

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Dedication



Harry David Vance was born to the Rev. R.O. and Sally Vance on February 6, 1923. He was one of 13 children 11 of whom grew to adulthood. All were active in church work of some type. Harry joined the church at the age of 12 and surrendered to the call to preach in August 1942 during a tent meeting. He was ordained along with his older brother, Clarence, on March 16, 1947. He began his preaching career in Macon County where he did an outstanding job in his work as Training Union Leader. During three years he served Ellijay, Coweeta and Wells Grove Baptist Churches in Macon County, as pastor.

In 1949 he returned to Jackson County and served as a First full-time pastor for three years in the East Sylva Baptist Church where he now retains his church membership. During his preaching experience at East Sylva, he continued his studies through the New Orleans Extension Department and the Fruitland Bible Institute. He left East Sylva to continue his studies at Gardner Webb College. Graduating from Gardner Webb in 1954, he went to Washington, D. C. to work in missions. There he had the unique experience of organizing a church, with only two members.

From Washington he went to Fort Lauderdale, Flordia to become the pastor of the Memorial Baptist Church. The call of the mountains was strong and he returned to Western North Carolina and home to pastor the Hamburg Baptist Church. From Hamburg he went to the Three Forks Association in Watauga County where he pastored the Meat Camp Baptist Church, so named because the famous Daniel Boone had a meat camp there.

Five years later he moved to the East Side Baptist Church in Kings Mountain and remained there until an accident disabled him in 1973. In spite of pain he continued as pastor of the church until June 30, 1974. He then returned to Jackson County and home. Since that time he has served in many capacities as supply. He is frequently called into other associations for supply work. His physical handicap prevented his holding a full-time pastorate. He has filled many positions in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association on the associational level. He served efficiently as treasurer from 1976 until 1983 when he resigned from that position to accept the Director of Music position for the association. Singing is not new to Harry. He has

been the song leader for practically every associational meeting since his return to this area. He is blessed with a strong, clear voice.

Harry's dedication to the work God called him has been remarkable. He is generous, kind, considerate and understanding with much concern for people. He is always concerned about money dedicated to God's work and is always looking for the best way to use it wisely. He scans all possibilities and usually comes up with what consumers consider "bargains." He is an eager, willing worker, endowed with an extra abundance of energy curbed only by his handicap. Seldom does he complain of the pain that is his, much of the time. A dynamic preacher of God's Word, he is called to serve in many capacities--preacher, teacher, song leader, evangelist, pulpit supply, general repairman, etc. He is a man of versatility, a man called by God and makes every effort to serve Him well.

To you, Harry David Vance, the people of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association lovingly dedicate the 1983 Annual in appreciation of the many fine contributions you have made here and in other associations where you have served. Sing on! Work on! O man of God!

Proceedings

Thursday, August 18, 1983

The 150th annual Session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association met at the Cashiers Baptist Church on August 18, 1983. The fellowship dinner, provided by the membership of the Cashiers Church, was served in the community Building at 5:30

p.m. to one of the largest groups of messengers and visitors - approximately 200 - in recent years. Following the dinner the annual session was convened in the church at 6:30 p.m. The Rev. Johnny Enloe, moderator of the association, called the meeting to order.

- 1. The Rev. Trenton Connelly, pastor of the Cashiers Baptist Church brought a welcome and devotion.
- 2. Harry Vance led in the singing of "We Are Marching To Zion".
- 3. The Book of Reports and the Order of Business were adopted.
- 4. The Rev. Tim Burleson was recognized as a new minister in the association.
- 5. Two visitors, Sam O'Neal and Eric Reed were recognized.
- 6. The Rev. John Reid, Director of Missions, thanked the Cashiers Baptist Church for its hospitallity in hosting the meeting.
- 7. The Rev. John Reid called attention to his report in the Book of Reports and then delivered a very challenging talk that set the spirit for the meeting. Points emphasized were:
 - a. That the Director of Missions was not the association
 - b. The purpose of the associaton is spelled out in the Constitution.
 - c. The main issues and concerns of the assoication at this time revolve around
 - (a) the need to "Reach People" for Jesus Christ.
 - (b) the involvement of more people in Bible study through the Sunday School.
- (c) The training of our Key Leadership. A Key Leadership Conference is now scheduled for September 12.
 - d. Concern for our associational finances.
 - (a) need of a secretary to assist the Director of Missions
 - (b) up-dating of office equipment and machilnery.
- 8. The Tuckaseigee Baptist Hour is designed and sponsored by the Director of Missions. It comes on the WRG C station on Saturday mornings.
- 9. The Rev. Burdette Robinson brought the report on the Sunday School. The motto for this year is "Commitment for Growth" in the Sunday School.
- 10. The ASSIST consists of ten people coming from eight churches in the association who have been highly trained to assist churches with their Sunday School improvement.
- 11. John Hyatt, Assistant to the Director of Sunday School was introduced by the Director. Burnette Robinson.
- 12. Sam O'Neal brought a report from the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention urging all churches to provide financial security for their pastors through the Annuity Board.
- 13. Beginning January 2, 1984 all pastors will have to begin paying a 14 percent tax. Churches should keep this in mind as they plan their budgets for 1984.
- 14. Mildred Cowan, WMU Director for the Association, reported that this report was included in the Book of Reports.
- 15. Coy Deitz called attention to the Deacons-Pastors Report included in the Book of Reports.
- 16. The Evangelism Report was presented by the Rev. Tim Burleson, newly elected Director of Evangelism. October 10 an Evangelism Conference will be held at Camp Truett for pastors of small churches. The Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held on February 6 and 7, 1984. On April 5 and 6 the Rev. Vance Havener will be conducting an Associational Revival. In 1986 the Conventional-wide Simultaneous Evangleism program will be held.
- 17. Kathleen Buchanan gave the Associational Missions Report. The report is included in these minutes.

18. The Financial Report for the General Fund and also for the Building Fund

19. The Rev. Harry Vance, treasurer, resigned effective with the audit of the books in August. The books were found to be in good condition. A copy of the Auditors Report is on file with the minutes in the association office.

20. Mike Moore, Finance Chairman, presented the budget for 1983-1984. A copy of this budget is included in the minutes. The budget reflected a 31 percent increase.

Mike Moore moved that the budget be approved as presented.

The motion was seconded and passed.

- 21. The Directors of Missions, John Reid, presented certificates to a number of churches that met the goals set by the Baptist State Convention set for the number of baptisms, associatonal giving, Cooperative Program giving and church receipts.
- 22. Robert Blanton presented the Nominationg Committees report. He moved that the officers listed on the Nominating Report be accepted.

The motion was seconded and passed.

23. The Rev. Charles Dean presented the Committee on Committees report and moved that the report be accepted.

The motion was seconded and PASSED.

24. Robert Blanton requested prayers for the Rev. Joe Coker, who was in a hospital and the Rev. Jack Hinson, whose Father had recently passed away.

Robert led the prayer.

- 25. The Congregation sang "Have Thine Own Way, Lord" directed by Harry Van-
- 26. The Rev. Ben Cabe, pastor of the Long Branch Baptist Church, brought the message of the evening. He used as scripture Philippians 2:1-8. The theme of the message was based on unity, humility, love and obedience for God's work and His people.
- 27. The session was adjourned at the conclusion of the sermon.

August 19, 1984

The second session of the Annual Association meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. in the Cullowhee Baptist Church by the Rev. Johnny Enloe, Moderator.

- 28. Dr. Joel Freeman, chairman of the Deacons of the Cullowhee Church, gave the welcome and led in a prayer.
- 29. Hugh Starnes, Area Director of the Homes for the Aging, reported on the Western North Carolina Home in Asheville. This home needs, very badly, a nursing care unit but money is not available at this time to build this addition.

The Balsam Baptist Church in this Association has done much to let the people at the Nursing Home realize that they are not forgotten.

One fourth of the members of Baptist Churches are 65 years of age or older. We should remember that God loves his "Older Children" just as He does His "Younger Children."

- 30. The Biblical Recorder report was brought by the Executive Editor, Gene Puckett. He gave some interesting facts about the growth of the state paper. He is attempting to make each edition better than the one before. The paper is very important because it keeps the people informed about what is going on in the Baptist World in North Carolina.
- 31. In the absence of Coy Privette, Don Taylor brought the messengers up-to-date on what was happening along the line of alcoholic drink. He urged Baptist to keep informed and to take the leadership roll in fighting the forces of evil.

32. The Children's Homes were represented by Luther Osment. He said that the homes were attempting to minister to children who were victims of society. Some children have been so badly abused that it requires camp therapy to help them.

He requested prayer and money to enlarge the Homes so more children could be

treated and cared for.

33. Osment extended an invitation for all Baptist to attend the area conference at the Broyhill Home on September 8, 1983. Dr. Blackwell, new president, will be attending and will want to get to know the people.

34. Henry Stokes brought the report on Christian Higher Education. There are 16,000 students now enrolled in Baptist colleges in North Carolina under a \$83

million budget.

35. Robert Clark reported for Truette Camp.

- 36. Tom Lolley announced that the Mountain Pastors' Conference would be held at Ridgecrest on October 7 and 8. He urged all pastors to attend.
- 40. Calvin Knight spoke on the Baptist Hospital and the growth and work that was being accomplished there.
- 41. Sue Fitzgerald informed the messengers of the materials available to the churches from her Mars Hill office with no cost for postage.
- 42. Joe David Fore, Chaplain at Western Carolina College, related some of the work that he was doing with the Baptist Students on Campus. He is in the business of "Sharing Christ" through the students to the churches in the association.

He introduced his assistant. Wanda.

