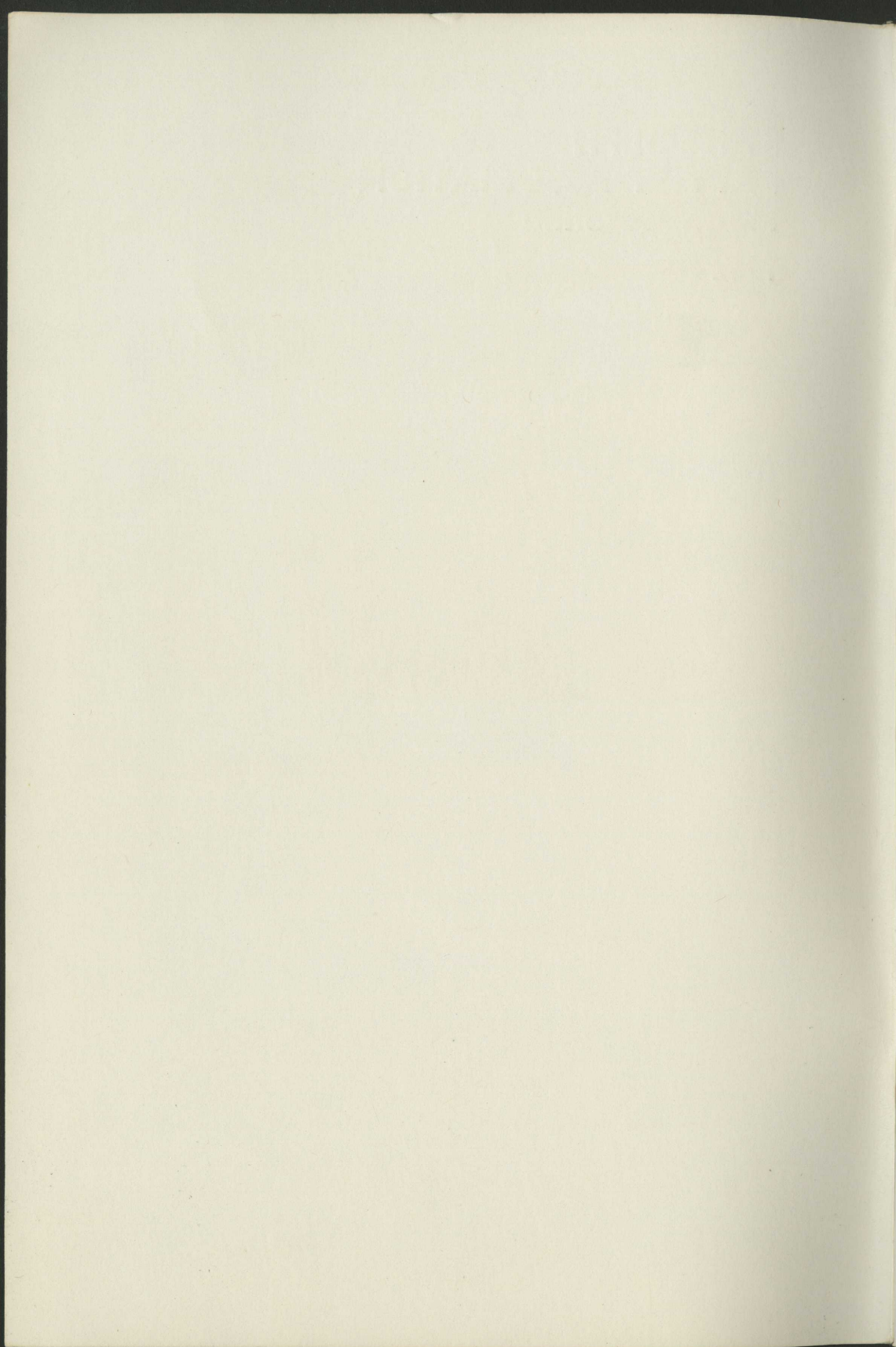

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The name of the organization shall be the Randolph Baptist Association.

Section 2. The purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. The promotion of harmony, fellowship and cooperation among the churches of the Association.
- b. The propagation of the Gospel within the territory of the Association and to the uttermost part of the earth.
- c. The promotion of the missionary, education and benevolent causes of Christ within the Association and in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II — MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. a. The membership of the Association shall consist of messengers of Baptist churches regularly affiliated with the Association. All churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall present to the Missions Committee proper petitions, accompanied by satisfactory evidences of doctrinal regularity and general acceptability. After one year under the watchcare of the Association the said Committee will report to the Association its recommendation. Upon a favorable vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the annual associational meeting the petitioning church may become regularly affiliated with the Association.

b. "Fellowship may be withdrawn by the Association at any annual meeting upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, from any church in its membership that has been found, by due investigation, to have departed from the Missionary Baptist faith and practices, or has failed to abide by the provision of this Constitution and By-Laws, or has failed to either have its pastor or lay member or both in attendance in one or more of the four regular meetings of the Executive Committee, or has failed to make a contribution to the expenses of the Association in addition to the cost of Association minutes, or has failed to properly prepare and return to the Association office a copy of the associational letter, or has failed to send one or more messengers to the annual session of the Association."

Section 2. Such a church may, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and vote of the Association, be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such action have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the meetings of the Association.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish to the Association each year a letter, on the form provided by the Clerk, giving full information and statistics provided for on the form, and to send with the letter or by messenger a contribution toward the cost of printing the minutes and other expenses of the Association.

Section 4. It is understood that each church in this Association is indepen-

dent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except of an advisory nature.

Section 5. A church may withdraw from membership in the Association by a vote of the church according to its own by-laws, regulations and procedure.

ARTICLE III — MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually on two days during the week following the Third Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting shall be composed of messengers chosen by the respective churches of the Association from their membership. *Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, above one hundred it has enrolled, but not to exceed ten such messengers.* All pastors in the Association and the Director of Missions are messengers in all the Associational Meetings, each having but one vote.

