1,100 Students gather for apologetics and worldview conference passion to worship, love

After a robust turnout of 1,100 high school and college students that exceeded all expectations, organizers for Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary's first "20/20" apologetics and worldview conference say that it will not be the last.

The conference, held Feb. 4-5 and entitled "20/20 Collegiate Conference: Seeing Things Clearly in a World That's Blurred," took place on the seminary's Wake Forest campus. It attempted to instruct students on how to look at life through the lens of Scripture. Featuring speakers like Gary Habermas, professor of apologetics and philosophy at Liberty University, and Daniel Akin, president of Southeastern Seminary, the conference was a resounding accomplishment, according to all estimates.

"The 20/20 Conference was a wonderful success far exceeding my expectations," Akin said. "To see almost 1,100 young men and women with a

Mohler promotes 'biblical theology of marriage'

In a culture that has grossly perverted God's ideals of sex and marriage, the church of the Lord Jesus Christ must champion these gifts according to God's revealed plan, Albert Mohler, Jr., said in a two-day lecture series at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Mohler, president of The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky., was the featured speaker at The Carver-Barnes Lecture on Feb. 8-9. The lecture series recognizes W.O. Carver and W.W. Barnes for their outstanding contributions to theological

education and deals with topics related to the history and mission of the church.

In his lectures, Mohler took on such salient cultural topics as homosexuality, pornography and sexuality within marriage. His two Binkley chapel addresses were augmented by a Tuesday evening session in which he met with male college and seminary students for a frank discussion about pornography and Christian sexual ethics, followed by a brief question and answer session with students.

Mohler's messages, which sought to develop a "comprehensive understanding of a biblical theology of

marriage," began in Genesis 2 and outlined four characteristics of marriage: partnership, protection, procreation and pleasure. The problem, Mohler indicated, comes when society pursues sexual pleasure without the other three characteristics within the marriage relationship.

One form of sexual perversion into which society is "rushing headlong" is homosexuality, Mohler said.

"It is one of the most pressing pastoral issues you will face," he said, adding that "nothing less than the credibility of the Christian church is at stake" in the way it responds to the crisis.

"The most appropriate way

for us to think about this is to ask what kind of people we must be to be up to a challenge like this," Mohler said.

The answer, he said, is for Christians to be people of God's Word, to take its position in reference to the sin of homosexuality and to humbly show love to those mired in a homosexual lifestyle while extending to them the Gospel of Christ.

"If you take away the Bible, we have nothing to say," Mohler reminded students. "We're not smart enough for this. We're not clever enough for this. But it's not our wisdom that we use; it's God's wisdom."

desert of the Middle East, the outcry is the same. It is common for Muslims to cling to the erroneous belief that to be a Saudi, Pakistani, Malaysian, Egyptian, or Bengali is to be

Muslim. There are no exceptions. Period.

In this book, fifteen men and four women from eighteen countries and three continents present a different story. And readers will hear the story, too, of a young woman who, at this moment, yet stands at the crossroads between love and respect for family and what she knows is true. These testimonies demonstrate that the religious perspective of people in traditionally Muslim lands is far more varied than might be supposed. At this writing, some of these former Muslims are as young as thirty. Others are old enough to retire. Some are still in the poverty that has marked all of their lives; others grew up in some You must be a of the world's most affluent neighborhoods. One was born in the African bush, while others have lived surrounded by soaring skyscrapers, endless concrete, and non-stop traffic.

Whether from Iraq or Indonesia, Tanzania or Thailand, Saudi Arabia or Sri Lanka, these individuals were all brought up to be Muslim. They are first-generation believers in Christ, who converted with little or no Christian influence in their past. Each person's unique story offers a window into the intricate dance of culture, street of North religion, and a desire to honor loved ones yet live by truth. What each Africa, or in a person shares is a threefold struggle.

First, each believer in Christ has made grave sacrifices for his or her faith. Some watched family members die without Christ; others are considhave lost jobs. Some have been imprisoned, threatened with execution, fined, and beaten relentlessly. Some were forced to flee their countries and live in exile, seeking a new life in Europe or a more tolerant Muslim-led country. They have sacrificed much in their lives for one reason: They have a genuine relationship with the one, true, living God, Jesus Christ.

Second, these believers in Christ love all people unconditionally, even their enemies. Unwavering commitment to those who disdain them most permeates their testimonies. It is extraordinary that these former Muslims have repudiated the god of Islam, yet not one has turned in bitterness to reject the people of Islam, especially those in their own families. Instead, they adore the Muslim people. Radically transformed by the power of the gospel, they have forgiven great wrongs committed against them and still desire reconciliation with their kindred.

