## Higbest in 7 Years SEBTS' Enrollment on the Rise! By Dwayne Hastings

SEBTS' spring enrollment jumped 27% over last year's springtime mark prompting Southeastern's Registrar, Sheldon Alexander, to say that the trend in student growth is "definitely up." Alexander further noted that, "This represents Southeastern's largest spring semester enrollment in 7 years." (775 total enrollees)

The count of new students entering the seminary this spring likewise reflected a sharp increase, moving up 44% over last spring and nearly 100% over the 1990 spring semester. Alexander said that the administration was "not placing too much emphasis on the numbers," but did regard them as an indication that things are moving in the proper direction.

Activity by the Admissions Committee suggests that strong enrollment growth should be expected to continue. The Admissions Office reports that as of 88% mid-March more have been applicants approved for enrollment in the summer and fall terms than were as of the same period in 1993

# Entbusiasm and Optimism Prevails Trustees Kneel, Pray, MR 24104 MR 24104 MR 24104

*Wake Forest, NC*---In a decidedly enthusiastic, optimistic climate twenty-eight of the thirty Trustees of Southeastern Seminary assembled March 14 and 15 in Broyhill's Hall of the Presidents for their semi-annual meeting

meeting. They heard devotionals by Ed Long, Minister of Youth at Parkwood Baptist Church, and from Julian Motley, SEBTS Adjunctive Professor and member of the Executive Committee. All trustees knelt in a season of prayer following Motley's devotional from Ephesians.

Trustees heard the President's Report given by Dr. Paige Patterson, met in committees with staff, approved several items of business, and adjourned ahead of schedule.

Highlights of the President's Report include:

**1. SACS** has returned SEBTS to full accredited status, while the **ATS** report is expected in June.

2. NEW CURRICULUM has been developed by the faculty and president. It emphasizes a classical, yet practical approach to pastoral and church growth studies.

**3. ENDOWMENT GIFTS** are now being sought to endow ten teaching chairs for the school. Each chair costs approximately \$1,000,000, with moneys already promised to endow the Bailey Smith Chair of Evangelism. Three more chairs are nearly committed. Patterson hopes to announce that moneys for five chairs have been committed, by the SBC in June, 1994.

4. THE MANOR HOUSE is in serious need of renovations, since it is discouraging to house prospective students there.

**5. A BOARD OF VISITORS**, if established, would help in the areas of financial development, student recruitment, and public relations.

**6. VACANCIES** exist in the areas of Christian Education, Church History, and Preaching. With the move of Dr. Phil Roberts to the HMB, a vacancy will exist in Evangelism also.

**7. TOTAL STUDENT ENROLLMENT** is now 775, with 609 as full-time enrollees. This appears to be the highest percentage of FTE's to total enrollees of any of the SBC seminaries. Over twenty prospective students visited campus last week. Next year's enrollment could be as high as 1,000.

8. ATS HAS ASKED THAT THE A.DIV. PROGRAM BE PHASED OUT. The President was reluctant to do so entirely, because of the tremendous need that exists. (Approximately 1/3 of the SBC pastors have not had training for the pastorate.) To accommodate these folks, a prebaccalaureate program in theology could be implemented.

9. SEBTS WILL LOSE
\$331,000 in Cooperative
Program funds as a result of "the thaw in the freeze."

1. INCREASE MATRICULATION Fees by \$5.00 per-credit bour.

2. THE 1994-95 BUDGET was adopted.

3. A BOARD OF VISITORS was established.

4. AD HOC COMMITTEE TO STUDY FACULTY STATUS, TENURE, ETC. was appointed.

5. COMMITTEE TO STUDY POSSIBILITY OF "UPPER LEVEL" B.A. was appointed.


6. ADMINISTRATION was requested to propose a PAY SCHEDULE FOR FACULTY, SPECIAL FAST TRACK SELECTION PROCESS, and evaluate present FACULTY SEARCH PROCESS.

7. NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR THE PRESENT DEGREE PROGRAMS were approved.

8. PROFESSOR MAX ROGERS was granted SABBATICAL LEAVE.

Finally it happens! Your prayers have been answered and God has directed you to a totally different area than you had anticipated. What am I talking about? The very thing that is on the minds of all graduating seniors; and on the minds of many underclassmen.

