





To the Voters of Calhoun County.

Our attention has just been brought to a printed circular signed "Turnipseed Campaign Committee," evidently designed for circulation on the day of the primary election, or the Sunday prior thereto, too late, it was supposed by its authors, for reply by Mr. Goodlett or his friends. This circular abounds in misstatements, to which we, as his bondsmen, feel impelled to reply, both in our own defense and in the interest of truth and fair play.

The report of the State Examiner referred to in the circular was made in the midst of the collections of that current year, long before the time fixed by law for final settlement by the Collector while yet a large amount of the assessment was still due and collectable; and, in justice to Mr. Goodlett, the Examiner stated that his figures, for that reason could not and in fact did not represent a deficit to any where near the amount of the sum stated.

The act of the Legislature referred to in the circular gave no relief or advantage to Mr. Goodlett or his bondsmen prejudicial to the rights or interests of the people of Calhoun county. It simply revived the remedy of the Collector against defaulting tax payers from the beginning of his service as tax collector to the first day of October 1900 and authorized the Commissioner's Court to examine his accounts and allow for errors and insolvencies during that time. Under that act the Commissioners were the sole judges of what should be allowed him, and the law did not give Mr. Goodlett or his bondsmen any advantages, whatsoever, further than a fair statement of account between him and the county gave them. He was allowed only such insolvent taxes as it was shown that he could not possibly have collected (mostly poll taxes of a floating population) and he promptly paid what was found on the settlement to be due from him to the county. At no time were his bondsmen released and at no time did they wish to be released from liability. We had full confidence then in Mr. Goodlett's honesty and capacity and still have the same confidence and are yet on his bond.

As reckless as are some of the statements of the circular, the authors of it admit that Mr. Goodlett did not reap any financial benefit from the failure or inability of some of the tax payers to meet their taxes as they fell due. On the contrary, during the settlement of his accounts with the Commissioner's court, his books disclosed the fact that he had paid, in the course of years, several thousand dollars out of his own pocket for unfortunate men and poor widows, who would have been sold out of house and home had he been as rigorous as the "Campaign Committee," speaking for Mr. Turnipseed, seem to think he should have been. Kindness of heart is no crime.

If Mr. Goodlett had followed the policy advocated by Mr. Turnipseed's "Campaign Committee," Mr. Turnipseed's own home and property, as well as that of one of the confessed authors of the circular issued by his "Campaign Committee," would now be advertised for sale, as we are informed that both Mr. Turnipseed and his "Committeeman" have thus far failed to pay their taxes for the current year. But Mr. Goodlett has always endeavored to extend to the people of Calhoun county every kindness and consideration in his power, and, notwithstanding the unfair methods of Mr. Turnipseed's "Campaign Committee," he is still extending to Mr. Turnipseed himself and to his "Campaign Committeeman," the same consideration and courtesy that have ever characterized his official acts.





Rules of Constitution

Baptist Church of Christ at Concord
In the State of Alabama Benton County
March the 21st 1852 Considering it to be our duty
To separate ourselves from the world and give
our selves to the Lord and to one another who hath
promised to receive such and be their God Meaning
Therefore to become one body soverainly to assist
each other and act according to the bonds and
Rules of the gospel each esteeming themselves hence
forth a Member of its Controle and in no wise
Sepperable therefrom; Then by consent we hold it
good according to the scriptures that we keep the
Faith once delivered to the saints which we think
Excludes the following Doctrines (to wit)

- 1) we believe in one only true and living God and
That there is a Trinity of persons in the god-head
The Father the Son and Holy Ghost and yet there
are not three gods, but one god
- 2) We believe that the scriptures of the old and

tion of human nature and unpotency of man to
recover himself by his own free will and ability.

The Eternal Election of a definitive number of the
Human race to grace and glory, and that there
Was a Covenant of grace or Redemption made between
the Father and the Son before the world began
for which their salvation is secure and that they in
Particular are Redeemed.
- 5) That sinners are Justified in the sight of God

The committee reported that preaching would commence Sunday morning by A. H. Duke, officiating.

One hour intermission. Then preaching by Elder J. D. Prichard and H. M. Eubanks.