Third, the believers in Christ in this book have an undying burden that all Muslims, indeed all peoples, will see the truth of the gospel found in the person of Jesus Christ. Some of these saints of God have taken extraordinary risks to share the gospel with a loved one. Even those who have been irrevocably disowned by their entire families still mention each day the names of loved ones in prayer to God, pleading for the salvation of their souls. From a very personal stand-

ered dead in the eyes of family. Some point, they understand what Paul meant when he said, "For I could wish that I myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my countrymen according to the flesh" (Romans 9:3).

> These are not stories of Christians from centuries past who gave their lives for the faith. Other books have appropriately honored many in those past generations of faithful believers. Rather, this book is the account of Christians whose witness goes on, whose sacrifice continues, and whose faith tenaciously abides. For that reason, all names, specific locations, and identifying details have been changed in consideration for the safety of the individuals involved. While each story represents actual events and people, their testimonies are presented in a form that advances the narrative.

> The Costly Call chronicles the amazing, and sometimes painful, stories of men and women whose faith is sincere, genuine, and committed. They are heroes of our generation, for our generation.

seminars for students dealing with the most pressing issues in Christianity today, as well as worship lead by popular Christian recording artist Caedmon's Call.

According to Akin, the church today is losing its battle to have its worldview shaped by Scripture rather than culture. This battle for the mind is of paramount importance, he said, for a church surrounded by a culture that is moving rapidly in the wrong direction.

"I believe that in the church, we do a good job of loving God with our heart," Akin said, "but not a very good job of loving God with our

mind. As we enter the 21st century, Christians need to be armed for battle with their heart and mind. You and I need to be able to tell people both what we believe and also why we believe."

Habermas' messages were practical, dealing with two topics central to present-day Christian apologetics. An acclaimed expert on the topic of Christ's resurrection, Habermas instructed students on how to defend this crucial tenet to the Christian faith. His other address dealt with what he termed "the No. 1 objection to Christianity," the presence of pain and suffering in the world. He exhorted students to handle the pain and suffering they may encounter in life by renewing their minds in accordance with God's Word.

"What's happening to you may not change now," he said, "but what you tell yourself about what's happening to you can change immediately. Emotional pain is not caused by what happens to you. It is caused by what you tell yourself about what happens to you."

Students like University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill junior Daniel Bare saw the immediate value of the "20/20 Conference" for the help it gave in contending for the Christian faith in a world skeptical and often hostile toward Christianity.

"Once you get to college," Bare said, "apologetics becomes a lot more useful and a lot more pertinent because there are people around who are questioning what you believe and why you believe it, and they have a

lot of scientific arguments, a lot of pretty well-thought-out arguments. So this (conference) is a really important event to get people to start thinking about apologetics and why they really believe what they believe. It helps them to get some sound reasoning behind their faith rather than, 'I grew up in church. I always went to church. That's just how it's always been.' This conference allows you to actually get some substance behind it."

'A lot of times you don't really get to think about a lot of this stuff,' added his brother, Michael Bare, a high school junior at the Durham School of the Arts, "but if you look at the list of seminars, it's a lot more than you usually get at a church so it's good to have people talk about stuff like this."

The key to God's blessing of America is the obedience of Christians to his teachings, said Richard Land, president of the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission, to students of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in a chapel address February 23.

Land says

Land has represented Southern Baptists' interests the nation's capital, and in the larger cultural milieu, since his appointment to his present position in 1988. President George W. Bush also appointed Land to two terms of service on the United States Commission on International Religious Freedom. He hosts a weekly radio call-in show and frequently appears on network and cable news programs.

Just a few weeks ago, Time featured Land as one of the 25 most influential evangelicals in the country.

Land spoke from 2 Chronicles 7:14, pointing out what conditions God has placed on Christians in America so that the country may receive His blessings.

"God is not going to bless a people who continually disregard His teachings," Land said.

The theme is a familiar one for Land, and is the blueprint for achieving God's blessing of America according to Land's newest book, Real Homeland Security: The America God Will Bless. The book attempts to present to believers how to view and interact with the events of the world in a way that seeks to invoke the blessings of God.

Christians cannot pull out from the

world, Land said in his message. Instead, they are meant to be "salty salt" and "burning light" so that the world's decay may be stopped and its darkness may be penetrated.

Before Christians can serve as salt and light to our world, they must first get their own lives correct by God's standards, Land said.

"Far too many Christians are trying to live as schizophrenic Christians with one foot in the world and one foot

Theological Thoughts A Creation-Order Theodicy: God and Gratuitous Evil

Maybe the most enduring and compelling argument against belief in the existence of the Christian God is the argument from evil. Although at one time many people were shielded from

and hear. It is difficult in the age of images and information to ignore the immense suffering around the world. Our different media screens confront us with images of starving children, horrific acts of terrorism and the destruction of natural disasters. On September 11, 2001, many watched the collapse of the Trade Towers in real time on their televisions, startling the viewer with horror and creating questions within. Viewing such enormous events of suffering creates not only angst, but a cry from within for some reasonable explanation. Often, in the midst of such events, it is common to call out to God, either to help or ask why He allowed it. Because the Church is the guardian of the knowledge of God, Christians are often the target of the "why" question. People usually do not raise questions regarding why there is some evil, but why is it that an all-knowing, all-powerful, all-loving God does not stop such

horrific suffering as the Holocaust. Surely God could do that without sacrificing some greater good.

