




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

CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, augels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another as one body in Christ. We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the Gospel through all nations. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion, to religiously educate our children, to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances, to walk circumspectly in the world, to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all talking, backbiting, and excessive anger, to abstain from the sale and use of intozicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Savior.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love, to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness or distress, to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of these rules of our Savior to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant and principles of God's Word.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association shall be denominated and known as the EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ARP. 2.—The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3.—This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from her membership, assembled in conference.

ART. 4.—The delegates from each church shall bear a Letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church: Provided, however, that when any church has prepared a Letter, and through inadvertence the Letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5.—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator. Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members, by ballot, by majority of its members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6.—It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7.—It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

Art. 9.—The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee in order that said Committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

ART. 10.—The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe Gospel order.

ART. 11.—The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privilege of the body, except that of voting.

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ART. 12.—The Annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13.—By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon

ART. 14.—This Constitution may be amended at any annual session, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

1-On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceeding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a Chairman pro tem. shall be elected.

2-Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3-At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4—The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that

courtesy which becomes Christians.

5-Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6-No member shall speak more than twice on the same question with-

out permission.

7—All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer, before discussion.

8-No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9—When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time; which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10-After a motion has been decided any member having voted in the

majority may move a reconsideration.

11-No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association, and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the Minutes.

12-All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be de-

cided by a majority of votes.

13-The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall

be admitted to consideration.

14-The Rules of Order may be altered and amended at any session of the Association, by a majority vote.

MT. OLIVE, N. C., October 9, 1900.

The Eastern Association met in its Fifty-seventh Annual Session with the Mt. Olive Baptist Church, at 11 a. m., Tuesday Oct. 9, 1900.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by R. H. Gilbert, South Carolina, Text: Col. 1:18. After the sermon a recess was taken for one hour.

The Association reassembled at 1:30 p. m. J. L. Stewart, Moderator of previous session, conducted devotional exercises by reading - Psalm. Benj. Ward led in prayer.

At the hour appointed for preaching by J. J. Adams, O. L. Stringfield, at the request of bro. Adams, spoke for the Baptist Female University, after which \$139.93 was raised in cash and pledges, all of which was turned over to O. L. Stringfield.

SECOND DAY, Wednesday, Oct. 10.-MORNING SESSION.

At 9 a. m., S. M. Carlton conducted prayer service. At 9:30 the Association was called to order by Moderator. Roll of Delegates called.

Letters from churches not represented the first day were handed in and the delegates named in them were enrolled.

The Minutes of previous day read and approved.

A. Johnston, from the Baptist Orphanage; N. B. Broughton, representing the Biblical Recorder; B. W. Spillman, S. S. Board; A. L. Betts; Raleigh; W. C. Newton and Mayor Peterson, Goldsboro; O. L. Stringfield, for Baptist Female University, were recognized and welcomed by Moderator.

Special Order: Report of Executive Committee together with report on State Missions. Report of Executive Committee was read by S. M Carlton, State Missions by Benj. Ward.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

For the past year we have aided the following brethren: Benj. Ward, at Maple Hill, Olivet, Castle Haynes; N. A. Shelly, at Richlands, Catherine Lake, Rose Hill, Jacksonville; J. H. Hildreth, at Providence, Salem, Turkey Creek; J. J. Payseur, at Brooklyn, in the City of Wilmington. In connection with the State Board we have expended \$425.00 on our Mission field the past year and baptized nearly 100 into the fellowship of our churches. Your committee asks for larger contributions to our State and Associational work.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

That State Missions is an important part of our work is evident by reason of the existing conditions and the work being done. In eastern North Carolina are many places in which the Gospel as preached by Bap-

tists is very little known. Western North Carolina calls loudly for help in developing the churches already there. The rapid increase of centres of industrial enterprises of the State presents a field for State Mission operations. The large force of volunteer missionaries have done a good work. Our work is now conducted on a basis of \$20.000 per year. We must all do our best that there be no backward step, but always a forward movement.

The reports were spoken to by B. Ward, B. W. Spillman. At this juncture, aid to build a house of worship for the Antioch Church was asked by Gaston Kelly. Further remarks by L. R. Carroll, O. P. Meeks, J. J. Adams, J. A. Powell, N. A. Shelly, J. H. Hildreth, L. B. Boney. On motion the matter of aid to Antioch Church was referred to Executive Committee. The reports were then adopted.

