

ASSOCIATE OF DIVINITY

The Associate of Divinity degree is designed for God-called men and women who responded to the call of Christian service somewhat later than some students and often after a career in some other field. The Associate's program of study includes courses in biblical, theological, and practical ministry areas. The purpose of the degree is to equip graduates with basic knowledge and skills so that men can serve effectively as pastors, bi-vocational ministers, or church leaders, and women are prepared for a wide variety of family, care-giving and mission ministries, usually in the local church. The Associate of Divinity curriculum is composed of courses similar to those in the seminary's Master of Divinity curriculum, except that they are taught on the college level. The Associate's degree requires 64 semester hours of work or a minimum of two years to complete. Many graduates from the Associate's program continue in the college to complete the bachelor's degree as preparation for the seminary's Master of Divinity degree.

BACHELOR OF ARTS

The Bachelor of Arts degree is built upon a strong liberal arts core in the history of ideas but with a heavy focus on biblical and theological studies. Some students transfer undergraduate core courses in liberal arts, the humanities, and science that have been taken in an accredited college elsewhere in order to study Bible and Theology at Southeastern, thus completing a minimum of 128 hours of undergraduate work leading to the baccalaureate degree. Others will follow our History of Ideas program and complete their entire B.A. degree at Southeastern. The purpose of this specialized undergraduate major is to equip students with basic knowledge of the Christian worldview and the classical literature of Western thought. In addition, this program intentionally prepares graduates specifically for more advanced study in the Seminary. Students can also major in Social Studies, History, or English. The various majors and minors accomplished by these students are designated in the graduation program.

CANDIDATES FOR GRADUATION SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Master of Theological Studies

The Master of Theological Studies is a seminary degree requiring a Bachelor of Divinity prerequisite for international students. The degree requires 48 hours of coursework in masters level courses, extending the student's expertise in historical theology and biblical interpretation under the supervision of a faculty member who also serves as the major professor under whom a research project is written. The project is reviewed and must be approved by a selected group of faculty readers. The project is bound and kept in the reference area of the seminary library.

Master of Church Music

The Master of Church Music is a seminary degree requiring an undergraduate degree in music or the completion of Southeastern's Church Music Diploma. The degree requires 64 hours of master's level coursework. The program extends the student's expertise in his/her chosen skill area as well as in biblical, theological, proclamation and ministry studies. The purpose of the MCM is to prepare God-called men and women for kingdom service both at home and on the mission field.

Master of Arts

The Master of Arts degree has two forms. First there are M.A. degrees that provide a basic understanding of theological disciplines for further graduate study or for general educational purposes. These programs adopt a nomenclature reflecting the goal of the degree, which is to provide survey knowledge of various theological disciplines or focused knowledge of a specific discipline. The second type of M.A. degree will include the nomenclature "in (area of specialized ministry)." The purpose of these M.A. degrees is to equip persons for competent leadership in some form of specialized ministry in the local church or other settings. All Master of Arts degrees require a previous baccalaureate degree and are designed to be completed with either 64 or 48 credit hours over two years of full-time study. The Seminary offers two degrees of the first kind: Christian Ethics and Christian Studies; and five degrees of the second kind: in Christian School Administration, in Christian Education, in Biblical Counseling, in Women's Studies and in Church Music. The overall purpose of all M.A. degrees is to prepare God-called men and women for kingdom service both at home and on the mission field. The Master of Arts program is not considered to be adequate preparation for a pastoral ministry in a local church.