Section 3. The Association may hold a Mid-Term meeting each spring at such time and place as may be determined by the Association or its Executive Committee. The purpose of the Mid-Term meeting shall be that of information and inspiration without the transaction of business, except that urgent matters of business which cannot well be delayed until a later meeting may be considered and acted upon.

Section 4. Other meetings of the Association may be held when called by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV — OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, and three Trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected on the first day of the regular annual session. The prior approval and consent to serve, if elected, shall have been secured from a prospective nominee prior to placing his name in nomination for any one of the several associational elective offices. They shall take office at the close of the Annual Session and serve through the next Annual Session. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall not serve more than two years in succession.

Section 3. Duties of the Officers:

- a. The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association and discharge such duties as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body.
- b. The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of or at the request of the Moderator.
- c. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceeding of the Association, together with the reports and statistics, and have the same printed and distributed.
- d. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at the Annual Meeting.
- e. The duties of the Trustees shall be to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of said Trustees shall be authorized by the Association or its Executive Committee.

Section 4. "The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches of the Association for the promotion of the various phases of their work involving Sunday School, Church Training, Baptist Brotherhood, and Woman's Missionary Union. The Directors of the Associational Sunday School, Associational Church Training, and Associational Baptist Brotherhood shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Association, and approved and elected by the Executive Committee of the Association in the May meeting, and shall serve officially from October 1 to September 30. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary organization of the Association. These officers are elected in the WMU Annual Meeting in the spring."

ARTICLE V — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Association shall have an Executive Committee comprised of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Trustees of the Association, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Baptist Brotherhood Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Associational Director of Missions, all pastors, all church educational directors, and one member of each church in the Association desiring representation on the Committee.

Section 2.

- a. The Executive Committee shall hold meetings once each quarter during the second month of the quarter, the date to be set by the Board itself, and at such other times as may be required at the call of the Moderator, or at the call of not less than five members of the Executive Committee.
- b. Twenty members of the Executive Committee shall be required to be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. To act for and on behalf of the Association between sessions.
- d. To carry out the orders and resolutions of the Association pertaining to it.
- e. To superintend the Associational Mission work, employ a missionary and determine the salary to be paid.
- f. To *fill* vacancies which may occur during the year in the personnel of the Associational officers or workers for the remainder of such unexpired term.
- g. To investigate any report of complaint that may be brought to its attention about irregularity of doctrine, practice, or conduct on the part of any individual or group in the Association and report its finding with such recommendations as it considers advisable, to the Association in a regular meeting.
- h. To make such recommendations as it may deem wise for the strengthening and upbuilding of the churches and the work of the Association.
- i. The Executive Committee shall not involve the Association in debt to exceed one hundred dollars for necessary operating expenses of the Association.

- j. To appoint and elect the officers for the Associational organizations of the Sunday School, Church Training, and Baptist Brotherhood.

ARTICLE VI — ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1.

- a. The Associational Council shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Associational Music Director, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Director of Missions, and others deemed necessary by the Moderator to carry on the work of the Association.
- b. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Council, the Vice-Moderator as vice chairman, and the clerk as secretary.

Section 2.

- a. The Associational Council shall hold meetings once each month and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman, Director of Missions or at the call of not less than 5 members of the Council.
- b. Seven members of the Council shall be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. The duties of the Associational Council shall be:
 - (1) To plan the general work of the Association.
 - (2) To assign responsibility of the implementation of proposed plans.
 - (3) To receive and help correlate into a general associational program the proposed plans of the individual organizations.
- d. The Council shall give a quarterly report to the Associational Executive Committee along with any recommendations it may have.

ARTICLE VII — COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees at the August Executive Committee Meeting, before the Annual session of the Association. This committee shall prepare its report and shall be given the opportunity to submit its report early on the program of the first day of the Annual Session.

The committee shall name the following committees to report during the Annual Sessions.

Committee on Memorials, Committee on Appreciation, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

The Committee on Committees shall also name the following standing committees:

Nominating, Budget and Finance, Missions, Evangelism, Constitution and By-Laws, Ordination, Time, Place and Preacher, Order of Business, Christian Life and Public Affairs and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

This committee will continue to function to replace vacancies that occur during the year.

Section 2. Duties of Committees for Annual Session:

- (1) **Memorials:** This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare a list of those members of the churches who have died during the year and present suitable memorial resolutions for adoption by the Association in the annual session.
- (2) **Appreciation:** This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare and present appropriate resolutions of appreciation and concern to the annual session.

Section 3. Standing Committees Membership and Duties:

A. Term of Service

Each standing committee will have members who will serve on a rotating basis: three (3) years, two (2) years, and one (1) year, with the term of office being from the close of the annual session through the following Annual Session. It is suggested that each committee meet once each quarter or as often as needed.

Each committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons with every area of the association represented.

B. Duties of Standing Committees.

a. *Nominating Committee:* The nominating committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The nominating committee shall nominate a complete slate of officers for the next year. Their first report would be to the May Executive Committee meeting, in which the Sunday School Director, Church Training Director and Baptist Brotherhood Director would be presented and elected. These Directors would make suggestions concerning leaders in their organizations to be presented at the annual session for election and approval.

b. *Budget and Finances:* The Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The Budget and Finance Committee shall study the association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the quarterly Executive Committee and a final report to the Annual Session.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the association, upon request, with the stewardship program offered by the Baptist State Convention or Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee should meet once each quarter to review financial affairs of the association, or as often as is needed.

c. *Missions Committee:* The Missions Committee shall be composed of six (6) members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. Also WMU Director and Brotherhood Director shall serve as Ex-officio members. This committee shall meet at least once each quarter or as often as is needed.

Guiding Principles for the Work of the Missions Committee of the Randolph Association.