These questions surrounding suffering cannot be ignored by the Christian. Christians claim that the Christian Faith provides a worldview by which man can properly understand his world. It gives a framework for answering the tough questions of life. The Christian faith consists of a network of beliefs and forms a Christian worldview. This means that however not any longer the Christian answers the argument from evil, that answer must be consistent with other essential Christian beliefs. The Christian's task is not only to answer the argument from evil, but to do so in a way that avoids compromising other essential doctrines of the Christian Faith. And however one responds to this argument, he will soon find that it has implications for almost every major doctrine of the Christian faith.

> Historically, the Church has answered the argument from evil with some form of a Greater-Good theodicy. This theodicy maintains that God is morally justified in permitting evil in this world because He only allows that evil from which he can bring about a greater good or a worse evil. This means that there is no gratuitous evil, that all evil/ suffering has a purpose designed by God. This position unnecessarily raises serious questions for the theist. Many attempts have been made recently to answer these questions by explaining evidentially how the good is obtained. But by all appearances these explanations have failed. I think this was made clear after September 11, 2001. The Church stuttered in responding to the cry for answers. Eventually, the world

stopped asking. This was unfortunate for both the world and the Church. I will argue that the reason the answers were so weightless was because they were grounded in the Greater-Good theodicy which is flawed at its foundation.

The purpose of this book is twofold. The first is to give an historical context for understanding the importance and development of a theodicy. The second is to show the weaknesses of Greater-Good theodicies and to offer a theodicy that affirms both the providence of God and the existence of gratuitous evil. The proposed theodicy is named the Creation-Order theodicy because it is constructed upon an understanding of the divine ordering as part of creation that was necessary for the infinite God to have a meaningful relationship with finite man. This ordering established how God would interact with His creation in general and man in particular. By this, God chose to limit the expression of some of His attributes in order to make it possible that man could function as a true moral being.

God's creation order takes into

that makes it possible for Him to have a meaningful relationship with finite man. This is a relationship where God's love is directed towards man and where man can freely respond to that love. This possibility is predicated upon the fact that man loving God is the highest function of mankind (Matt. 22:34-40). The Creation-Order theodicy affirms the providence of God in the affairs of men, yet allows for gratuitous evil but in such a way that it does not count against either the goodness and/or power of God. In doing so, this theodicy removes the burden of proof required by Greater-Good theodicies to demonstrate that the good always obtains—an almost impossible task. The creation-order theodicy maintains that it is not necessary to posit some good as moral justification for God's allowing certain evils occur. Rather it maintains that according to the creation order some evils occur because man has the power of moral choice. Bad choices result in bad consequences, however, they never threaten the counsels of God. God has not promised to stop all gratuitous evil (but He has assured the end), therefore there is no reason to build a theodicy on the assumption that He has. Once gratuitous evil is acknowl-

edged by the theist, the argument from evil is deprived of the strongest point.

in the kingdom," he said. "When we live lives like the world, where the world can see no difference between ours and theirs, then we have nothing to say."

Land said that Christians are therefore meant to view Christianity not as a religion but as a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, which should be responsible for bringing about a

new worldview.

From the Christian worldview, Land said that believers are to see the world's problems as "God-sized" problems. This should cause them not to pull away from the world and its issues but instead get "close enough for the world to see the light and feel the heat."

Land added that the responsibility of seeking the blessings of God does not fall to the world but to born again believers, who are willing to humble themselves, pray, and seek after God.

Akin preaches sermon series on 'powerful book' of Titus

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Over eight Wednesdays this semester, Dr. Daniel Akin, President of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, has been and will be preaching through the book of Titus, modeling expository preaching through a book of the Bible.

Akin calls Titus a "wonderful book, a powerful book." He said, "It is a wonderful manual for us to consult as we think about ministry, as we think about church planting, as we think about what it means in a beautiful symphony to wed what we believe and how we live."

In his first message on Wednesday, February 16, Akin studied the prologue of Titus in a message entitled, "Saved to Serve."

Again, on March 2 Akin continued his series on Titus, studying Titus 1:4-9 in his message, "Qualifications of a Godly Leader." Akin declared that there is a great need for godly leaders in this era, and he looked to Titus to develop several qualities of godly leaders.

In his most recent message, Akin preached through Titus 1:10-16 in a message titled, "The Ministry of Confrontation" on March 9. Akin explained that God has called us to a "ministry of comfort and confrontation." His three main points were that minis-

ters must confront the divisive, deceived and defiled.

