Lovill, N. C.,

Tuesday Morning, Aug. 30, 1921.

Three Forks Baptist Association met in its eighty-first annual session in the house of worship of Brushy Fork Baptist church. "He Will Carry Us Safely Home" was sung. Prayer was then offered, L. A. Wilson leading.

"Down at the Cross" was sung, after which F. M. Huggins, the appointee for the annual sermon, read John 1 chap. from 35th verse. Prayer by F. M. Huggins. Nearer My God to Thee was sung. Bro. Huggins then announced as his text Luke 14 chap. 23 v. Subject: "Winning the Lost to Christ."

After the sermon R. C. Eggers led in prayer.

Rescue the Perishing was sung.

The moderator called for the church letters that had not been sent to the clerk.

A motion prevailed that the church letters be turned over to the Committee on Finance.

A motion prevailed that W. S. Farthing cast the ballot of the association for the present officers. Bro. Farthing so cast the ballot; Smith Hagaman for Moderator and W. Y. Perry Clerk.

The order of business was read by E. F. Sherwood, and adopted. The moderator invited correspondents and visitors from sister associations to seats. The following brethren reported: Jerry Harrison and B. F. Wilcox from Stony Fork, J. H. Love from Watauga P. P. Hayes from Holston, Tenn., J. P. Wilkinson from Mt. Lebanon, Va., John Hodges from Stony Fork, and Mrs. Victoria Greene from Sweet Water, Tenn.

The pastor and messengers of Brushy Fork church were appointed a committee on Religious Exercises.

DUTIES of PASTORS to CHURCHES

The calling of a minister or pastor is the most important calling in this life. He has the greatest duties to perform, duties which concern this life and that which is to come, and the prosperity of the Lord's kingdom, from a human stand point, depends largely upon the pastors.

The pastor should be the spiritual guide and guardian of his flock. He should ward off dangerous influences and fortify the minds of his people against them. He should teach them their full duty to God and their fellow men.

He should labor to evangelize the unsaved in the community of his church, to add them to his fold and to develop them for service.

The pastor owes it to his church to know something. In the first place, he should know his people, their environments, their associates, their temperaments, and all their needs. He cannot know these things by riding several miles once a month, preaching twice, and then returning home at once. He should frequently be in touch with all his people.

In the second place he should have something with which to supply the spiritual and moral needs of those under his charge. The pastor should give himself to reading and thinking. The Bible should be his main text book. He should know the book, but he should not be afraid of using other books. There are many books that would help the minister in studying and understanding the Bible, and he should have them, and the Baptist pastor should take and read at least one good Baptist paper.

The pastor should also labor for the betterment of the community in which his church is located. He should strive to make it a better place to live in, a better place to raise children in, and a better place to do church work in.

Lastly, the pastor should reinforce his teachings by his examples. The true life of a pastor is one of his greatest assets. He should lead his flock in every good work. He should himself be what he teaches them to be, and ever act as he teaches them to act.

ORPHANAGE

STATE of the CHURCHES

In recent years there has been some increase in the number of additions to the churches. There has also been a general increase in the amounts of their contributions for Pastoral Support, Missions, &c. The financial table however shows, that as yet, there is no general response for the objects fostered by the denomination. Most of the churches contribute nothing to Home, State and Foreign Missions, Ministerial Relief and Christian Education. We believe that these objects are neglected largely because the average church member knows nothing about them and consequently cares nothing. It is the duty of the pastors to acquaint themselves with needs and conditions and lead their churches into this important part of our work.

Another great problem is the enlistment of all the members in church work and placing individual responsibility upon each one. Too many churchmen have taken advantage of their denominational freedom and are in no way actively related to the church. Not more than half of the church members in the association attend their church meetings. Considerably less than half attend Sunday-school and even a less number are vitally interested in church work. We believe these conditions might be remedied to some extent by taking a religious census, more frequent roll calls, stricter discipline and more personal work. Respectfully, G. P. Sherrill, Com.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, AUG. 31, 1921.

The association met and engaged in devotional exercises, conducted by B. F. Wilcox who read Matt. 10:1—15.

John Norris lead in prayer. The congregation then sung "Glory to His Name." Prayer was again offered by B. F. Wilcox.

The association was called to order by the Moderator. The Clerk then read the proceedings of yesterday, amended and adopted.

The roll of messengers was called and absentees erased.

The Report on Christian Education was read by the Clerk who spoke to the same. The report was further discussed by Geo. R. Sherrill, L. C. Wilson, Rev. A. P. VanDusan and E. J. Farthing.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The aim of Christian Education is to make men and women of Christian character.