Sunday morning the brethren came forward in the order of their names and preached to a large and attentive audience in the power of the Spirit and we hope for good effect.

Monday morning met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder M. M. Finley.

Called for the report of the committee on business and received it.

Called the roll and marked absentees. Read Decorum.

Called for the corresponding letter and received it, and appointed Elders M. M. Finley, A. H. Duke, H. M. Eubanks and brethren J. E. Lambert, J. M. Patterson and J. E. Burnham to bear it to the Lookout Association.

Appointed general meetings as follows: First District, at Mount Zion, to commence Friday before the 3rd Sabbath in August, 1888;

Second District, at New Bethel, to commence on Friday before the 4th Sabbath in July, 1888.

Appointed the next session of this body with the church at Providence, Douglas County, Ga., six miles south of Villa Rica, to commence on Saturday before the 3rd Sabbath in September, 1888.

Called for contributions and received from the churches \$11.50 and distributed corresponding minutes.

Called for miscellaneous business. Read Circular Letter and received it.

Received brother J. D. Prichard and invited him to preach and received the doctrine.

Ordered the Clerk to have 250 copies of these minutes printed, reserving 25 for correspondence, and appointed the Clerk to attend the printing of the same. The Clerk to have any unexpended funds for his services.

The committee report that preaching would commence Monday morning at 10 o'clock by Elders J. D. Prichard and M. M. Finley.

Then one hour intermission.

Then prayer by J. E. Burnham.

Adjourned to the time and place appointed.

FORM OF CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall meet annually, if the churches think proper, as an advisory council, and be composed of members of the different churches, and each church shall have three members, and no more. The messengers' names shall be inserted in the letters from the churches which they represent.

Art. 2. The members thus chosen and convened shall be denominated the Macedonia Baptist Association, of the Primitive Faith and Order.

Art. 3. The Association shall have a Moderator and a Clerk, who shall be chosen by the members present—shall be of the body and hold their offices until the next election.

Art. 4. The different churches will express in their letters the number in fellowship, baptised, received by letter, dismissed, excommunicated, restored, and dead, since the last Association.

Art. 5. No act of this Association shall be binding on the churches—but it shall be its duty to give the best advice in matters of difficulty, and endeavor to preserve the union of the churches.

Art. 6. This Association shall receive any church that may petition by letter and delegates, if found orthodox in faith, and moral in practice. Also, if any church that is in order wishes to withdraw, she may at discretion or on application obtain a letter of dismission.

Art. 7. This Association will not fellowship any church or churches, nor hold them in union, who are engaged in supporting any Missionary, Bible, Tract or Sunday School Union Society—advocate State Convention, or Theological School, nor any other society that has been, or hereafter may be formed under a pretense of circulating the Gospel of Christ—nor any secret organization—nor will she correspond with any Association that is engaged in supporting any of the above named institutions—they being without a “thus saith the Lord” for them as to the chnrch.

Art. 8. If any church in this union shall become offended with a sister church in point of faith or practice, it shall be the duty of said church to have an interview with the church thus offending, and if satisfaction c innnot be obtained, she shall call in the aid of one or two other churches, who shall investigate the matter, and decide according to their best judgment, and report at the next Association, which will be final and entered on the record as such; and if such church be found guilty as charged, the Association will withdraw from such church

Art. 9. This Association may correspond with every other Association of the same faith and order, and such only, and may withdraw her correspondence at discretion

Art. 10. Amendments to this constitution may be made by two-thirds of the members in session.

Art. 11. This Association shall have power to adjourn to any time and place she may think most convenient to the churches in the union.

DECORUM.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer, and when opened the Moderator shall invite ministering brethren to act with us, of our faith and order.

Art. 2. If new churches desire to be admitted into this Association, they shall petition by letter and delegates, and on examination if found orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Moderator giving them the right hand of fellowship.

Art. 3. Every query sent to the Association by any church in the union, shall be read and put to the vote by the Moderator, whether it shall be debated or not; if there be a majority for it, it shall be taken up and investigated, but if not it shall be withdrawn, provided always those be first considered, which effect the union of the churches.

Art. 4. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it,

Art. 5. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and he shall not be interrupted while speaking, except he depart from the subject.

Art. 6. No person shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave from the Association.