In speaking of the divisive, Akin declared, "These are your popular teachers today that declare a pipeline to God." And, he warned his future ministers to "never become seduced with an entitlement mentality."

In confronting the deceived, Akin demanded that ministers "cut away toxic teaching of these false teachers," but reminded that it should be a "ministry with hope of recovery."

Finally, Akin declared that ministers need to confront the defiled because "just a drop of false teaching can defile the whole body."

Akin has five more sermons on Titus, this "bargain basement letter, where you get a lot more than what you pay", with the next messages being March 30 and April 6.

Theological Thoughts Anselm of Canterbury: The Beauty of Theology

It is not uncommon to hold that there is no central theme in Anselm's writings precisely because they are occasional. Students, fellow monks, even the pope on one occasion, approached Anselm with their questions

and problems. On account of this information any attempt to demonstrate a unity in the diversity of topics covered appears futile. That is why I propose that we not try to

search for a

unity in the topics Anselm chose, but to discern the weltbild that informed the manner of his responses, for in this we will discover the foundation which, in a far deeper sense, unifies all Anselm wrote.

Let me be clear here. I do not intend to give an exhaustive account of Anselm's model of reality and to demonstrate its presence on every page of every treatise he wrote. What I am proposing is that we study Anselm's works to see if they reveal comparable patterns of expression. The framework within which Anselm operated can tell us much about why he said the things he did in the way he did. In this way we can transcend the particularity of each treatise and begin to perceive the unity that underlies them all because all of them, regardless of their subject matter, will be related to and within a certain understanding of reality.

The most pervasive constituent of

That is, an understanding of reality that is based on the conviction that the In contrast to the beauty of Anselm's harmony and unity, the beauty and fittingness that is part of God's being have been imprinted on his creation. Such a view of the relationship between creator and creation dominated the literature Anselm read and the milieu of which he was a part. Reading psalms which dwell extensively on the beauty of creation, the glory of God and the harmony of God's purposes would not have gone unnoticed by Anselm and his colleagues. Meditating on the final chapters in Job where God describes his attention to detail during creation, how could Anselm have remained unaffected by the obvious implications for proportion, symmetry and fittingness? Reading the record of John's apocryphal vision in Revelation, a foretaste of beatific eschatological realities described through analogies with the present age would have whetted Anselm's appetite to admonish his contemporaries to secure for themselves the glory of what will inevita-

I will concentrate on, is aesthetics.

bly occur. This is the environment Anselm inhabited; such was the taxonomy of Anselm's expression. In what follows we will explore the extent and impact of such thinking in Anselm's theology. We will begin by examining the Prayers and Meditations which were written throughout Anselm's life and so provide a good place to start since they evince an aesthetic model of reality throughout his writing career. Although there are only nineteen prayers and three meditations, there is still more contained in this collection than can possibly be covered in one chapter. Nevertheless, even the bounds of one chapter will

the seeds of aesthetic thinking which will germinate in succeeding treatises. In the course of the chapter, connections will be drawn with the Monologion. This will lead us most naturally into a discussion of the Proslogion to see if there is more there than the profusion of current scholarship generally allows. Following that we will turn our attention to the three dialogues (De Veritate, De Libertate Arbitrii, De Casu Diaboli). Here we will see just how suffusive aesthetic categories are in Anselm's years as Abbot of the monastery at Bec. Finally, the Cur Deus Homo will be assessed as one of the chief examples of how deeply Anselm's model of reality was rooted in an aesthetic ideal. Within this structure

It will not have missed the reader's attention that the term 'aesthetic' was distinctly absent from the medieval period. In fact, the word itself was not coined for another 650 years after Anselm's time. How, then, can I so cavalierly use this term as if it were as much a part of medieval life as feudalism and kingship?

While it is certainly true that concepts of beauty, symmetry, harmony and order were part of medieval culture, their aggregation under the rubric of aesthetics was unknown. It was, as I mentioned, not until the eighteenth century that Baumgarten coined the word, even then it was neoterized to denote the sensible as a particular aspect of epistemological inquiry. Now, while it is true that Baumgarten's definition of aesthetics was challenged by Kant in his Critique of Judgement, delineating the parameters of their differences and recapitulating the ensuing discussion on the matter lies well beyond the scope of our present interest. It is notable, however, that with Kant and Baumgarten a distinctly new direction was taken with respect to the place of the aesthetic within the study of epistemology....It might seem that applying the term 'aesthetics ' to a body of medieval literature is inappropriate

and blatantly anachronistic ... [but] aesthetics can be broadened to refer 'to a whole range of issues connected with beauty'.

Don't surrender the doorsteps, Welch says

As an Associated Press reporter and his camera crew looked on in astonishment, Southern Baptist Convention president Bobby Welch warmly shared the Gospel with a young woman with tattoos on both of her arms on the doorstep of her Massachusetts home.