Ex President Wilson said: "Character is not taught but caught." Therefore, it is very necessary for us to have schools with the proper views of life manned with teachers of strong Christian character.

Granting that the spiritual side of a person is after all the most essential, how can religion be excluded from education? It cannot with out detriment. Education divorced from religion is even more disasterous than no education. Current history has shown us in Russia the baleful effects of no education and in Germany the still more baleful effects of anti Christian state education.

The superiority of the Christian school is shown in the fact that the state school renders a man fit for service to the state, and the vocational school for service to self, but the Christian school makes one capable of service to God and man.

If the members of our churches could be made to realize that the maintenance and enlargement of our Christian schools is a fundamental condition of denominational progress, they would be more careful in the selection of schools for their children.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

In the last 50 years Southern Baptists have made great progress in foreign missionary activities and results. In 1870 we had only 11 missionaries on the foreign fields, and 250 converts, and the contributions of Southern Baptists, for foreign missions for that year am-

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ounted to only \$21,938.

The last conventional year we had 341 missionaries under appointment, 6,998 baptisms, and the native churches contributed \$295,438—an average for all the fields of about \$5.00 per church member.

About one third of the native churches are now self-supporting. We have 544 schools on the fields with 18,000 pupils. We have 16 hospitals in which 205,000 patients were treated the last year. Fifty years ago there were no schools or hospitals of any consequence on these fields.

We now have 457 missionaries under appointment and 611 churches on the fields, with a membership of 59,438. Houses of worship are needed for one half the churches and residences for one half the missionaries.

Our Foreign Mission Board has appropriated something over \$3,-000,000 for the prosecution of foreign missions for this year.

Fifty years ago Southern Baptists had no missions outside of China and one or two other countries. Today they have mission stations on every continent on the globe.

Since the London Conference, steps have been taken and initial work done, towards establishing missions in a stretch of territory in southern Europe, embracing Spain, Hungary, Jugo Slavia, Roumania, Ukraine, and southern Russia. The work in these nations will be done in co-opperation with the native Baptists.

The Board is also preparing to establish missions in five new provinces in China. Plans are also laid to enter Siberia at two different points, east and west, and if all the plans of our leaders materialize, Southern Baptists will have belted the globe with missions.

The above facts and figures are very encouraging but not at all satisfying. Some one has said that if all the Baptists of the world are now doing to evangelize the race, were multiplied by ten, it would not more than suffice to give every one, who has it not, the New Testament message.

The old work on our missionary fields needs to be better equipped.

The new territory in China and Siberia will stand in need of every thing from the foundation, and the work in southern Europe will stand in need of a great deal of help. Our Baptist people there, tho true, are comparatively few, and poor people. There is perhaps, not a page of Baptist literature, outside of the Bible, circulated in any of those nations, and in some of them, new copies of the Bible can not be obtained now, at any price. In some places they copy hymns on paper, to be used in religious services.

They have no Baptist schools nor hospitals in this new territory.

Now if the work, projected by our leaders is accomplished, a great deal of money will be needed to carry it on and develop it.

We urge all our people, who have pledged to the Seventy-five Million Campaign, to redeem their pledges, that the work may not drag. We also urge all who have not pledged anything, to enlist and help to support Foreign Missions, because the fact, that we have not pleaged, does not relieve us of the obligation to contribute, nor shut us out from the privilege and blessedness of giving.

The work also will demand many more workers. The Lord alone can give us these. Let us therefore heed the injunction of the Sayiour: "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest." We should also *earnestly* pray for the success of their labors.

HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board is our great organization for work among Southern Baptists. Its work is largely cooperative with the various State Mission agencies. Here are some of the ways that help is extended:

- I. It furnishes a medium for the strong to help the weak.
- 2. It helps the growing cities to solve their religious problems.
- 3. Country churches are assisted in developing and becoming efficient.
 - 4. The evangelization of our southland is the chief goal.
- 5. It conserves our Baptist people by enlisting them in our work.

The following is a summary of the year's work:

- 1. In the Evangelistic Department there have been 15,567 baptisms and 22,689 additions to the churches.
- 2. Among the Foreigners, Indians and Negroes there were 2,157 and 3,208 additions to the churches.
- 3. In cooperative missions we had eighty Enlistment workers; our Sanitorium treated 298 patients with the great White Plague; much work was done among our soldiers and sailors; our mountain schools had a prosperous year; we aided 824 churches in building; many tracts and books were distributed among our people

We recommend that our people not only give their prayers to this cause, but that they give it their financial support.