1. The Committee is to seek to discover areas where new work is needed and to lead in the sponsorship or establishment of new work to meet present need or the securing of property by a local church and/or the Association in the anticipation of future need.
 2. All new work does not necessarily need to be nor should be intended to become an organized or constituted church. New work may be started and maintained on the basis of a mission to meet particular needs (This provides for institutional missions such as jails, prisons, rest homes, etc.).
 3. The location of missions or new churches shall be determined by the need revealed in an adequate survey conducted by the Missions Committee and local interested groups or churches.
 4. Any church, committee, group or individuals considering beginning new work, acting with or without church sponsorship, should approach the Missions Committee for guidance before having any service or choosing a temporary or permanent location.
 5. The Missions Committee shall institute basic, understandable operational procedures and practices for a mission that leads in establishing and strongly urges that each church establishing a mission does the same. The guidance of missions by the Missions Committee shall continue until a co-operating church or churches can be led to accept the responsibility of sponsorship.
 6. A mission organized or assisted by the Missions Committee shall accept the recognized principles and practices of a church cooperating with the Randolph Association, the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 7. The Missions Committee shall plan and develop special associational projects and make the churches aware of these mission opportunities to participate.
- d. *Order of Business:* The Order of Business Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. The committee will prepare well in advance a suggested order of business for the annual session. The committee will notify those who are to make reports or have a part on the program. The program for the annual session of the association shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting. The Moderator, Clerk, and Music Director shall be Ex-officio members of the committee.
- This committee will be also responsible for promoting the annual session through the various news media.
- e. *Evangelism:* The Evangelism committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The committee shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. The committee shall plan and promote annual programs or clinics for persons to be trained and motivated to witness for Christ. The committee shall meet at least

once each quarter and report its activities to the Executive Committee. The committee will give a written report to the annual session.

- f. *Ordinations*: The Ordination Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. Also the Director of Missions, the pastor and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate of the Gospel ministry.

Guidelines:

- (1) The committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of minutes, signed by the Clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.
- (2) The committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
- (3) The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place and procedure.
- (4) The committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
- (5) The committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The committee may also counsel the candidate.
- (6) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the committee regarding any area of the ministry.
- (7) In every instance, the committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9. The Ordination Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The chairman shall report the committee's activities to the Executive Committee and provide a written report for the annual session.

- g. *Place, Time, and Preacher*: This committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee will receive invitations from the churches which desire the association to meet with them the next year. It will recommend to the association in its annual session the time and place of the annual session the following year. This committee will also recommend a preacher and an alternate for the annual sermon.

- h. *Constitution*: The Constitution Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The clerk of the association shall also serve on the committee. This committee shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed. The committee shall meet at least twice a year, once in the winter and once in the summer.

- i. *Building and Grounds*: The Building and Grounds Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the association. It will make recommendations to the Executive Committee concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. The committee should meet at least once each quarter. It shall give a written report to the annual session of its work.
- j. *Seminary Extension*: The Seminary Extension Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall publicize study courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension classes for pastors and lay-persons as they may be desired. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee its activities and make a written report to the annual session.
- k. *Historical*: The Historical Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving for three years, one serving for two (2) years, and one serving for one year. It shall be the duty of the committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Session.
- l. *Christian Life and Public Affairs*: This committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall recommend ways in which the association can work for the promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift. It will inform the churches of current issues of Christian response. The committee shall also commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee and Annual Session when needed.

ARTICLE VIII — ORDINATION AND CALLING OF PASTORS

Section 1. Inasmuch as the ordination of a man to the gospel ministry by any church in this Association is expected to be recognized by the denomination as a whole, the churches are counseled to be extremely careful in the matter of setting men apart for this sacred calling, ordaining only those who, by irreproachable character, piety of life, doctrinal soundness and suitable talents, give promise of honoring the name of Christ and of rendering acceptable service in the missionary Baptist ministry.

Section 2. To aid the churches in this vital matter, the Association will appoint each year a committee of five of the pastors to be called the Committee on Ordination. Any church desiring to ordain a brother to the ministry may request the Ordination Committee to act as a presbytery for the purpose of examining the brother according to the guidelines found under Duties of Ordination Committee.

Section 3. The churches are urged also to exercise the utmost care and wisdom, earnestly seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in calling of their

pastors, choosing only men who give evidence by their Christian character, cooperative spirit and leadership ability, that they will serve the best interests of the churches, the denomination, and the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE IX — NEW CHURCHES

Baptist churches may be organized and established in localities within the territory of this Association when such new churches are seen to be needed. Those interested in organizing a new church may seek the Counsel of the Executive Committee and the Missions Committee of the Association.

ARTICLE X — RULES AND ORDER OF DECORUM

This Association shall be governed in its meetings by such rules and by-laws as may be adopted, amended, or set aside by a majority vote of the messengers present. *Robert's Rules of Order* will be the guide in all parliamentary matters.

ARTICLE XI — ADOPTION

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and shall supersede any and all constitutions, by-laws, and amendments previously adopted.

ARTICLE XII — AMENDMENTS

The Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Annual Meeting. The vote on any proposed amendment so presented should be deferred until the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the messengers present.

PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, October 19, 1982, Evening Session

The 48th Annual Session of the Randolph Baptist Association was called to order on Tuesday evening, October 19, 1982 at 7:00 P.M. at Cross Roads Baptist Church by Mr. Mike Cockerham, Vice Moderator.

1. Hymn No. 67 "Praise Him, Praise Him" led by David Thomas, Music Director of Asheboro First, with Kay Cagle at the organ and Jewel Applewhite at the piano.

2. James Cane, Pastor at Sandy Creek, gave the opening prayer.

CHURCH TRAINING REPORT

Ruth Prince, Consultant in Church Training Department, Baptist State

Convention, led us in a Church Training Enlargement Campaign. On May 16, 1982, there was a Sunday afternoon meeting with all churches invited to attend. Ruth presented to us the programs available through our Church Training Department, the emphasis being on stimulating churches who had not recorded a church training program in the past. While in our association, Ruth had opportunities to speak at the Pastor's Conference and in two of our churches.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

WMU ANNUAL REPORT

During this year, we completed a four year emphasis on "Life-Changing Commitments." Our watchword for the year was Isaiah 6:8, "Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me". The hymn of the year was "Send Me, O Lord, Send Me".