- 43. Each year the Baptist Student Union holds an association-wide retreat for the youth of the association.
- 44. Frank Anderson, Chaplin at the C. J. Harris Hospital, brought a report on his
- 45. Charles Moses presented the Time, Place and Preacher Report. The annual meeting for 1984 will be held at the Tuckaseigee Baptist Church and the Moses Creek Baptist Church.
- 46. Harry Vance made a motion that the name of the Baptist Building be changed from the Baptist Building to the Baptist Center. The motion was seconded and PASSED.

47. John Reid read the following recommendation:

WHEREAS, alcohol abuse is a rising problem in North Carolina that leads to destroy families and lives.

WHEREAS, the North Carolina State Legislature has recently passed the Safe Roads Acts that includes a provision for raising the legal drinking age.

WHEREAS, five local businesses have been recently charged with the selling of alcohol to minors.

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association express its concerns to the community at large to the danger of alcohol abuse and to the violation of alcohol laws.

Be it further resolved that we request the local media to keep the public informed as to the status of the litigation as these cases move through the courts.

This Resoultion was suggested by the Rev. Hardin Nicholson. It was adopted by the messengers as presented.

- 48. Gene Puckett requested that a copy of the Resolution on Alcohol be sent to the Attorney General.
- 49. Barbara Burleson issued an invitation to all pastors wives to meet in the First Baptist Church in Sylva on September 29 to organize a "Wives Fellowship".
- 50. Tom Smith shared thought about A C T S program and encouraged the churches to begin to get prepared for it.

A video tape of the program is to be shown during the luncheon in the Little Auditorium of this church.

51. A suggestion was made that the association officials consider the possibility of two night sessions rather than a night and a day session of the annual meeting.

52. The Registration Committee reported 77 in attendance at this session of the meeting.

53. The Rev. and Mrs. Forest Blankenship sang "Amazing Grace".

54. The Rev. Jack Hinson, pastor of the Cullowhee Baptist Church, delivered the message entitled "The Triumpant Christ in a Troubled World." It was a fitting sermon to bring to a close the annual session.

55. Annie Hoyle, Chairman of the Memorial Committee, brought the Memorial for the 91 who had passed away during the year. The service was entitled "The

Highway of Life."

56. After the closing prayer and blessing a luncheon was served in the Fellowship Hall of the church by the ladies of the church.

Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs

This has been an extremely busy year for the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs. Through its three departments, it has provided a variety of field service events and educational resources for North Carolina Baptist. Associational Christian issues was furnished to churches and associations. June was promoted as World Hunger Month and our churches increased their giving significantly over that of 1982. The Council made available bulletin inserts, posters, world hunger calendars, and hunger bank labels in addition to free offering envelopes.

Department of Christian Family Life

A wide variety of family events was sponsored this year. Included were eight marriage enrichment retreats, including one leadership training event; one clergy couples' marriage enrichment retreat and for the first time a pre-marital retreat; nine family enrichment conferences; six singles seminary and a single adult leadership conference.

Co-sponsored by the department were a chaplain's wives retreat; "Senior Adult" marriage enrichment and singles retreats in addition to sharing leadership in a Holy Land trip for senior adults. Program leadership was furnished in two Better Homes Clubs. For the first time, a domestic violence seminar was offered at the state level. Also, a Divorce Adjustment Workshop was held. Consultations by the director, assisting churches, association and pastors' conferences in their crucial task of strengthening family life were offered. Two conferences for pastors' wives were underwritten. Family life revivals were led in two churches.

The department continued to expand its ministry to senior adults through new events and services. Five leadership workshops were conducted across the state, in addition to four major conferences/retreats at Caraway Conference center. Additionally, two new retreats - one for singles and the other for retired couples, were added. A senior adult tour of Egypt nd the Holy Land was conducted and a statewide senior adult rally attracted a large and enthusiastic audience. Coordination between senior adult leaders and opportunities for training was provided through *Contact*, a newsletter/training resource furnished by the department to all senior adult clubs in the state convention.

The Legislative Information Network has continued to provide reports on the work of the state's General Assembly to 800 contact persons in churches across North Carolina. Members of the L.I.N. have been especially involved with two major issues; drunk driving; and the state lottery. Baptists were instrumental in securing passage of the Safe Roads Act, a tough and comprehensive package of legislation aimed at curbing drunk driving in North Carolina. Not only did Baptists call and write their legislators, but members of the L.I.N. attended communicated directly with senators and representatives at crucial points during the bill's consideration. The new law which goes into effect in October, promises to aid in the crackdown on drunken drivers. As is always the case, however, the final version of the law was not as strong as many had wished. The L.I.N. will monitor the implementation of the Safe Roads Act to see if further changes need to be made in the law. Baptists also played an important part in defeating a proposed state lottery. Based primarily on an anticipated revenue shortage, the state lottery was suggested as a way for the state to make money off its people's urge to gamble. The bill was defeated in the state Senate, but the state lottery is an idea certain to surface in future years, especially when financial times are tough. Other legislation covered by the L.I.N. included a package of bills to provide alternatives to prison as a form of punishment, a resolution supporting a freeze in nuclear weapons, proposals to protect the state's residents from hazardous wastes, and a bill to make it a crime to hold someone in slavery in North Carolina.