Master of Divinity

The Master of Divinity degree prepares men for the pastorate and men and women for other significant leadership roles in Christian ministries both at home and around the world. The M.Div. requires 90 semester hours and builds upon a prior bachelor's degree. It is designed to be completed within three years of full-time study. Southeastern Seminary offers several specializations within the Master of Divinity degree. The Ministry Track, which is the original emphasis of the degree, focuses on biblical languages and theological studies as well as on preaching and pastoral ministries. It also serves as a suitable basis for further graduate theological studies. The M.Div. degree can also be structured with specializations such as Christian Education, Apologetics, Evangelism, Worship Leadership, Women's Studies, Advanced Biblical Studies, North American or International Church Planting, Ethics, and Biblical Counseling. The degree program normally consists of 42 hours of foundational core courses in Theology, Church History, Christian Philosophy, Ethics, Evangelism, Christian Missions, Biblical Counseling, and Biblical Studies. Other specialized requirements fill out the various tracks or concentrations. Most students attending the Seminary enroll in the Master of Divinity program as their first professional degree. Those students who have satisfactorily completed coursework in both Biblical Hebrew and Greek are noted with an asterisk. Degree specializations are also noted in the graduation program. Graduates who have completed eight or more elective hours in one discipline will have this concentration noted on their diploma and transcript.

Doctor of Ministry

The Doctor of Ministry program equips students for the practice of ministry at the highest level of professional competency. Candidates for this degree have previously completed the Master of Divinity degree or its equivalent with high academic achievement and have demonstrated competence and potential for ministry. Candidates are expected to have had at least three years of professional experience prior to beginning the Doctor of Ministry program and must be continually engaged in ministry throughout their enrollment for the degree. The program currently consists of 15 hours of advanced interdisciplinary intensive seminars and 12 hours of specialized electives. Then there are nine hours of field-oriented ministry under supervision, and a formal Project in Ministry report, which is submitted to a faculty committee for evaluation and is bound and kept in the reference area of the Seminary library.

Doctor of Philosophy

The Doctor of Philosophy program equips students for the practice of ministry, for research, and for teaching at the highest level of academic competency. Candidates for this degree have previously completed either a Master's degree in their field of doctoral specialization, or more likely the Master of Divinity degree or its equivalent with high academic achievement. Students must have good writing skills and an aptitude for teaching and academic research. The program consists of a two-year residency including instruction in research and teaching, involvement in interdisciplinary colloquia and graduate seminars, proficiency in two research languages in addition to English (and in addition to Greek and Hebrew, the two biblical languages), and a mentorship program concentrating in an area of academic specialization under the tutelage of the student's major professor. After successfully completing the residency requirements, including passing written field exams and a comprehensive oral examination, a Dissertation Prospectus that outlines and justifies the relevance and originality of the student's proposed topic for research must be approved by the Graduate Studies Committee. Then, a research-based dissertation must be written that makes a significant contribution to the student's major field of study. This dissertation is submitted to a faculty committee for review and evaluation. Often an outside expert is called upon to read and evaluate the dissertation. The student must then defend the dissertation before a committee of the faculty. When approved, the dissertation is bound and kept in the reference section of the seminary library. The Doctor of Philosophy degree is the highest degree awarded by Southeastern.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

The hoods, gowns, and caps worn in academic ceremonies today are modified versions of clothing worn by ecclesiastics and students in the 12th and 13th centuries. They wore gowns and hoods to their lectures, probably for warmth in the damp, unheated halls where classes were held. The designs and colors of these costumes have come to symbolize the level of academic attainment and the institution attended.

Robes - The bachelor's robe has an elaborate yoke but is otherwise a plain garment with a closed, pleated front and long, full-pointed sleeves. The master's robe is identifiable by its sleeves, cut for the arm at the wrist and just above the elbow, which have a distinctive oblong back and are squared at the ends. The doctor's robe, full cut and with voluminous long sleeves, is distinguished by its rich velvet trim. Robe-length front panels and velvet sleeve bars are either black or symbolize, by their color, the field in which the doctorate was obtained.

Caps - Graduates of American colleges and universities normally wear a stiff mortarboard that matches the robe in color and material. European universities are somewhat less rigid in the style of their caps. In recent years, some faculty members have chosen to wear the Tam (a soft round cap of Scottish origin) even though they graduated from an American school. Tassels are usually black but may represent the degree held by the wearer. Tassels worn by doctors may be black or gold.

Hoods - The color or colors symbolize the college or university granting the degree, and the velvet trim denotes the field of study. A long hood with velvet trim represents a doctor's degree. The hood trim colors most frequently seen are signified by the following:
