an \$80 cost for lodging and meals. He suggested that the association send someone and pay expenses. Second, the new Church Training program has come out with some new material in the form of an Equipping Center which consists of eight separate areas. The cost of this material is \$87.32.

A motion made by John Reid, seconded by Billy Rogers that the Church Training Equipping Center material be purchased and kept in the Associational Office for loan to the several churches was passed.

A motion made by Hinson, seconded by Hyatt, that two people be sent to the Churchmanship Leadership Conference at Camp Caraway with all expenses paid and that one of these be the Moderator of the Association and the other the Director of Missions was passed.

16. The Reverend Billy Rogers, pastor of the Yellow Mountain Baptist Church, brought the message using the title "The Church is God's Special People" and scripture from Acts 4:1. He likened the spiritual growth of the church to the present oil crisis and concluded that we all need to be annointed with fresh oil from God and become a living organism carrying on God's work.

17. The message concluded the first session of the Associational meeting.

August 17, 1979 Pine Creek Baptist Church

18. The second session of the annual Association meeting was called in session by Moderator Robinson at 9:30 AM. There were 24 churches represented with 15 pastors, 36 messengers and 17 visitors making a total of 92 persons.

19. The Reverend Ambrose and Mrs. Ambrose, Education Directors of the Sylva First Church opened the session with special music.

20. The Reverend Everett Wilson, pastor of Pine Creek Baptist

Church read scripture from 2 Timothy 2 and led in prayer.

21. Max Smith, Director of the Sunday School, gave a report on the accomplishments of that department for the year. The detailed report is recorded in the minutes. He suggested that the church place more emphasis on Bible Study the coming year.

22. Annie Hoyle, WMU Director referred to the report contained

in the minutes and shared some of the trends in the work.

23. J. E. Carnes presented the enclosed report for the Deacons and Pastors organization.

24. Ray McCall called attention to the Ordination Committee's

report.

- 25. In the absence of Mildred Cowan, Alvin Loiry gave the report on Truett Camp. Attendance at the camp has been good this year. Forty-nine preachers attended the preacher conference, 28 youth attend the music camp, 178 girls and 117 boys attended during their special weeks. In all 978 persons attended the camp this summer. The most urgent present need is for a building in which camp leaders can be housed. He urged churches to include Camp Truett in their budgets.
- 26. Coy Privitte distributed materials and urged churches to encourage members to subscribe to THE BIBLICAL RECORDER in order to keep abreast of what is happening in the Baptist World in North Carolina. He urged the support of the Christian Action League through prayer and contributions. Several incidents of misrepresentation and misinterpretation of some of our current laws were presented. Baptist should be informed and know how their representatives vote.

27. John Bunn presented the "A B C's" of Christian Higher Education. The representatives present were Abrams for Gardner-Webb,

Blackwell for Mars Hill and Clegg for Campbell.

28. Loiry speaking for Bold Missions presented a partial list of ways in which our state missions assisted in mission work in our Association. The list was distributed to all present. He reported that Miss Balleu, a U.S. 2er, would be working with the youth in our Association for the next two years.

The Association has been invited to assist with a mission project

in West Virginia this year.

The Home Mission Board is requesting each Association to accept and assume the responsibility for at least one Indo-Chinese family in the area. Support of such a family would not be a budget item but gifts from the several churches would be necessary. This item will be brought to the attention of the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

29. Hugh Starnes brought a report on the Baptist Children's Homes. He related some of the unique contributions made by churches in this association to the Broyhill Home. Such items as wood, home canned commodities, the opportunities to speak in the several churches and the four children from this association in the Broyhill Home.

The emergency care center for the Children's Homes is located in Forest City with 8 beds for children and the Hawthorne Heights facility in the Tuckaseigee Association, which may become affiliated with the Baptist Children's Homes in the near future. There are 30 children in Foster Homes at present. There is a critical need for more Christian people to keep children in their homes.

30. A motion made by Smith and seconded by Vance to adopt the changes suggested by the Constitution Committee be approved, passed.

31. In the absence of the chairman of the Finance Committee, Harry Vance presented the **proposed** budget with the following changes made

to the Proposed Budget as presented in THE BOOK OF REPORTS: That the item under section 5 Projects for Progress "Training for Association Leaders" be changed to read \$500 not \$250. Included as the last item in this same category should be "Associational Missions" \$200.00. The item listed as "Housing for Director" should be removed from "Properties" and placed under section 2 "Personal Benefits". These changes will increase the total budget for 1979-80 to \$21,058.