There were many opportunities for training available to the Associational WMU officers. Four of our ladies attended the Early Associational Training conducted by our state leaders in the spring. I represented our WMU at the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest, May 10-12. Four of the officers attended WMU at Ridgecrest, August 7-13. Nine of our officers attended the State Associational Training in High Point on August 21.

As a follow through on the training we received, we offered several training events to the church WMU leaders. On February 1, we had a Mission Action

During the past associational year I was in thirty-eight (38) of our forty-two (42) churches, either preaching, teaching, leading a conference or workshop, or visiting. The joy of preaching in many of our churches is exciting and I am very grateful for the opportunities. My ministry to Randolph Baptist Association has carried me over 20,000 miles to our churches, meetings within the association and conferences outside the association in which I attended for the effectiveness of my work as Director of Missions. Ministering to our churches and association has found me in many roles, such as pulpit committees, sharing in pastor's conference, counseling with pastors and church leaders, attending Brotherhood and WMU Conferences and many, many, other ministries among our churches and the association.

Some of the special events were:

1. Attended a Director of Missions Conference at Southeastern Seminary in Jan.
2. Traveled to Fairmont, West Virginia with Cecil Johnson, Carl King, and Leland Bingham to survey the possibilities of helping the First Southern Baptist Church construct a new building, and to see how our association can be involved.
3. Sharing in the planning of "Here's Hope" Crusade in our association. It was my joy to preach in two of our churches for a week each during this crusade.
4. I was involved with the Greystone laymen in a work project for three days in Fairmont, West Virginia during June.
5. Spoke at Southeastern Baptist Seminary, June 24th to thirty potential Directors of Missions on the topic. "Serving Small Churches as a Director of Missions".
6. I attended the Director of Missions state conference at Wingate College during July.
7. I was one of the missionaries at Mundo Vista, sharing with 200 G.A. girls during a week in August.
8. I attended the Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest in August, sharing and participating in the Director of Missions Conference.
9. During the last week in September I participated in a World Missions Conference in the Carolina Baptist Association, around Hendersonville, N. C., speaking in a different church each night.

Oh, there are many other activities and events that makes my work varied and exciting that could be mentioned, such as administration through the associational office, planning programs and promoting the events, publishing the newsletter to 650 persons per month, the average of 200 letters that we write and mail each month to associational leadership and related programs, and then being faithful to the stewardship that the association has given to me to do.

The two big events this past year that we believe were successful were:

1. **"Here's Hope Crusade"**, in which twenty-four (24) of our churches participated. Weeks of preparation and prayer were put into this crusade. We pray we shall see the results in the months to come.
2. **Christian Family Life Conference**, held at Balfour Baptist Church, October 4-5, 1982. Over 160 persons participated in this two night event. Conferences were held for all age-groups. In the adult group, there were conferences for Singles, Parenting, Married Couples, and Senior Adults. Outside guests led in these conferences. There was around 15 churches represented at this conference.

There are three (3) concerns and challenges that I would mention about our ministry. 1. Growth pains have developed in our association over the past several years as we have adopted expanded programs and mission project involvement, but finances did not come in from our churches to support the expansion. As a result, this past year has been a financial crisis. My prayer is that churches will help us to minister more effectively in the months ahead with increased gifts to the association. The suggested goal is 3% from each church. 2. In two years Randolph Baptist Association will be fifty (50) years old. I would encourage our churches to join us in preparing for a great celebration of our 50 years in 1984. We shall recommend a special committee to begin planning for this time in our association. There is much to be gained by remembering our history. Let's join together as Randolph Baptists in this celebration during 1984. 3. The challenge of missions is always before us. It is our mandate from the Lord. So let us "go into all the world, and make disciples". Let us continue to find areas of need in our county and be willing to minister to them, as well as in other areas outside our county. My prayer is that we will see some new missions and churches rising up in our county and more involvement of lay-persons in mission projects outside of our county.

As I visit around with our churches and its members, it is thrilling to be a part of a group of churches who are excited about being on mission for our Lord. My prayer is that we will become more and more involved in that mission.

Thank you for letting me serve the Lord Jesus Christ with you.

EVANGELISM REPORT

1982 has been an exciting year for North Carolina Baptists in the area of evangelism. Two wonderful things happened in the early part of 1982. The North Carolina Baptist State Convention secured J. W. Hutchins from Virginia to become the Director of our Department of Evangelism. He is a man of insight, wisdom, and enthusiasm and is already making headway among the Baptist of North Carolina in an area where we had been in a state of decline. Many of his ideas are new and exciting and they are like a fresh wind sweeping across our state. It is our hope that new areas of witness will be realized and utilized as he directs our extended efforts to sow the seed of the Word in the hearts of the people in North Carolina.

The second exciting thing that has happened in 1982 was the joint effort between the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the General Baptist Convention in the "Here's Hope" campaign that took place in our state in the spring. Hundreds of Baptist churches in both white and black communities experienced the best revivals with the most exciting outreach that they have had in years. The results of the "Here's Hope" campaigns is difficult to measure. Some churches experienced high numbers of additions while other churches only experienced revitalization of spirit and enthusiasm and burden for the communities in which they were found. These two events have served like a shot in the arm and will help North Carolina Baptists in the cause of Bold Mission Thrust to become more serious about reaching the people of North Carolina with the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

In Randolph Baptist Association the Evangelism Committee tried a new approach for its Annual Evangelism Rally. Instead of having an outside preacher and a preaching event, Mr. and Mrs. David Thomas, of First Baptist Church presented, in March, a concert of evangelistic music. About 200 people enjoyed a full hour of exciting music that inspired and thrilled the listeners with the call and the seriousness of reaching people for Jesus Christ. It was held prior to most of the "Here's Hope" revival meetings in our sister churches. It was intended to be a rally, a point of inspiration, so that our own people could receive the impetus for reaching more people for the kingdom of God. We are indebted to have such accomplished musicians in our association and we are grateful that Mr. Thomas is our Associational Director of Music.