The Annuity Report

The Annuity Program of the Southern Baptist Convention is that program through which Baptist Churches, Conventions and agencies can protect and provide financial assistance during the retirement years and the families of these people if ill health or premature death comes.

Financial security in retirement years and health and disability financial needs are a growing concern of most people. The Social Security System has claimed a high place in the news in recent years. It is quite obvious that Social Security will not allow us to live with a greal deal of dignity in the years to come. We must prepare for that during our working years.

Many of the churches in the Tuckaseigee Association are now making varying amounts of financial security for their pastors and staff people in their old age. We can be thankful for the 21 churches who do participate in the Annuity Program of our convention.

It is hoped that others will follow the lead of these 21 churches. Any pastor or staffer who is in the Program will be glad to discuss with those who wish further information in this important matter. In addition to the pastors, our Director of Missions is always happy to help. Most of the time the association has a person elected who will be glad to give all the guidance he can in these matters.

Besides the 21 churches listed below, there are a few that have other methods of old age security.

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Incorporated Western Area

We at Baptist Children's Homes are grateful for the way our mountain churches have captured the spirit of our Lord in their desire to care for needy children. Because of your faithfulness to us we have been able to maintain our ministry at maximum levels. Thermal Belt Baptist Youth Shelter in Forest City, the Maternity Home in Asheville, Craig Home at Ridgecrest, the group care program and the emergency care program at Broyhill and the Moddy Farm in Macon County all continue to meet the needs of young lives.

The heaviest demands placed upon our services continue to be in relation to emergency care. Two of the eight emergency care homes are located in western North Carolina. In these centers, located at Forest City and on the Broyhill campus, we can receive a child with very brief notice out of a desperate circumstance and meet the needs of that child for up to 90 days. During this time, work is done with the family to enable the child to return or assistance is given in arranging for a more long term placement for the child. A very gracious ministry is the Maternity House in Asheville. The problems of teenage pregancies is epidemic in our soceity. Often these girls come to us feeling that life has virtually ended for them. It is a joy to observe them finding new Christian strength and purpose to begin all over again in even more positive directions.

We are coming to be increasingly grateful for the beautiful Moody farm in the Iotla Valley of Macon County. This 300-acre site is now being used for recreational camping by children from our units of work all across the state. As needs become evident and resources become available, we anticipate further development on this lovely property in the years ahead.

Of course the program of group care provided on the Broyhill campus continues as our lead operation in the western area. This is one of our four major group care campuses. It is always a happy privilege to welcome guests from our churches who come to visit us at Broyhill. At any time we are happy to set up a cottage tour, a showing of the film of our work, "You Needed Me," and a tour of our campus. Many groups enjoy bringing a picnic meal, having a period of recreation on the

ballfield and making use of the John Johnson Chapel for a Vesper service. We would be delighted to welcome your group!

From time to time positions of service become available in our ministry especially for couples to serve as cottage parents. Others find rich service in ministering as foster homes or visiting homes. We would be happy to discuss these opportunities with you.

On July 1, 1983, the Baptist Children's Homes welcomed its new President, Dr. Michael C. Blackwell, a native of Gastonia. Dr. Blackwell becomes the eighth President of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina and follows in a nobel tradition of excellence established by the seven men who preceded him in this position. In making the announcement of Dr. Blackwell's selection, Dr. William Brown, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, said that "we firmly believe that Dr. Blackwell will continue to lead this vital ministry in an exemplary manner. His unique talents, personality and commitments will assure that this ministry remains at the vanguard of excellence in child care in meeting the challenge of resolving the hurts of children and families in need."

Dr. Blackwell served churches in both North Carolina and Virginia before assuming the Presidency of the Baptist Childrens Homes.

We of the Foundation are indeed thankful for what Baptist of North Carolina are doing to guarantee support for the multitude of Christian missions and ministries carried on by Baptists. During the past year increased interest has been shown by individuals attending estate planning seminars sponsored by the Foundation and through personal visits by Foundation staff. Greater numbers are committing a tithe of what they leave at death, when they no longer need it, to Christian causes.

The asset value of trusts held at the end of last fiscal year totalled \$8,214,696.00. Designated new additions to trusts were \$276,815.00. Income from investments of trust assets totalled \$323,140.00. Investment asset market value gain during the year was \$398,812.00.

We are thankful for the facilities in the new Baptist Building making it possible to have the staff in one suite of offices. We welcome opportunities to discuss with individuals effective estate planning alternatives involving wills and trusts which could provide sustained support for Baptist causes even beyond a lifetime.

North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc.

Through North Carolina Baptist, God continues to bless our North Carolina Baptist Homes with meaningful blessings, and we are grateful!

One of the most significant blessings that we have received during the year has been a 31 percent increase in the percentage used for distribution of funds through the Cooperative Program. This percentage change, along with strong Cooperative Program support during the first five months of 1983, has meant an increase of \$29,079.73 over the same period in 1982. Total Cooperative Program funds for the period totalled \$135,647.39.

