Bro. D S. Kennedy offered the following resolution :

Believing that the best interest of the Denomination demand that a permanent record of the proceedings of each Association be kept on file.

Therefore be it ordered, That the Clerk of the Association be instructed to call on the Treasurer for sufficient funds to purchase a suitable book for preserving the records, and that the Clerk be instructed to transcribe the proceedings in said book.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Among the last words spoken by Jesus Christ to his followers, we find these: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature," and "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." And they were directed to begin at Jerusalem. The special work which our State Board of Missions is striving so hard to prosecute, is the carrying of the gospel of the Son of God into every portion of our own State.

For fifty-six years this course has claimed the attention of the Baptists of North Carolina, and at some time the Missionaries of the Board have traversed every section of the State, and their foot-prints are found in every county (1) the commonwealth. And as they have gone forth with weeping, "bearing precious seed," the promise of our God has been verified, and his power manifested. These gospel seed have sprung up into an abundant harvest, and the "feeble folk" that we were a half century ago has become a great people. Instead of the 14 Associations, 272 churches and 15,360 members in all our churches, at that time, we now have 85 Associations, 2,222 churches and 225,322 members. What a great work hath the Lord done for us! And this year the results are even larger than at any time in our history. The Board has seventy-two Missionaries in the field, and is paying ten more men than at any former time. And the reports which have come up from all parts of the State from the Missionaries and pastors, alike, are most wonderfully encouraging. Numbers of new churches and Sunday schools have been organized, scores of meeting houses are going up and thousands have been "buried with Christ by baptism."

And yet there are vast fields still opening up before us and crying unto the Board to "come over and help" them. The men, too, are ready to go. Our great need is the money to send them. Will not the Eastern Association come to the relief of the Board, and nobly aid in this great work?

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

For fifty-two years our people have had such a paper in the *Biblical Recorder*. The oldest and most widely circulated paper in the State. The *Recorder* is an instrumentality in the hands of God for the accomplishment of much good. It is sound, conservative, though aggressive; a strict adherent to the old theology, and a fearless defender of truth.

Y our committee is convinced that the interests of our churches would be materially advanced were the *Recorder* more widely circulated among them. We therefore recommend to the churches the advantage of appointing a special committee in each church to assist the pastors in securing subscriptions. This would not only insure the *Recorder* a larger list of subscribers, but be a means of greater usefulness to many brethrep and sisters who wish to be active for the Master.

Your committee also especially commends the Foreign Mission Journal and the *Kind Words*, Sunday School lesson helps.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Forty years ago this Board began operations with six Missionaries. It proposes to preach the gospel in destitute places in the South, and to the Indians, to furnish instruction to the colored ministry, to aid in building houses of worship where they are needed, and to supply periodicals for the better instruction of our Sunday Schools. During the past year the Board has had in the field 255 Missionaries, of whom 14 have labored in western North Carolina; 9,599 weeks of labor have been performed, and 3,812 baptisms are reported; 45 churches have been built on mission fields; aid has been extended to feeble churches to the amount of \$10,000.00, so that this amount added to that spent on the Mission churches aggregates the sum of \$25,000.00 expended on church buildings, under the direction of the Board. The Board has received \$45,824.89, and reports \$48,696.14 expended by bodies directly co-operating with it. Making a total of \$94,-521.03. Your committee is glad to report that the Board is continually enlarging its operations, and receiving more and more the confidence and support of churches. In four years the number of Missionaries has increased three-fold, the weeks of labor five-fold, and the baptisms fifteenfold. The results have increased much more largely than the contributions, which are only about twice what they were four years ago.

At the last session of the Convention an advance was made in the work of the Board in several directions. It was determined, if possible, to do a larger and more efficient work in evangelizing the colored people and the churches were asked for \$10,000.00 for this specific work. A new and most interesting mission providentially developed in Cuba was placed under the care of the Board, and it was resolved to remove the Sunday School paper. *Kind Words*, to Atlanta, where the Board is located, and to add the publication of periodicals, such as have proved so prosperous and efficient under the management of the Baptist Publication Society, of Philadelphia.

To accomplish this greatly enlarged work the Board will require enlarged contributions, and in their estimate of the amount required they ask North Carolina to give this Board \$5,000 00 this year.