Art. 7. No member of the Association shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same, nor whispering in the time of public speech, nor cast reflections on the speaker.

Art. 8. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Association without leave from it.

Art. 9. The several names of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and called over as often as the Association may require.

Art. 10. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but he shall have no vote except the Association be equally divided.

Art. 11. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the proceedings of the Association.

Art. 12. Amendments to the Decorum may be made at any time, when two-thirds of the members in session may deem it expedient.

Art. 13. The minutes of each Association shall be by the Clerk entered in a book kept by him for the purpose, and the same to be read and approved before the Association adjourns.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. We believe there are three that bear record in heaven—the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost—and these three are one God of all power and wisdom. Proof: John, ch. 5, v. 7; Rev. ch. 1, vs. 1 and 2; Psalm 62, v. 11; Proverbs, ch. 9, v. 1.

Art. 2. That the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the written words of God and the only rule of faith and practice, and does testify of Jesus Christ. Proof: 2nd Timothy, ch. 3, v. 16 and 17; 2nd Peter, ch. 1, v. 20 and 21; John, ch. 5, v. 39.

Art. 3. That Jesus Christ did stand in God, and the church in him in eternity, and it was made manifest in the first Adam. Proof: John, ch. 10, v. 3; ch. 14, v. 10; Jude, v. 1; Titus, ch. 1. vs. 1, 2 and 3, 1st Timothy, ch. 1, v. 9.

Art. 4. We believe in the everlasting love of God to his people; and the eternal election of the same to grace and glory, and that they were chosen in Christ and called; that they should be holy and without blame before him in love. Proof: Jeremiah, ch. 31, v. 3; Eph. ch. 1, v. 11.

Art. 5. That the church did transgress the law in Adam, died in trespasses and sins, and is raised to life and holiness by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, and is made manifest in these last times. Proof: Cor. ch. 15, vs. 3 and 4; Eph. ch. 2, vs. 1, 5; 1st Peter, ch. 1 vs. 3, 20.

Art. 6. That sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the righteousness of Jesus Christ imputed unto them. Proof: Romans, ch 5, v 1, ch 3, vs 22, 24.

Art. 7. That good works are the fruits of faith, and follow after justification, and are evidences of our state. Proof: James, 2nd, vs 20, 21, 22, 23, 24; Ephesians, ch 2, v 10.

Art. 8. We believe in the spiritual resurrection of the dead, both of the just and of the unjust, and a general judgment, and the Gospel day is the resurrection and judgment day, and the happiness of the righteous and punishment of the wicked are eternal. Proof: Acts, ch 24, v 15; John, ch 11, v 44, ch 5, vs 25, 26, 27, 28; 1st Corinthians, ch 15, vs 51 and 52; Matthew, ch 25, v 46.

Art. 9. We believe there are two spiritual seed; one is the children of the kingdom—the elect of God; the other is the tares—the children of the wicked one, the reprobate; and there is no relation between the two. Proof: Genesis, ch 3, v 15, ch 2, v 15; Psalm 22, vs 30 and 31; Matthew, ch 13, vs 24, 37, 38, 39; Jeremiah, ch 6, v 36; 2nd Corinthian, ch 13, vs 5, 7; 2nd Timothy, ch 3, v 8; Titus, ch 1, v 16.

Art. 10. That Jesus Christ is the Son of God and the Word of God, and was in the beginning with God, and the Word was made flesh and did suffer and die for the sins of His people, and was buried and rose the third day for their justification, and ascended into heaven, and there is making intercessions for the saints, according to the will of God. Proof: Luke, ch 1, vs 31 and 35; Matthew, ch 1, v 21; John, ch 1, vs 1, 2 and 14; 1st Corinthians, ch 15, vs 2, 3 and 4; Ephesians, ch 4, vs 8, 9, 10; Romans, ch 8, vs 20, 27 and 34; Nehemiah, ch 7, v 25.

Art. 11. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper and washing the saints' feet are ordinances of Jesus Christ; and true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances; and the true mode of baptism is immersion. Proof: Romans, ch 6, v 4; Colossians, ch 2, v 12; John, ch 13; Mark, ch 14, vs 22, 23, 24 and 25.

Art. 12. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances, only such as are called of God, as was Aaron, and came under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery and in fellowship with the church of which he is a member. Proof: Hebrews, ch 5, v 4; Galatians, ch 2, v 9.

Circular Letter.

Dear Brethren and Sisters of the Macedonia Association:—At your last session you appointed me to write a circular. I will try to comply, asking and hoping that you will bear with me in my weakness, and indeed bear with me, and for a starting point notice 5th ch. and last v. of Romans, "That as sin hath reigned unto death, even so might grace reign through righteousness unto eternal life by Jesus Christ our Lord."

Dear Brethren, we are compelled to admit that there being two reigning powers, one of them reign to death, the other to life. Now we are compelled to acknowledge that sin did reign first. Let me here ask what is the difference between sin and death. I hear the scripture saying death reigned from Adam to Moses. By man came death, by man came also the resurrection of the dead. Wherefore as by one man sin entered into the man, as some say, but the scriptures say into the world, and death by sin. Now take notice, by man came death, do you reckon that death came by a human being? If so you will, in the first place, make him sin, as sin reigned, or make him death as death reigned. Now I think I can give a scripture that will settle the question beyond a doubt to those who know anything about the day of the Lord. I am not trying to give any one a thinking mind, but I desire to stir up their pure minds by way of remembrance.

Now to the scripture, the day of the Lord cometh as a thief in the night, but that day will

not come except there first be a falling away, and that man of sin be remoulded—the son of perdition. This is the man that sin rode into the world, and he is the man of death, not temporal; let me here say that he was the strong; the strong man's arm keepeth his palace until a stronger comes, then the stronger binds the strong and spoils his goods. Here is death and life and you know there is no relation between death and life; death comes from one place and life from another; death came by the man of sin and life by Jesus Christ our Lord. Now some say that it was that death reigned over the human family, if so where is the scripture to prove a resurrection from a temporal death. Now to the law and to the testimony, if any man speak not according to this is because there is no life in him.

Remember that Jesus Christ of the seed of David was raised from the dead according to my gospel wherein I suffer trouble, and evil doer even unto bonds, but the word of God is not bound, therefore I endure all things for the elect's sake, that they may also obtain the salvation which is in Christ Jesus with eternal glory; it is a faithful saying, for if we be dead with him we shall also live with him; if we suffer we shall also reign with him; if we deny him he will also deny us; if we believe not yet he abideth faithful, he cannot deny himself; I believe if he was to deny himself he would deny the children; if the children were to deny them they would deny their Savior, their elder brother. Now let's see if he did not acknowledge them equal with himself, and say that they were his kinsfolks: he said to them I go unto my father and to your father, to my God and to your God, then he is their brother, they are his brothers. Well might he say it behooves him to be made like unto his brothers, that he might be a merciful Savior. Now what did he save them from? I say from sin and death and hell. Did he save the human family from death, if he did why are they dying daily? The soul that sinned it shall die. Where did it go when it died? Don't you believe it went into death and hell? The sea shall give up her dead, death and hell shall deliver up the dead that is in them, then what became of death and hell? Death and hell was cast into the lake of fire which is the second death.