The 37th Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held in Owen's Auditorium in Charlotte on February 7-8, 1983. Some of the speakers for that event will be Landrum Levell, Wayne Ward, Bo Baker, Frederick Simpson, Joe Ford, and Dick Baker.

1983 will mark a new opportunity for pastors and staff people to become involved in MasterLife Training that will be held at Caraway Conference Center on March 7-11, 1983. MasterLife Training is an intense program of discipleship training for lay people of the local church. It will provide an ongoing and ever expanding number of people in the local church who are committed to following Christ and committed to witnessing as a lifestyle.

Projections have been made for an evangelism strategy for the North Carolina State Baptist Convention to reach more people for Christ between the years 1983 and 1992. Listed below are the strategies and the emphases for each year:

- 1983 — Growing an Evangelistic Church
- 1984 — Revival Training Seminars
- 1985 — Witness Training — CWT (Continuous Witness Training)
- 1986 — Statewide Crusades
- 1987 — Target Group Evangelism
- 1988 — Seminar on Evangelism
- 1989 — Partnership Evangelism
- 1990 — Equipping Evangelism
- 1991 — Witness Training (1-2-1)
- 1992 — Cooperative Evangelism

The above strategies will provide an ongoing program for evangelistic involvement on the state level and on the associational level as information material and opportunities are provided for Randolph Baptists to become involved year by year with the commitment to reach people for Jesus Christ.

MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Missions Committee has been pretty busy this year and appreciate your prayers. We as an Association have been paired with the Fairmont, West Virginia Area. And last year we had two persons from that area meet with us in the Annual Meeting. They only had a few minutes on the program but we talked with them after the meeting. We received some information from them and later four persons from the Association traveled to Fairmont and visited

with Rev. Don Walls and Rev. Whitlock, the Area Missionary and the Pastor of Fairmont First Southern Baptist Church. Then we were made aware that money was needed to be of financial help to them. Then we started the Mission Action Plan (MAP) in order to raise some funds to help the churches in West Virginia and also to have a little money for missions in Randolph Association. We have not raised as much money as we had hoped for, but we are now sending \$200.00 per month to help support a young preacher and church planner in the town of Mannington, West Virginia. The Fairmont First Southern Baptist Church is supplying a like amount and the Home Mission Board is also helping financially in this mission. Rev. Steve Waddle and wife, Frances, are on the field.

We have had two or three groups go to Fairmont Church and help in the construction of their new building, and there is still some help of this kind needed. We are pleased to announce that our plea for money to buy chairs for the Fairmont Church has been very successful and the chairs have been bought, paid for, and delivered to Fairmont Church. We thank you for such a good response for this cause. We need several additional members of MAP, however, and I am sure you can get the information about membership from any member of the committee or associational officer.

We have not been able to accomplish what we wanted to in the Association as yet. We had hoped by this time to have a Mission going in the Randolph Association but that is not the case as yet. We have had a few setbacks this summer in this endeavor. Will you please remember this effort in prayer as well as Foreign and Home Missions? Thank you for your prayers and your contributions for missions, both at home and around the world.

WEST VIRGINIA PROJECT

Last year our Association voted to participate in the Mountain 200 Project through our Baptist State Convention. We were assigned to work with the First Southern Baptist Church of Fairmont, West Virginia. They requested three things.

1. Help in constructing their new building, volunteers and financial.
2. Needed 150 stacking chairs for their building.
3. Assistance in other areas of work, equipment, mission opportunities.

WORK PROJECT:

Since May we have had three groups to go to Fairmont, to help in the constructing of the building. There were a total of twenty-four men from Asheboro, First Baptist and Greystone churches who went for a weekend or three days during the week. These work groups put up sheetrock, ceiling tiles and other inside work to help finish the church. The congregation had its first service in the building on Sunday night during Labor Day week-end, September 5, 1982. We are grateful for those men in these two churches who are willing to go and share their time and skill with this church in West Virginia.

STACKING CHAIRS BOUGHT

A special project and effort in May by the Missions Committee of the Association to purchase 150 stacking chairs was successful. Eighteen (18) churches, individuals, or groups gave \$2,600.00 toward the purchase of the chairs. The chairs were ordered on July 14, and delivered during the middle of August. These stacking chairs will be used in the auditorium of the new building of First Southern Baptist Church, Fairmont, West Virginia. At present, the auditorium will be used for multi-purpose functions related to the church. We are grateful to those churches and groups who responded to this request.

MAP

MAP stands for Mission Action Project. It was created and established by the Missions Committee of the Association as a way to minister through our Association in developing new work on mission points in Randolph County and assisting in mission projects in West Virginia or other outside areas. To be a part of MAP, a person agrees to contribute \$50.00 each year over and above his regular contributions to his/her church. The goal of the Missions Committee is 400 persons participating each year. Twice each year an invitation goes to a person to contribute \$25.00 (usually every six months). As of October 10, there were only 58 members.

One of the first projects the Mission Committee decided to do was to assist the First Southern Baptist Church, Fairmont, West Virginia in Pastoral Assistance for their mission at Mannington, West Va., around 25 miles from Fairmont. At the present, we are sending \$200.00 per month. We began in July. \$800.00 has already been sent. The total for this year, 1982, will be \$1,200.

Also, there were some surveying and Backyard Bible Clubs conducted in several areas of our county this summer in search for potential missions or new work possibilities. Funds from MAP helped in these efforts.

As of October 15, the balance in MAP Fund was \$1,459.83. MAP is a worthy effort for our people. Others are encouraged to be a member of MAP. This is our way as Association to reach out to others in love and concern.