For the first five months of 1983, undesignated support through the North Carolina Missions Offering provided \$74,087.47 toward the Homes' benevolent care needs. Designated gifts of \$42,274.58 brought the total North Carolina Mission Offering support to \$116,362.05...

Through these mission gifts of \$252,009.44, we were able to provide care for over 50 percent of the residents in the five Homes and Nursing Care who have limited resources. Even with this mission support, benevolent care exceeded the resources by \$132,975.00 for the five-month period. This gap must be bridged, and we must continue to receive more through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering if we are to meet the needs of residents in the Homes. This still leaves the many who are waiting to enter the Homes, but do not have sufficient funds to pay the cost of care.

The Baptist Homes have been and continue to be a benevolent care ministry throughout the 32 years of caring. Because of the over-extended benevolent care ministry, the Trustees have had to put a hold on admissions of persons who cannot demonstrate the resources to pay the cost of care for their life expectancy. Let's change this picture as rapidly as possible. The only way that it can be changed is through a concerted effort of increased giving through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering.

Another step forward during May of this year was the approval by the Homes' Trustees of a Capital Funds Campaign of \$2,500,000 for meeting of needs on the Hayes Home Campus, Winston-Salem. This challenge will meet some of the very vital needs of updating the Nursing Care Unit. Included in this updating will be a physical therapy room, patient dining room/activity area, and other vital needs related to food service. A second area of need includes the building of additional rooms at Hayes Home. These rooms are desperately needed to make possible additional beds in the Nursing Care Unit. This expansion will require additional money beyond the current Capital Funds Campaign. The upcoming campaign will be the first major current capital funds effort that the Baptist Homes have undertaken. We covet your prayers for a successful effort.

The needs of older persons in our nation and state become more and more acute with each passing day. It is imperative that we focus more on the needs and that we provide as wisely as we can for them in the family of our North Carolina Baptist Homes, now and for the future.

We believe that the future of the Homes' ministry is in God's hands. We shall continue to trust Him for our needs, and urge you to join Him and us as we strive to meet the needs of this vital ministry to older persons.

Baptist Hospital

Baptist Hospital has celebrated its 60th anniversary during 1983 by continuing to expand and improve its services. During the year the hospital has installed a

nuclear magnetic resonance machine in the Department of Diagnostic Radiology. With the use of radio waves, this machine produces pictures as good as or better than standard x-rays and can also provide valuable information based on the body's chemistry without posing any radiation hazard.

Baptist Hospital is also providing a new treatment aimed at finding and removing the cause of heart attacks. The procedure attempts to dissolve clots in the coronary arteries feeding blood to the heart muscle by injecting a clot-dissolving drug through a catheter.

During the past year a survey team from the North Carolina Department of Human Resources designated the hospital's Emergency Department as a Level 1 trauma center which indicates that the department offers all major services for serious injuries 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Because of these and other services provided by the hospital, a total of 23,903 patients were admitted to its approximately 700 beds during the year for a total of 213,021 days of patient care. An additional 66,039 persons visited the hospital's emergency room and outpatient clinics.

The Department of Pastoral Care provided more than 14,000 hours of pastoral service to hospital patients, their families, and the Medical Center staff besides leading at least four worship services each week in the Davis Memorial Chapel. The Pastoral Counseling division provided 14,491 hours of counseling to persons who had individual or family problems or concerns. The Clinical Pastoral Education division provided training at some level for more than 100 students. During the past year Dr. Mahan Siler, who has been with the department for 10 years, resigned as its director in order to return to the pastorate.

In order to provide adequate care of its patients, Baptist Hospital employs approximately 3,500 people and has building and equipment valued at more than \$100,000,000. The operating budget for 1983 was \$101,000,000.

During the past year the hospital trustees have reviewed plans for another major capital expansion program to begin when construction funds are available.

Careful mangement with continuing emphasis on cost-containment projects has made it possible for the hospital to operate in the black with only a four percent room rate increase during the past year.

During the 1982 fiscal year the hospital received from the churches of the Baptist State Convention a total of \$497,019 through the Cooperative Program and \$343,665 through the North Carolina Missions Offering. Cooperative Program funds helped to underwrite the budget of the Pastoral Care Department and the gifts received through North Carolina Missions Offering assist financially needy patients in paying their hospital bills.

The hospital administration and staff are deeply grateful to the Baptist State Convention and all its constituents whose leadership and support make it possible for the hospital to provide these ministries.

The Biblical Record

The Biblical Recorder is celebrating 150 years of service to North Carolina Baptist. Founded by Thomas Meredith while he was pastor of the Edenton Baptist Church, the Recorder is the fourth oldest among the 34 state Baptist papers in the Southern Baptist Convention, exceeded in age only by the Georgia, Kentucky and Virginia papers.

