## ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

## CURRICULUM\*

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the A.Div., M.Div., M.A.C.E. and M.A.C.M. programs, or entering candidates for those degrees. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admissions to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-degree studies.

The maximum course load permitted per term is four semester hours, H2324s, M4701s, and M4231s excepted. Students who elect language study may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, unless otherwise noted.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio or to cancel a course if enrollment is not sufficient.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours' credit for the completion of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1989-91, pg. 108. In order to receive credit, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report form at the conclusion of the course (M4360s - M4361s).

## Admission

Currently enrolled students need only to register on the designated days.

Students applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog, 1989-91, pp. 25f, and register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to summer school on any other basis should be received in the Registrar's Office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. For additional information, write: Registrar, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina 27588.

## Registration

First Term: On Monday June 4, 1990, orientation activities will be held for entering students. Classes begin on Tuesday,

June 5. Enrollment in classes closes at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 6.

Second Term: On Monday July 2, 1990, orientation activities will be held for entering students.

Classes begin on Tuesday, July 3.

Enrollment closes at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 5.

## Withdrawal

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:30 p.m. June 8 in the first term and until 4:30 p.m., July 10 in the second term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance. A student enrolled for only one course who withdraws from that course must complete the process for withdrawal from enrollment.

## Fees

### Inter-Term

Matriculation Fees for Inter-term Courses:

2-3 hours	\$50.00
4 or more hours	\$80.00

In addition to matriculation fees, professors may also collect additional fees for supplies, travel expenses, etc. necessary to complete the inter-term classes.

### Summer School Terms

The matriculation fee for summer school is \$80.00 per term. This fee is not refundable after 4:30 p.m. on June 8 for the first term or after 4:30 p.m. on July 10 for the second term. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken.

In addition to the matriculation fee, each summer school student will be charged a Summer School Student Services Fee of \$10.00. (See page 31 of 1989-91 Catalog.)

## Housing

Inquiries concerning housing accommodations for the summer terms should be directed to the Director of Housing. Dormitory rental rates for Johnson and Lolley Halls are \$105.00 for double occupancy and \$130.00 for private rooms. Duplex Apartments are \$198.00 a month for a one-bedroom apartment and \$209.00 a month for two bedrooms. The Townhouse Apartments are \$253.00 a month for two bedrooms and \$268.00 a month for three bedrooms.

## Recreation

The Town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. Tennis courts are also available.

\*Except where otherwise cited, Catalog prerequisites for summer school courses are waived. Students are encouraged to consider carefully their level of proficiency when selecting electives in areas where no formal study has been done.

### MAY 1990

#### H 2350s Practicum in World Religions

Mr. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field experience conducted in selected settings among centers of world religionists in Washington, D.C. 2 semester hours. May 11-16, 1990. Prerequisites: H 2220 or H 2222 or by permission of the instructor.

#### M 4232s Workshop on Urban Studies

Mr. Bland

A workshop designed for Baptist church, associational and denominational leaders, treating Christian mission and ministries in urban settings, with special attention to the work of the association and mission strategy. New York, NY. 2 semester hours. May 19-25, 1990. Prerequisite: Special application required.

#### T 3323s The Church and Social Change

Mr. Hewitt

A study of selected ecumenical, denominational and church models for social change with special attention to the church's social strategy and the theological justification for programs of social reform. Requires travel to Americus, GA. 3 semester hours. May 17-26, 1990. Prerequisite: T 3300 and permission of professor.



### JUNE 1990

#### H 2324s Practicum in Home Missions (Praxis)

Mr. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in conjunction with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and Baptist State Conventions in Pennsylvania-Jersey, Washington, D.C., and Virginia. 10 weeks summer practicum, open to middlers, seniors and graduate students. 8 semester hours. June 1-August 10, 1990. Permission of professor required.