STATE MISSIONS

The State Board of Missions is responsible for Foreign Missions and Home Missions, but administers only State Mission funds.

State Missions is divided into the following departments: Evangelism, Church Building, Sunday Schools, B.Y.P.U., W. M. U., and Negro Work. The Colportage work has been changed into a Book

Department. while the Mobile Schools, though serving useful er.ds, have largely been discontinued.

Let us notice the work of these departments.

- 1. Evangelism, or the winning of the lost to Christ is our first and perhaps most important work. The State Board of Missions has employed an Evangelist for the eastern part of the state, and proposes to employ one for the western part. In addition to these, Bro. A. C. Hamby has been secured as general enlistment worker for the state.
- 2. Church Building. Last year there were \$5247.02 contributed to the Church Building fund. This inadequately small sum is supplemented by an appropriation of \$5000 by the Home Mission Board. But even with this it is small in comparison with the demands made upon it.
- 3. Sunday Schools. The Sunday Schools of the state have made phenominal development during the past year.
- 4. B. Y. P. U. This department has accomplished great things in the training of the young people of our state. Under the leadership of Mr. Perry Morgan the work is expected to go forward. The churches of this association should encourage the organization of B.Y.P. U.s for the training and development of the young people.
- 5. W.M.U. This department has proved itself worthy in every way. Last convention year the total contributions of the W.M.U. was \$174,326.98.
- 6. Negro work. Dr. A. W. Pegues has been in the joint employ of our Board of Missions and the Union Baptist Convention, his work being divided between the young preachers of Shaw University and the holding of Institutes among the pastors out on the field.

During the last convention year the State Board of Missions employed 178 missionaries. They supplied 279 churches aided directly by the Board. There were 4,378 conversions, and 1,953 baptisms. \$103,839.42 was contributed to State Missions last year. Of this amount the churches aided by the Board contributed \$12,277.78.

The present situation of our mission work in this state is distressing. Dr. Maddry writes that there is a falling off in the payment of the pledges to the 75-million Campaign. Not over \$628,000, including gifts to the Orphanage, has been sent in for all objects since the last convention. This leaves \$600,000 to be raised by Oct. 31st if we reach our quota. Ten Thousands a Day for Sixty Days!

In this general falling off in the payment of pledges to the 75 Million Campaign, State Missions must suffer with the rest.

We recommend 1, that members of the churches keep their covenant with God and faith with each other in the payment of our pledges to the campaign, 2, that the churches hold revival meetings

making a religious survey as preparation for it; 3, that the pastors preach State Missions at least once during the year; 4, that special collections be taken to supplement the quota to the 75 Million fund; 5, that the pastors secure tracts and other literature from the Board of Missions and distribute them among the members of the churches.

BOOKS and PERIODICALS

Our reading should produce in us three results. First, we should read the papers, magazines and books that will give us general information on the important questions of the day. This will keep us posted on the industrial, social, political and religious world. Without this information we cannot have a strong Christian citizenship.

In the second place, our Baptist people should read books and periodicals that will give them information as to what our denomination is doing. It is not natural for people to be interested in something they know nothing about.

We urge our people to inform themselves through the columns of the Biblical Recorder, Charity and Children, Home and Foreign Fields and other religious periodicals as to what the Baptists are doing.

Ignorance never accomplished anything. The church is in need of

a more intelligent membership.

Your committee urges in the 3d place that our people read the Book that will ground them more firmly in the distinctive doctrines of the Baptist Faith, and that will deepen their spirituality. These are the two paramount needs today of the Baptists of the Three Forks Association.

Report adopted after being discussed by I. G. Greer, W. R. Gragg.

D. D. Dougherty said if there was any pastor in the association who was not taking the Biblical Recorder he would pay his subscription for six months.

the neglect of our old worn out preachers, who have given all their lives in traveling over these hills and mountains almost without money and without price, preaching the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ to a lost world as best they can, doing all they can for our blessed master.

2. If we as a denomination would take care of our preachers in providing for them homes and substantial support, as other denominations do, we feel that more of our young men would be willing to enter the ministry. Therefore we urge our churches to wake up to agreater sense of their duty and do all they can for these old wornout heralds of the cross. We suggest that all of our churches take up a free will offering once a year for this worthy cause.

The Sunday-school is no longer looked upon as a separate and distinct organization from the church, but is now generally considered as a part of the church. It is no longer looked upon as a nursery of the church suited only for women and children, but the best intellect of our association find the Sunday-school work challenging all their energies.

We now have Sunday-schools established in all our churches, most of them running throughout the year. The Sunday-school is generally recognized as being one of the best agencies of the church for evangelistic endeavor and the development of Christian character.

