ORPHANAGE REPORT.

We Baptists of N. C., have a home at Thomasville which is known as the Baptist Orphanage of N. C. We have for our Superintendent our beloved Bro. J. D. Boone, who is a worthy man for the place. We have about 300 acres of land and 16 buildings. We have 175 children in the Orphan's home now. We hope to be able to care for two hundred by next year. They must be fed and clothed. They are dependent upon the good people of the State for their support. These facts should receive our attention for several reasons. 1st. Because they are poor and God has entrusted them to our care. 2nd. Because they are without parents to train them and educate them. 3rd. Because Christian Education as well as Literary, is what every child needs. We should feel, since the consolidation of the two Conventions, a greater responsibility upon us. Therefore, we recommend that our Pastors and Churches give this Institution their hearty co-operation.

Report on Education was taken up, and pending adoption was spoken to by Rev. Z. J. Edge. Report re-read and discussion continued by John E. White, A. E. Brown, N. L. Shaw, A. B. Smith, A. B. Thomas, A. H. Sims and B. N. Queen. On motion the vote on this report was deferred till to-morrow.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We are glad to report increasing interest among the Baptist people in North Carolina along the lines of education. However there is not the interest among our people in W. N. C., as should be in the point of popular education. Every Baptist ought to be a strong advocate of education. We, therefore, urge our people to strive in every possible way to secure the best Primary Education. We believe that the best way to promote education is to encourage the establishment of primary schools, whenever an opportunity is presented, therefore, we ask that every member of the association give his best efforts to this work in his own community. Without academies our colleges would be useless, and the cause of education would suffer. We heartily recommend to our people, Mars Hill College, under the supervision of Prof. R. L. Moore, Prin.

WAKE FOREST COLLEGE—The last session was the most successful in the history of the college; the number of pupils enrolled surpassed all previous records. The grade of work done and success of the students commend. Wake Forest College to our people.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The call of the times is for an educated ministry. If the Minister is to lift up the people under God, he must be informed. "Like people, like Priest" has been found only too true.

HIGHER EDUCATON—We favor taxation by the State for primary education only, and commend the principle of local taxation as far as possible, but we regard the large appropriation for higher education as too great a drain upon our primary work.

ASSOCIATIONAL SCHOOL.

We lament the fact that the Holly Springs School has failed to meet the demand of our people, and realize the necessity of a Baptist School in which to educate our children. We recommend that this association invite the co-operation of the Haywood Co. and Tennessee River Associations in building and equipping a Baptist School of high grade to be managed jointly by the three Associations, and to this end we recommend the appointment of a messenger to each of these Associations to lay this matter before them and to ask their co-operation; Also that this Association appoint a committee of five wise, judicious brethren to meet and co-operate with a like committee from the above associations in locating and equipping such school. Should either or both of these Associations fail to cooperate, then our committee is empowered to proceed to the establishing of a School at some eligible point.

INSTRUCTIONS TO THE COMMITTEE.

The committee appointed by the Tuckaseige Association to act for the Association in the establishment of a Baptist High School is instructed as follows, by order of the Association:

1st. To organize at once by electing a chairman who shall be empowered to call the committee together whenever it is needful to do so.

2nd. To secure and hold property of all kinds as the agents of the Association. 3rd. To receive and receipt for money or contributions in kind, to use and expend same in purchase of site, building material, and in the erection and equipment of a school building the cost of which shall not exceed \$2000.00. 4th. That this committee be instructed to incur no debt as agents of the Association, either upon its good name or property belonging to it. 5th. That this committee is instructed to confer with and cooperate with like committee from Sister Associations, or any of our conventional Boards, in selecting site and in erection of building. 6th. That this committee report to the next Association an itemized account of all subscriptions made, moneys received and expended under the foregoing instructions.

Adopted by the Association.

HOME AND STATE MISSIONS.

It has been about 54 years since the Tuckaseige Association needed the services of a committee on State Missions. The dissolution of our own W. N. C. Baptist Convention spreads the great State Mission Work all over these mountains. Our State Mission work is co-operative with the work of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Con. The 1899 report of the Home Mission Board shows that this year (1899) the Board employed 653 Missionaries against 467 last year.