BAPTIST HOMES FOR THE AGING

The past year in our North Carolina Baptist Homes has been a good one. We have had 45 persons admitted to the ministry of our Homes and apartments. This represents 98,065 days of special care for an average daily population of 269 persons. The Lord's blessings continue to be poured out upon us.

Great things are in store for our Homes as we look to the Lord, to North Carolina Baptists, and to the future! The Trustees made a decision of far-reaching significance at their May meeting in approving a Capital Funds Campaign. The existing needs at the Hayes Home and Nursing Unit in Winston-Salem present a primary challenge of this campaign. With success, we

will be well on our way to adding much-needed nursing care beds, and resident rooms. We will also be able to provide much-needed upgraded services in relation to our present Nursing Unit, and also construct a desperately-needed Administration Building. We covet your prayers for the success of this effort.

Our major concern presently in our Homes' ministry is in regard to our benevolent care, assisting those who need supplementing financially. Gifts through the Cooperative Program and the North Carolina Missions Offering go a long way in undergirding those who cannot pay the full cost of care. These gifts, totalling \$516,804.00, provided 57% of benevolent care. The many residents who will be looking to the Baptist Homes' ministry for their care and the 43% short fall in mission gifts will place increasing demands on the already over-taxed benevolent funds. Also, many persons on the Homes' waiting list who cannot pay the full cost of care may have a long period to wait because of limited benevolent funds.

We believe, therefore, that if you know the need, you will respond to it by the increasing support that you will give through the Cooperative Program and through the North Carolina Missions Offering. We will be looking to the Lord and to you to help us continue to be the benevolent ministry that we have always been.

We love you, and thank you for your love, your gifts, and your prayers. As Abraham was about to deliver the fatal blow to his son, Isaac, he asked, "Father, where is the sacrifice?" Whereupon Abraham replied, "God will provide!" And so He did! And so, we believed that you will provide!

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Believing that North Carolina Baptists have a right and responsibility to know as much as possible about their institutions, we submit the following information on Baptist Hospital in the hope that it will be of some interest and help.

With 673 beds in use, the hospital admitted 23,350 patients during the past year and provided a total of 210,000 days of patients care. There were 65,381 additional visits to the hospital's outpatient clinics and the emergency room. These patients come from across North Carolina, from other states, and even from other countries to receive the specialized hospital care which our institution offers.

Many of these patients received traditional types of hospital and medical care, but others benefited from new procedures: (1) a new method of delivering anti-cancer drugs by means of an "infusion pump," which is implanted in the patient somewhat like a pacemaker for heart patients. For many patients this has proven to be a more effective and more convenient form of chemotherapy. (2) A new type of x-ray called "digital radiography," used principally for examination of blood vessels, which virtually eliminates expensive and cumbersome x-ray film. This method uses less radiation and requires less dye than standard angiography. It also requires less time and can

sometimes be done on an outpatient basis. It is expected that this method can eventually be used in many areas of the body where x-rays are required. (3) A new type of dialysis for patients with kidney disease called "continuous ambulatory peritoneal dialysis," which involves leaving a special fluid within the peritoneal cavity for several hours while impurities (normally removed by the kidney) are taken from the blood. This type of dialysis not only frees the patient from dependence on a machine but it is also less expensive than the more conventional forms of dialysis.

The Pastoral Care Department continues to provide a pastoral ministry to both inpatients and outpatients and to their families. During the past year, chaplains made a total of 48,209 visits with patients. They provided 923 "on-call ministries" and led 262 worship services in Davis Chapel. The Pastoral Counseling Division provided 8,684 hours of counseling for 855 persons. A total of 63 students were enrolled in various levels of clinical-pastoral education. The Winston-Salem center and also the satellites in Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton, and Charlotte all continued to experience growth both in the types of service provided as well as in the number of people served.

During the year, our hospital again received a two-year approval by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Despite many economic pressures, our hospital continues to operate in the black. It has recently adopted a budget for the new fiscal year which for the first time exceeds \$100,000,00.

Gifts from churches during the past year through the Cooperative Program amounted to \$479,997 and through the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts totalled \$345,765. We are indeed grateful to the churches and their members for this continuing fine financial support.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

All services of the Baptist Children's Homes are available through the Thomasville Family Services Center. These services include: Group living on four campuses, foster care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, emergency care, social work service, care for children in need of specialized assistance, college and technical education, a demonstrational program of preschool child care and development; counseling and professional services to families, and assistance to churches and associations in parent education and family living through the Family Resource Center.

In the Thomasville Area, we are particularly pleased with our Foster Home program and its potential. Foster care provides "one on one" care to certain children. This program has grown and we look forward to being able to serve more children as good Christian people respond to this special ministry by becoming foster parents.

Cameron Home, which provides therapeutic camping for boys from all across the state, has shown steady growth since its beginning in December of 1980. The program is now operating with three groups of 10 boys each. This is a highly specialized program of "friendship therapy" in a small group setting surrounded with nature's incentives for achievement and learning.

Members of the Mills Home Alumni are in the midst of renovating the oldest standing child care building in North Carolina. The Mitchell House was built in 1885 and will soon house a museum which will help us to know "how it was."

Mills Home is at the hub of what we are doing in the Thomasville Area under the capable leadership of newly appointed Resident Director and Associate, Gene and Mary Alice Wilson.

The quality of life for our children has been enhanced this year by the addition of a therapeutic recreation team. Mr. and Mrs. Jim Martin have a fine background that will enable them to help our staff statewide to plan and provide recreation with purpose. They work out of Thomasville.

A new 16mm thirty minute film was released in July called "You Needed Me" and is available for use in our churches. Contact the Children's Homes to schedule this inspiring, instructive film.

Larry W. Sawyer and members of the Thomasville Area Family Services staff are ready to serve those who turn to us for help.