After Welch finished sharing, the two quietly bowed their heads, and he led her in a prayer to receive Christ as Lord and Savior. The group of media personnel, who had come to report on Welch's door-to-door evangelism efforts as part of his national "Everyone Can Kingdom Challenge for Evangelism" bus tour, had no explanation for what they had just seen.

"These guys had never seen the power of God unto salvation," Welch said of the crew of unbelievers who accompanied him. "They think they've got the church figured out, but they can't explain what they're seeing out there. They wrote about how different it was in the streets and doorways wherever we went."

In a March 29 chapel service at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Welch, pastor of First Baptist Church in Daytona Beach, Fla., told that story to illustrate the truth that said. "We have come to the point the students must hit the doorsteps of

America to give the lost world the answer it is missing. After all, he said, the Gospel is still the power of God unto salvation, and God is still at work saving the lost.

"The only people who do not know that souls are searching out there are people who do not go out there searching for souls," he Dr. Bobby Welch, President of the SBC, preaches in Binkley Chapel.

said. Welch's much-publicized goal for the Southern Baptist Convention is to "witness to, win and baptize 1 million" in the coming year. He has been speaking on the theme in churches, seminaries and conferences around the country leading up to the Southern Baptist Convention annual meeting in Nashville this June.

Welch adamantly reminded students that they can do something about the disturbing trend that has witnessed the numerical decline of many Southern Baptist churches; they can witness.

"We in the church have failed the people outside of the church," Welch where we think it is all about getting a



crowd inside the church, and I am amazed at how many pastors out there don't get it.

He reminded listeners that the impetus for evangelism is that as laborers, Christians serve the Lord of the harvest, who is able to save lost souls as believers take to them the message of the Gospel.

"Here's the good news," he reminded students. "We're just carriers. We can't do it. The Lord has to do it. You don't have to do it all. You just carry the message. You can't save anybody. The Lord of the harvest is the one who does the moving, the empowering and the changing. He's the one who does it, but we must go."

Theological Thoughts The Unity of the Farewell Discourse

It is our belief that answering the question of the unity of the Farewell Discourse can impact broader areas of concern in Johannine studies. Several areas of investigation are immediately impacted by the question. The first,

the brightest and cleverest of biblical scholars who are often willing to think outside of the box to answer the question of Johannine sources. The question of the origins of the Gospel of John provides the most stimulating of puzzles. The present study should bring more objective data to bear on the question of Johannine sources beyond merely the question of the Farewell Discourse.

This is due to the paradigmatic status of the magnus reus in contemporary scholarship. It is generally seen among Johannine source critics as the prototypical example of a literary seam. It, thus, becomes the legitimating foundation for the delineation of other seams. The results of the present study will, therefore, impact Johannine studies beyond the present limitation to the Farewell Discourse by confirming or rejecting this prototypical status.

An ancillary concern beyond sources is the question of origins and authorship. In recent years the issue of authorship has been somewhat replaced by the concern for origins. For many this is a far more interesting question; it encircles not only who wrote the Gospel but how. In that the present study will investigate the theory of multiple hands at work in the Farewell Discourse, the results should impact how the production of the whole Gospel is viewed. However, the impact is somewhat limited. The present study can only contribute to the overall question of Johannine authorship of the Fourth Gospel as far as the Farewell Discourse contributes to that discussion. Whether or not John, the son of Zebedee, or a community of schismatic sectarians produced the Gospel, cannot be fully addressed due to these limitations. The question should, however, be informed by this study, as the Farewell Discourse makes up a considerable portion of the Gospel.

The second area impacted by the present investigation is the historicity of the Fourth Gospel. A recent monograph on the subject deals with the issue in depth. However, the present work could be a helpful contribution to the question. If the Farewell Discourse is not a unity, then the historicity of the Gospel must be judged on the antiquity and reliability of the sources employed and the contexts into which they are placed. If our study shows the Farewell Discourse not to be the final result of an editorial process, the legitimacy of these questions and the methods employed to answer them should be rejected as irrelevant for at least the Farewell Discourse.

If the Farewell Discourse is the

work of one writer, the unity of the Fourth Gospel is on more solid ground (although admittedly another topic). The question of historicity is then tied to the question of authorship. In a unified text, the options for authorship are narrowed to search for one person. However, that a text was

written by a single author does not necessarily increase the historicity of the text. Unity could not discriminate between John, the son of Zebedee, and John the presbyter or some other ecclesiastical figure of the late first century. Thus, the question of historicity subsequently becomes, how close is the author to the events narrated? However, such questions are irrelevant if the text is the result of a more complicated process.

The third issue impacted by the question of unity (and tangential to the historicity question) is the authority of the text. Today, many scholars are willing to investigate to the text as it stands apart from any consideration

assume that the questions of origins or authorship are immaterial in favor of literary questions. Ignoring the authority of the text, however, does not alleviate this issue. For instance, the demands made by Jesus at Jn 14.6 will be read in a different light if the origin of the statement is significantly removed from an eyewitness account. A mere appeal to an ancient source is not sufficient because the use of ancient sources, by later redactors, does not, per se, indicate authority if the original context is unknown. How, then, are interpreters to gauge the demands upon them from a text like Jn 14.5-6, if the nature and content of the original cannot be compared? To what extent and how accurately has the text been edited? This, then, is the upshot of the historicity question: How is the interpreter to weigh the authority of a redacted text?

The fourth issue impacted by the question of unity is exegesis and hermeneutics. A number of monographs and articles have approached the Farewell Discourse from various angles. Many today are exegeting the text based on a source-critical interpretation of the relationship between 'the first farewell' and the rest of the discourse. If disparate strata can truly be discerned from the discourse, then redaction criticism between the two strata is proper. If not, the meaning of the text is obscured by such criticism and not illuminated by it. The question of unity, therefore, plays a large portion in how the interpreter goes about the job of explaining the text.

Southeastern reaches initial fund-raising goal

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary's capital fund-raising campaign "Scholarship on Fire!" has exceeded its first phase goal with more than \$16.9 million in gifts and pledges received. President Daniel Akin said he believes this is another sign of God's blessing on the school.

Southeastern's Board of Trustees heard that positive report, among others, during their spring meeting on Southeastern's campus April 11-12.

A significant portion of the money of the first phase of "Scholarship on Fire!" will be used to fund the construction of the Patterson Campus Center, a 59,000-square-foot facility that will serve as the hub of campus life at the

school. The money will also be used for Southeastern's endowment and student scholarships.

"Scholarship on Fire!" is a 10-year, \$50 million investment campaign that was approved by the Board of Trustees in 2002.

"I am thrilled that we have met and surpassed Phase I of our Scholarship on Fire! campaign and our goal of \$16.5 million," Akin said. "Those who support Southeastern and believe in what we are doing have blessed us in their prayers and their giving, and they have helped us strengthen this great seminary. We are now poised to move into Phase II as we build a school that can accommodate 3,500 students and train pastors, evangelists and

Kingdom Families conference builds strong, Christcentered families

After he witnessed his parents' divorce after 43 years of marriage, Tom Elliff could not bear to watch another marriage end in divorce. His search for answers led him to seven principles from Scripture that he now imparts to every couple he counsels before marriage, principles that are designed to foster strong, secure and Christ-centered marriages

Elliff, pastor of First Southern Baptist Church in Del City, Okla., and former chairman of the SBC's Council on Family Life, brought his popular "Kingdom Families" conference to Southeastern Baptist Continued on Page 3 Theological Seminary on

April 5. He spoke to more than a thousand students and guests about the "Seven Pillar" approach to building strong families based on God's Word that the Southern Baptist Convention adopted in 2002 with its "Kingdom Families: Come Home to the Heart of God" initiative.

His "Seven Pillars" include: honoring God's authority, respecting human life, exercising moral purity, serving the church, using time wisely, practicing biblical stewardship and sharing the Gospel of Jesus Christ. When these principles are in place in a marriage, Elliff noted, "You couldn't blow

Realize the authority you've been given, Rogers says

Too many Christians live life expecting spiritual defeat from the world, the flesh and the devil rather than making use of the authority that is theirs in Jesus Christ to win the battle, beloved pastor Adrian Rogers told students at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary on April 12.

However, this kind of defeat is needless for a child of God, Rogers warned, once that child realizes the great-

ness of the victory won for believers in Christ and the authority to overcome evil that He gives to believers.

Rogers, who has served as a threetime president of the Southern Baptist Convention and recently retired after 32 years of faithful pastoral ministry at

Bellevue Baptist Church in Memphis, Tenn., preached to a packed Binkley Chapel crowd, which included members of the seminary's Board of Trustees and Board of Visitors.

"There is a greater battle, an invisible war," **Rogers said.** "There is a philosophy of wickedness that you cannot destroy with a bomb or bullets. The only thing that will destroy error is truth, and God has given us weapons of truth."

In his message, Rogers reminded students of the spiritual war believers face each and every day. Unlike the wars seen in newspapers and on television, this spiritual war pits believers against three sources of opposition: their external foe (the world), their internal foe (the flesh), and their infernal foe (the devil).

"There is a greater battle, an invisible war," Rogers said. "There is a philosophy of wickedness that you cannot destroy with a bomb or bullets. The only thing that will destroy error is truth, and God has given us weapons of truth."

Rogers noted that persons outside of Christ are still under bondage to sin and blinded by Satan, who has dominion over them. However, the glorious truth for Christians is that just as kingdom authority to resist the enemy was lost by one man —Adam—it has been regained by the second Adam, the God-man, Jesus Christ.