J. J. Adams submitted and read letter and report of the Woman's Missionary Society. On motion J. T. Albritton, said report is to have place in the Minutes.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF MISSIONS.

To the Eastern Association:—It is with great pleasure that the Woman's Central Committee of Missions reports to your body the most successful year in its history. For some time past it has been our custom to take an aim and motto for the year, and to bend our energies towards fulfilling these. In 1899 the Woman's Missionary Societies of North Carolina determined to endeavor to raise \$7,500. When we gathered in our Annual Meeting, last December, we were greatly gratified to find that we had far overshot our mark, and instead of \$7,500 reported more than \$8.700. Encouraged by this, the Societies have taken for their aim in 1900 the raising of \$9,500 for Foreign, Home, and State Missions. Our motte for the year is. Increase in Faith, Knowledge and Works. To reach our aim and fulfill our motto we are urging upon all our Societies Bible study, the reading of mission books, and increase in liberality. We have every reason to believe that the close of the Nineteenth Century will see this work far in advance of what we would have dared to hope for ten years ago. We desire to thank those brethren who have cooperated with us in making the Woman's Missionary work of North Carolina what it is, and would respectfully ask the aid of all interested in the furtherance of Christ's kingdom through mission efforts.

Report on the Orphanage was submitted and read by J. J. Adams.

Announcement--The Mission Societies will meet in the Presbyterian church at 2:30 p. m.

The Association adjourned till 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION--WEDNESDAY--SECOND DAY.

The Association re-assembled at 1:30.

On motion, S. M. Carlton, the Finance Committee was ordered to pay all money in their hands to the Treasurer, and that he pay the same to the several objects as designated in the Letters

Committee on Devotional Exercises report, That A. L. Betts preach to-night at the Presbyterian church, and W. C. Newton preach the Missionary Sermon in this church at the same hour; and they recommend that a cash collection be taken at each church, after the sermon, to aid the Antioch Church to build, the same to be turned over to the Chairman of the Executive Committee, to be held by him as a building fund to be used as the Committee may adjudge best.

Leave of absence granted J. F. Lewis, C. E. Daniel, R. H. Hewlett.

Letter from Rose Hill (Duplin), asking for membership, was read by J. H. Hildreth. On motion Moderator appointed J. T. Albritton, J. J. Adams, B. Matthews, a Committee of investigation to whom the said Letter was referred.

D. L. Gore, in accordance with the order of the last Association, tendered to the Association the note and mortgage securing the debt incurred for building the church house at Jacksonville, said note and mortgage being marked "Paid." Whereupon it was ordered that the Clerk receive and receipt D. L. Gore for the note and mortgage, and turn over the same to the Trustees of the Church at Jacksonville.

REPORT BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage never enjoyed greater prosperity than at the present time. There are 190 children under its care and we are glad to report them making excollent progress. The current fund for the past year was the largest in its history and the work was never so well organized as it is to-day. But the wider the work of the Orphanage, the greater must be its needs. The supreme need of the institution just now is more room for the accommodation of those clamoring for admittance, as needy and as worthy as those who are already there. One of the buildings--the Biggs-is shortly to be enlarged, and thus room will be made for at least ten more girls; but a new and large dormitory should be built at once, a building that will accommodate thirty children can be completed at a cost of \$2,500. The Mills Memorial Machine Shop is in process of erection, and it is hoped that it will be completed within the year. The Orphanage property is worth \$30.000. The farm is producing a good dividend and is a great factor in the training of the boys. The printing office opens another avenue of usefulnesa to boys, and many of those trained here are holding good positions in many sections of the State. The paper, "Charity and Children," turned a thousand dollars into the treasury last year after its expenses were paid, and the prospect is better for this year's work. We commend to our Sunday Schools the plan of taking one collection each month for the Orphanage, and call attention to the favorable terms upon which the paper may be obtained in clubs of ten or more. We urge that our churches increase their contributions to this worthy object of our love and care in the year to come, in view of the greater work before the institution.

The report was spoken to by A. Johnson. At the close of the address N. B. Broughton was asked to take collection for the Orphanage,

which he proceeded to do, to the amount of \$23.16, which was paid to A. Johnson. The report was then adopted.