The soul that died, did it die a temporal death or did it die a spiritual death? If so it is raised from a spiritual death, then it is a spiritual resurrection from the grave, and the grave is hell. Ye men of Israel hear these words, Jesus of Nazareth, a man approved of God among you by miracles and wonders and signs, which God did by him in the midst of you as ye yourselves also know, now we have come to the man that the resurrection came by. I will try and get to the signs again. Was he approved by any other men but the men of Israel? He did no sign among any other men. Him being delivered by the determinate council and foreknowledge of God ye have taken and by wicked hands have crucified and slain whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death because it was not possible that he should be holden of it, for David speaketh concerning him, I foresaw the Lord always before my face, for he is on my right hand that I should not be moved. Therefore did my heart rejoice and my tongue was glad, moreover also my flesh shall rest in hope. Now he signs a reason for all this. Now let him tell w^t. at the reason is or was: Because thou wilt not leave my soul in hell, neither wilt thou suffer thine holy one to see corruption. I don't recon that any one will dispute his soul being in hell and it was delivered out of that place by the resurrection of Christ from the dead, and I will show wonders in heaven above and signs in the earth beneath, blood and fire and vapor of smoke. The sun shall be turned into darkness and the moon into blood before that great and notable day of the Lord come. In that day shall there be a great mourning in Jerusalem; in that day there shall be a fountain opened to the house of David and to the inhabitants of Jerusalem; for sin and for uncleanness, it was only to the house of David. Let me here say that Christ took upon himself the seed of David according to the flesh, therefore was he of the house of David? In that day shall the Lord defend the inhabitants of Jerusalem, and he that is feeble among them at that day shall be as David, and the house of David shall be as God, as the angel of the Lord before them. Again the Lord said I will pour upon the house of David and upon the inhabitants of Jerusalem the spirit of grace. Behold the day of the Lord cometh and thy spoil shall be divided in the midst of thee. Now then think back and see whose spoil was divided, was it not the strong man's? I hear him saying the strong man's arm keepeth his patnce till a stronger comes, then he divides the spoils; then is the day of the Lord, the day of his vengeance: the Lord is the stronger man, the devil is the strong man and he is the one that is bound and cast out, bound hand and foot and cast into outer darkness and there was wailing and knashing of teeth; then he, the man of sin, is cast out, sin is then cast out of the world. I hear him saying the son of man shall send his angels and they shall gather out of his kingdom all things that offend and them that doeth mighty, then shall the righteous shine forth in the kingdom of their fathers, who hath ears to hear let him hear. Now it is certain that there were something in the kingdom that did not belong there. Now then, did the tares belong to the field, if they did they had a right there and should been let alone, but they did not belong to the field, therefore the Lord told the servants how long they should stay and that was till harvest, until the day of harvest. Now then some say the harvest is not yet come, let's examining the scripture on that a little: The harvest truly is great but the laborers are few. Look upon the fields are white, all ready to harvest again, thrust in thy sickle for the harvest of the earth is fully ripe. Not the harvest of this temporal earth, but the first earth. I think there is a difference between the field, or the world and the kingdom of God. The tares were sown in she field, and by an enemy, they were to remain until harvest, and if the harvest is not yet come they are altogether yet, but I believe the sheep is on the right hand of God and the goats on the left hand, which is the good seed and the tares? they did not grow together, only till the day of the Lord's vengeance, for the great day of the Lord is come and who shall be able to stand. Do you recon the tares can stand? Now some more scripture: and