We are grateful for the continuing support of our fellow Baptists through the Cooperative Program, the North Carolina Missions Offering and designated gifts. Like everyone else, we are being affected by short-falls in anticipated income. Programs have to be adjusted but we are careful to maintain quality care for those whom we serve.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

It is important to recognize the value of offering a continuing Christian education experience for our young people when they leave the home community for further vocational training. Our seven North Carolina Baptist Colleges and Universities — Campbell, Chowan, Gardner-Webb, Mars Hill, Wingate, Meredith, and Wake Forest — offer strong academic programs and maintain a Christian influence through departments of religion, Baptist Student Unions, and varied Christian service projects. These schools are open to all qualified students, but they make a special effort to recruit North Carolina Baptist students through pastors and directors of missions.

In this day of spiraling college and university expenses, it is encouraging to know that the Directors of Financial Aid work in every way possible to aid deserving and qualified students.

A most exciting opportunity is offered at Wingate College. The following is an excerpt from Wingate's current colorful and informative booklet:

"Fantastic!"

"The experience of a lifetime!"

"Opened my eyes to the world!"

"These are just some of the comments Wingate students have used to describe Winternational, the exciting Wingate College travel-study opportunity. Not only has the Winternational program won students' favor, it has also captured international attention, having been cited in "The Wall Street Journal" and other major publications. The unique aspect of the program is that every student has the opportunity to travel and study in a foreign country at very little additional cost (lunch, dinner and incidental transportation are all that the student pays). The experience is available to all students, even those of very modest family income levels. Roundtrip air transportation, airport transfers, lodging, breakfast, instruction and excursions are provided.

Participation is at the mid-point of the sophomore year. A student has only to meet the following conditions:

- a. Achieve at least a 2.0 or "C" grade-point average after three semesters as a full-time student;
- b. Maintain high standards of campus citizenship and character;
- c. Complete the fall term Winternational seminar;
- d. Meet all financial obligations to the College and post the deposit for the succeeding semester.

For 1981-82, Wingate students chose either London, England; Vienna, Austria; Geneva, Switzerland; Amsterdam, Holland; or Merida, Mexico. (Cities of destination vary from year to year.)

And after Winternational, students may choose an entire semester abroad at extremely modest additional cost."

CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS REPORT

The purpose of this Council on both the state and associational level is stated in the annual book of reports as: "The Council shall assist North Carolina Baptists in the propagation of the Gospel by: 1. Helping our churches become more aware of the ethical implications of the Christian Gospel with regard to such aspects of daily living as family life, human relations, moral issues, economic life, daily work and citizenship. 2. Helping North Carolina Baptists create with God's leadership and by His grace the kind of moral and social climate in which our witness for Christ will be most effective.

The major thrust for the associational Christian Life Council for this year was the Family Life Conference held October 4-5 at Balfour Baptist Church. Experts in the field of Parenting, Single Adults, Senior Adults, Married Adults, Youth, and Children led conferences that focused attention on how to enrich Christian family life.

The Council plans to choose another area of concern for the churches in Randolph Association as its focus in the coming year. Ethical issues like world hunger, local human needs, divorce, and ministry to senior adults are being considered. The Christian must always fulfill the calling of Christ to set the standard for righteous living in this present world.

THE HISTORICAL REPORT

This is the third year the Historical Report has been made. The main source of information on events occurring in the churches during the year is the church letters. So we hope that each year the churches will report to the Associational Office the main events that have been made history during the year so that these can be summarized and used in the Historical Report. Also, each year we want a brief history of each church where the Association meets which this year are the Cross Road and Mt. Pleasant Baptist Churches. Thus, we are including a brief history of these two churches in this report.

1. The Calvary Baptist Church, C. J. York of Asheboro to the gospel ministry, 1982.
2. Rev. Wilburn Eaton, pastor of the Cedar Falls Baptist Church for nine years, has retired from the pastoral ministry and moved back to his old home community of Seagrove.
3. Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church started a new sanctuary in 1981 and completed and dedicated it in a beautiful ceremony in 1982.
4. First Baptist Church of Ramseur, honored Mr. C. E. York, Sr. for forty years of faithful and dedicated service as church custodian.
5. First Baptist Church of Seagrove paid off its debt in March, 1982 and held the note burning and homecoming service June 6, 1982.
6. Macedonia Baptist Church has started a Sunday School bus ministry.
7. The Richland Baptist Church has completed the lay-out of the church cemetery.
8. Glenola Baptist Church had a mortgage note burning service.
9. Riverside Baptist Church retired its church debt, 1982.
10. Union Grove Baptist Church of Rt. 1, Seagrove continues to operate its mission which has been named the McCook Baptist Church near North Sioux City, South Dakota. The mission pastor is Rev. Clyde Stutts, originally from the Seagrove community.
11. Asheboro, First Baptist purchased a new Allen Pipe Organ during the year. It was installed during the summer months. Funds for this organ were raised in one year, totalling \$84,000.00.

A brief history of the Cross Road and the Mt. Pleasant Baptist Churches follows.

HISTORY OF THE CROSS ROAD BAPTIST CHURCH

In November of 1976, a small group of people began to pray about the possibility of beginning a new church to help reach the masses of unsaved people in Randolph County. Under the Lord's leadership The Cross Road Baptist Church was formed, taking its name from Matthew 16:24. Rev. Don McIntyre accepted the call to pastor the church, and the first formal worship service was held in his home. The VFW building on Albemarle Road was prepared for worship, and the Cross Road Baptist Church was chartered there on May 31, 1978, with 23 members.

By August, the members were able to purchase 13 acres of land on Cox Road on which to build a sanctuary and educational building. The Lord blessed the efforts of the congregation and in September of 1979, when they moved into the completed building, there were 216 members of the Cross Road Baptist Church family.

As the church continued to grow, it became obvious that Rev. McIntyre needed someone to help meet the needs of the people. In March of 1981, after much prayer and searching, the Cross Road Baptist Church called Rev. Paul LeCrone of Little Rock, Ark., to be its Minister of Music and Education.