Baptisms this year 6,552 against 4,739 last year. Total additions to churches this year 12,983 against 9,509 last year. Sunday Schools organized this year 512 with 14,768 teachers and pupils, against 297 with 7,710 teachers and pupils last year.

FINANCES OF HOME BOARD.

Amount raised and expended on the field for Home Missions this year is 65,818.81 against 554,251.04 last year. There have been collected and expended in building houses of worship on the field this year, 50,050.33. Total amount of money raised on the field this year—not including boxes—is \$115,869.14, an increase in cash received by the Board from the States over last year of \$7,744.14. The value of boxes raised this year by the Women's M. U., under the auspices of the Home Board, is \$22,567.06. Special mention ought to be made here of the "Home Field," a little paper published by the Home Board at 10 cents in the interest of its own work. Pastors can get this paper in clubs of 50 at five cents per copy.

REPORT, FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The spirit is one. But for convenience the great enterprise of giving the gospel to every creature, has been divided into county or Associational. State, Home and Foreign, which divisions have for their basis the last words of our Divine Master: Acts 1:8; "And ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth:" and Mark 16:15; "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Indued with the spirit of our Master and impelled by the magnitude of the task, we should in loving obedience to His will, put forth our best efforts, supported by our means, and directed by the wisest plans under the guidence of the Holy Spirit. To this end under God, the Foreign Mission Board, S. B. C., was located at Richmond, Va., in 1845. The wisdom of the cause surely commends itself to all candid minds, when viewed in the light of facts. The Board began its Foreign mission work with but one station in South China. Now its Missionaries are in China, Africa, Italy, Mexico, Brazil and Japan. The Denomination now has 100 churches, 140 out stations, 35 male and 47 female Missionaries, 27 ordained and 87 unordained native helpers.

Last year they baptized 845, we have a membership of 5,347 and 2,446 S. S. scholars, these Churches and S. Schools contributed last year \$7,110.20. We heartily endorse the work of this Board and earnestly recommend its needs and claims to our confidence, prayers and support,

STATE MISSIONS.

Last year the State Mission Board raised and expended in State Mission work in N. C. \$16,582.91. This does not include the amount we raised in the late W. N. C. Baptist Convention.

This year the State Mission Board has laid out its work on a \$20,000 basis; indeed the appropriations already made exceed that sum. The Board is dealing very liberally with W. N. C. Our Cor. See'y., in the Recorder of 9th inst. says "reports from the workers show that great work has already been done in the field. It has been a notable year, especially in the remarkable outpouring of God's blessings, &c."

However, to this date the Treasurer has received \$2,442.71 only. We have only about three months work till the Convention meets in Asheville. During these three months we need to raise about \$18.000, or six times as much as we have raised during nine months.

Here we add that letters read in this Association from 40 Churches, representing about 4,000 Baptists, show only \$41.00 given to State Missions and to H. M. \$18.00 the year now closing; yet some of our letters were headed The Missionary Baptist Church at——.

We feel that this report should not close without calling attention to The Baptist Book Store at Raleigh; the property of our State Convention. This Book Store can supply you with any book wanted, as cheap as the Pub. Society, and at the same time help State Missions.

REPORTON PERIODICALS.

Your committee on Periodicals beg leave to report as follows:

When we contemplate the reports from the various churches of our Association, it is evident that our people are not as deeply interested in the different objects of our denominational work as they ought to be. We believe that when our people are properly informed, as to the needs of our work, at home and abroad, what has been done, what we are now doing, and what we hope to do, they will readily respond.

How then are we to be enlightened in regard to our denominational interests? We answer by saying that we must keep in touch with the progress of the work in all our Conventions, State, Home and Foreign. To this end we recommend first of all, the Biblical Recorder, which in the hands of our brilliant and able editor J. W. Bailey, is to-day one of the soundest and best Baptist papers in the South.

The Biblical Recorder is no longer a paper for a part of our State, but has become the organ for the Baptists of the entire State. May the day speed to come when this paper will be subscribed to and read by the people throughout this entire mountain section.