The past 12 months have been a time of transition for the *Recorder R. G.* Puckett became editor upon the retirement of Marse Grant in September, 1982. Lawrence E. High came as managing editor of the *Recorder* from the editorship of

The Maryland Baptist. Puckett is the only man in Southern Baptist Life to have served four different state Baptist papers. High and Puckett are the only team of editors who have both served as editors of other state papers before coming to North Carolina.

The cost of second-class postage threatened the very survival of the state Baptist papers in 1982, including the *Recorder*. However, with the faithful support of subscribers, assistance from the state convention and tight management of finances, the paper is now stable and as secure as possible under present economic conditions. Future costs for second-class postage are unknown and greatly feared. Your prayerful concern at this point is earnestly requested.

The format of the paper was changed to tabloid from the magazine style which had served for approximately 40 of the 50 years of the *Recorder*. Economy of production and increased space by approximately 50 percent were the deciding factors. Those readers who preferred the magazine style have generally accepted the tabloid because of the money saved and the added amount of news coverage of North Carolina and Southern Baptist.

In March, the Directors of the *Recorder* approved a plan to make circulation the highest priority in 1983. Churches are urged to put the paper in the budget so that every resident family receives a copy. Club plans are available for interested persons and key leadership in the church.

The editors and staff of the Recorder are grateful for the opportunity to have this ministry among North Carolina Baptists. We invite your news items, letters to the editor and items of general interest to all North Carolina Baptist. Most of all, the staff requests your prayer support and faithful reading of the Biblical Recorder, one of the largest and most influential Baptist papers in the history of Baptist in the United States.

Christian Action League

We are grateful to our Lord for what your association has meant to the cause of social and civic righteousness in our state in the past 12 months. We have assisted the efforts of the Lesgue with appropriate action along with your prayer and financial support.

We wish to list just a few of the strategic issues where your voice as so influential.

1. SAFE ROADS OF 1983

Due to the growing problem of the needless slaughter of innocent men, women and children upon our highways due to drinking drivers, the League called upon Governor James B. Hunt, Jr., to name a Task Force to study this problem and seek constructive recommendations to be presented to the 1983 General Assembly. He complied with this request, and the recommendations of the Tasks Force were compiled into the Safe Roads Act of 1983. Even though the powerful beer-liquor-restaurant lobby along with other alcoholic retail groups were able to "water-down" some key provisions in this legislative packet, we at least have a measure that can be strengthened in the future to deal with the irresponsible drinking driver.

II. STATE LOTTERY

With the General Assembly seeking additional tax funds, it became apparent that an easy route for the politicians to take would be to put the state into the gambling business via a statewide lottery.

The League organized the opposition to this issue. When the pro-lottery force paraded representatives of the lottery industry extolling the "virtues" for North Carolina to a legislative public hearing, it was the Christian Action League that presented the adverse effects that a lottery would have upon our state.

It was through your letters, resolutions, and other contracts to your legislators

that generated the opposition to the lottery and resulted in its defeat.

However, this is not dead. Pro-lottery forces are seeking state tax funds for a Legislative Lottery Feasibility Study to prepare legislation for the 1984 mini-sission of the General Assembly, May we not "grow weary in well-doing" or we will get stuck with a lottery as we did with liquor-by-the-drink.

III. REFERENDUMS

In the past 12 months, you made it possible for the League to assist seven communities successfully in defeating various referendums. These were:

- 1. Archdale: Liquor-by-the-drink, ABC Liquor Stores; and Off Premise Beer and Wine sales.
- 2. Newton: Liquor-by-the-drink
- 3. West Jefferson: ABC Liquor Stores
- 4. Banner Elk: Liquor-by-the-drink
- 5. Lenoir County: Liquor-by-the-drink
- 6. Kings Mountain: ABC Liquor Stores and Off-Premise Sales of Beer and Wine
- 7. Elizabethtown: Liquor-by-the-drink.

Other referendums are pending.

Thank you again for making it possible for us to remain on the "firing line." May your churches continue to provide the prayer and financial support so that we might be an effective instrument for the cause of social and civic righteousness.

Christian Education Report

The Council on Christian Higher Education is the instrument of our Baptist State Convention which seeks to coordinate and serve as a liaison between the Convention and the seven colleges and universities which are associated with North Carolina Baptist.

A great deal of activity has been going on in Education circles in the past year: Mars Hill and Meredith have launched new degree programs in music, business administration and education. These were masters degree programs.

Two of our schools have lost presidents and now both of those schools have new presidents. Dr. Paul Corts has been elected to succeed his brother Dr. Thomas Corts who has served Wingate College for several years and has gone to Samford University in Alabama, another Baptist School.

Wake Forest has a new president to succeed Dr. Ralph Scales, who has been president of that institution for the past 16 years. I have not learned the new president's name as yet.

Although much has taken place in Baptist Education this year there is a marked concern bordering on a crises, which all private institutions of higher learning face. This crises is directly related to the dwindling academic pool - that pool of potential students.

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We are told that with the dwindling pool of college pupils and the increased efforts of public institutions at enrollment scholarships and other things, there is a potential to lose one private school every year for the next several years. Already Mars Hill has had to reduce her staff of one staffer to each 11 pupils to one staffer to 15 pupils.

