EDUCATION.

BRETHREN—Your Committee on Education beg leave to make the following report: It is evident that when we take into consideration the great responsibilities and duties which our Heaveuly Father, in His infinite wisdom, has enjoined upon us during our short stay upon earth, that we are ready, at once, to confess that without some knowledge of books we are deficient in the performance of the great task. Education means the development and improvement of the mind. Its object is to fit and qualify men and women for the active duties of life; to lift humanity to a higher state of being. The requirements of the times demand that our boys and girls be educated. We need more educated people to engage in the various pursuits of life. We are deficient in whatever business we may undertake, if we be uneducated. We believe that men who are called to the ministry must educate, in order to accomplish, more fully, the work of causing men to come to the fold of Christ. We need men called of God to preach the Gospel, men whose minds have been developed, whose persuasive faculties are such that men and women may be persuaded to accept the plan of salvation and be saved.

Your committee would therefore recommend Wake Forest College to young men who feel it their duty to preach the gospel. The condition of the college is men who leel it their duty to preach the gospel. The condition of the conlege is such that young men can prepare themselves for the work under the direction of the faculty who are sustained by the Baptists of North Carolina. We would also call attention to female education. We think it the duty of fathers to education. neate their girls, in order that they may be better prepared when they take upon themselves the active responsibilities which rest upon the mother.

DUTIES TO THE POOR. There is no duty more strictly enjoined upon us than the duty of helping the There is no duty more strictly enjoined upon us than the duty of neighing poor. God, in giving his law to Israel, was careful to see that the poor should have protection; and every fiftieth year was to be a year of release. All real estate was to go back to its former owner every fiftieth year, so that the poor should not be oppressed. In the 14th chapter of Luke we are commanded that when we make a feast we are not to call in the rich; but the poor, the halt, the blind; they cannot recompense thee; but in the resurrection thou shalt be recombind; they cannot recompense thee; but in the resultection that shall be recompensed. These poor are Christ's representatives, and He takes what is done unto them as done unto Himself. The evidence of Christianty is to visit the orphans and widows in their poverty. The Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville should have a warm place in our hearts, and we should feel it our duty to give liberally to the poor children who are being cared for at this institution. HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The cause of Foreign Missions is more popular among the Baptists of the South than ever before. The contributions to this work, through the Foreign Mission Board, are drawn from a greater number of meetings and are more systematic, and yield a larger aggregate than at any time in the past. The Southern Baptists have missionaries in China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Cuba, and various other places: and God requires us to do more for Him in sending more missionaries into the heathen nations that have never heard of Jesus. We should labor to promote Domestic Missions. We should not forget that there are hundreds of millions of our fellow beings in heathen lands who have never heard the name of Jesus; and how can a Christian who has the love of God flowing in his soul, rest quietly and never do anything to supply them with the Light of Life.

Now, bretheren, you who have been blessed with more of this world's goods than needed, remember that God requires you to give to these objects as He hath prospered you. And may He give you grace that will prompt you to devise liberal things for Him. The Home Mission Board has done a great work in supplying the destitute places, and still is doing more; and we ought to do more for the Master than we have, and for the salvation of souls.

STATE MISSIONS.

There are many portions of our State where there is no Baptist preaching -a great many of our people who have never heard the Gospel as we preach it. If we believe that we have the whole truth, how can we, as Christ's Church, be satisfied as long as these places are not supplied, which are so close to our doors, and without the Gospel, as we hold it. If we have the whole truth, let us rise up in our strength and in our love for the Master, exemplifying the almighty

are we indebted to those who bring us the gospel of peace. Moreover, the same principle in the law that cared for the oxen and maintained the priests, demands of us this duty, in view of the worth of souls weighed against the few carnal things any of us possess in this world.

This is God's direct plan for carrying on his work in the world, and happy will it be for all churches if we can be aroused to our duty in this important matter. The duty of the pastor may here be briefly stated: It is of the first importance that his life be pure and eminently spiritual. Nothing can take the place of these things. Secondly, he must study the Word he preaches, depending on God, the Spirit, for all his success. And lastly, the motive that prompts him to preach, while it does involve, yet must be above and independent of all mercenary considerations. See I Cor. 9:15-19: there the peculiar danger to the ministry. We must maintain the self-denial of the past, and this, coupled with the advantages of our day, our possibilities cannot be estimated.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Use temperance in all things-temperance in eating, temperance in thought and speech, temperance in joy and mirth, temperance in the gratification of the appetite and natural passions. To-day the use of ardent spirits is destroying all peace, happiness and harmony in some of our homes; disintegrating the morality of our country, and sapping the very vitals of the youth of our land. We believe the All Wise Being will at length remove this threatening cloud from above us, only through the medium of the prayers of his people, for "He heareth the prayers of the righteous."

Further, this Association endorses preachers and teachers, upon whom depends largely to what extent right or wrong, good or evil thrives among us, who use every means, right and proper, to educate and inculcate in the rising generation sentiments opposed to intemperance in all its forms, hoping that thereby the liquor traffic will be, in a measure, set aside in the future