Seriously, I have joined the ranks of the privileged few to whom God has given the charge to care for and lead His flock. Even as I write this, I am amazed that God would bestow such an honor upon me.

At this writing, I have been pastor of Sandy Creek Baptist Church about three and one-half weeks. In that short time we have seen four folks come to know Christ as Savior. Also, there have been several rededications. In addition to these decisions, two people have surrendered to Christian service: one to full-time missions, and the other to starting a prison ministry.

These very exciting and meaningful decisions have had absolutely nothing to do with me. Clearly, God has been working at Sandy Creek, and has blessed me by placing me there.

In the midst of these very positive, life-changing experiences I have also been very involved with two families that have had loved ones to die quite unexpectedly. In my previous profession as a police officer, I had been involved with countless situations where people had died. I have lost friends and co-workers to death, as well. The one constant factor is a sense of helplessness. This is how it was with me this week. However, in the life of one of our church families who lost their mother, one would plainly see the abiding strength of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I was with the family in the hospital when the doctor told the three grown men that their mother did not survive the ambulance ride to the hospital. Battling my own emotions was difficult enough, but seeing these brothers rally to one another in the strength of Christ was wonderful! In the hurt and shock of the moment, the comfort of knowing their mother was in Heaven provided a peace that surpassed all understanding. In unison they said, "She lived her whole life to be where she is right now." Their pain was as intense as any I have seen, but our Lord provided strength and special grace when they needed it!

I was there as their pastor, but I could do, nor say nothing. I had met their mother once, and can still remember her smiling face. Now, as her family goes through this difficult time, they have a legacy that all who know Christ as Savior and Lord share in. I believe when that day comes for all of us, we will hear our loved ones say, "You won't believe it! He's right over here! Let me take you to see JESUS!'



# Roberts to Head HMB's Interfaitb Witness


The Southern Baptist Home Mission Board has selected Southeastern Seminary Professor Phil Roberts to lead the Board's Interfaith Witness Department. Roberts, currently Associate Professor of Evangelism and Church Growth, is wellknown on the Southeastern campus for his work in evangelism and pastoral training in Eastern Europe countries. He said that this appointment "does not mean that I cut all my ties and involvement in overseas work."



Roberts noted that it will be a "fresh challenge" directing the Interfaith Witness Department, but that he is convinced that interfaith witness is "one of the most crucial opportunities in all of Southern Baptist Life." The church growth professor, who has pastored churches in Belgium, England, and Germany, said that much of our evangelism is "to people with the same world view and values we have."

He remarked that "a vast majority, four-fifths, of the world's population are not of a Christian background" and that Southern Baptists can witness to

those other faiths right here in the United States. In assuming his new duties June 1st, Roberts will be taking charge of a depart-ment that was rattled last year by the Freemasonry controversy. Masons, like any other group, open themselves to examination when they make theological statements, said Roberts. Yet he noted that there are "many other movements" besides Masons for Southern Baptists to consider.

In order to point them to Jesus, we had better get seriously active in creating modern methods to deliver the unchanging message of Jesus Christ to a spiritually hungry generation.



# Why every student should major in Theology!

## AN INTERVIEW WITH DR. KURT RICHARDSON

Kurt Richardson is a man with a vision. That vision is far-reaching concerning this country, this denomination, this seminary, and YOU, a student at this seminary. Richardson believes that sound theology is a key to our growth and ministry. The EnquirY recently visited with him to discover facts about his background, his views on theology, this seminary, and other related topics.

Chichardson was born in southern California. He grew up the oldest of three children in a strong Christian home. He became a Christian at age six. At a large youth rally in 1974, Richardson also answered God's call to ministry. From that time forward, he has continued in a strong commitment to evangelism.

He attended Trinity Evangelical Divinity School in Deerfield, Illinois to gain his M.Div. degree. While at seminary he pastored a Southern Baptist Church where he was licensed and served faithfully. Shortly after graduating and getting married (they happened nearly simultaneously), they moved to Basil, Switzerland. There Richardson earned his Doctor of Theology degree, studying the great evangelical Scottish theologian, Thomas F. Torrance. Before concluding his work in Basil, he was called to Southeastern in the summer of 1987.

That move was "one of the hardest things I have ever done," said Richardson, "stepping induring the hottest year of the controversy within the SBC. Without having long-term relationships here, we had to go it alone and trust the Lord. However, during this time I had the opportunity to receive one of God's most precious gifts: perseverance. My wife, Dolores, on a human level, has been my one true mainstay."

**On SEBTS** 

"My wife and I are very excited about the present and future of Southeastern. With our children, we pray every night for the Seminary and everyone here. I see a splendid mixture of missiological and theological emphases---the practical and the academic---all strongly represented here.

Also, because of the unparalleled attractiveness of Southeastern, the only real question for us in leadership here will be the limits of our faith, and the quality of stewardship. Pray earnestly that God will pour out resources for greatly increasing the number of faculty."

## On Unsound Theology

"The Ethiopian eunuch felt the need to know what is in the Bible, and he felt just as great a need to know what it meant. While it is always right to read the Bible, the history of Christianity shows is that there are many ways to read the Bible wrongly. Paul, constantly burdened for the increasing understanding of unbelievers, reflects a constant concern that Christians are easily deceived and self-deceived. Deceptions in the life of faith can only lead to bad faith, poor preaching, and a discredited witness. However, sound theology teaches us in all those areas."

On Sound Theology

"Sound theology focuses on doctrine (with doctrine being defined as) all that God teaches us that is necessary for life with Him in the church and in the world. Good theology organizes the best understanding of doctrine that the church of Christ, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, has to offer, and transmits it to the next generation of faithful teachers and believing servants of the Lord."

#### The Burden of Theology

"The burden of theology, beyond Biblical interpretation, is to identify how God's Word works as the Authority in Christian life and work. On the practical level, doctrines are decisions. The true Christian teacher and theologian is charged with the responsibility to make decisions or defend them regarding the weightiest matters of God's revelation to the people of God and further to set weightier passages of Scripture over and against others which may appear to be incompatible. Without this decisiveness, essential matters of belief and obedience could not be acted upon in practical life."

## Weaknesses of the Church

"Each age of the church has its own severe weakness. Today that area is the *doctrine* of the church. Baptists have had a problem with doctrine historically. Being rejected by and rejecting the offices of state churches, prioritizing thought and behavior that contribute to revival, and, in the twentieth century, putting programs ahead of all else, have all conspired to produce a rather *doctrinally illiterate* band of Baptists.

Today, against every Baptist instinct, institutionalization has all but replaced the true character of the church as the body of Christ. Earlier, revival could reverse this process, but, another aspect of this crisis is the fragmentation, divisiveness, and estrangement of its leadership and its members toward each other. Not only is this fragmentation a trend, but it has become a state of affairs so that only deep revival and reform, in terms of re-formation, can improve this situation. There is a little secret about our concern for America and its need for God: reform the church! That is one task, and I think that is the only task that will help America find God.'

# Passing the Vision

"The godly father of Proverbs 4:5 exhorts his son, 'Get wisdom. Get understanding.' Theology is that wisdom and that understanding. Paul says to Timothy in his second letter (2:2), '...the things you have heard from me entrust to faithful men...' My plea to every student here is to be faithful to get the doctrine. This is one of the only ways you can show yourselves to be trustworthy as you pass it on."

Richardson and his wife, Dolores, are the parents of four children. He has been part of the Southeastern faculty since 1987 and serves as Assistant Professor of Historical Theology.

# Library Lines The Church Curriculum Center:

THE place to browse, learn, plan...

**Definition: Special Collection** A collection of library materials separated from the general collection because they are of certain form, on a certain subject, of a certain period or geographical area, rare, fragile or valuable.

This is the American Library Association's<sup>1</sup> official definition of a special collection, and *we've got one!* It's called the Church Curriculum Center and it is located on the second floor in the north wing of the library.

Begun in 1973 in what is now the copier room, the CCC is a sub department of the Reference Department. It was moved to the second floor in 1980 and has remained there ever since.