This threat to private institutions comes at the same time we can ill afford less Christian influence in education. Baptist must find ways to strengthen her in-

fluence and not let it grow weaker.

If you have college age children why not consider one of our seven institutions as the place for them to get a good education.

Director of Missions Report

I have completed my first year as Director of Missions. It has been my privilege to have visited every church in the Association. In many of the churches I have enjoyed preaching and in all the churches I have appreciated the warm friendly spirit in which I have been received. I want to express my appreciation to the churches of the association for their interest and support. I continue to have high praise for the officers and committees of the association who have done their work well during this past year.

One of my great joys is visiting the churches. There are three factors that affect my church visitation. The first is the size of the association. With 48 churches it takes a while to get around to all. The second is my commitment to pastors in responding to their invitations to preach. If a pastor is sick, has an emergency, is on vacation extends a general invitation to preach, I give that request priority. The third is my family's need to worship together. One Sunday each month I worship with my family at my home church, Ochre Hill.

I have enjoyed an increasingly active counseling ministry to churches. Also I have counseled ministerial families in a variety of situations. God has blessed this ministry and I am thankful to those who have sought assistance.

I have attended the State Convention meetings, the Evangelism Conference, and the Director of Missions Conferences, the General Board meetings.

I have attended several training events during my first year: the State Key Leadership Conference, A Church Training Enabler's Conference, a Regional V. B. S. Clinic, the Basic Leadership Seminar, sponsored by the Home Mission Board, the Director of Missions Interpreter's Conference, sponsored by the Foreign Mission Board, and the Conference on God called Ministry, sponsored by the State Convention. All of these have equipped me to better serve the association.

There were some significant events that occured in the association this past year. A new location for the Seminary Extension work was opened in the Sylva area. I taught the "Book of Acts." A music workshop was organized and conducted at the Webster Baptist Church. The association's participation in a Great Challenge Stewardship Conference conducted by the State Convention Leadership was the first of its kind to to be done on the associational level in our state. The association sposored a V.B.S bookstore this year to help eliminate travel and time spent going to Asheville to purchase V. B. S. materials. A prayer chain has been organized among the pastors to handle emergency and crisis prayer requests. The fourth Friday of each month is designated as a Day of Prayer and a special prayer meeting is conducted at 10:00 a.m. in the Baptist Building. Our work is directly linked to our prayer efforts.

The ministry of the association has advanced to the point that our financial needs are greater than our financial receipts. The Finance Committee has sent out letters informing you of the needs. The budget proposal this year is the largest in the association's history.

Already positive response has been indicated that the financial support is forth coming to be able to meet the needs. This will require the effort and attention of all the churches in the association. I am grateful for your increased financial support

to the association. You see that the Baptist witness to Jackson County is missions and you are seeking to fulfill the Biblical mandate to minister to the county through the association. I commend you for this vision.

We have the kitchen in the Baptist Building equipped now with a sink and a lower cabinet. Our building fund continues to be strong and we are grateful for that.

The major event during the next few months is the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign. Our records indicates a resident membership of 6,800 people in our churches with only 3,000 that attend Sunday School on an average figure. The population of the County is more than 25,000. We must do something to more effectively reach our County for Christ. I believe this effort to strengthen our Sunday Schools will be used of the Lord to help reach people.

Across the association, among the pastors and churches, I have observed our deepenening fellowship. This is one of the primary purposes of the Associaton, to develop fellowship and unity among churches. It is my prayer that we will learn more fully to forgive each other, to love each other, and to recognize our interdependence and need for each other as members of the Body of Christ. As Baptist people we will always have our unique differences from each other as a result of our autonomy. But in response to God's command we have learned that only through cooperating with each other we can accomplish things together that none of us can do by ourselves for God's glory and the Kingdom's Advancement.

Hospital Chaplaincy

Four thousand, three hundred six (4,306) patients passed through the hospital from July 1, 1982 through June 30, 1983. This is an average of 358 patients per month. Here were 4,306 opportunities to mediate the compassion of our Loving Heavenly Father.

The voluntary cooperation of 30 churches, 11 individuals and one Thanksgiving Service offering made possible this ministry. They gave a total of \$6,198.72. This is the highest income for the Chaplaincy Programs during the past eight years. It was \$537.16 more than the preceding year, for which we are most grateful.

In 1979 the Chaplaincy Foundation was established to secure the on going ministry of the Chaplaincy. The first goal of the foundation \$30,000.00 has now been attained. Remember the Foundation in your wills, memorials and honoring the living. The Hospital Board of Trustees has the responsibility of investing the funds of the Foundation. Only the interest from the investments can be used for current expenses. The principal remains intact.

The Chapel Library, begun by a grant of \$2,000.00 from the Percy B. Ferebee Foundation, is now being used by the patients. Ms. Elise Terrell is our volunteer librarian.