32. Harry Vance moved that monies left from the cost of the publication of the minutes be used to publish a history of the

Association. The motion passed.

33. Loiry recommended that the clerk be given an honorarium as a token of appreciation for the work done.

34. John Reid presented the following Resolution to be added to the list of Resolutions as stated by the Resolutions Committee:

We express our concern and our disagreement to the legislators representing Jackson County in the North Carolina House of Representatives and the North Carolina senate for their recent support to the legislature bill H B 936 which would have decriminalized possession of marijuana up to 4 ounces.

35. Robert Blanton, Interim Pastor of the Ochre Hill Baptist Church, brought the message selecting the scripture from Hebrews 12:13 and Tim. 2:2. The message was entitled "Follow Peace for all Men."

36. Annie Hoyle, Chairman of the Memorial Committee, presented a memorial service for the deceased members of all churches reporting.

37. Harry Vance brought the Benediction and gave the Blessing for the delicious meal following the close of the 150 annual session of The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

There was no afternoon session of the 150 annual session.

#### BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

The purpose of the Baptist Children's Homes is the care of dependent, neglected and homeless children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives.

In 1978 the lives of more than 4,175 people were affected in a

significant way by the services of the Children's Homes.

The Homes provided care and related services for 1,440 children. Of this number 1,140 received continuing service while 340 received casework, counseling and referral services. Applications for 79 children were in process of evaluation at the end of the year.

Through members of the staff, a close working relationship was maintained with 2,222 adults while working with the children. Consultant services were provided more than 400 other adults through

Child Development and Family Education services.

In Piedmont North Carolina the programs, services and facilities of the Homes are being utilized well for the care of children and

in providing assistance to families.

Mills Home, foster homes, emergency care at Burlington and Charlotte, the Family Resource Center in Charlotte, the High Adventure program at Wall Home, the Child Development Center on the Mills Home Campus, programs of crisis intervention, counseling and family education fill a particular need in this area of the State.

As in other areas of the state, requests are coming for additional

community-based services.

Approval has been given by the Planning-Zoning Commission and the City Council of Chapel Hill for the development of the Gree-Burris Home near Chapel Hill.

In Eastern North Carolina the Indian Memorial Cottage at Odum Home has been completed and dedicated. Odum Home has been made an area center of operations for eight counties in the southeastern part

of North Carolina.

The Kennedy Home campus near Kinston continues to be the largest scene of child care activities in the eastern area. The regular cottage programs are maintained along with several specialized services which have been made available to children needing special help.

At Kennedy Home work is now proceeding on the preservation and restoration of Cedar Dell, the residence of the Kennedy family which donated this property to North Carolina Baptists for a child care ministry in eastern North Carolina.

People in Western North Carolina, with the establishment of Broyhill Home, as a center of operation, now have all the services

which are provided elsewhere in the state.

During the past several months, members of the Children's Homes' administrative staff have been in dialogue with members of the Board of Directors of Hawthorne Heights group home near Sylva who have requested the assistance of the Children's Homes in providing emergency service for children in a seven county area in the far western part of the state.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, in its 1977 Annual Meeting, voted to request the Children's Homes to develop a three year pilot program to serve mentally retarded adults. A committee from the Board of Trustees has engaged in a constructive study of services needed for this population in North Carolina. It is anticipated that a home will be provided for a small number of mildly retarded adults during 1979.

Modern day child care, as provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a Christian Ministry and as we continue to expand and meet this growing need there is always a need for

additional capital.

Changes within the Baptist State Convention's financial support structure for her institutions and agencies increase the necessity for intensive cultivation of individuals, families, industry, business, foundations and endowments. Free counsel, printed materials and assistance are offered as suggestions for estate planning that involves charitable bequests to the Homes by the Development Department.

This report is respectfully submitted for and in loving memory of my husband, Tom Clayton, who was always deeply grateful to the Baptist of North Carolina for providing him a home. He served as a member of The Board of Trustees of the Baptist Children's Homes from 1965-1978. He served as Children's Homes Representatives of the Tuckaseigee Association for many years.

#### CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Continuing Education Committee was re-activated in January of this year. Planning meetings were held, the Seminary Extension Department of the Southern Baptist Convention was contacted, and in April two courses were offered. The Rev. Al Loiry is serving as Director of our Association Seminary Extension Department.

Through the channel of the Foreign Mission Board they have responded in part by sending from among their number men and women called missionaries. These messengers have gone to help share the good news of Jesus Christ in other lands--wherever there is invitation or opportunity. At the end of 1978 the total missionary staff was 2,906. New personnel gain in 1978 was 130.