While these things are true and rather plausible, yet we feel that the Sunday-schools throughout this association are falling far short of their possibilities and of their duty as an agency of the church.

We believe that before we can ever reach the maximum of efficiency in the Sunday-school work, our first indespensible duty is to train our teachers. A corps of welltrained teachers means a progressive Sunday-school. A corps of inefficient teachers means an ineffective Sunday-schools.

Again, we need to enlist more church members in the Sunday-school. Considerably less than half of the church members in this association attend Sunday-school. The disinterested churchman is our greatest handicap in the Sunday-school work.

Your committee makes the following suggestions:

I—To enlist indifferent pastors and try to secure their help and co-operation in the work. (Continued page 13.)

- 2—Immediately start a Teacher Training Class in every church, using the Normal Manual.
- 3-Make the Sunday-school truly the teaching service of the church.
- 4—Take a religious census, keep an accurate roll and follow up absentees.

We give thanks unto the Lord for all His bountiful blessings during the year and pray that He may lead us out into still greater service for Him.

We also recommend that all churches that already have W. M. S. organizations provide some work along missionary lines for their young people in Sunbeam Bands or Y. W. A's.

OBITUARY OF BRO. CALVIN S. FARTHING

The members of this Association and its territory, were shocked by the sudden decease of Bro. Calvin S. Farthing which occurred on the 9th of last Jan., while he was away from home. He preached on Saturday at Clark's Creek church and died on Sunday morning following, while the family, where he was lodging were eating breakfast.

Bro. Calvin was a son of Thomas Farthing, deceased, and a grand-son of Rev. William Farthing. He was born Nov. 22, 1849, and was 71 yrs., 1 month and 18 days old at his death.

His opportunities for obtaining an education were seriously interfered with by the Civil war, and the untimely death of his father while he was quite young.

On Sept. 28, 1869, he was married to Kisiak E., daughter of Rev. A. C. Farthing, and by that union were born unto him 13 children, 9 sons and 4 daughters, 10 of whom were left to mourn their loss. His wife and 3 children preceded him to the spirit world—his wife by about ten years. Bro. Calvin professed religion when young, and united with Bethel church Oct. 24, 1866, a few months over 54 yrs. ago and his membership in that body was unbroken until his death.

He was ordained as a deacon Aug. 22, 1886 and served as such till July 23, 1892, when he was ordained to the full work of the gospel ministry, Revs J. J. L. Sherwood, A. C. Farthing, J. H. Farthing and John Norris acting as Presbytery.

He was elected pastor of one church, at least, before his ordination. He served quite a number of churches as pastor in this and adjoining associations, and was pastor of three churches at the time of his death, but he did a good deal of pastoral work in a private way. He never forgot to visit the sick and afflicted, and offer them words of consolation and encouragement.

He was for several years in succession President of the Watauga County Baptist Sunday School Convention.

Our deceased brother had a natural talent for vocal music, and in

his younger years, always joined in that part of Public Worship—an example well worthy of the emulation of our young people of today.

Bro. Calvin was a firm believer in the distinctive principles of the Baptist Denomination, and advocated them publicly and privately.

The passing of our brother reminds us of our own approaching dissolution, and should quicken us in to renewed activity in the Lord's Service, "For the night cometh when no man can work."

"Then what my thoughts design to do, My hands with all your might pursue; Since no device nor work is found, Nor faith nor hope beneath the ground."

Again his passing reminds us of the depletion in the ranks of our clergy. A few years ago there were at least, 5 ministers belonging at Bethel church, now, there is but one in close touch with the church. This should prompt us to heed the Savior's admonition: "Pray ye there fore the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest.

OBITUARY OF REV. J. F. ELLER.

Rev. J. F. Eller was born in Ashe county Nov. 17, 1857.

He professed faith in Christ and joined the Mount Zion church in the same county in 1877. Soon after, he moved to Watauga county and helped to constitute the Union Baptist church, he going into it as one of its charter members.

He was ordained to the full work of the ministry by the above named church in 1886. Some years later he moved his membership to Forest Grove Baptist church where he remained a member till his death.

In Jan. 1920, he was striken with a severe case of pneumonia, from which he never fully recovered, and on Nov. 20, 1920, the earthly tabernacle fell and Bro. Eller passed on to that of the heavenly.

Bro. Eller was a close student of the Old Book and was considered a good and safe interpreter of the same.

He was a man and preacher of strong conviction. He stood against the wrong and for the right.

His activities covered a wide field, and eternity alone can disclose to us the vast amount of good wrought by this man of God.