July 18, 1981, a worship service was begun by means of closed circuit television. A generous gift makes possible this ministry to the patients every Sunday. The Chaplain, in person or by video tape, brings a message to the pateints in their rooms. It is preceded and closed with sacred music.

What a privilege! What a challenge! What a stewardship, for which the churches of Jackson County will one day give an account. More time and equipment is needed to meet the needs of the patients.

Also the Committee met to discuss and initiate the Cooperative agreement with the State Convention for the coming calendar year 1983-84. Again we requested \$4,620 with the understanding that a portion of this be used for secretarial assistance.

Sunday School

In the spring of 1983, an update was given on progress in reaching people through the "8.5 by '85" emphasis (to enroll 8.5 million in Sunday School by 1985). It was good news! While the goal was to have 7.5 million enrolled in 1982, 7,678,604 were enrolled in the Sunday Schools of Southern Baptist churches.

Churches are encouraged to report their yearly enrollment to the Baptist Sunday School Board. In our association, the following churches reported enrollment goals for 1983: Scotts Creek, Buff Creek, Ochre Hill, Shoal Creek, Sylva First, Tuck'aseigee and Zion Hill. Churches will be encouraged to report their enrollment goals for 1983-84 as well.

One of our biggest accomplishments of the 1982-83 year was the formation of a new ASSISTeam (Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). Enlisted were 10 persons, two in each age division, to help the director and his assistant carry out the work of upbuilding Sunday Schools to reach people. This team has been meeting monthly. The team held an annual planning session in June to chart ASSISTeam events for the 1983-84 year. Phil Stone, ASSISTeam Development director for the Baptist State Convention, provided additional training for the team at that time.

Two Sunday School events were held in the association in the past year. The Associational Sunday School Leadership Night was held September 14 at Old Savannah with 23 persons attending, representing seven churches. On May 24, an Associational Curriculum Workshop was held at East Sylva. That night 26 persons attended, representing nine churches. Plans are under way to hold the Associational Sunday School Leadership Night again on September 13, 1983.

By far, the most significant event to help churches in an association reach people for Jesus Christ through the Sunday School is the Associational Sunday School Enrollment/Enlargement Campaign. Steps have been taken for the campaign in the Tuckaseigee Association. A presentation dinner was held on March 25. the first preparation dinner was on May 16. A second will be held on August 29. The campaign dates are October 15-23. Those churches who have voted to participate are: Scotts Creek, Green's Creek and Sylva First. This is a simultaneous campaign. Other churches who care about reaching people for Christ are encouraged to join.

Let us commit ourselves to strong, growing and winning Sunday Schools in our association this year.



Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980; August 13, 1982.)

ARTICLE I - NAME 16

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II — OBJECTIVES 23

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

- 1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
- 2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually, and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III — AUTHORITY 23

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP 23

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership should be presented to the Credentials Committee of the association. Upon the recommendation of the Credentials Committee the church will automatically come under the watch care of the association for one year. During that year, the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except that of voting. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the regular meeting of the association, provided that the church submit an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

SECTION 5. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, and annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

ARTICLE V — MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The association should hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Board provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 members or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI — OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Church Music Director, Director of Deacons, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Director of Continuing Education, Chairman of the Missions Committee, Director of Associational Missions, Trustees and such other officers as the association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) Homes for the Aging, (5) Baptist Literature, (Biblical Recorder) (6) Cooperative Program, other representatives (such as the American Bible Society, Annuity Board, Baptist Foundation, etc.) may be added as deemed appropriate and properly elected. *SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session with the exception of the treasurer and clerk who will serve from October 1 through September 30 (the financial year).

SECTION 3. The director of associational missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 10 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the director of missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The *Moderator* shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The *Vice Moderator* shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The *Clerk* shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a Book of Reports to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

SECTION 4. The *Treasurer* shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The *Parliamentarian* shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. The *Director of Missions* shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the director of missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the association, and not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X — THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one-week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

*ARTICLE XI — ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

*SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of five members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. The Order of BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association.

SECTION 6. The PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the first session of the annual session. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. The MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) Present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) Devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget; (c) Audit the finances and financial records of the association twice annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) Report all audits to the annual association meeting.

SECTION 10. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIV.

SECTION 11. The ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastor who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.
- d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.
- e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associationalwide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. The MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational Brotherhood director and Woman's Missionary Union director are to serve as ex officio members along with the director of missions and the moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be: to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

*SECTION 14. The BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII — THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the director of missions, the moderator, the vice moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, church training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the chairman of deacons, the chairman of the Evangelism Committee, the chairman of the Missions Committee, the chairman of the Finance Committee. The director of missions is to serve as chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organizations and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII — THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS'S CONFERENCE

The associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist Ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV — DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confine extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

- 1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
- 2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
- Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
- 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).
- 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries:

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacon's meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefit

- 1. His salary shall be
- 2. His fringe benefits shall include
- 3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excludes normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of the days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year, without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two seeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Years' Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday, Christmas, December 25 and 26.
- 4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
- 5. The director of missions is affored the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV — AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