Today Southern Baptist express their missions conviction in terms of the primary challenge and objective of Bold Mission Thrust: To provide every person on earth the opportunity to hear the gospel

by the close of this century.

Southern Baptist seek to do their part, to be faithful in their responsibility. Your Foreign Mission Board added four new fields in 1978. At years end, missionaries were assigned to 94 geopolitical entities around the world.

Total gifts for Southern Baptist Foreign Missions in 1978 reached \$64,995,017. Of this total Cooperative Program and Lottie Moon

Christmas Offerings provided 91.92 percent.

I am happy to report that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association also believes in being faithful, doing its part and supporting Foreign Missions. A good percentage of our churches are involved in missions through WMU's Cooperative Program and Lottie Moon Christmas Offerings.

#### HOMES FOR THE AGING

One of the outstanding things that has happened in connection with the North Carolina Baptist Homes for the Aging is the completion, dedication and occupancy of the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville. This new home will accommodate 50 residents.

In Winston-Salem a new apartment complex has been completed and will accommodate 16. The North Carolina Baptist now have provision

for the accommodation of 300 persons.

The Baptist homes are located in the following places: Resthaven, The Hayes Home, Apartments, The Skilled Nursing Unit, in Winston-Salem; the Albermarle Home; the Hamilton Home; the Yanceyville Home and the Western North Carolina Home.

Not having the special offering usually contributed on the third Sunday in February has caused the homes to dip into endowment funds. Once the new plan of contributions coming through the North Carolina Missions Offering in September, it is hoped that the Homes will be on a more secure financial basis.

The Cooperative Program supplies about 8% of the total budget. While this is a steady fund it does not provide all of the support

needed to keep the Homes operating adequately.

Five out of every six people, who cannot pay the full cost of care, and are living in the Homes are supported particially through love gifts from the North Carolina Baptist.

Two new administrative staff members--Jack Hoyle, Director of Admissions and Social Services and the Reverend Jim Saul, Director of Denominational Relations and Development have been added to the administrative staff as replacements.

Because ministry to an older person is a ministry unto Christ, we must keep this ministry close to our hearts and not forget to give abundantly to the North Carolina Missions fund in September.

When North Carolina Baptist call the college/university roll, there are seven institutions that will respond; namely, Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Meredith, Wake Forest and Wingate. According to the latest figures 15% of all Baptist college enrollments are located in this state.

This year enrollments were stable. Wingate College made history by graduating the first senior class; Campbell, once known as a senior college announced a name change to Campbell University; the

Campbell Law School graduated its first class.

All North Carolina Baptists are now aware of the current discussions between Wake Forest and the Council Committee to study the Wake Forest University Proposal. The Council will make its recommendation to the General Board, and the General Board will report and recommend to the Convention.

The Council on Christian Higher Education joins in encouraging the churches to elect responsible and informed messengers to the Convention. The results of the vote will affect the Convention and Wake Forest for many years to come. The churches are called upon to pray.

#### HOME MISSIONS

"There's a call comes ringing o'er the restless waves, Send the Light". "Send the Light"--Baptist of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association! We are indeed making an effort to send a small part of the Light in our efforts to respond with boldness to the Bold Mission program launched in 1977 by the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Before we can become concerned about missions we must know. In order to know more, key leaders in our Association have given of their time and energy to attend meetings and workshop at Ridgecrest and other places. They have returned to us and have shared and are sharing the information they received. Their enthusiasm has stirred within our hearts a desire to do more in the form of giving and in praying that every person might hear the gospel message and know that Christ is our Lord and Saviour.

The fifteen men and women from our Association who attended the Leadership Conference will bring information to Association in an associational meeting in September. We want to watch for that date and attend that our knowledge might be increased and our enthusiasm and zeal might be fed.

The major theme in the Division of Church programs has been growth in membership in all of the organizations in our churches. Reports have been rewarding in the field of church growth. A goal

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN C. J. HARRIS COMMUNITY HOSPITAL July, 1978--June, 1979

Four thousand, three hundred five (4,305) inpatients passed through the hospital July 1, 1978 through June 30, 1979. This is an average of 358 patients per month. Here were 4,305 opportunities to mediate the compassion of our loving heavenly Father.

During the past year, 36 churches, one person and a community service gave \$3,393.18 for the Chaplaincy. This represents an increase of \$433.72 over 1978. Four more churches participated in

the program for which we are most grateful.

The Chaplaincy Program is made possible by the voluntary cooperative effort upon the part of the majority of the Christian denominations in Jackson County. A standing committee of the Jackson County Minister's Association supervises the program. Churches are urged to place the program in their budgets, making their donations monthly.