J. T. Albritton, for Committee on Requests, made a verbal report to the effect that the investigation was satisfactory and recommended that Rose Hill Church (Duplin), be admitted into membership. The report was adopted and the delegates named in Church Letter enrolled.

Report on Ministerial Relief was read by C. E. Daniel.

REPORT ON MINISTERS RELIEF.

We are glad to report progress in this department of the Master's work. Last year the churches contributed \$2,000 to this object, which amount was judiciously distributed among the 17 beneficiaries now aided by our Board. We are informed by the Secretary of the Board that many faithful servants of Christ in the State are sadly neglected. We recommend that each church appoint one active member to look after this worthy object, and at least two offerings a year be made for the same.

Report on Periodicals was submitted and read by J. T. Albritton. Final leave of absence was given to J. H. Hildreth, Benj. Ward, O. Meeks, W. B. Hawes, and Gaston Kelly.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

There never has been greater necessity for the dissemination and study of wholesome religious literature than that which is upon us today. Nor has such literature ever been hitherto so abundant. Nothing surpasses it in copiousness except it be unwholesome literature. The story has been published that when Benjamin Franklin, the printer and lightning tamer, sought the consent of his prospective mother-in-law to marry her daughter, that practical woman, having an eye to the lard stand and meal barrel, raised the objection that there were already two presses in America and that she had serious fears of the country's ability to support so many as three presses at one time. America has, however, survived the strain of supporting three presses, and is to day supporting thousands of others of far greater capacity, which are flooding the land with all sorts of literature. Paul wrote prophetically, when he wrote to Timothy about "doctrines of devils." Political, religious, and so-called scientific devils have in modern times multiplied almost as rapidly as lrish-potato bugs. We can kill the bugs with Paris Green, and stop their ravages, but we can't kill the "divers devils," nor stop the spreading of their divers, devilish doctrines, which are finding their way into the homes of the country, and alienating neighbor from neighbor, and man from his Maker. How important, therefore, is the circulation of pure, wholesome, religious literature to the home-life and society at large.

Baptists should, by all means, have in their homes a good supply of denominational literature. We can get the "Biblical Recorded." for \$1.50; the "Carclina Baptist," for \$1.00; "Charity and Children," for \$1.00; "Foreign Mission Journal," in clubs of ten, for 25 cents; and the "Home Field," for 10 cents. All these good papers may be had for a whole year for the sum of \$3.85. It is impossible for a Baptist to read carefully these papers from week to week without being informed about Baptist faith and affairs throughout the world. We therefore would urge upon the brethren the advantage of taking their denominational papers, and paying for them in advance. Thus avoiding the affliction of

being haunted throughout the year by the grim spectors of unpaid subscription bills. We desire to commend to the brethren the Sunday School periodicals of the Southern Baptist Convention. They are cheap, and the very best in the world for our Sunday Schools. We close this report by recommending the adoption of the following resolution:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Statistics show that about two thirds of our churches are the outgrowth of Sunday Schools, and about 85 per cent. of our membership came to us through the Sunday Schools. This but convinces us of the great importance of the Sunday School work as foundation work. And we do insist that the most consecrated and intelligent brethren and sisters be employed in teaching in our Sunday Schools. If the children be taught Bible principles and doctrines they will become liberal supporters of the churches when they are brought within its pales. We recommend that our churches take one collection a year for our State Sunday School work. And that all of our Sunday Schools give one collection a month to the support of our Thomasville Orphanage.

It affords us an opportunity to help our brethren in States where our cause is weak, to give the Gospel to the Indians in our bounds, to assist our colored people, and to reach the foreign population in some of our great cities. It has given us a glorious highway into Cuba, along which we are carrying the testimony of our Lord and Saviour: the truth that makes men free politically, socially, and religiously. The Home Board is doing work along educational lines even in our own great Baptist State. It is helping us to maintain schools to give our preachers a chance to fit themselves for the preaching of the Gospel. It is doing a large and growing work in all our Southland

 \mathbf{a}_{Jd} in Cuba, and is filling a sphere that we have no other means of doing. \mathbf{l}_{t} gives us an extra means of growth and development along the lines of giving, in which we are sadly lacking as yet. We urge its more liberal support by our pastors and all the brotherhood.