at that time shall Michael stand up, the great prince which standeth for the children of thy people, and there shall be a time of trouble such as never was since there was a nation, even to that same time, and at that time thy people shall be delivered every one that shall be found written in the Book. Now the Lord is good and a stronghold in the day of trouble but the Savior says many small come in my name saying I am Christ and shall deceive many, but when ye shall see the abomination of desolation spoken of by Daniel the prophet: but in those days after that tribulation the sun shall be darkened and the moon shall not give her light; and then shall they see the son of man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then shall he send his angels and shall gather together his elect from the four winds. Now learn a parable of the fig tree, when her branch is yet tender and putteth forth leaves ye know that summers near, so in like manner, when ye shall see these things come to pass know that it is nigh, even at the doors. Verily I say unto you that this generation shall not pass till all things be done. Now this generation that shall not pass till all this is done is the generation of Jesus Christ the son of David, the son of Abraham. Abraham begat Isaac and Isaac begat Jacob and Jacob begat Judas and his brethren, this is the generation that he said should not pass till all be done. Now he tells the children under the gospel that ye are the children of the prophets and of the covenant that God made with Abraham their father. Now here comes the Armenian text: The promise is unto you and unto your children and to all that are afar off even to as many as the Lord our God shall call. They place that to the human family, while I place it to the children of the prophets. Another scripture then tells them to look to Abraham their father and to Sarah that bare you. Then brethren they are the children of the free woman and not the children of this world, nor of the bond woman. Now brethren don't you reckon that is the reason they hate us so bad is because we say that we are in spirit the children of the free woman; he that was born after the flesh persecuted him that was born after the spirit even so it is unto this day, they are all the children of Isreal; Jacob my servant, Israel mine elect; all Israel shall be saved and come unto the knowledge of the truth. Now brethren and sisters I want to call your attention back to the travail while you was going about the streets mourning. David says to the Lord, deliver me, O Lord, from the evil man, preserve me from the violent man; here is the strong man: the man of sin; also when they shall be afraid of that which is high and fears shall be in the way and the grasshoppers shall be a burden and desire shall fail. Now he signs a reason for all of this. Now listen to the reason, because man goeth to his long home and the mourners go about the streets of Jerusalem. Now we find them at Jerusalem that is the mourners now goeth that is the man of death that goeth to his long home, then death is abolished, there is a separation then of the tares from the wheat, or the field, a separation between the man of sin and the man of God, then the righteous shines forth in the kingdom of their fathers. Now is the Judgment of this world, now is the prince of this world cast out. Again the prince of this world cometh and hath nothing in me, that is the man of death has nothing in Jesus Christ, the man of God. Now let's trace the mourner a little farther as he goeth about the streets mourning. Those upon the other side say that we don't preach repentance, I say neither do they; I ask where is the command in the scripture to any minister to preach repentance. They blame us for not doing that which we are not commanded to do. Now let's examine the scripture on that subject and see who is right. John came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, saying repent ye for the kingdom of heaven is at hand, that was Christ that was at hand. Let me here say that John is the only one that ever did preach repentance, all the one that the scriptures gives any account of. The ministers after that was commanded to preach the word; preach the gospel to every creature, preach the gospel of the kingdom. Advents say it has not yet come, I hear the scripture saying the kingdom is within you, which shall we believe? I say believe the scripture and let manism alone. Now turn to the scripture for the man of our counsel. Thus it is written and thus it behoved Christ to suffer and to die and to rise on the third day, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name beginning at Jerusalem, where the mourners was going about the streets. Then they were in the wilderness where John came preaching, behold I send you the same mourners that was in the wilderness. Elijah the prophet before the coming of the great and dreadful day of the Lord, and he shall turn the hearts of the children to their fathers. Who can dispute people, prepare for the people, means a particular people. How did he make them ready? I believe by baptizing them with the baptism of repentance, and there has been no one that has ever done that but him. Alough our world is full of what is call preaching repentance, but think for one moment and see who preaches it to you. Did some mortal man preach it to you? Surely not. I believe when John preached it he preached it to the church in the wilderness. I believe the whole church was there; the whole church is now in manifestation, and has been ever since John preached to it in the wilderness. Do you think that Christ was not in the church in the wilderness? Let's examine the scripture on that: a prophet shall the Lord your God raise up unto you of your brethren like unto me, him shall ye hear. Now take notice, this is he that was in the church in the wilderness, with the angel which spake to him on Mount Sinai and with our fathers who received the lively oracles to give unto us, he brought them out after he had shewed them wonders and signs in the land of Egypt and in the Red Sea and in the wilderness forty years. Here is the sign referred to in this letter, here is the sign of the coming of man with power and great glory, he was of these brethren. Well might he say to them, I go unto my father and unto your father, to my God and to your God. Now some more concerning John's baptism. Let me here ask, has hear him saying, I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance.

any minister of the gospel ever received such a charge as that, or does the scripture authorize any one to do that, if it does not then we should not claim it. Now finish the quotation, but he that cometh after me is mightier than I. Again, when John had first preached before his coming, the baptism of repentance to all the people of Israel, so all Israel shall be saved. I recon then he preached repentance to the dry bones of the valley, for these bones are the whole house of Israel. Jacob my servant Israel mine elect, then he preached it to God's elect, that was certainly the church, that was all Israel, so all the elect of God was in the wilderness and John preached to them baptism of repentance. John says I am the voice of one crying in the wilderness. What was he crying repent for the kingdom of Heaven is at hand? Don't you recon all Israel heard his cry? Don't you believe they all obeyed and did repent. I don't believe he cried in vain. So John finished that work, as much so as Christ finished the work God gave him to do. A little more: repent ye therefore and be converted that your sins may be blotted out. When the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord. When they heard these things they held their peace and glorified God, saying, then hath God also to the Gentiles granted repentance unto life, unto Christ for he is life.

Dear Brethren and Sisters, stand fast in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free, be not entangled with the yoke of bondage, is my prayer for Christ's sake.