In addition to the voluntary gifts from the churches and individuals, a Chaplaincy Foundation has been established to further secure the chaplain ministry. The Board of Trustees of the hospital

will invest the funds.

Dr. James E. Dooley, Vice Chancellor for Development and Special Services at WCU, and Rev. Terry Hammill, Pastor of First United Methodist Church in Sylva, are the Chairman and Vice Chairman for a campaign for the Foundation in mid-October. The campaign, promoted by representative citizens of Jackson County, will seek \$30,000. The interest will provide a supplement to the current annual contributions from County churches.

Jesus said, "Inasmuch as you have done it unto one of the least of these (sick) my brethren, you have done it unto me." Here is a challenge, a privilege and a stewardship to give an account for!

#### STATE MISSIONS IN NORTH CAROLINA

Through more than fifty different types of ministry, State Missions programs of the Baptist State Convention are at work in North Carolina. Let us look at a few of them.

MIGRANT FARM WORKERS--These are some of God's most forgotten children. Because of their mobility and poverty, they are "outsiders" wherever they go. Through State Missions you are helping us sponsor migrant mission programs in twelve associations, including the Hendersonville area.

AID TO ASSOCIATIONS -- Almost all State Mission programs involve local associations. Furthermore, a large portion of the state convention budget goes to assist associations with their programs. All but two associations in the mountain region receive financial

assistance from the State Missions.

TRUETT CAMP--The camp is one of the fine ministries provided for boys and girls in Western North Carolina. It is located near Hayesville. In addition to the seven weeks of youth camps, Truett hosts Bible conferences, missionary and pastors' meetings, and church retreats. More than half of the Truett budget comes from State Mission sources.

DEAF MINISTRY--This ministry includes two full-time missionaries plus a statewide television ministry ("Light Unto My Path") for the deaf. One of the newest areas of Deaf Ministry is a program for deaf students at Gardner-Webb College, sponsored jointly by the college and the State Convention. Gardner-Webb is the only Southern Baptist college with a program for deaf young people.

CORRECTIONAL MINISTRIES -- Working with men, women and youthful offenders in the state's 79 correctional institutions, it is one of

the fastest growing State Mission Ministries.

FRUITLAND BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE -- With 200 plus students, no educational institution has meant more to the pulpits of Western North Carolina than Fruitland. Fruitland's total support comes from State Missions.

#### TRUETT CAMP

Western North Carolina's Truett Camp has had a struggle in past years but is now recognized as one of our valued assets.

During the past year Truett Camp has progressed considerably through the combined interest, faith, and cooperation of the trustees, committee, and churches of the western region. Some of the improvements which may be mentioned are: Renovation and upgrading of the swimming pool, stainless steel kitchen equipment to replace the old aluminum which is no longer accepted by the State Department of Health, enlargement of the parking area, painting where needed, upgrading of the living quarters and facilities there, and a long dreamed of outdoor chapel for vesper services and presentation of dramas has been erected. Much of this work has been done by Brother Kenneth Crawford, Camp Supervisor, himself. Others have made sizeable donations and have given hours of volunteer labor.

Truett Camp offers three weeks for girls, grades 4-10; one week is designed to teach youth music skills on the individual study basis. This week is for both boys and girls. Three weeks are scheduled for boys grades 4-10. Brother Bob Watson of the State Brotherhood organization plans and leads the program for this week.

We are pleased to report that a number of youth from several Tuckaseigee Association churches have attended these camp schedules which offer Bible study, mission studies, and Evangelistic training along with a reasonable amount of supervised recreation. Some have made committeents for mission or religious work and professions of faith have been made through the leadership of State workers.

It is interesting to note that youth from "Down East" are coming

to Truett Camp in the mountains.

The Associational WMU has offered assistance and some churches have given scholarships to assist or to send deserving boys and girls to Truett Camp. May we suggest that churches having Brotherhood organizations do the same for worthy boys who could not other-

wise attend camp.

Our program this year has been better advertized through the distribution of brochures to all the association churches, through magazines, newspaper coverage and by radio stations. #### CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE REPORT

The following amendments to the Constitution have been presented to the Constitution Committee for presentation at the Annual Meetings of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

1. Article V, Sec. 1--in the second sentence, after the words "special meetings", insert the phrases, "of the association".

2. Article VI, Sec. 1--in the list of General Officers change "Director of Evangelism" to "Chairman of the Evangelism Committee".

3. Article X, Sec. 2--The second sentence reads: "This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter."

Add to this sentence, "except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July". Also add: "Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to churches."

4. Article XI, Sec. 1--Add to this section, "A person can not serve on more than two committees at one time." Also, "A person can be reelected to serve on a committee, after a one term period off

the committee."

Article XI, Sec. 2--To the list of committees to be nominated by the Committee of Committees add: Order of Business Committee.

#### CONSTITUTION

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979.)

#### ARTICLE I Name

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

#### ARTICLE II Objectives

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.

2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.

3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.

4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually, and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.

5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### ARTICLE III Authority

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

#### ARTICLE IV Membership

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership should be presented to the Credential Committee of the Association. Upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee the church will automatically come under the watch care of the association for one year. During that year, the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except that of voting. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a 2/3 vote of the messengers present and voting at the regular meeting of the association, provided that the church submit an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a 2/3 majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such

vote is to be taken by written ballot.

SECTION 4. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the

next annual meeting.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

#### ARTICLE V Meetings

SECTION 1. The Association should hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Board provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof and not to exceed ten

messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

#### ARTICLE VI Officers

SECTION 1. General Officers of the Association shall be:
Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer,
Historian, Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be Sunday School
Director, Church Training Director, Church Music Director, Director
of Deacons, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Director of Continuing Education, Chairman of the Missions Committee, Director of
Associational Missions and such other officers as the Association
may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: Truett Camp (2), Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Hospital, Homes for the Aging, Baptist Literature (Biblical Recorder), Cooperative Program, Other Representatives (such as the American Bible Society, Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation, etc.) may

be added as deemed appropriate and properly elected.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Associational Missions the term of office for all officers of the Association shall

be for one year with the privilege of continuing reelection. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the Annual session with the exception of the treasurer who will serve from

October 1 through September 31 (the financial year).

SECTION 3. Director of Associational Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 30 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the Director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the Annual Meeting of the Association is scheduled within sixty days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting

and financing his work.

#### ARTICLE VII Duties of Officers

SECTION 1. THE MODERATOR shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. THE VICE MODERATOR shall assist the Moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. THE CLERK shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention office. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the Association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

SECTION 4. THE TREASURER shall receive and disburse by the order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the Association at each session.

SECTION 5. THE HISTORIAN shall keep the records of the association up to date.

SECTION 6. THE PARLIAMENTARIAN shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

SECTION 7. THE PROGRAM LEADERS AND THE INSTITUTIONAL/AGENCY REPRESENTATIVES shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS shall work closely with the Associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to

facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the Association as set forth in Article 2.

The Director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. The Director shall communicate with the State and Southern Conventions such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

#### ARTICLE VIII Rules of Order

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

#### ARTICLE IX Quorum

The Annual Associational quorum shall be not less than 25% of the member churches represented.

#### ARTICLE X The Executive Committee

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the Association and the pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer or Program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

#### ARTICLE XI Associational Committees

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

A person can not serve on more than two committees at one time. A person can be reelected to serve on a committee, after a one term period off the committee.

SECTION 2. THE COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES shall be appointed by the Moderator at the first Executive Board Meeting of the Associational year. There shall be three members.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the annual meeting the following committees: Nominating, Credentials, Place and Preacher, Memorials, Finance, Constitution, Ordination, Evangelism, Missions and Order of Business Committee.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association including General Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional/Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior

to presenting of their names at the Annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the Association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or

fellowship with the Association.

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator at the first session of the annual session. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the Annual Meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last Annual Meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members

including the Treasurer of the Association.

This committee shall:

- a. Present a budget to the Association for the following year.
- b. Devise plans for raising the funds for the Association budget.
- c. Audit the finances and financial records of the Association twice annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee.
- d. Report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting. SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.
- a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.
- b. The Committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.
- d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the Committee.
- e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the Committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the Committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE

The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The Associational Brotherhood Director

and Woman's Missionary Union Director are to serve as ex-officio members along with the Director of Missions and the Moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be: To plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the Association through--

- a. Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting.
- b. Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association.
- c. To survey the mission needs to be found within the Association.
- d. Assist churches in doing mission work.
- e. Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

#### ARTICLE XII The Associational Council

The Associational Council shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Program Leaders (Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the Chairman of Deacons) the Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, the Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the Council is to co-ordinate the planning of the various programs of the Association, to develop an Associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organizations and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The Council shall meet quarterly.

#### ARTICLE XIII THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTOR'S CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastor's Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the Association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

#### ARTICLE XIV AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 30 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