This Board is heartily endorsed by our State Convention. It has helped us greatly in times of sore need, and is helping our dear old State now, and hence has special and urgent claims upon our support. T. H. PRITCHARD,

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education beg leave to report a constantly increasing interest in general education, and to note with unfeigned gratitude the unprecedented success of Wake Forest College. This child of our toil, our hopes, our love, our prayers, has assumed dignity, attained a growth and formed a denominational factor, for which we thank Almighty God. Wake Forest opened the current year with 180 students, the largest number ever known in its history, at the opening of its session. There are about 40 young men studying for the ministry, about 30 of whom are receiving aid from the Board of Education. The Education Board needs all the funds its friends can raise; and we suggest that increased efforts be made to enlarge contributions to the Board. We take pleasure in stating that our female colleges at Murreesboro, Oxford, Thomasville and Shelby, are doing good work, and afford ample facilities for the education of our yeung women.

We desire to draw special attention to our own school at Warsaw, under the management of Rev. W. M. Kennedy and son, who are prepared to meet the demands of the patrons, and who should receive the support of this Association, whose property this school is. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Dear brethren, during the year we have had Elder T. J. Baker in our employ, who has spent the whole of his time in the county of Onslow. He has held regular services at Barlow's Chapel, Salem, Piney Grove and Rose Hill, and occasionally at Stump Sound and Jacksonville. He has held protracted meetings at all his churches, and reports six bap-tisms. He has collected in his field about one-half his salary. He also assisted Elder C. S. Cashwell in protracted meetings at two of his churches.

Elder W. M. Kennedy has given one-fourth of his time at Chinquepin. and reports five baptisms and much interest, and will organize a church at that point next week.

With a little help from us Elder C. S. Chashwell has given one-fourth of his time at Emma's Chapel, and reports sixteen accessions, and a growing interest in that section

In a small way we have also helped the churches at Teachey, Burgaw and Willard, in supporting a pastor. Elder R. C. Sandling reports fifteen accessions at Teachy, and that they have a house of worship well under way; also thirteen baptisms at Willard. Elder W. B. Pope reports four accessions at Burgaw and increased interest in that town.

The amount of the pledges for our work at our last Association did not justify us in undertaking any more than the above work, and but for the fact that we had a surplus on hand from our last year's work, and that our missionaries have received considerable aid in their fields, we would not have been able to accomplish this much.

We recommend that the entire missionary work of our Association be turned over to the State Board, provided, however, that it shall not be understood that the Executive Committee shall be abolished.

It has not been quite two years since the Asylum was organized, but the Lord has put it into the hearts of some of his people to give liberally of their means, till about \$15,000 have already been given. Three buildings have been finished, and the foundation of five others laid. Some forty-three orphans are already at the institution and they are constantly coming in. This is work that seems to meet the approbation, not only of God, but of our people where its claims are presented.

We take great pleasure, therefore, in commending it to the Christian sympathy of all our churches.

During the thirty-one years of our union with the Triennial Conven-tion, southern Baptists raised for Foreign Missions \$212,000.00, nearly an appual average of \$7,000.00

annual average of \$7,000.00. We now have fifty-eight missionaries of our own, with about an equal number of native assistants in China, Africa, Italy, Brazil and Mexico, with an annual income of over \$82,000.00.

We ought to be gratified and liberal because God has so henored us, that in this number of Missionaries two are from our own Association— members of our own household—Brethren Bryan and Herring. Indeed they are all a noble band of efficient, self-sacrificing men and women, and are entitled to our sympathy, our prayers and our unstinted support. MINUTES OF THE

CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith. hav-ing been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels, and this assem-bly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Ghost, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cherfully and regularly to the support of the ministry; the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the Gospel through

all nations. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaint-ances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour

to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour. We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to rewe further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to re-member each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offence but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay. We moreover engage that when we toppose from this relevance in

We moreover engage, that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out

the spirit of this covenant, and principles of God's word.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chaiman pro tem shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4. The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

S. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a de-finite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Associa-tion without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association; and if any shall do so their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ARTICLE 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ARTICLE 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers members of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, elected by the church in conference assembled.

ARTICLE 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certi-fying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church: *Provided*, *however*, That when any church has pre-pared a letter and through inadvertance the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ARTICLE 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ARTICLE 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ARTICLE 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of the body, and disburse the same as ordered by the A sociation. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

ARTICE 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which Committee shall have the superintendence of As-

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sociational Missions and Colportage. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge, and during intervals between the meetings of this body to disburse funds for those objects, and to take such steps for their advance-ment as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

ARTICLE 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to preserve Gospel order.

ARTICLE 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privileges of the body except that of voting.

ARTICLE 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ARTICLE 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introductory sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ARTICLE 14 This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