The motto of the church has been "the church that cares," and its efforts have been aimed at meeting the needs of the total person. The church has just completed some additional educational space and has voted to build the Cross Road Baptist Church Rest and Retirement Center, Inc. in order to minister to the needs of the elderly in Randolph County. Pray for our church as we continue to seek to do God's will in Asheboro and Randolph County.

HISTORY OF MT. PLEASANT BAPTIST CHURCH

On July 6, 1882, the Presbytery met for the purpose of constituting a Baptist church in Randolph County. The charter members had withdrawn from Mount Zion Baptist to constitute a church of like faith and order. From the earliest record book, it is known that the church was functioning in a steady manner and met for a church conference on Saturday before the first Sunday in August, 1872, as was the custom for many, many years.

During its existence there have been four church buildings. The first is believed to have been a log structure and was located near where the present sanctuary stands. The second building was completed in August 1906. In 1962 an educational building was constructed during the ministry of Rev. Gilbert Adams. The present sanctuary was occupied in June of 1982 with Dr. Sam James delivering the dedication sermon. The present pastor, Rev. Alton G. Cook, began serving in January of 1979.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

"SOLID GROWTH AND EXPANDING ACHIEVEMENTS"

"Despite the economic problems in the nation, 1981 was a year of solid growth and expanding achievements with record number in assets, benefits paid and member accounts," said Darold H. Morgan, president of the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Key statistical highlights in 1981 included:

1. A 10 percent 13th Check was sent to annuitants who retired before 1980. Those annuitants who retired in 1980-81 received their 13th Check bonus in their monthly checks.

2. A total of \$24,298,521 was paid in retirement benefits.
3. Total assets administered by the board as of Dec. 31, 1981 were \$896,535,999 compared with \$806,518,757 in Dec. 31, 1980.
4. Relief funds from the Cooperative Program totalled \$357,200.
5. Membership records indicated that 19,299 persons were enrolled in Plan A, 58,930 in Plan B and 4,193 in Plan C.
6. Premium income reached \$72,854,632. Of this amount, \$45,443,258 was designated for the Fixed Fund and \$10,294,788 for Plan A.

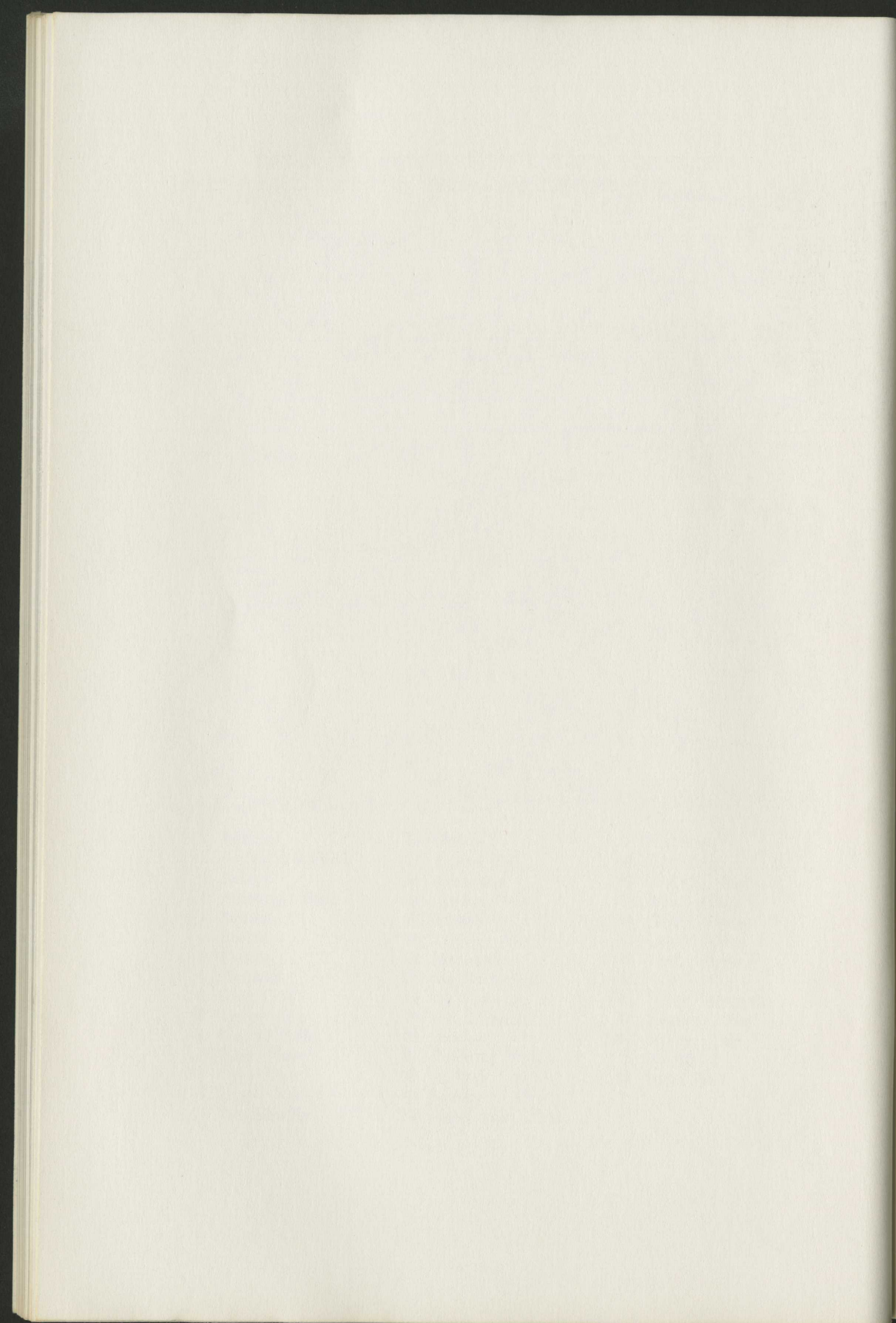