The CCC is staffed by Barry Jimmerson, a part-time Reference Assistant and student. He is backed up, and reports to, Mrs. Jo Philbeck, Assistant Librarian. Barry is available at specified times during the week; but, if you can't catch him, you can always leave a note for him. Forms for this purpose are available in the CCC.

The CCC has a mission. It is to "Provide current church curriculum materials for examination by ministers." This is extended to any person involved with a church program, any student, faculty member, or staff person at SEBTS. The whole idea is to provide a resource for investigating the various types of materials available to you for use in your church's programs from the different agencies within the SBC.

Barry tells us that, "I have been able to use much of this stuff in conjunction with my classes and as a resource in paper writing." Let him who has ears...

The materials in the CCC are provided to the Seminary through the convention as a

reference collection. That means that what's on display is ours for in-house use only. However, if you are interested in looking over these materials with people from your churches, you may request overnight use of the materials, or make copies to take to them. Here's another idea though. If you have found materials that you would like to share with your church, why not invite them to The Library? You can then show off these materials and any others that we have which may be of interest to your folks. We can even set aside a room for your use.

Locating materials in the CCC can be a little confusing, but not after you understand the system. Here's the system. There are two paths to locating materials;

Path One: Look in the large notebook titled the <u>Church</u> <u>Materials Catalog</u> located on a stand under the window. This catalog has a title index located in the back of the notebook. There is also a subject index for materials that you don't have a title for but want to find something on. From the title or subject index, turn to the page listed to find items.

Once you have chosen an item, check for the alphanumeric catalog number. Using this number you can look around the room where, under the letter posted on the wall, you will find all materials which begin with that letter of the alphabet shelved in alphanumeric order. An example of this would be item number K3-11 where **K** indicated the shelf for "Single Adult Ministries", **3** indicates the third shelf down, and **11** indicates the 11th item on the shelf.

Path Two: Look around the room at the different signs posted. They will direct you to materials shelved together by type. In other words, materials are shelved together because they are Sunday School Board materials, or because they are WMU materials, etc. By the way, resource kits, etc., can be found in the desk drawers labeled to correspond with the sections H, I, J, K, etc.

Improving your use of resources is an effective way of improving your ministry. The CCC has the resources you need to help you and your church reach the world for Christ. Hope to see you there.



The long-awaited news finally arrived by letter. Lolley Dorm Manager, Cheryl Cobb, will spend the next two years of her life serving God in a former Soviet Central Asia country.

Her journey began eight years ago, when, as a 2-year-old Christian, she was carted off by members of her home church's Women's Missionary Union to Ridgecrest for a conference. There she heard missionaries speak and ended up riding in a van with Frances Tolley, a retired Southern Baptist Missionary to Japan.

"I just remember speaking to her, and something within me said, "Cheryl, one day you're going to be on the mission field,' "Cobb said.

Now, Cobb is trying to figure out how to get two years of belongings into two suitcases and a trunk.

"She's going to a challenging place, and I think God's going to bless her pioneering spirit," said Dr. Keith Eitel, professor of Christian Missions.

Cobb, 30, of Greensboro taught severely and profoundly handicapped children for six years at Gateway Educational Center. In Central Asia she will teach English as a second language at a university, through International Service Corp.

She knows little about what to expect when she arrives in the predominantly Muslim country. There are about three million unreached people in the university city where she will work. "I'm going to a hot country," Cobb


said. "They say last summer it got up to 120 degrees." She already has begun learning how to overcome adversity during three short mission trips to Brazil and two to Romania. "On every trip I saw different aspects of missions and what it is all about," she said.

During her third trip to Brazil, Cobb found herself caught is a flood and trying to help a Brazilian family. "I really understood and felt how the people had to live," Cobb said. "I began to feel the fears that these people have to live with every day. I also felt how quickly life can change."

Lolley dorm resident, Angela Huskey, is collecting items for Cobb to take on her two-year teaching trip. Anyone wishing to help Cobb as she prepares for missionary service should contact Huskey at 556-3711.

"Since I have known Cheryl for the past two years, she has felt the call to lead other people to Christ through foreign missions." Huskey said. "Her call is finally becoming an actuality, and I and others would like to help her as much as we can."