#### M 4826s Advanced Practicum in Personal and Church Renewal

Mr. Clemmons

An advanced workshop approach in spiritual formation and renewal of the life of the church. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: M4821, M4930 or permission of professor.

June 5, 1990: All students meet with professor for orientation.

All students must attend one of the following:

Wellspring/Church of the Saviour, "Orientation"—May 24-27, 1990 and "School of Christian Living," June 20-24, 1990, Germantown, MD. (Participants must attend both).

Dunklin Memorial Camp—"School of Prayer," Okeechokee, Florida—June 24-30, 1990.

The Oratory—"Horizons of the Spirit," (Spiritual Direction Workshop), Rock Hill, SC, July 16-20, 1990.

#### H 2458s Practicum in International Evangelism

Mr. Roberts

A comprehensive experience in an international setting including both practical involvement in personal and other types of evangelism and exposure to various methodologies and ministries of evangelism. 4 semester hours. Involves travel to Eastern Europe. Dates to be announced. Permission of professor required.

The elements of Koine Greek for beginners in the Greek New Testament. Credit will be given only if both B 1400 and B 1401 are completed satisfactorily. 3 semester hours.

**M 4420s**    **The Ministry of Worship**

**Mr. Blackmore**

A study of the nature of worship, both liturgical and non-liturgical, and materials and methods of worship in the local church. 2 semester hours.

**M 4600s**    **The Pastor's Multiple Ministry**

**Mr. Cogdill**

A study of the multiple ministries of the modern pastor, including planning a preaching program, filling the pastoral role of the congregation, planning services and activities, and relating his ministry to the community and denomination. 2 semester hours.

**M 4231s**    **Seminar on Urban Studies**

**Mr. Bland**

A study of structures and problems of the secular city, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches. 6 semester hours. Monday-Friday. Special application required.

**Mr. Eddins**

A survey of the biblical teaching and doctrinal development of the Spirit of God. Attention will be given to fundamental theological problems of the doctrine of the Spirit. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: T3000 or by permission of instructor.

**Mr. Reid**

A critical interpretation based on the English text. 2 semester hours. Prerequisites: B1500 & B1501

**B 1224s**    **Drama in the Old Testament and Contemporary Literature**

**Mr. Rogers**

An examination of the dramatic qualities of Old Testament religion and a comparative study of drama in the Old Testament with contemporary literature. 2 semester hours. Prerequisites: B 1200 and B 1201.

**H 2006s**    **Christian Classics and Biography**

**Mr. Miller**

Studies in selected classic source materials from all periods of church history with special attention given to the careers of the authors of the chosen works. 2 semester hours.

**M 4923s**    **Theory and Practice in Educational Administration**

An integrative study of local church and denominational administration of selected church programs. The relationship between theory and practice will be examined during seminar and workshop sessions conducted in local churches/denominational offices. 2 semester hours. **M 4701s**    **Supervised Ministry II**

**Mr. Pyle**

An elective course offered the semester following the completion of Supervised Ministry (M 4700). The student who elects to take this course may not take either of the advanced courses "Concurrent Internship" or "Intern Year Away." The requirements for the course must be fulfilled in the same location and with the same supervisor approved for the preceding course. 2 semester hours. (Restricted to students currently taking M 4700. Conference with Instructor required prior to registration.)

for Ministry (First Colloquium)**

**Mr. Halbrooks**

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. Open only to D.Min. students. 4 semester hours.

**BHTM 0411s Colloquium: Action-Research  
Approaches to Ministry  
(Second Colloquium)**

**Mr. Meiburg**

An interdisciplinary investigation of several of the theological foundations and functions of ministry (e.g. preaching, pastoral care) with attention to the candidates' field experiences and projects in ministry. Open only to D.Min. students. 4 semester hours.

A study of the effective use of the Bible in preaching. Attention will be given to the interpretation of the Scriptures in the work of preaching with emphasis upon their relevance to the contemporary situation. 2 semester hours.