We would also recommend the Skyland Baptist, an eight-page monthly published at Mars Hill in the interest of missions in Western North Carolina.

For information in regard to our Orphanage, we recommend Charity and Children. As touching the work done by our Home Mission Board, we recommend to the Association The Home Field and Foreign Mission Journal. As the importance of the right kind of reading cannot be too strongly emphasized, and as this is pre-eminently a time when sound and wholesome reading should be freely circulated among our Baptist people, we earnestly insist that the pastors spare no effort to put into the hands of the members of their churches the very best *Baptist* literature.

HISTORIAN'S REPORT.

The last session of our body was held with the Coweta Baptist church, Macon co., N. C., and was characterized as one of the most spiritual meetings of our body. We had with us Revs. C. S. Cashwell, J. T. Jenkins, H. H. Mashburn and S. W. Hall, whose services and talks were much appreciated and helpful. During this year the W. N. C. B C. was consolidated with the State convention. So now we have one convention, reaching from the Sea-shore on the east to Ga. and Tenn. lines on the west, in which we hope to unite all our Baptist forces in one continual effort to carry the gospel to all the world. Revs. G. N. Cowen graduated at the S. B. T. Seminary, Ky. with A. B., and W. R. Rickman, of Macon connty, at Wake Forest, with A. B. Rev. A. H. Sims moved from 1st to the 2nd District, and took charge of the work at Franklin, Rev. A. T. Hord moved from Glenville to Cleveland, N. C. Rev. A. J. Galloway, Jackson Co. Rev. Wm. Dewees, of Macon co., two of our oldest Ministers have died. As they were faithful to the end, we would suggest that a Memorial page be placed in our minutes of them.

Revs. J. A. Brendle and C C. Rickman attended Wake Forest last year and expect to attend this year. Rev, G. A. Bartlett moved from Franklin to Canton. Ga., and took work there. Rev. C. A. Ridley moved to Ga., and is in school at Mercer University. Rev. Z. J. Edge moved from Pensacola to Sylva, N. C. A. B. THOMAS, Historian.

By motion, ordered that a collection be taken just after the 11 o'clock sermon to-morrow for State Missions. Report on State of Churches read and adopted.

15 REPORT ON STATE OF CHURCHES.

We, your committee, submit the following report on State of Churches: A careful examination of the letters sent up by the Churches shows that they have enjoyed an increase of 243, and suffered a loss of 142, making a net gain in total numerical strength of 101. The churches report that they gave to missions \$130.68; and to other objects including Pastors' Salary \$1729.49. A. W. YOUNG, Chairman.

The Association met persuant to adjournment; Sang "Beautiful land." Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. A. B. Thomas. Prayer by Bro. Hooper. Minutes of previous day were read and approved. Sunday School report was taken up and, pending adoption, was spoken to by Rev. W. R. Rickman, Rev. A. B. Thomas, R. F. Jarrett and N. L. Shaw, and was adopted.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

Dear Brethren: Your Committee find that 33 Sunday Schools have been reported to this Association, against 35 last year. We also find that over 2500 children attend these Schools, an increase of more than 700 over last year, and that \$119.25, has been expended for Literature, and only \$52.34, for other objects. Nine Churches have not reported any Schools. Now, brethren these 2500 children will soon become the controlling element in our Churches, and just as they are trained in the Sunday School, they will develop into usefulness in the

church work. We recommend that each School take a collection each quarter for the associational year as follows:

4th quarter, 1899 for State Missions.

1st. " 1900 " Ministerial Education.

2nd. " " " Foreign Missions.

3rd. """" Orphanage.

We would urge each pastor and Superintendent to tell the children that these 2500 children are expected to contribute to one object, and in this way bring their gifts together for the Lord. In this way we can develop them in the grace of giving. Brethren, the teacher can get nearer the hearts of the children than the pastor, so we should look well to the one that teaches our children in the Sunday School. We also advise the Schools to buy their Literature from the Baptist Book Store, Raleigh, N. C.