Rogers distinguished the difference between authority and power, reminding listeners that although Satan is more powerful than Christians, they have more authority than he does because they have been given that authority in the name of Jesus. Similarly, he said, although a policeman is not more powerful than a speeding 18wheeler, he has been vested with the authority to make it stop.

As a result of Christ's work on their behalf, believers should live differently, realizing that they have been given Christ's power to overcome, Rogers said.

"Where is our authority today?" Rogers asked. "Authority today is over the world, the flesh and the devil. You need to use the authority God has given to you. So many

of us have been so defeated by the devil that we just expect (defeat) to come. Satan has no authority over you. Greater is He that is in you than he that is in the world.... One of these days we're going to understand the authority our Father has given us."

missionaries to take the gospel to the ends of the earth. What God has accomplished here is truly awesome, but we are ready to move ahead for His glory and the greatness of the work He has called us to do."

Trustees elected Anthony Allen, 36, as Southeastern's new Vice President for Institutional Advancement. He will replace Bart Neal, who has served in that post for more than a decade and will retire in the fall.

Allen has served on Southeastern's staff for 13 years, including 8 years as the director of admissions. For the past four years, he has served as a special assistant to Neal.

"I think God has been preparing Anthony for this," Akin said. "I have great confidence that he will take us from where we are and move us forward, building on the strong foundation laid by Dr. Neal."

Allen, noting the success of the first phase of the "Scholarship on Fire!" campaign, said he is excited about the future of Southeastern. POSSIDIC.

that marriage up with dynamite. If marriages and families in their not, you couldn't keep it together with Super Glue."

If the results of Elliff's ministry are any indication, the principles he shares from God's Word are working. In his more than 30 years of premarital counseling, Elliff knows of only three couples he has counseled who have ended their marriage in divorce.

The key, Elliff said, was his decision not to marry couples without making sure that they were believers and that they intended to live their lives according to the principles of God's Word.

"I had to decide," Elliff said, "if I was going to marry everybody that came down the road or follow God's Word. I had to decide whether I would be part of the ceremony or invest myself in the couple's life."

For Elliff, the choice was clear, and the results have been amazing. He

encouraged the audience that they, too, could cultivate God-honoring marriages and families in their churches, with the understanding that no marriage can be successful if the couple does not know Jesus as Savior.

"You can go to all the marriage conferences," he said, "but as far as I'm concerned, you're on a journey to nowhere with anybody (that you counsel) if they don't know Jesus as Savior. It all begins with knowing Christ personally. When you're born again, you have the very first, but most essential, element for a good marriage. Once you do, there's no problem God can't fix."

Elliff's seminar also covered important topics such as communication, forgiveness and proper decision making, ingredients that must be in place if a marriage is to commend the Gospel. He challenged students to make honoring Christ the goal of their marriages and building strong churches the goal of their ministries.

"Your family can become the most winsome, telling testimony of what it means to know Jesus on your block," Elliff said. "Your church can become known as a haven for people's lives that have been lacerated by divorce. You grow strong churches by growing strong families."

Preach the right gospel, Baucham says

Thousands have been misled or given a false assurance of a salvation they never had by ministers guilty of preaching the wrong gospel, Christian apologist Voddie Baucham said in his April 14 message at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

These preachers strip the gospel of sin and repentance, preaching instead a warm, fuzzy" Jesus that is foreign to Scripture.

Baucham, who preached from 1 Corinthians 15, is a sought-after speaker, an elder at Grace Community Church in Magnolia, Texas, and an adjunct professor at The College of Biblical Studies at Union University.

False representations of the gospel, Baucham said, are often preached by clever men and women who attempt to manipulate crowds with humor rather than call them to repentance and faith in Christ. As a result, lost people leave with the impression that they have been saved because they have repeated a certain set of words when really they are still lost in sin.

"You can make a good living if you know how to manipulate crowds,"

Baucham said. "But as a result of this type of ministry, hundreds, if not thousands, are being sealed in unbelief.

"We've bought into the idea that all we have to do is be crafty enough and manipulative enough and we can win people to Christ. News flash - God saves sinners, not you or me. The right words in the right order do not save sinners. Your manipulation does not save sinners."

Instead, Baucham said, God has chosen the "foolishness" of the preaching of the gospel to save sinners, and He blesses its proclamation when it is done in a way that is faithful to the truth of the biblical text.

Another way in which the gospel is distorted is Jesus Christ is not fully proclaimed as the Son of God, Baucham said. Those who concede that Jesus was a good teacher or a moral man, but deny Him as the divine Son of God, who died for sinners, must be brought face to face with Jesus' claims of His own divinity and urged to turn from sin and to Christ.

ing" (Proverbs 4:1-2). The psalmist also indicated that fathers must tell their children and future generations about the works of God and the wisdom that is generated from the lessons of redemptive history (see Psalm 78). The purpose of this teaching is to help children not make the same mistakes as their forefathers made. It is also designed to inspire confidence in God and His purposes for His people. Repetition and review are important learning tools for rehearsing God's dealings with His people. The Israelites used these learning tools effectively. The same principles need to be applied to Christians today.

The single most important principle for acquiring new knowledge is that we must operate from a foundation of

prior knowledge. This means that what we have stored in our minds in the past provides the basis for what we can learn in the future. Therefore, it is essential for a child to learn how to please God and how God has dealt with persons in the past. This knowledge lays a firm foundation for future learning about God and His Son, Jesus Christ. Building upon this prior knowledge base is very important during these childhood years. Some educators would like the child to construct his own meaning in life, but the Scripture indicates clearly that we are to teach our children to build a firm Christian orientation to life.

During the preevangelism phase, before a child is ready to make a personal commitment to Jesus as Lord and Savior of his life, he needs to have a knowledge base and an understanding that will prepare him for committing his life to Christ. After conversion, or in the postevangelism phase, the child now has the indwelling Holy Spirit to guide him into a deeper knowledge of Christian truth. The Holy Spirit is also active in deepening the child's personal relationship with God. Learning about the Christian faith in the childhood years helps to build the prior knowledge base that will lead toward integrating and internalizing core Christian values to guide him throughout the rest of life. The Holy Spirit can use that learning to deepen Christian faith. The young person must develop what has been termed a Christian-world-and-life view. While it will not be fully formed in childhood, significant strides may be made in the formation of that view.

About This Book

"If we don't understand who Jesus is, we don't understand the Gospel," he said. "We allow them to believe in this warm, fuzzy Jesus who is not the Christ of the Scriptures. Jesus is not just a warm, fuzzy guy who wants to be your friend."

This type of preaching fails to mention sin on many occasions, Baucham said. Instead, society is blamed for man's failure.

"We don't just make bad choices," Baucham said. "We weren't just raised by the wrong parents in the wrong neighborhood. It's sin – we're centuries. You'll come to understand the rise of the variety of denominations. You will have the opportunity to explore the medieval church and compare it with the church in today's world. This volume will equip you with the tools for greater understanding or what we believe and why we believe as we do.

Once your children and preteens are grounded more thoroughly in their faith, they'll appreciate the diverse ways that Christianity is shared in our culture. We'll give you a glimpse at missions and a greater understanding of the Great Commission. "God saves sinners. God keeps sinners. If you believe that, act like it," he said.

Southeastern Events Heimbach hosts F.I.D.E.S. to engage scripture with students

Throughout this school year, Dr. Daniel Heimbach, professor of Christian ethics at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, and his wife, Anna, have hosted F.I.D.E.S., a discussion group in their home about scripture and biblical issues.

F.I.D.E.S. stands for "Friday Informal Discussion Engaging Scripture," and it is an idea Heimbach and his wife developed from the patter of Dr. and Mrs. Francis Schaeffer's L'Abri Fellowship, which ministered to students in their village in Switzerland. It met the first Friday of each month, and averaged between 10-20 students each evening. Heimbach believes that there have been between 100-150 different individuals participating in F.I.D.E.S. throughout this past year.

"Like the Schaeffers when they started what became L'Abri, we have prayed that God would send those he truly wants to be there and to keep others away. Of course, everyone is welcome. But, we are not interested in merely gathering numbers of faceless individuals," Heimbach said.

F.I.D.E.S. is an informal setting where guests are free to ask questions for discussion, under the moderation of Heimbach, for the purpose of exploring God's truth revealed in Scripture. There was not a pre-set agenda, so guests were free to raise discussion concerning any topics.

According to Heimbach there have

been a variety of topics because guests are allowed to discuss anything the needs and struggles of those who that they would like. Some of the more notable topics have been: Was God responsible for killing the children who drowned in the tsunami last Christmas? How is God related to natural evil as opposed to moral evil? Does God allow divorce and remarriage? What went wrong with the Terri Schiavo case? Is it ever right to disconnect life support and, if so, when and what types? Is disconnecting artificial food and water from a patient who will never recover murder, or is it simply letting them die?

The guests engaged Heimbach and the other members on multiple difficult questions that Christians have to face in the culture in search of biblical answers. Heimbach served as the moderator, adding his opinion as well as some background of classic arguments on the subjects. Heimbach believes this was a strong point of F.I.D.E.S.

"Rather than passively following a learning agenda set by an instructor, during F.I.D.E.S. the topic of discussion is controlled by students and only guided by the hosts. Participants get to address what really is on their minds," he said.

In doing so, F.I.D.E.S. helped the students to think for themselves and wrestle with difficult issues Christians face in the culture. Heimbach believes that this helps "create a learning environment that is tied very closely to

real life. It tends to be much closer to are actually in the room."

"F.I.D.E.S. offers an environment for personal growth that is precious and rarely

available anywhere else. It really is the exact opposite of a classlearning experi-
